
Tourism Is Really Big Business In Texas

U.S. travelers spent a record \$16 billion in Texas during 1985, a seven percent increase over 1984, another record year, the Texas Tourist Development Agency announced recently

Statistics compiled by the U.S. Travel Data Center, Washington, D.C. for TTDA show once again that tourism is one of the state's top industries.

tourist industry," Out of state visitors in 1985 totaled 36.1 million, as compared with 37.6 million the previous year. TTDA has estimated that more than 40 million out of state visitors will come to the Lone Star State in 1986.

Total night visitors stayed in Texas in 1985 rose 3 percent over the previous year, from 168,040,000 to 172,700,000. The longer visitors stay in the state, the greater the tourist in-


come, Todd noted.

The number of jobs generated by tourism in Texas increased 4.3 percent in 1985 to 278,099 as compared with a 2.9 percent increase in total state nonagricultural employment. Employees in these jobs earned more than \$3.2 billion in wages, which also contributed to the state's economy. Traveler spending brought in \$477,227,000 in state taxes and \$245,985,000 in local tax receipts. The


state tax figure was approximately 4.1 percent of all state tax collections in 1985

'Many people have the impression from movies and television that Texas is hot and arrid, rocks and sand, and dusty with few trees," Todd said. "But those who come here learn about our beaches and forests and lakes and rivers and our varied climate. They learn one can, indeed have a big time in Texas."

The two teams played stalemate through the second quarter and at half time, the Patriots trailed by seven points.


The third quarter was a replay of the second quarter and the score was still seven to zip for the Brahmans.
