

Local Sales Tax Figures Up And Down

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$49.9 million in local sales tax to 1,038 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said that 1987 payments to date were down six percent as compared to payments to date made in March of

last year.

Houston's check for \$8.3 million was the largest, bringing 1987 payments to date to \$35.9 million, down six percent from 1986.

Mt. Pleasant received \$60,878.84, for a 1.48 percent increase over the

1986 payment.

Talco received \$1,072.92, for a 24.30 percent increase over last year's payments to date of \$6,033.44.

Bogata received \$1,119.65, marking a 10.59 percent decrease over last year's payment of \$1,867.96, while

Clarksville received \$11,830.61 for a 9.86 percent decrease.

Detroit received no payment this period, for a 25.92 percent decrease over 1986.

Blossom received \$873.25 as it's

payment for this period for a 2.94 percent increase over last year's payments of \$3,835.69 to date.

Deport received \$536.38 for a 24.28 percent increase to date in payments of \$3,613.59, compared to \$2,907.52 in

1986.

Paris received \$110,340.57, for a .85 percent increase over the 1986 payment for the same period.

Local Names On Unclaimed Money List

The Texas Treasury has about \$80 million in unclaimed money, safe deposit boxes, oil royalties and stocks and bonds that it wants to return to about 100,000 Texans.

"On Sunday, March 8, we will publish this annual list of names," Treasurer Ann Richards said, "and we hope to return a sizable portion of that money to its rightful owners."

Persons who find their name on the list may reclaim their property by calling the State Treasury, toll free at 1-800-321-2274 or by writing to the State Treasury at P.O. Box 12608, Capitol Station, Austin, TX 78711.

She said that last year, the State Treasury published a similar list and about \$50 million was reunited with owners.

The Unclaimed Money Fund list was first published when Treasurer Richards took office in 1983. Since that time, the State Treasury has returned 73 percent of all the money ever returned since the law took effect 26 years ago.

Under her administration, the State Treasury has also substantially increased efforts to collect dormant accounts. Collectins have increased

from \$6.2 million in 1982 to \$69 million in 1986.

The list is being published statewide in 16 newspapers. The list is also available at public libraries and county offices. In addition, many newspapers publish local names as a public service to their readers.

Under state law, checking and savings accounts, mineral royalties, insurance payments, safe deposit boxes, utility deposits and the like are turned over to the state if accounts are inactive for at least three years.

The state may use the funds for general state services and for education, but the owners or their heirs may file a claim at any time in the future for the money held by the state.

Muffler-Gun Shop Burglary Crime Of Week

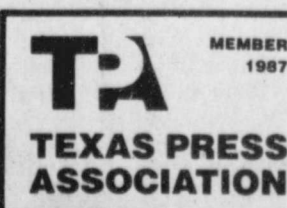
On January 14, 1985, burglars broke a front window glass to gain entry to Marshall's Muffler and Gun Shop at 2010 Lamar Avenue in Pris.

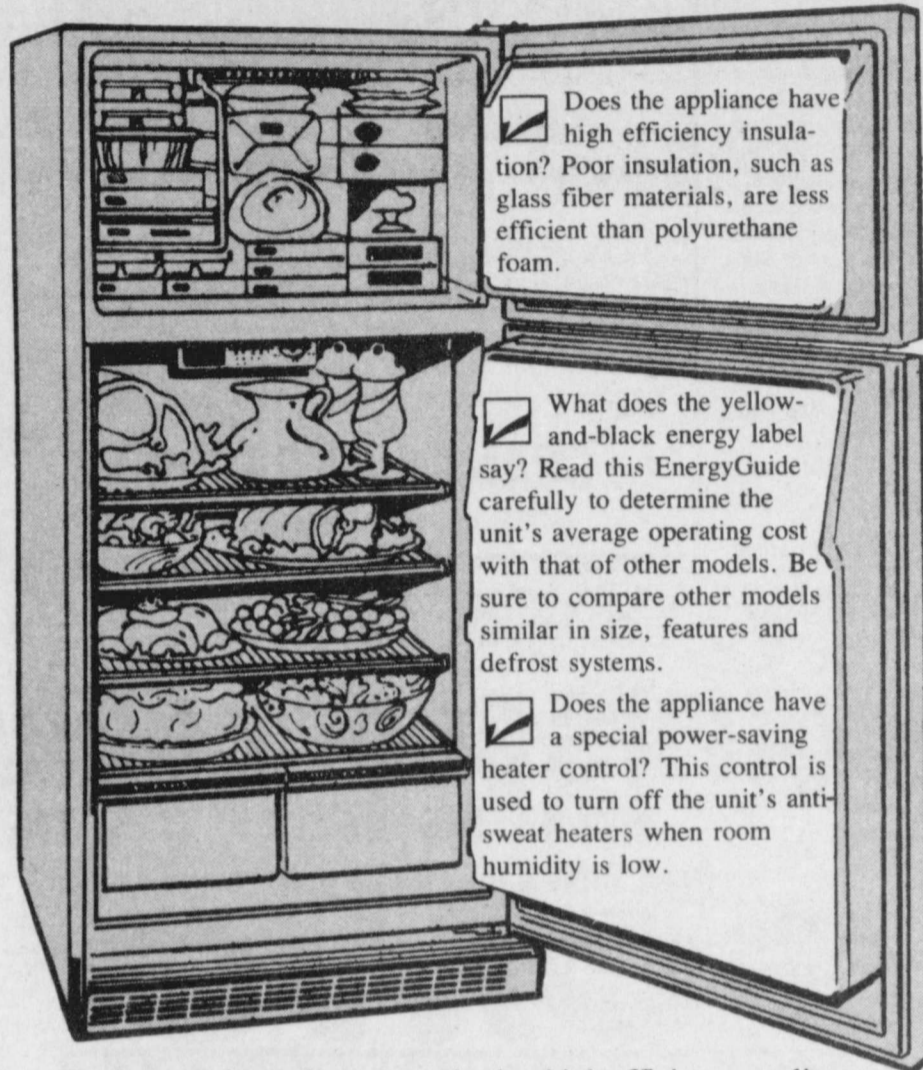

When purchasing a new refrigerator or freezer, don't just look at the color or the purchase price. Consider how much you will pay to operate the appliance. Here are some things to consider when shopping.



Does the appliance have high efficiency insulation? Poor insulation, such as glass fiber materials, are less efficient than polyurethane foam.

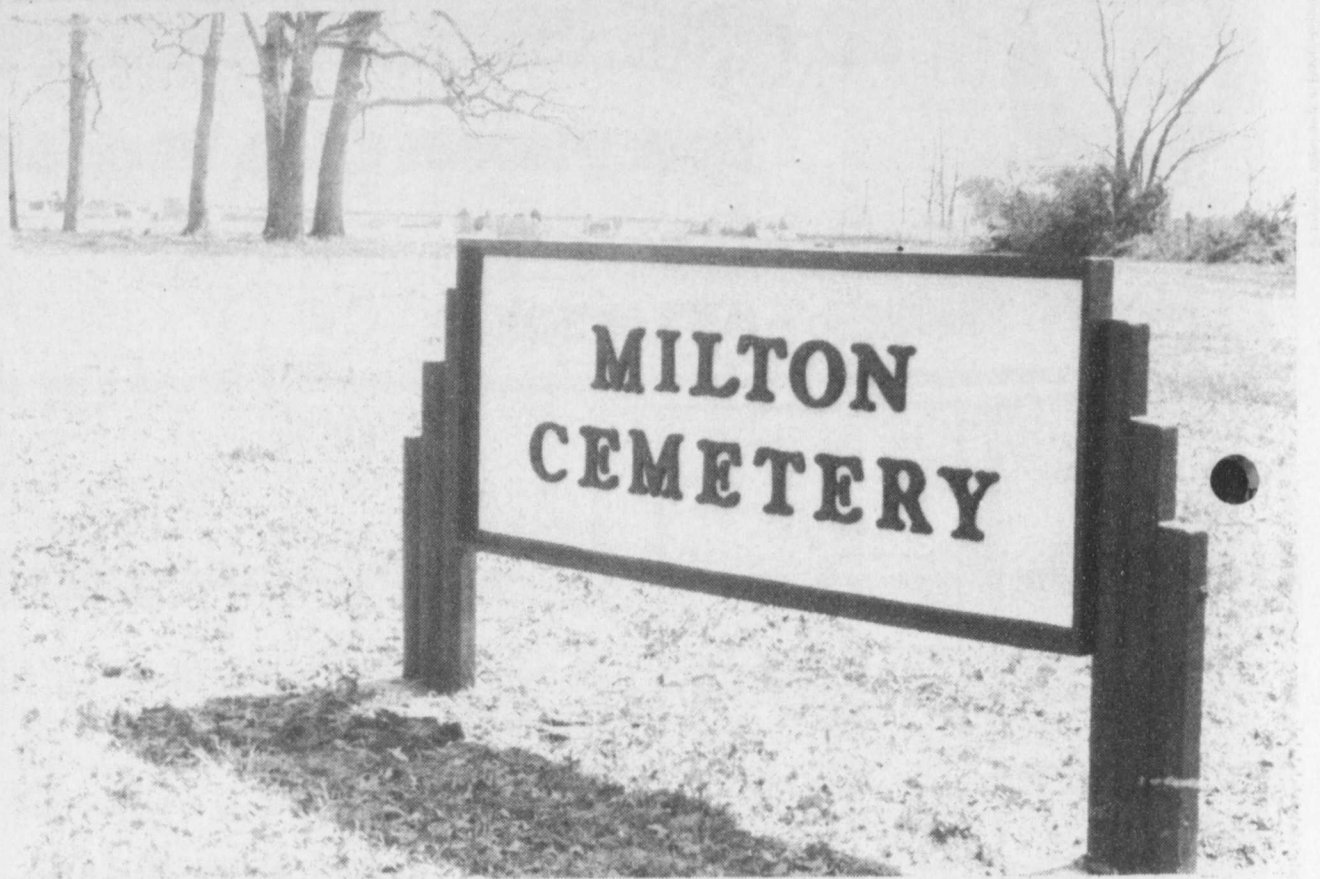
