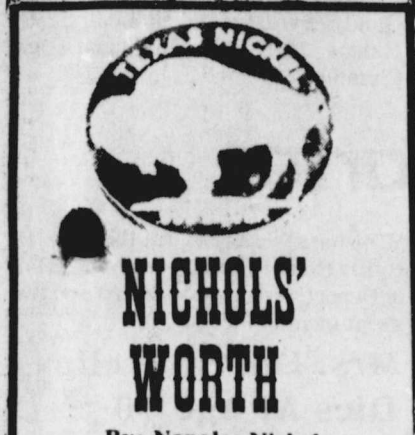
Richard Nash says that "we just want to show our appreciation to our seniors for their support of the kids and the school district". Any senior citizen wanting the passes can contact the school for

It brings to mind some of the other things that have happened here on main street.

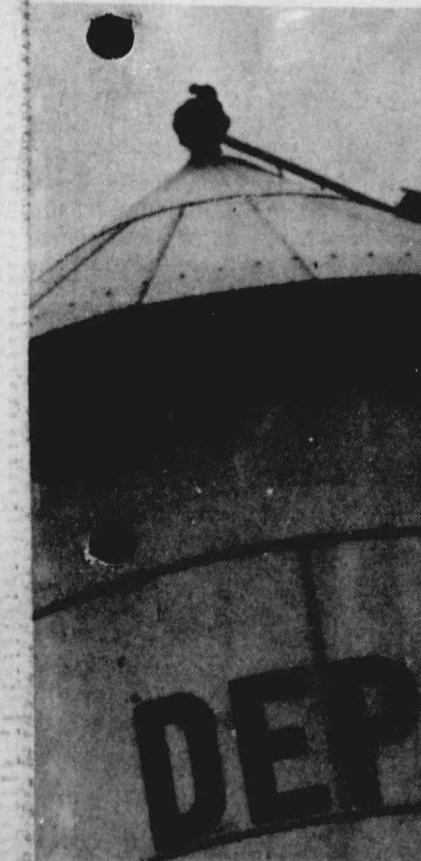
There was the afternoon in the middle of summer several years ago when a small black goat trotted through main street.

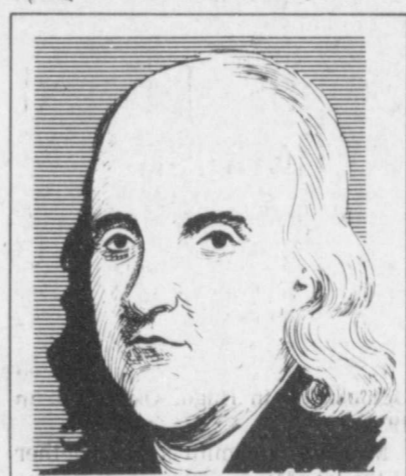

FIRE SAFETY TIPS

October is Fire Prevention Month and is emphasized in the schools. But fire safety shouldn't stop at school — you and your children should know a home escape plan and review the plan routinely. Here are some tips:

- Make a fire drill fun, but serious at the same time. Making a game of it will avoid frightening children. Use races. Try a blindfold race — can you find your way out when wearing a blindfold?
- Use the smoke alarm to start the drill. This acquaints the family with the sound of the alarm — and gives you a chance to test it.
- Sleep with bedroom doors closed. Smoke is the greatest enemy in a night fire. Teach children that the door is their castle gate to keep them safe.
- Teach children two ways out of each room. Tell them to feel the door as high as they can reach. If it is warm or hot, don't open it. If it's cool — open it cautiously.
- Stay low in smoke. The cooler and fresher air is near the floor.
- Teach children how to open windows and take out screens. And teach them to stay near the window if they can't open it. Be sure children have something to climb upon to reach the window.
- Once out, stay out! Never, never, never re-enter a burning building for anything or anyone!
- Have a meeting place outside. Go to the meeting place and stay there until everyone is found. (Fire fighters have died searching for people who were already safe.)
- Practice calling the fire department. Use a role-playing technique to help children learn their home address and how to report an emergency clearly. Teach them not to hang up until the dispatcher tells them to.
- Visit the fire department. Fire fighters enjoy meeting kids and teaching fire safety.

The Prairiland T.A.F.E. Chapter got off to a great start with a study skills meeting last Monday evening.

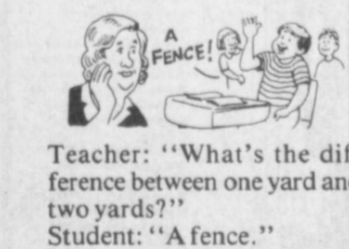
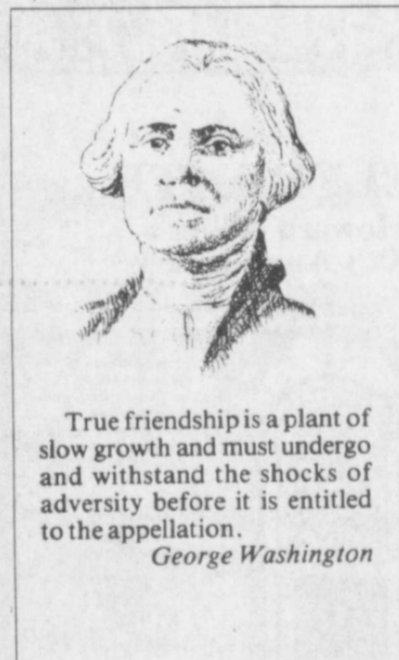

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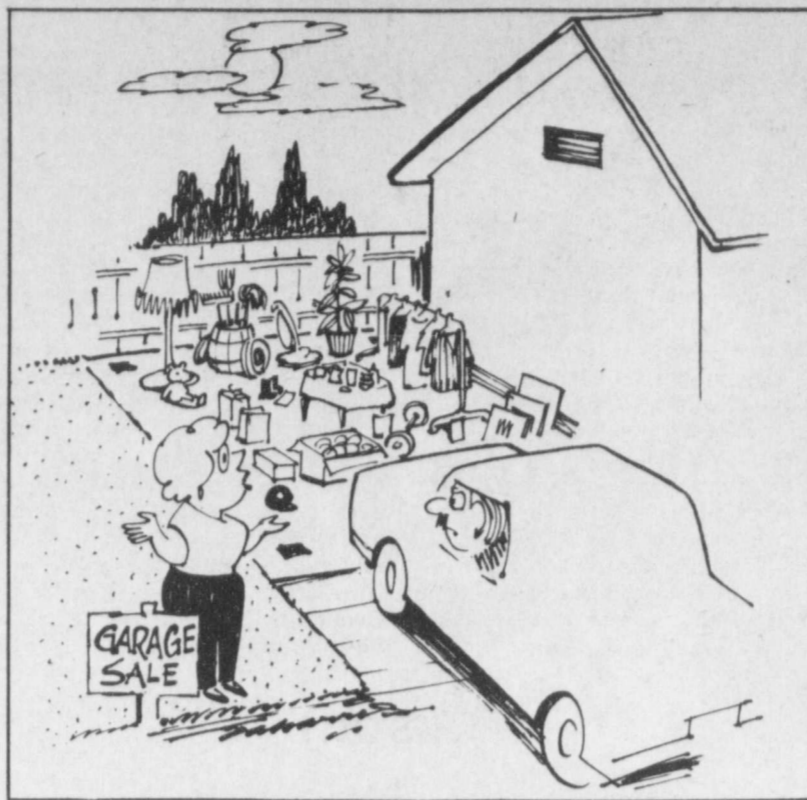

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Area Resident Recalls Life In War Torn Germany

Crystal Maria Elizabeth Weinert Mayfield became a United States citizen in 1964 by naturalization. Lisa, as she's called by family and friends here in the states, was born in Berlin in 1939. Although she speaks with affection for her native land, when asked about her allegiance she quickly replies, "I'm a genuine Southerner and Texan from the good ol' USA."

Lisa recalls with sometimes painful clarity, the rise of Hitler's power and her life in Germany during World War II.

At age four, she remembers walking through the market place in Berlin with her mother and seeing three people hanged there with a sign over them which read "Punishment for speaking against your Fuhrer."

In the years that followed, she recalls the scarcity of food and standing in long lines in freezing weather for hours to receive her family's rations only to be turned away because the stores had run out of supplies. Even friends could not be trusted during this time. There was always the possibility that anything said against Hitler would be reported.

Lisa's father, Carl Weinert, was serving as Master Sergeant in the German Infantry assigned to the Russian front. He refused to become an officer for the Nazi force. Lisa's mother took great risks by warning her children about the evils of Hitler and the Third Reich. She also risked her life and that of her family's by hiding and feeding many of the persecuted Jews.

Bomb raids and enemy attacks were daily happenings and frantic flights to bomb shelters for protection were common for Lisa and her family.

On May 9, 1945, Lisa recalls that the Russians marched into Germany. They were told they had nothing to fear from the Russians, however, many of the soliders looted the houses, raped the women, and brought fear and terror to the people. Lisa's grandmother barely escaped being shot by a group of these Communist terrorists when they broke down the door of their house and entered. Lisa's mother was able to slip out and run for help and the family was spared.

Lisa's father was captured while retreating by the English and was hospitalized because of severe frost bite to his feet. He was treated and allowed to return home in August of 1945 only to be picked up two hours later for interrogation by the Russians. Although he was soon released, he realized what was sure to happen

to East Germany due to the Communist take over, so through contacts with the black market, he planned the exodus of his family. He was able to escape into West Germany with the two older sons and plans were for Mrs. Weinert, Lisa and the younger brother to follow at a later date, however, a neighbor reported to officials that Mr. Weinert and the two boys were missing and a surveillance was placed on the remaining family. The family was separated for seven years.

Mrs. Weinert developed a severe gall bladder infection and was sent with Lisa to West Germany for an operation. The younger brother was kept in East Germany as "insurance" that they would return. While in West Germany, Lisa was able to see the freedom of the people there and the availability of food and clothing which could not be obtained in East Germany. After returning to East Germany, Lisa was enrolled in the Communist school. One of the Communist teachers began teaching the students that the Americans had destroyed all the crops in West Germany and the people there were starving. Lisa stood and reputed these accusations, relaying the facts about West Germany that she had learned from her visit. She was promptly called to the office and confronted by Russian officials and the German Police. Through efforts of another teacher, whose Jewish wife had been helped by Mrs. Weinert, Lisa was released from the charges.

Realizing the grave danger their lives were in, Mrs. Weinert worked feverishly trying to find a way to get to the other side. Finally, by giving an official some very expensive paintings which she had kept hidden, she was able to secure passports for herself, Lisa and the younger child.

By using these passports, they were able to board the train just three miles from the West German border. Just before the train was to leave, Mrs. Weinert was escorted from the train by Russian officers, taken to a room next to the train, stripped and searched. As she was being allowed to get dressed, she heard the train whistle blow in departure. Realizing that the train was leaving with her children on board, she had only enough time to grab her coat, rush from the room and jump the train. She rode the three miles on the outside of the train in freezing rain. At the West German border, American soldiers came aboard and found Mrs. Weinert, her hands frozen to the rails. The first American words her mother recalls hearing in West Germany

were those of one of the soliders who said to her, "Did you make it, Baby?"

The family was reunited in West Germany and Lisa lived there until 1956 when she married an American soldier of German descent and came to the United States.

Although most of the memories Lisa has of her life in East Germany are ones of sorrow, she tells her story with no tone of bitterness. In fact, it seems the hardships have had an in-

fluence on making her the kind and loving person she is.

Lisa now lives with her husband, Clyde Mayfield, on Highway 910 between Cuthand and Clarksville. She returns to West Germany to visit her family about once every two years. She has four children, Fred Hildebrand of Houston, and Greg Hildebrand, John Haynes and Tina Williams, all of Bogata.

Time To Sow Rye, Small Grain

 Small grain and ryegrass pastures on prepared seedbeds should be planted by the end of September for optimum yields. These pastures can still be planted, but early grazing will be delayed.

October is a good time to sod seed small grains and ryegrass, says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist. In any sod seeding, the existing sod needs to be as short as one inch or less. The shorter the grass sod, the better stand of winter pasture can be expected.

Reeves suggests applying phosphorus and potassium either before seeding or at seeding. Delay the nitrogen application until after the plants are taller than the warm season grasses or until after frost. If nitrogen is applied too early, warm season plants will choke out the winter pasture.

The middle of October is also a good time to plant clovers. Reeves suggests white clover for bottom lands and either arrowleaf or crimson for upland soils. Regardless of the clover specie selected, inoculation is a must. If the seed are not inoculated, the clover plant will not fix nitrogen out of the air. Without nitrogen fertilizer, the clover must be fertilized to get growth.

Reeves says that nitrogen should not be applied to clover that has been inoculated. High nitrogen rates will interfere with nitrogen fixation.

If clovers or ryegrass were grown on an area last year and are expected to reseed this winter, Reeves suggests putting large numbers of livestock on the area to graze the existing grass extremely short. This helps eliminate competition for the newly emerging clover or ryegrass.
