

Robert Burns Defeats Brady Fisher

Lamar County will have a new judge as Robert A. (Bob) Burns captured the judge's runoff elections 3,928 to 2,748 Saturday. Incumbent Judge Brady Fisher garnered 41 percent of the votes to Burns' 59 percent. Also defeated were Precinct 2 Commissioner Maxie Wofford, 607 to opponent Ronald Dockrey's 1,038, and

Precinct 4 Commissioner James C. (Dode) Wheeler who had 980 to opponent Victor Easterwood's 1,505. A total of 6,728 votes were cast in Lamar County. Burns has no Republican opponent in the November elections, and will take office on January 1, 1987. Fisher has been judge since 1979, and was seeking a third term. Burns

had waged an efficient and very active campaign for office. Fisher says at present he is committed to support State Rep. L.P. Patterson in the State Senate race and Garry Mauro in the land commissioner's race, but has no political plans of his own right now. In the statewide races, Lamar

County voters went for John Sharp over P.S. Ervin in the Railroad Commissioner's race with 4,564 to 1,147 votes. Oscar Mauzy was the local choice over Shirley Butts for the Place 1 seat and Robert M. Campbell won over Jim Brady for the Place 2 seat, 3,104 to 2,531.

Jay Gibson was favored over incumbent Raul Gonzalez for the unexpired Place 4 term, 3,680 to 2,083. Rusty Duncan was the favorite for Place 1 on the Criminal Appeals Courts 4,200 to 1,328. In the GOP runoff, Lamar County picked David Davidson over Aaron L. Bullock for Lieutenant Governor, 77

to 29; Ed Walsh over Roy E. Barrera, Jr. 60 to 50 in the Attorney General's race, Grady T. Yarbrough over M.D. Anderson, Jr. in the election for Land Commissioner 57 to 43 and John Thomas Henderson over Milton Fox in the Railroad Commissioner's election 58 to 48.

Patriots Capture Regional, State Hopes High

Last Saturday afternoon in Duncanville, the Prairiland Patriots defeated the Waco Connally Cadets 4-1 in the regional finals to advance to the state semi-finals in Austin.

Due to the field being under water in Mesquite, the Patriots and faithful fans migrated to Duncanville to get the game in. Over an hour after the scheduled start, the Patriots came up to bat looking for an early lead. Unfortunately, the Patriots never came close to scoring in the first inning as the Cadet pitcher threw strike after strike.

In the bottom of the first inning, Patriot hurler Scott Scudder was getting the outs the hard way. After a sharp leadoff double by the Cadets, Joel Ballard engaged a line drive and threw to shortstop Heath Kennedy to double off the unwary runner and suddenly the Patriots were out of a jam. Then for the final out of the inning, Tony Duncan in right field made a spectacular catch to keep the game scoreless after one inning.

After a scoreless second inning, the Patriots got on the scoreboard after two quick outs. Joel Ballard started the rally with his second walk of the

game and then came around to score when Scudder hit a Bubba Frazier fastball off of the centerfield fence for a triple. The Patriots failed to score in the inning, but the Patriots had a big 1-0 lead after two and one-half innings.

In the top of the fifth inning, with two outs, Ballard continued to be a spark as he hit a fastball 370 feet for a home run to widen the lead to 2-0. The way Scudder was pitching at the time, the lead looked sufficient.

With the Cadet pitcher appearing to be running out of gas in the sixth inning, the Patriots had their biggest ral-

ly of the afternoon. Shortstop Heath Kennedy led off with a double and moved to third base when Tony Duncan reached on an error. Craig Burns then singled to left field to score Kennedy and suddenly the Patriots had a 3-0 lead. After a pop-out by Mike Blackburn, Mike Connot drove in the final Patriot run of the game with a single to score Duncan. Going into the bottom of the sixth, the Patriots led the Cadets 4-0.

With the Patriots leading and three outs away from a trip to Austin in the seventh inning, the Cadets began to

fight back. After back to back hits, the Patriot lead was 4-1 with a runner on and no outs. However, Kennedy caught a ground ball at shortstop and threw to first for the first out of the inning. After a bases on balls by Scudder, Scudder coaxed the next batter into hitting into a Sparks to Ballard to Blackburn double play to end the game with the Patriots on top 4-1.

The next game for Prairiland will be Thursday afternoon in the state semi-finals in Austin as they will take on Medina Valley at Nelson Field with the game time set at 2:30.

James Chambers has been hired as the new football coach at Prairiland High School. Chambers has been teaching in Mt. Pleasant.

He will replace Mike Allen, who left the coaching position to coach at a different school next year.

Chambers and his wife, Mary have two children, Julie, age 13 and Stephen, age 7. They are moving from

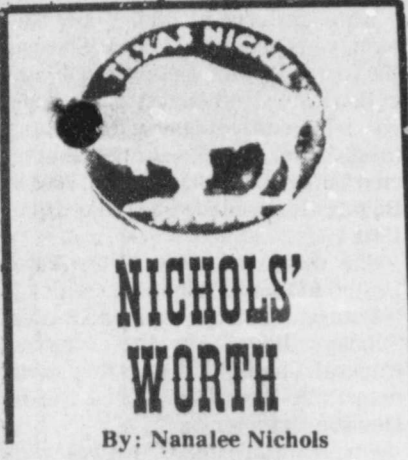


DEPORT-Eighth grade graduating class of Deport made a rainbow-like picture with the dif-

There are so many others, the richness of powdered sugar, the faint, standard, reassuring odor of plain, ordinary salt...all blended into a melage of smells calculated to bring back memories, provoke desires to cook, or conjure up pictures of faraway places.

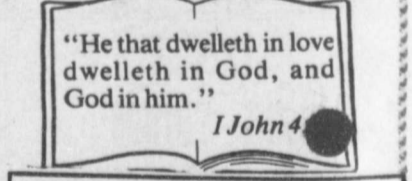

He has also been involved in numerous other church training, education and ministering positions.

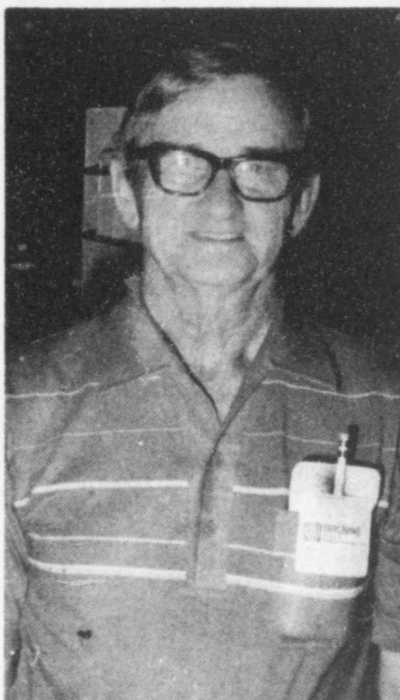

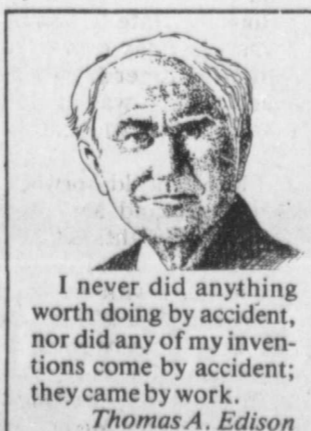

The grant approval was announced recently by Governor Mark White, following a competitive bidding cycle supervised by the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

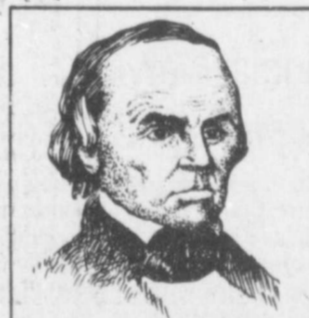

Weed Control Spraying Going On

By Herb Brevard

Many producers are currently spraying for weed control in their pastures. Most weeds are rather large, so it will take more chemical to do a good job of weed control, according to Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr. agronomist.

If the weed has already seeded out, Reeves says there is no need to try to kill it, except for looks. The seeds have already been produced for next year's weed crop and the damage is done. The lesson to be learned is to apply control measures earlier to prevent seed development.

When applying herbicides, make sure the sprayer is accurately

calibrated for dispensing the proper amount of chemical. Too much chemical costs extra money and does not improve contro. Too little chemical does not give control and the spraying expense is wasted.

Since most producers have gotten the first cutting of hay, they need to examine where and how round bales will be stored. Stored improperly, as much as 20 to 40 percent loss can be experienced. Ideally, store the hay in a barn or shed. The next best place is to store the hay on gravel or pallets to break contact with the soil. Always store hay on an area with excellent drainage.

Tomato Plants Have Leaf Disease

The recent rains have been excellent for grass production and home gardens in general, but the most humid conditions have been ideal for the development of disease problems in tomatoes.

Early Blight is appearing in many tomato plants and control measures must be applied or most of the foliage will be destroyed. It is easily controlled by the use of Manzate or Dithane.

The disease first appears on the older foliage down next to the ground. Also, it normally first appears on leaves inside the canopy where air circulation is poor.

The first sign of the disease is brown appearing spots on the leaves. The next step is yellow around the spot and then the entire leaf turns yellow and dies.

Once the disease gets a start, it can spread rapidly to leaves up on the plant. If one does not keep a close watch, a large part of the leaves can be affected before one is aware the disease problem exist.

The disease does not affect the fruit. However, fruit is susceptible to sunburn due to the absence of most of the

leaves.
I would suggest that a film of the fungicide be kept on the plant at all times as long as the humid weather conditions exist.

There is a five day wait from day of application to harvest where either Manzate or Dithane is used. Captan is another fungicide possibility, but probably not as effective as the other two chemicals. However, there is no time limitation.

If one was unable to apply their insecticide for control of the casebearer this past weekend, since the rains came down, then it should be applied immediately.

The County Wheat Tour held last week was well attended as produces from adjoining counties joined Lamar County producers and agribusinessmen on the tour. A special thanks to Estes Chemicals for providing the milk and donuts.

Individuals are encouraged to stop by the demonstration sites at their convenience to inspect the plantings. Each is identified with signs. The variety demonstration is located across the road from the Hickory Grove Cemetery and the fungicide plot is about one mile north on FM 137. The milo grass and weed control demonstration located on the George Humphries Farm is about one mile south of the intersection of 137 and FM 824.

You can expect to be receiving yield data on the wheat plots shortly after harvest. We are anxious to see if any economic benefit was obtained where the fungicides were used.

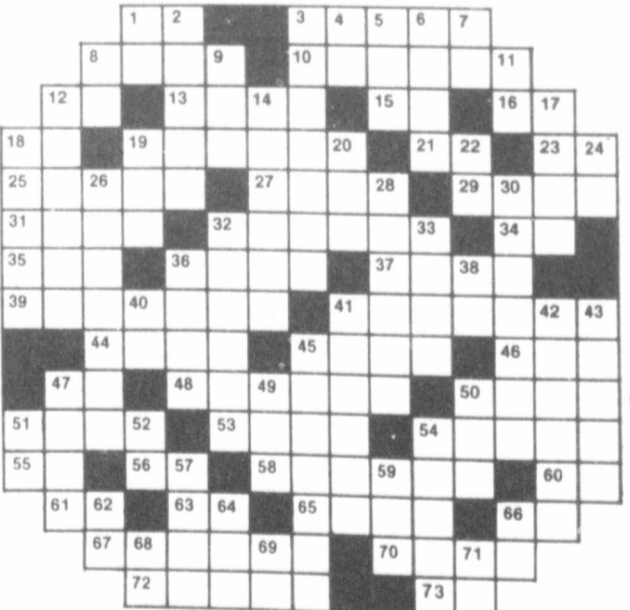

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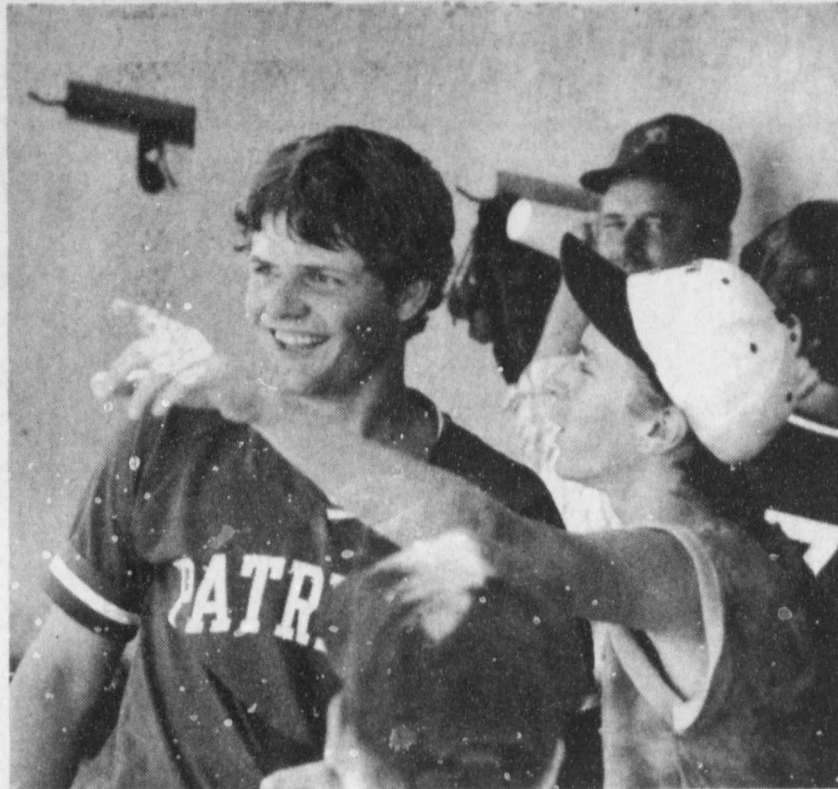
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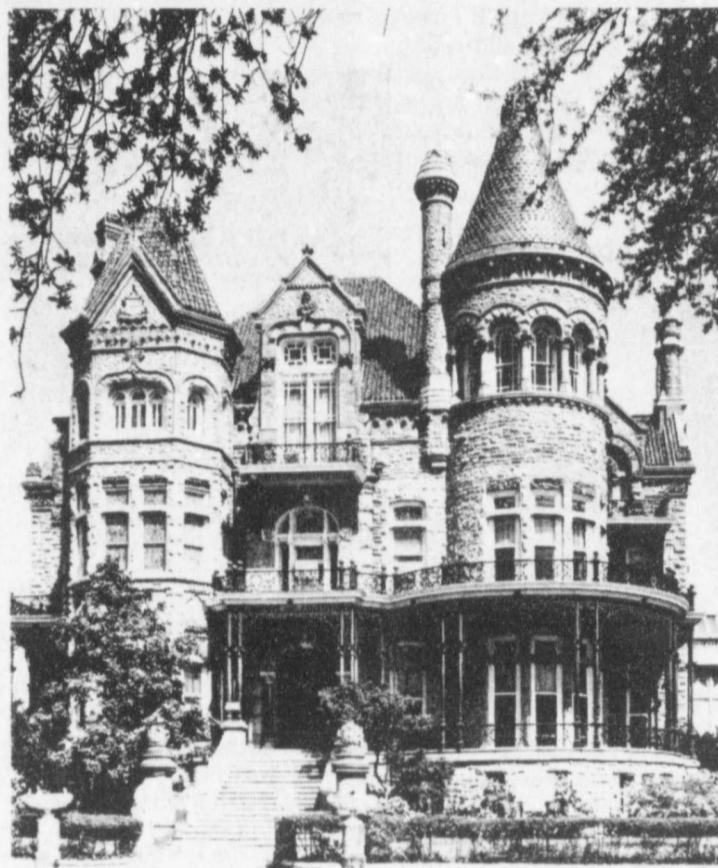

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Apology from Gen. Sheridan

TEXAS SKETCHES

One of the most famous remarks ever made about Texas came from Union Army General Philip Sheridan, military governor of Texas and Louisiana for a period during the Reconstruction era following the Civil War, who bitterly compared Texas and Hell as places of residence. The remark has achieved such legendary status that some historians, in and out of Texas, have questioned whether it was actually made by Sheridan or was only words put in his mouth by later writers.

But in 1880, on a visit to Galveston accompanying former President U.S. Grant, Little Phil, as he was called, admitted making the quip, but attempted to explain it away. Sam Acheson's book, *35,000 Days in Texas* describes how it happened. Speaking at a public dinner at the Tremont Hotel honoring him and President Grant, Sheridan's talk was filled with sentiments flattering enough for any Texan, and in conclusion he told his (mostly) ex-Confederate hosts, "Speaking so kindly of Texas — and I speak from my heart —

probably I ought to explain a remark I once made about it. It was in 1866, and I had just returned to San Antonio from a hard trip to Chihuahua on some Mexican business when I received an order to proceed at once to New Orleans. I hired relays and coaches so that I had only to hitch on the wagon and go speedily to get the boat from Galveston. I traveled night and day. It was in August and, need I say, very warm. I arrived here covered with dust, my eyes and ears and throat filled with it. I went to a little hotel in that condition and had just

gone up to the register when one of these newspaper men rushed up to me and said, 'General, how do you like Texas?'

"I was mad and I said, 'If I owned Texas and all Hell, I would rent out Texas and live in Hell.' Needless to say, that did not represent my true opinion of this magnificent State." Sheridan was given a standing ovation.

Don't Burn A "Bundle Of Money"

Burning wheat stubble is bad business. For an average wheat crop, burning stubble sends about \$10.00 worth of nitrogen fertilizer an acre up in smoke. All nitrogen in residue is lost by burning.

Using conservation tillage, however, you can plant in wheat stubble and use the nitrogen that is tied up in the residue said Charles VanDeaver, district conservationist

for USDA's Soil Conservation Service in Clarksville.

"The use of wheat residue is especially important in the Lamar and Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District, where a large acreage of wheat is planted annually," VanDeaver continued. "Less than one fourth the acres are planted by conservation tillage. This practice, depending upon equipment used, leaves from 90 to 30 percent residue on the ground after planting.

"When residue decomposes in the soil surface, the nitrogen is made available for the next crop. In addition to the nitrogen, decomposing stubble adds organic matter to the soil, helps control erosion, reduces soil moisture loss, and improves soil aeration, tilth and permeability. The stubble also helps provide a habitat for such wildlife as pheasants, rabbits, and quail."
