

# Rains Slow Area Agricultural Activities

The weekend rain brought most agricultural activities to a snail's pace and it will take several days of open weather before most activity can resume.

The rain was general over the entire area. Not everyone needed the precipitation.

Peanut producers will be anxiously awaiting open weather as they harvest a not too spectacular crop. Dry land peanuts were hurt by the dry July and August.

Part of the soybean crop remains

in the field and it will be November before harvest is complete if the weather cooperates. Fewer acres of soybeans are in the field at this time than in previous years as most of the acreage has shifted to the earlier maturing varieties.

Upwards of 50 percent of the wheat has been planted. However, the present planting delay is not critical as there is still plenty of time to plant wheat for grain. In fact, many plant scientists that have studied the leaf rust and Hessian Fly situation are en-

couraging a later planting date. So, perhaps this will all work out to the betterment of the farmer.

Tons of high quality forage has been produced in the area during the last month and several days of hay curing weather will be needed to make hay. Hay making will be a hit and miss affair due to the heavy dews, lower temperatures and rank grass growth.

Scattered armyworm reports continue to be received, but their activity should be slowed down with the arrival of cooler weather. Individuals

with young wheat and winter pastures should continue to look for damage. We do not expect an epidemic in pastures and meadows this late in the season.

Pecans are beginning to fall which is about three weeks earlier than normal. The nuts are smaller than normal but the kernel is filled in most cases. I do not know the reason for this early fall unless it is associated with the earlier nut set in the spring. There should be an adequate nut drop to meet the needs of the holiday baking

chefs. Turnips and mustard green patches have been hard hit this fall by leaf eating worms. Cabbage loopers are one of the major pests and should not

be confused with the armyworms. Loopers are a lighter green than the armyworm and do not have the inverted "Y" behind the head. It is important to correctly identify the insect, as Sevin and Malathion will not control the looper. Dipel is about the

only material that will take care of the looper.

Read label instructions before applying as there are different day intervals from application to eating. For instance, there is a 14 day waiting on greens where Sevin is used. There

is no time wait where Dipel is used. However, one should understand that it takes longer for Dipel to control worms than insecticides.

## Patriots Take Homecoming Victory

Less than two minutes later, the Rebels scored from two yards out. The point after was blocked by

On the kickoff, Jack Kindle set the Patriots up in excellent field position. Five plays later, Mike Ray, Steven Johnston and Craig Ladd struck again. This time Craig Ladd received the honors and tacked on six more points. Martin Babb found his mark and extended the Patriot lead to 20 to 13.

The Rebels came right back and scored from the Patriot 45-yard line. The point after was good, and the Patriots trailed by one point at the end of the first half.

Both teams remained scoreless through the third quarter.

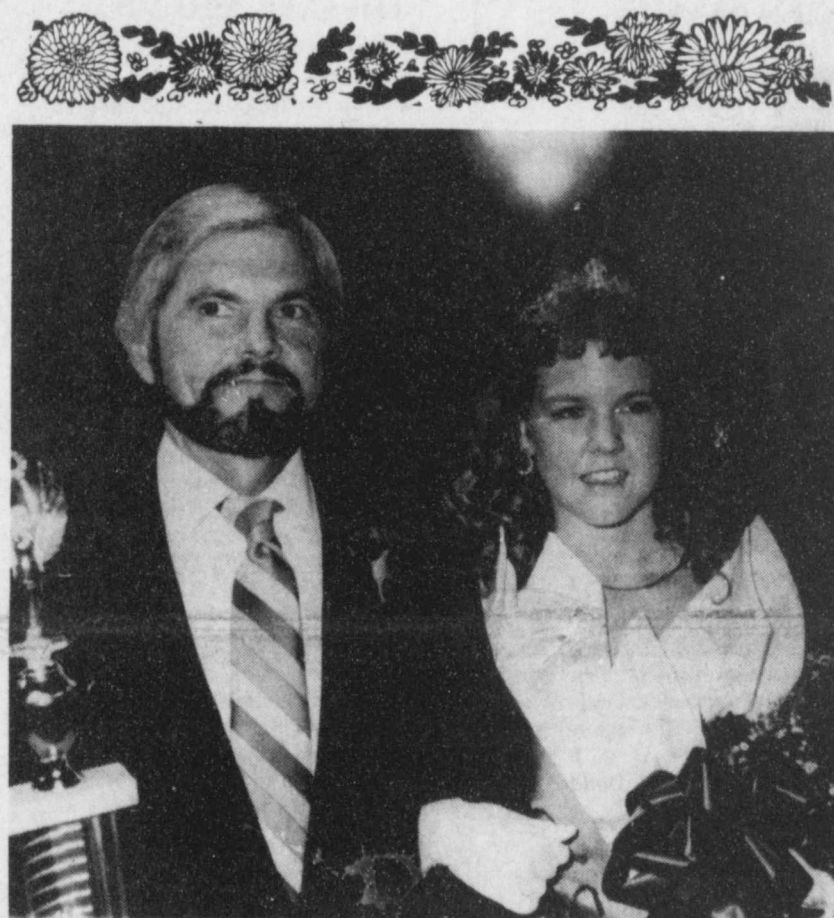
The Patriots started the fourth quarter with a scoring drive from their own 30-yard line. Richard Eatherly took the lions share of car-

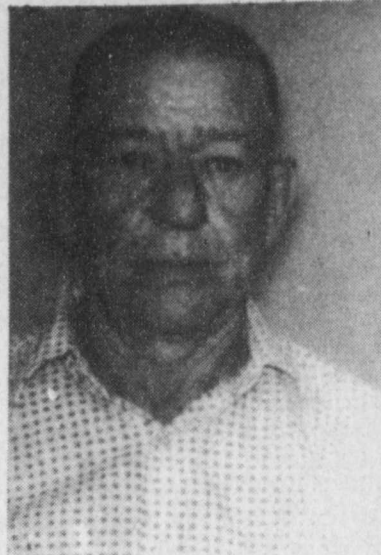

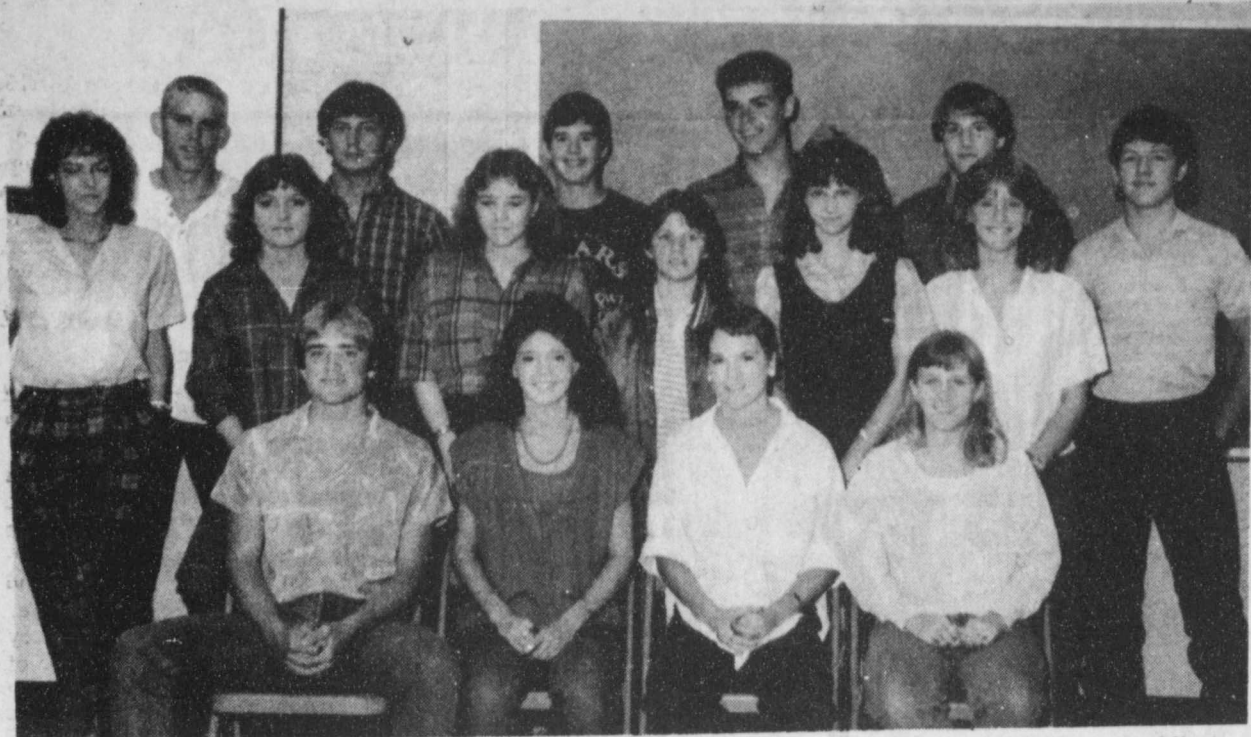

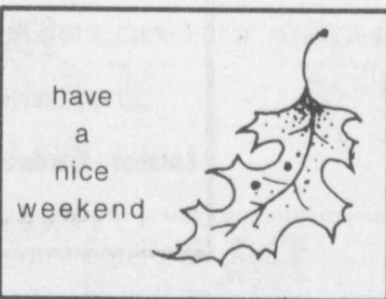
### Prairiland JV Take Victory Over Ore City

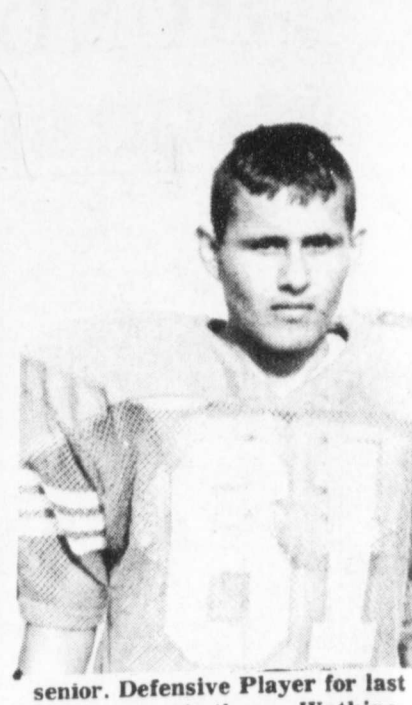

## Texas Crime Statistics Compiled For Half Of 1986

Texas crime statistics compiled for the first half of 1986 exceeded the figures recorded for the same period in 1985. Both the crime rate and volume of index crimes increased, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The crime rate noted for the first six months of this year rose 15.8 percent to 64.04 crimes per hundred thousand population, said Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director. Adams said all seven major crime categories were up.

"Robbery showed the highest increase in the violent crime listings, increasing 34.6 percent," Adams pointed out.

The number of aggravated assault cases rose 30.1 percent, while rape and murder posted increases of 14.6 percent and 1.1 percent respectively.

Burglary was 20.5 percent higher, while an increase of 15.6 percent was recorded in the number of thefts.

Twenty percent of the index crimes reported were cleared by arrests in the first half of 1986. The estimated value of property stolen during the commission of index crimes was over \$700 million with \$281 million worth of property recovered by police officers.

"One officer died in a duty-related accident. Additionally, a total of 2,192 assaults on officers were reported." DWI arrests in the first half of 1986

were down 9.2 percent and totaled 62,404. Drug-related arrests decreased 69.74 percent to 29,331.

The crime statistics were derived from reports submitted by 26 Texas law enforcement agencies to the Uniform Crime Reporting section of the DPS.

Statewide, murder increased 1.1 percent from 1,060 to 1,072, rape increased 13.6 percent from 2,983 to 3,410, theft increased 14.6 percent from 277,148 to 320,324, and motor vehicle theft increased 21.2 percent from 45,813 to 55,344.
