

Clements Defeats White For Governor

Lamar Countians Follow Statewide Voting Trends

Lamar County followed the statewide trend in the election Tuesday, November 4 as Bill Clements was elected Governor, defeating Gov. Mark White.

In Lamar County, unofficial totals show White received 4,712; Clements 5,049. Libertarian Theresa Doyle received 79 votes and write-in candidate Charles Lee received seven.

In the county, U.S. Representative Jim Chapman, who was unopposed, garnered 6,485 votes.

Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby

received 6,160 votes, David Davidson received 3,133 votes, Bill Powell received 56 votes.

Attorney General Jim Maddox received 5,727 votes; Roy R. Barrera, Jr., 3,693.

Bob Bullock, who was unopposed as State Comptroller of Public Accounts, received 7,028 votes.

State Treasurer Ann Richards received 7,115 votes and had no opponent.

Garry Mauro received 6,774 in the county for Commissioner of General

Land Office and Republican M. D. Anderson, Jr. received 2,569 votes.

In the Commissioner of Agriculture race, Jim Hightower received 6,333 votes while Bill Powers received 3,036 votes.

For Railroad Commissioner, John Sharp received 5,958 votes to opponent Milton E. Fox's 2,795 votes.

For Justice of the Supreme Court Place I, Oscar Mauzy received 5,883 votes while Charles Ben Howell received 3,108.

For Justice of Supreme Court Place

II, Robert M. Campbell received 6,104 votes while Nathan White, Jr. received 2,761.

Place III, Justice Supreme Court Jim Wallace received 6,782 and was unopposed.

Place IV, unexpired term, Raul A. Gonzalez received 5,648 votes; John L. Bates 3,201.

For the Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals Place I, Rusty Duncan, 6,643; Place II, Mike McCormick 6,646; Place III, Marvin O. Teague 6,563; L.P. (Pete) Patterson received

6,605 votes to Steve Phillips' 3,211 in the District II State Representative's race. Patterson was re-elected to his seat as State Representative.

Chief Justice Court of Appeals 6th District, William Cornelius received 6,623 votes; Chief Justice Court of Appeals, unexpired term, Ben Z. Grant received 6,634.

In Lamar County races, unopposed Democratic candidates Bob Burns for County Judge received 7,135; District Clerk Tommie Duke received 7,042; County Clerk Linda Sudduth received

7,274; Treasurer Laticia Miller received 7,139; Commissioner Precinct 4, Victor E. (Vic) Easterwood, 2,235; Austin Dowdy 1,167.

On the four proposed amendments, Amendment I received 3,659 for and against 3,760. Amendment II received 4,988 for and 2,539 against. Amendment III received 3,529 for and 3,822 against. Amendment IV received 4,007 for and 4,156 against.

All four of the amendments were passed on a statewide level.

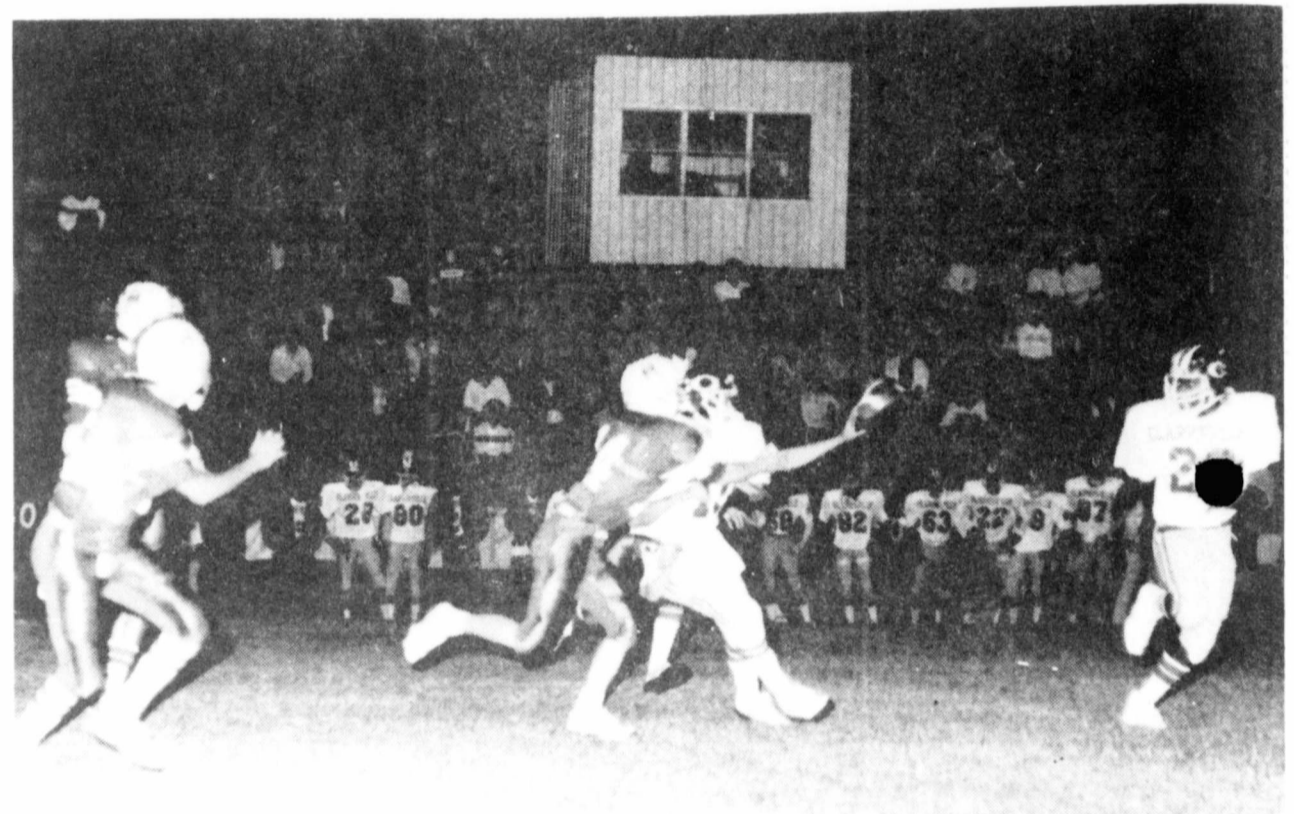
