

## **State Budget Deficit** Will Probably Go Higher

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday said Texas lawmakers should expect the state's budget deficit to go higher.

"A skyrocketing unemployment rate will be one key factor moving the state's budget deficit well above the curretn \$2.3 billion. Workers without jobs and paychecks reduce economic activity and taxes," Bullock said.

He said the 10.5 percent jobless rate announced last week is not the only economic indicator that will push the budget deficit higher.

"We expect to finish a new revenue estimate before August 1, and, frankly, none of the indicators contain an ounce of good news."

Bullock said losses in the oil and gas

economy as well as other industries. "I'm not going to second guess the exact number we'll be facing at the end of the month, but with deteriorating conditions in the Texas economy it will be substantially higher than the current estimate."

Bullock said besides oil, construction and unemmployment there are other factors affecting the state's revenue picture.

Federal energy rulings, court cases, Gramm-Rudman, loss of state income interest, to name a few, pose potential losses in the hundreds of millions, Bullock said.

He said analysts working with the latest tax and economic data have preliminary findings that indicate the





#### Gramma Barnes' Gingerbread

- 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cups whole wheat pastry flour
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tsp. cinnamon <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp. cloves
- 1/2 tsp. ginger
- egg, beaten
- 1/4 cup melted butter
- 1/2 cup molasses
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1/2 cup boiling water
- 1/2 cup raisins

Sift flour. Combine flour, sugar, cinnamon, cloves and ginger in a large bowl. Combine the egg with the melted butter and molasses. Stir soda into boiling water and add to butter and egg mixture. Add liquids to dry ingredients and beat well. Fold in raisins. Pour into an 8 x 8 baking dish and bake at 350° for 30 minutes or until a knife inserted in center comes out clean. Serve with sweetened whipped cream.

## Hay Quality Variable This Summer

By Herb Brevard

Due to wet weather, hay has been cut at odd times this spring. The 28 day schedule, normally used as a guide for determining the cutting time, has not held due to the predictable weather. Therefore, ording to Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist, it is difficult to determine the quality of the hay without testing.

Reeves says that each cutting of hay should be tested and properly identified. Hay quality is important whether selling or buying hay. The quality will determine the best use for the hay, since different classes of livestock require different nutrition levels. Higher quality hay should be fed to lactating cows and developing heifers. The lower quality hay is generally sufficient for dry cows if the protein content is near seven percent.

Some hay has gotten wet after cutting and before baling. This can be a very discouraging situation, particulary if the hay supply is situation. The longer the hay stays situation, the more quality is lost. Reeves says that if the hay can be fluffed so that it will dry quicker, less quality will be lost.

The production of hay is a very expensive practice on most farms and ranches. Therefore, it is a definite economic advantage to study the cost of production, cost of harvesting, investment and labor requirements, and the best use of the land available before going into the hay baling business. Many smaller producers find it advantageous to purchase all their hay and use their land and capital for other purposes. Teh situation will vary drastically from farm to farm.

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




