

# Judges Race Most Active In Lamar County

The May 3 election in Lamar County sees the County Judgeship as the most hotly contested race, with incumbent Brady Fisher, and candidates Ray Spencer and Robert A. (Bob) Burns running. Debates and forums have characterized campaigns which have been informative for voters no matter which way they cast their ballot.

The office of County Clerk has seen some active stumping by Brenda Biard and Linda Sudduth, also.

To the Duke is unopposed in her

bid for District Clerk, as is Patricia Miller in her race for County Treasurer.

Fred Nutt Sr. and L.Z. (Pete) Wilkerson are vying for the Precinct 5, Place 2 Justice of the Peace position.

Outside of County offices, the Democratic Party Primary Election Ballot will list the following candidates for office.

Running unopposed for United States Representative, District 1 is incumbent Jim Chapman. In the gubernatorial race, along with incumbent Governor Mark White are A. Don Crowder, Bobby Locke, Andrew C. Briscoe, III, Sheila Bilyeu and Ron Slover.

In the Lieutenant Governor race are two candidates, Bill Hobby and David Young. Attorney General Jim Mattox is unopposed in his re-election attempt.

Comptroller of Public Accounts Bob Bullock is also running unopposed for that office.

State Treasurer candidate is Ann

W. Richards.

Garry Mauro is running unopposed for Commissioner of the General Land Office and two candidates, Noel S. Cowling and Jim Hightower are candidates for Commissioner of Agriculture.

Railroad Commissioner candidates are John Sharp, John C. Poulard, P.S. (Sam) Ervin and W.A. (Bill) MacNaughton.

Running for Justice, Supreme Court, Place 1 are Oscar H. Mauzy, Shirley Butts, Sears McGee and Hugo

Touchy. In the Justice, Supreme Court, Place 2 race is Ted Akin, Jim Brady, Colin Kelly Kaufman and Robert M. Campbell. In Justice, Supreme Court, Place 3 race is Jim Wallace. In the Justice, Supreme Court, Place 4, unexpired term, candidates are John E. Humphreys, David M. Ivy, Jay Gibson and Raul A. Gonzalez.

In the race for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1 are candidates Rusty Duncan, George (Jorge) Martinez, Preston Dial and

Paul R. Reagan. Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2 candidate is Mike McCormick while Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 3 is Marvin O. Teague.

Candidate for State Representative, District 2, running unopposed is L.P. "Pete" Patterson and William J. Cornelius runs unopposed for Chief Justice, Court of Appeals, 6th district. Justice, Court of Appeals, 6th District, Unexpired Term candidate is Ben Z. Grant, who is also unopposed.

**NICHOLS' WORTH**

This column is intended to be the definitive work on distinguishing weeds from flowers or garden vegetable seedlings.

After perusing it, there can be no doubt as to the true character of weeds vs. desirable plants.

When seedlings, whether they are weeds or flowers, first push their sturdy heads through the ground, they frequently are indistinguishable.

Somehow, although the gardener knows he planted in a straight row, there are always little seedlings within the desirables that are weeds, and some desirables always come up outside of the line.

Pull up the plant in question. If it features a four inch tap root...it's a weed. Flowers and vegetables have small, feeble tap roots. That makes them harder to grow. The harder they are to grow, the more we want them. (A rather strange fact, but true.)

Replant the seedling...if it dies, it's a flower or veggie. Leave the seedling with the long tap root lying on top of the ground. Within a day or so, by some process unknowable to mankind, it will have managed to turn its roots downward, and will be happily growing, straight and proud, doing its little bit for weed dom!

These two tests should remove all doubt. But occasionally there will be seedlings one is just SURE are desirables, these, when left, will outstrip the others by leaps and bounds, putting down roots to the far reaches of the earth, and becoming almost impossible to pull. THAT is a weed. Never mind just how much it LOOKS like a flower, if it grows fast, doesn't need water or fertilizer...it's NOT a flower.

Oh, yes, another thing, the weeds will outnumber the other plants about 15 to one. They are never hard to sprout, don't even have to be coaxed up with dirt, just land on anything short of solid concrete!

Remember, weeds, much like insects, are intent upon taking over the world. The only way to truly destroy them may be to WANT them to grow. Cherish them, plant them, hoe them, don't let those nasty flowers threaten them. Ten to one, they'll die!

At any rate, it's a thought!!

## Friendship Marks Bob Allen's Thirty Years Of Sales!

Bob and Margie Allen have raised five children on Moorman Feeds. No, they didn't make the children eat the feed, but it has certainly fed, clothed and educated the whole family.

Now after 29 1/2 years, Bob is going to retire. He has, over that near 30-year span, been in the state's top one or two percent as a Moorman salesman each year, and in 1979 was THE top salesman.

He has been responsible as district sales manager for the past thirteen years for sales, service and distribution of Moorman products over large portions of Lamar, Red River and Bowie counties.

For Bob, service is the key word...not sales. Few salesmen will ever match his record, or his relationship with customers.

In all the years, he has only taken one straight week of vacation, although much more was due him. He and his wife and children have personally delivered every order, never trusting "hired help" to stack or deliver right, but keeping it all in the family.

They have attended graduations and weddings, and been a part of the "family" to uncounted farm and ranch families. They have shared in their joys...and their pains.

Bob takes no credit for himself, but gives it all to his customers.

"Farmers and ranchers are special people, and they have more integrity than anyone," he says seriously. "In all these years there has never been a lock on the warehouse door, and folks have gotten what they needed, left a note and I've never missed a bag of feed."

Mutual trust, integrity, that's what it's all about," he smiles softly.

His orders have ranged from single sacks of feed to 100 tons of protein blocks at a time. A rough estimate leads him to calculate that they have sold between seven and nine million dollars worth of Moorman products during his career.

His job with the company is the second job he has ever had. When he met Margie, his wife, he worked in a

defense plant in Grand Prairie. He didn't like the work, and wanted a chance to get out and work with agriculture some way. A friend told him of the family owned, family operated Moorman company, and he tried it out.

Their oldest child, Pam, is in Germany at the University of Berlin; Bob II is in Nashville, Tennessee; Nan, the only one who is married, and her husband Terry Fry have recently provided Bob and Margie with their first grandchild, Joshua; another daughter, Kim, lives in Paris and John C. is a senior in high school and still at home.

All five youngsters graduated from Prairiland High School and all five show an honesty, love and devotion to family that reflects their upbringing.

Bob's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Fred Allen of Cunningham and much of Bob's deep religious conviction, love of people and hard working attitude can be attributed to their upbringing.

Many ranchers completely trust their feed program to Bob's knowledge. They have asked him to set up the type of program they need, and he figures it, delivers it, and makes sure it's being stocked.

During all this, he smiles, "No one has ever tried to haggle on price. They just tell me, 'Bob, give me the best price you can,' and they know I'll do it."

He takes a justifiable pride in the implicit trust of his customers, and just can't say enough about the quality of farm folks.

Sadness creeps into his voice as he talks about today's agriculture problems.

"We've ridden the cattle business through lots of ups and downs, but the present troubles are the worst," he says.

Jokingly, Bob recalls all the times that he has "happened" up to the ranch house door just about noon time and been invited to partake of some good home cooking.

He has given away about \$10,000 of caps, gum, candy, balloons and various advertising products, main-

ly to kids.

The Allen's adore children, and Bob has known the names, school progress and achievements of generations of kids that appeared on his rounds.

"Margie has been my main asset," he contends. "She has kept the records and helped deliver uncounted loads of feed...she's just the best!"

What do they plan to do after retirement?

Well, first they want to travel. History buffs, they have been too busy to see the historic places they want to. First stop, they hope, will be the Great Smokey Mountains, then the Eastern Seaboard with its various historic spots.

After that? Well, they plan on giving each other rods and reels for their anniversary! They have between one hundred and one hundred-fifty private fishing spots available to them...invitations extended in earnest from customers!

A Herbalife sales business will provide some more contacts with their most treasured possession...friendship with people.

Participating in the RACE for Life Program in Paris has the couple walking between five and eight miles a day, too.

Three years ago, their log home burned to the ground. Everything was lost. They moved down the road, leaving their place with only the feed warehouse standing. During that time, for several weeks, Bob's costumes picked up their own feed, using the honor system, so that Bob could make arrangements for living and construction of a new home. Again, nothing was missing.

Now the Allen's live in a quiet, flower surrounded brick home four miles west of Blossom.

This week the Allen's will travel to Kerrville for a special retirement dinner for Bob. Sales personnel from all over the state will honor him.

Saturday, May 3, an informal gathering at the Allen's home will be held. Friends are invited to come by

between 6 and 8 o'clock. Bob Allen lives the philosophy of "to have a friend you must first be a

friend"....because of that, one wonders if the house will have enough room for all who will be there!

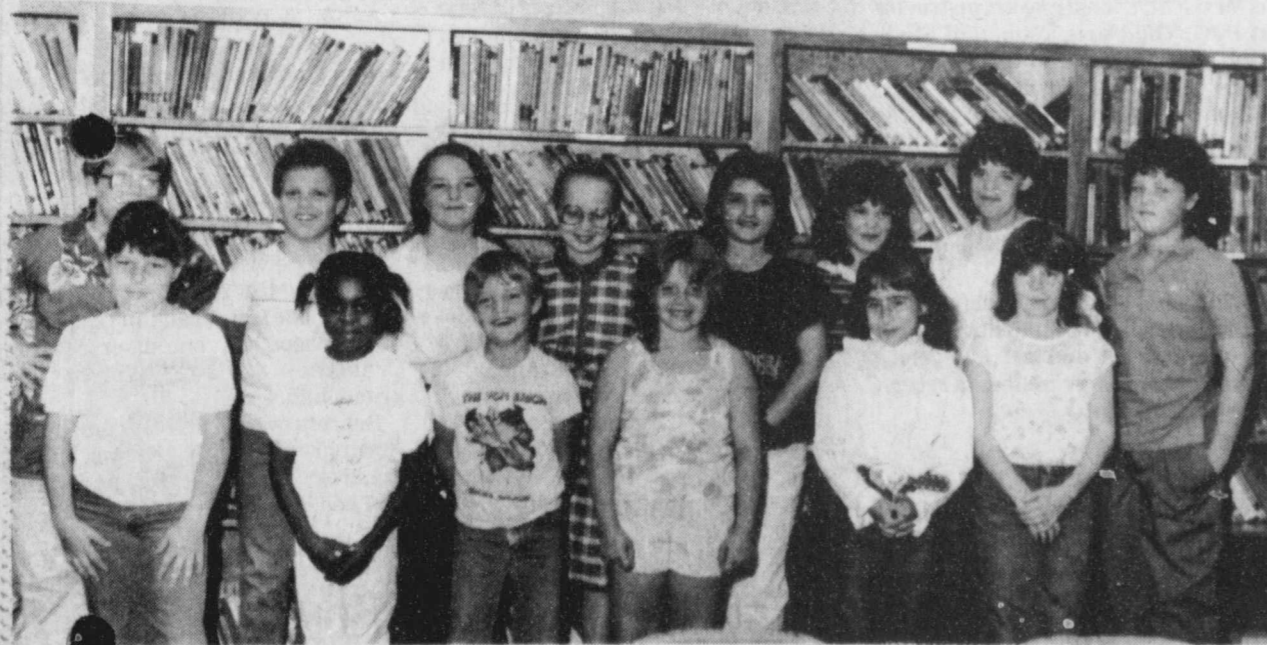
## Judge Fisher Announces Grants For County

Lamar County Judge Brady Fisher has announced that Lamar County has received approval from the Ark-Tex Council of Governments Criminal Justice Advisory Committee for three grants to assist the community.

Fisher, a member of the ATCOG Criminal Justice Committee, state that approval had been obtained for second-year funding for the county's crime prevention officer in the amount of \$21,588, the highest amount obtained by any entity in the crime prevention field. Fisher, who made the presentation, expressed appreciation to Sheriff Jim Parker for his cooperation and assistance in the preparation of the application.

Fisher said that the five school district in the county received second-year funding for the community's alternative classroom for disruptive youth in the amount of \$17,808, also the highest amount obtained by any entity in the juvenile field. Wayne Beard, Paris ISD Assistant Superintendent of Finance, made the presentation.

Fisher added that Family Haven, a county-sponsored application, obtained second-year approval of \$11,454 for counseling services for battered wives. Carol Romanski, Family Haven Executive Director, presented that proposal.

ed into scoring position as he stole second and third base. An out later, Scott Scudder singled where Connot did to drive in Connot and the Patriots led 1-0. Leanup hitter John Dusenberry reached on a fielder's choice and then Heath Kennedy moved Scudder and Dusenberry up a base as he grounded back to the pitcher.

With two outs and two on, Chris Sparks dumped a short single into left field to drive in Scudder and

Dusenberry and give Prairiland 3-0 lead. Tony Duncan followed with a single, however the Patriots failed to score again in the inning as well as the game.

Blackburn, who experienced control problems early in the game, found a groove late in the game as he followed up his last start, a no-hit shutout, with a two-hit 1 run game as the Patriots went on to win 3-1. Blackburn finished the game with

11 strikeouts. Joel Ballard and Chris Sparks were the leading hitters on the day as they both went 2 for 3 at the plate.

Last Friday, the Pittsburg Pirates forfeited to Prairiland because enough of their players are failing a class and cannot provide a full team. The next Patriot game will be Tuesday as the Patriots host the tough Mt. Vernon Tigers with the first pitch scheduled for 4:00 p.m.

Three Paris Junior College students received scholarships for their writing and art accomplishments, and numerous others were awarded prizes at the annual creative writing and art program April 15 at the college.



The Pattonville Water Supply Corporation has been notified by the Texas Department of Health that the water being supplied by our system exceeds the maximum constituent level for Fluoride established by the Department's "Drinking Water Standards" which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act", Public Law 93-523 (U.S.).

The limit for this area has been set at 1.6 milligrams of Fluoride per liter of water. The samples of water from our system contained 3.8 milligrams of Fluoride per liter. There is no immediate health hazard for drinking water containing Fluoride at this level.

The Fluoride may cause mottling (brown staining) of the teeth in children under 14 years of age. All dentists in this area are aware of the Fluoride level.

## The Jesse Chisholm Trail

Jesse Chisholm gave his name to one of the most famous episodes in western history, but he never knew it. Chisholm, of Scotch and Cherokee ancestry, migrated with the Cherokees from Tennessee to Arkansas in the 1830s and later set up a trading post at Council Grove, on the North Canadian River near present-day Oklahoma City. His freight wagons cut a 220-mile path from Wichita, Kan., down to his store, and in 1866 when a Texas cattleman asked the best way to drive a herd to the Kansas and Missouri markets, he was advised to "take Chisholm's trail."

Joseph G. McCoy was hired by the developers of the new town of Abilene, Kan., to get a trail laid out to bring Texas herds to their railhead. McCoy's trail began deep in South Texas, the first cattle going up to Abilene in 1867. But instead of being called "McCoy Trail" or "Abilene Trail," by 1868 the route from Texas to Kansas was called the Chisholm Trail, giving its title to legendary cattle drives of story, song and film. The Texas portion of the trail saw several herds combined below San Antonio and again near Austin, crossing the Colorado River. The Brazos was crossed at Kimball Bend or Waco, then all herds combined at Fort Worth, continuing through Denton, Cooke and Montague counties to the dangerous crossing of "Big Red" at Red River Station.

Fort Worth was where the trail drivers outfitted their cowboys for the long trip across the Indian Nations. In season, the trail was a living, animal river. In 1871, half a million head of cattle passed through Fort Worth going up the Chisholm Trail. Although later cattle trails moved westward, Fort Worth remained "Cowntown" in the

hearts and minds of Texas forever more. Poor Jesse Chisholm, he died in 1868, reputedly from eating tainted bear meat from a copper pot, never dreaming how celebrated his name would become.

## THOUGHT FOR FOOD

**Heavenly Angel Cake Surprise**

This old-fashioned cake has a surprise pineapple cream filling.

- 1 pkg. (14.5 oz.) angel food cake mix
- 1 can (8 oz.) Dole Crushed Pineapple in Juice
- 2 1/2 cups whipping cream
- 1/2 cup chopped maraschino cherries
- 1/4 cup toasted chopped almonds
- 1 tbsp. sugar

Prepare cake according to package directions. Drain pineapple well, pressing out excess juice with back of spoon. Whip 1 cup cream. Fold in pineapple, cherries and almonds. Slice and reserve a 1-inch thick layer from top of cake. Cut cake around outer sides and inner sides, leaving about 1-inch thick border. Remove inside cake with hands; break in chunks. Fold into pineapple cream. Spoon pineapple mixture into cake hollow. Cover cake with reserved top. Whip remaining cream with sugar. Spread over cake. Refrigerate 2 hours, or overnight. Makes 8 to 10 servings. \*Reserve juice for beverage.

- Fruit Crumb Coffee Cake
- 1 package (18.25 ounces) deluxe white cake mix
  - 1 cup flour
  - 1 package active dry yeast
  - 2/3 cup warm water
  - 2 eggs
  - 1 18-ounce jar Smucker's Red Raspberry Preserves or Apricot Preserves
  - 1/4 cup sugar
  - 1 teaspoon cinnamon
  - 6 tablespoons butter or margarine
  - 1 cup sifted powdered sugar
  - 1 tablespoon corn syrup
  - 1 tablespoon milk
- Pre-heat oven to 375°F. Reserve 2 1/2 cups cake mix in large bowl, combine remaining cake mix, flour, yeast, water and eggs. Mix by hand 100 strokes. Spread batter evenly in a greased 13x9x2-inch pan.  
 Spoon Red Raspberry Preserves or Apricot Preserves evenly over dough in pan.  
 In medium bowl, combine reserved cake mix, sugar, cinnamon and butter with fork until fine. Sprinkle over preserves. Bake 30-35 minutes or until golden brown.  
 In small mixing bowl, blend powdered sugar, corn syrup and milk. Drizzle over warm or cool cake.  
 Makes 12-16 servings.
