

# Summertime, VBS, Learning And Fun!

Summertime and kids are beginning to get a little restless, and then it's Vacation Bible School time. A time to go to a school which offers everything that a real school doesn't, fun, crafts and short lessons!

In small communities, one can find almost the same youngsters at every Bible School held...denominations count...little and Baptists, Methodists and Presbyterians and everyone else, share one another's children for the week-long event.

Today's working mothers have made it necessary for some church schools to be held at night, but other

than that the programs remain pretty much the same, as they were when today's parents were yesterday's students.

Then it's to classes, but classes that few students mind attending. The crafts are probably one of the

most appealing features of the week-long activities.

Afterwards there is a time for refreshments. It seems that those who furnish and serve the cookies and punch receive as much joy from serving to the bright-eyed youngsters as the kids do from eating!

Surrounded by chattering groups, the adults ladle cups of cool punch and hand out the goodies smiling happily, watching the younger ones cheerfully dicing their mouths pink, and spreading crumbs liberally.

A play period follows afterwards, usually, with games to be learned. One standard that seems to come from generations of the past is "Red

Rover". Who cannot recall the joy of charging the line of clutched hands in a valiant attempt to break through, earning the right to capture a favorite person and take them over to "your" side?

Back in the sanctuary of the church, more singing, usually accomplished with maximum volume, if not tone, prayers and perhaps another lesson, and then dismissal.

The week goes by so fast, and when Bible School is over most youngsters feel a little regret.

On closing day, a special ceremony usually marks the end, and certificates are presented to each and every youngster. A chart usually has

gold stars to mark each student's attendance that week, and parents are allowed to come and view the week's accomplishments.

Then it is over for another summer. Bible School is an integral part of small-town life. A special time, with interaction between children and adults, a continuation of religious education that achieves a perfect blend of pleasure and education that is hard to beat. And if one school is over, there's usually another one upcoming, right until nearly the end of summer holidays.

A fairly recent arrival is the Vietnamese or Chinese food.

Speaking of seafood, the long Gulf Coast lines makes sure that Texans can enjoy the bounty of the sea to it's fullest...Gulf shrimp, crab and fresh fish are hard to beat.

Then, of course, there's those delicious fried catfish, bass and crappie which Texas lakes have no shortage of.

For those with a taste for the wild...what about squirrel stew, venison or quail?

## Richard Rast Is Trapper At Folklife Festival

Richard Rast, a Prairiland High School teacher, and an expert at trapping fur-bearing animals, will be one of the 6,000 participants at the Folklife Festival in San Antonio July 31 through August 3.

Rast says that "My trapping experience began when I was about 10 years old," adding that he'd trapped extensively in Texas and Alaska.

"It is my goal to educate the general public about the heritage of trapping, the necessity of predator control and the important financial asset of furs to our state," Rast explained. Rast, who lives near Paris, takes that goal seriously. He is a member of the North Texas Trap-

per's Association and he brings more than 40 years of trapping experience to the Folklife Festival each summer to share his unique knowledge with visitors.

Over 100,000 visitors learn about the fascinating pioneer heritage and ethnic diversity of the state during the 15th annual festival, sponsored by the University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures and held at San Antonio.

Other events or skills include a one room schoolroom, boot making, saddle making, quilting, rug making, clay pots, cedar bark baskets, horsehair ropes and rawhide whips.

Live folk music, dances, ethnic food and a world of other fascinating things are to be found at the festival.

## May Savings Bond Sales Up

Sales of Series EE Savings Bonds in Texas during the month of May, 1986, were \$45,825,627, up 51.7% over May 1985, T.J. Morrow, District Director for U.S. Savings Bonds Division, announced recently. This amount brings the total sales in Texas since January 1986 to \$174,413,964, an increase of \$34,170,003 over the same period in 1985, for 47.4% of the state's assigned dollar goal of \$370 million.

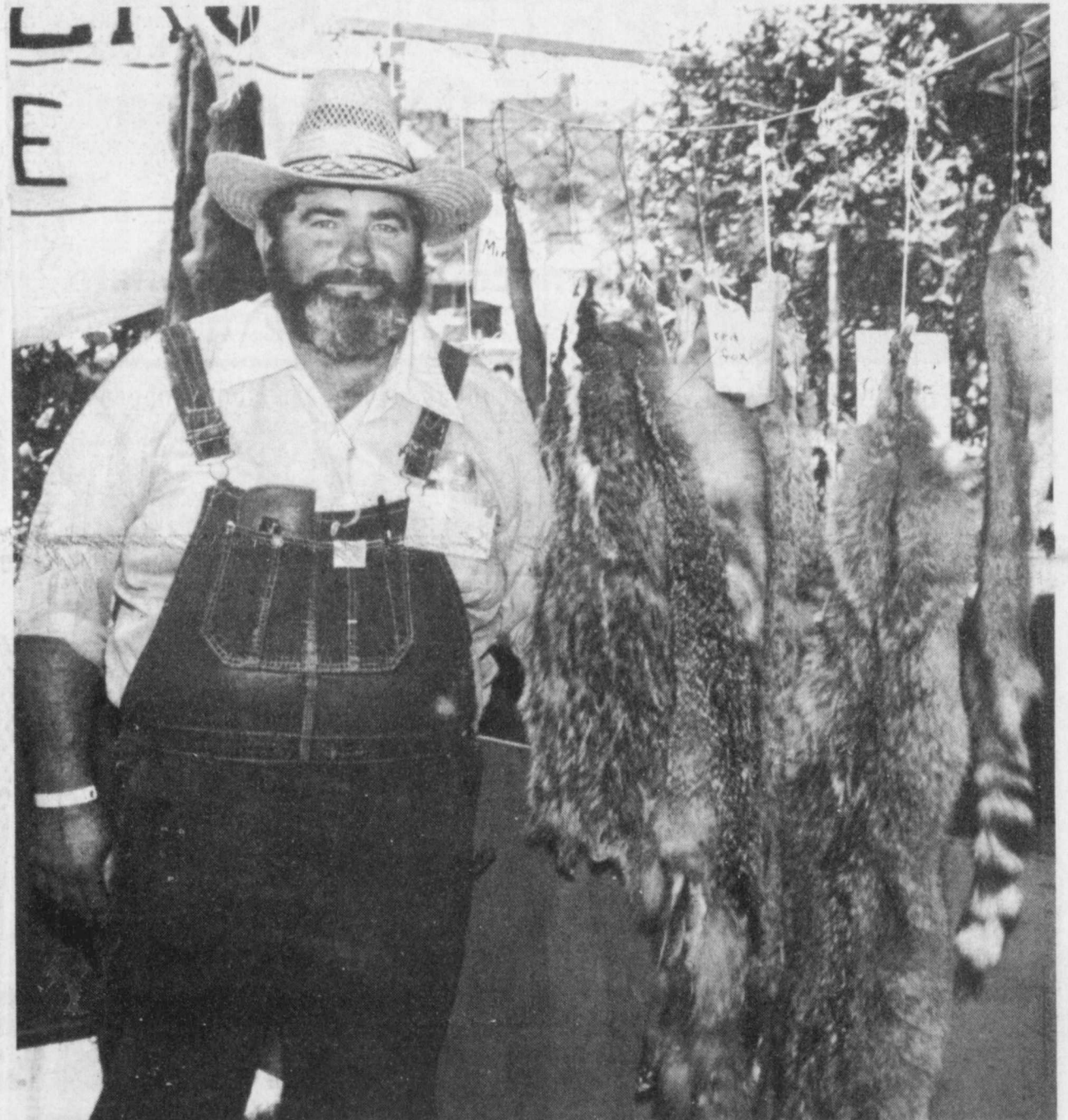
Sale of Series EE Bonds amounted to \$34,848 during May 1986 in Lamar County, James W. Farris, Volunteer County Chairman, announced. Total sales in the county during the period January-May 1986 were \$224,120, which represents 27.5% of the County's 1986 assigned dollar goal.

Nationally, May 1986 sales continued an upward trend, with sales of \$849 million, a 79% increase over May 1985. Total sales for 1986 totaled \$3,281 million for 61.9% of its 1986 dollar goal of \$5,300 million. May 1986 sales were

also the highest for any month since December 1985 and the highest May since 1945. Savings Bonds held by the American public reached \$83.06 billion, an all time record.

Current issues of Series EE Bonds held at least five years earn the average of semiannual market-based rates in effect while they are held, or the current minimum guaranteed rate of 7.5%, if the average falls below the mark. Semiannual market-based rates change each May 1 and November 1. The rate for May 1 through October 31 is 7.02%, bringing the average rate for the 8 periods since the market-based variable rate program started in November 1, 1982, to 9.36 percent. Bonds held less than five years earn interest on a fixed, graduated scale.

## Amendment Provides Extended Filing

An amendment to the Secretary of Agriculture's designation authorizing emergency loan applications in Lamar County provides for an extended period of filing for agricultural enterprises. The amendment provides that agricultural enterprises are eligible for economic injury

disaster loans if the disaster occurred prior to October 1, 1985 and if the request for a disaster declaration was made prior to October 1, 1985.

In order to give at least a four month filing period for agricultural enterprises, the deadline has been extended to November 24, 1986 for

agricultural enterprises only. Please note that the recently amended deadline of October 7, 1986 is still in effect for non-agricultural enterprises.

Those eligible applicants seeking loan information may call the toll-free number 800-442-7206 for assistance.

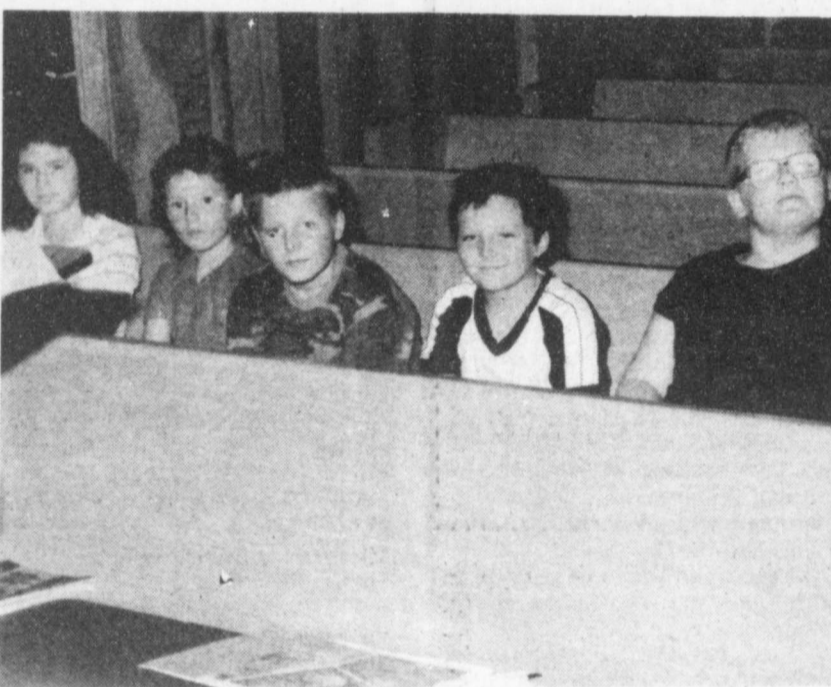
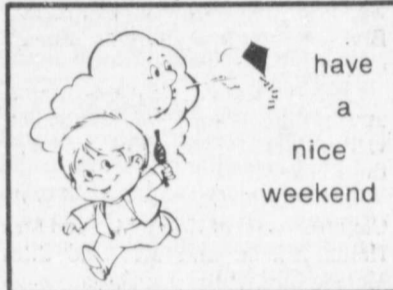

**Bill To Require Seatbelts To Be Introduced**

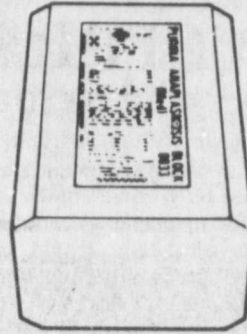
A new bill to require seatbelts on all new large school buses will be introduced to the 70th session of the Texas Legislature. This bill will require that all new large school buses

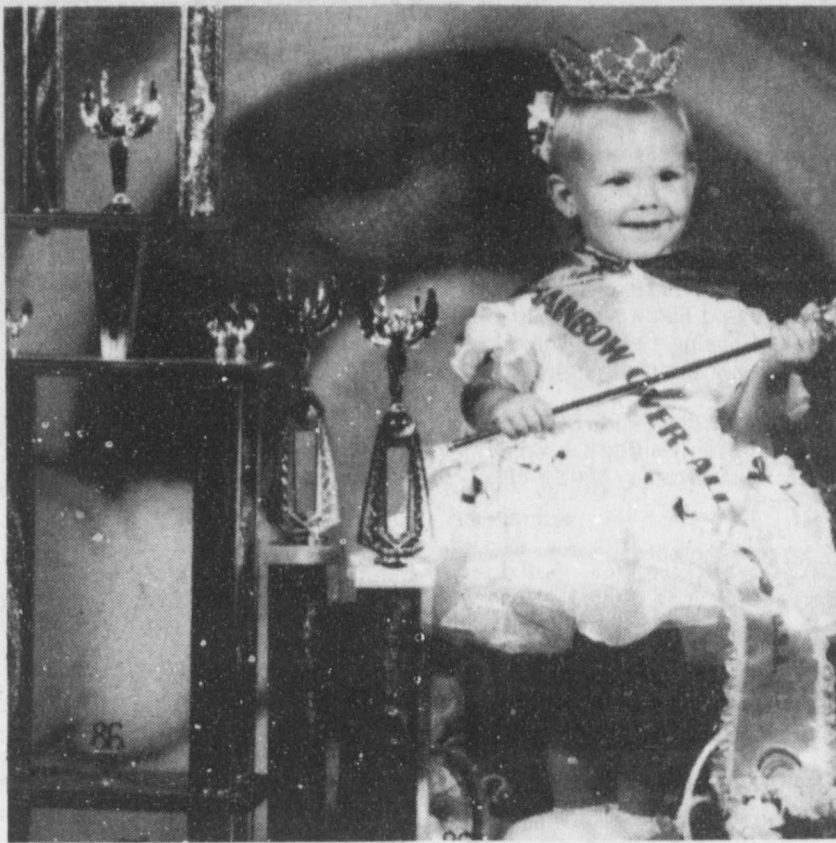

**Training Class To Begin Sept. 2**

Medication aide training classes will begin this fall at Paris Junior College with classes starting Tuesday, September 2, but registration must be completed by August 19.

Persons enrolling for the course must be currently employed in nursing facilities as nurse aides or in mental retardation facilities as non-licensed direct care staff persons. Students must have worked in Texas facilities for the past 90 days. A high school diploma or GED is required.

Those who have completed at least 120 academic hours of nurse aide training in an accredited Texas education institution may substitute this education for the employment requirements. The educational requirement must have been completed since January 1 of the year immediately prior to the enrollment in medical aide training.

Fee for the course is \$140 plus the textbook cost of about \$25. Registration must be completed by mailing the \$140 check payable to PJC by August 19 to Doris Nelson, Medication Aide Program, Paris Junior College, Paris, TX.

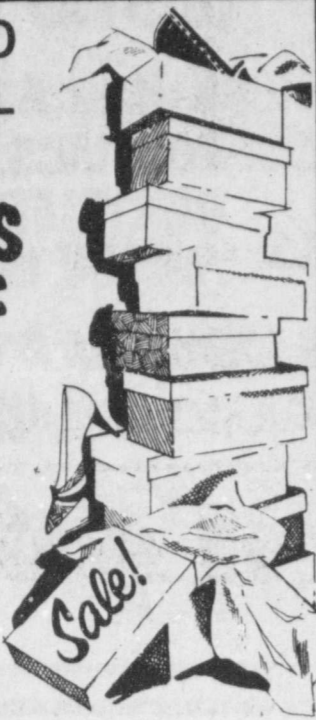

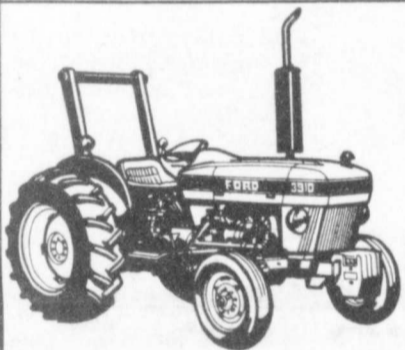
