

Variable Factors Influence Sales Tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$47.9 million in local sales tax to 1,038 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said that 1987 payments to date were down six percent as compared to payments to date made in April of

last year.

Houston's check for \$7.5 million was the largest, bringing 1987 payments to date to \$43.5 million, down seven percent from 1986. Dallas received \$5.8 million for a 1987 total of \$32.2 million, down four percent.

Mt. Pleasant received \$6,951.52 for a 13.98 percent decrease over last year while Talco received \$1,546.81 for a 23.61 percent increase over last year's payment of \$1,285.19.

Bogata received \$375.66 for a 12 percent decrease over last year's pay-

ment of \$1,673.10, bringing the 1987 total to \$7,487.42.

Clarksville received \$10,500.49 for an 8.41 percent decrease while Detroit received \$767.62 for a 2.25 percent increase.

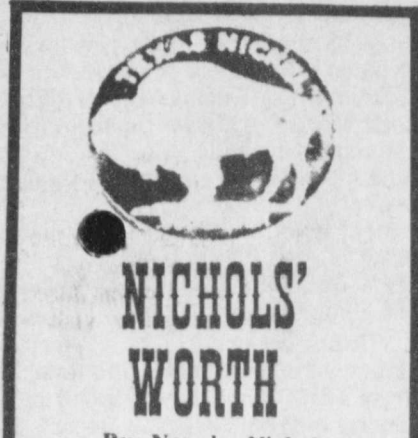
Blossom received \$713.61 for a 16

percent increase. Total payments to date are \$4,662.11, compared with \$4,654.44 for 1986.

Detroit received no payment for this period, compared to no payment in 1986, for a total of \$3,613.59 of payments to date for 1987.

Paris received \$116,314.54 for a 1.05 percent increase over last year.

April checks represent taxes collected on sales made in February and reported to the Comptroller by March 20.

It bugged me really badly for a while, until something else began to bug me worse.

As usual, it came to me during the middle of the night. What if I was forgetting things...and NEVER REMEMBERING THEM AGAIN? What if I forgot them so thoroughly that they were gone and I never even realized that they were forgotten.

Horrors...fear...desperation. Surely, oh surely, people would have been reminding me if I were forgetting events that should have been covered.

But still, the fear lingers. I scribble notes now and keep them, I look at them twice a day...and still wonder, and worry, that I might forget something important. I feel absolutely senile, and forty still looms a few years away! What will 50 bring, 60, oh, I'd rather not think about it.

Prairiland Patriots Continue Undefeated Roll

The Prairiland Patriots upped their district record to five wins without a loss Friday in Mt. Vernon as they defeated the Purple Tigers 4-1 in eight innings.

The first two and one-half innings of the game were scoreless. Both Patriot pitcher Mike Blackburn and the Mt. Vernon hurler were in full control of the game. However, in the bottom of the third inning, a Tiger led off by sending a Blackburn fastball over the left field fence. This home run gave the Tigers a 1-0 lead which they would hold onto until the seventh inning.

After the home run was given up by Blackburn, the two pitchers continued their mastery on the mound. Just when it appeared that Mt. Vernon would win 1-0, first baseman Jack

Kindle led off the seventh inning by hitting a fastball over the right field fence to knot up the game at 1-1. The Tiger pitcher finished up the inning by striking out three consecutive Patriots and keeping the score 1-1.

To keep from losing the game, the Patriots had to shut out the Tigers in the bottom of the seventh inning. Blackburn did his part by coaxing the first Tiger to hit a ground ball out to third baseman Martin Babb. However, Blackburn walked the next two batters and allowed them to advance when he threw a wild pitch. With runners on second and third base with only one out, second baseman P.G. Morrison made a terrific catch of a sinking line drive and scampered to second base to force out the wandering Tiger for the third out of the inning. Without the catch by Morrison, the game would have been over.

Leading off the eighth inning, Wade Sparks reached base to give the Patriots the go-ahead run on first. After a strike out, Martin Babb reached first on a fielder's choice. On the lay, however, Sparks was tagged out trying to advance to third base for the second out of the inning. After Babb stole second base, Richard Eatherly reached base to put runners at first

and second with two outs. Because Kindle already had a double and a home run in the game, he was intentionally walked to load the bases. Luckily for the Patriots, this plan backfired when Steven Johnson followed with a ground ball single up the middle to score both Babb and Eatherly. This hit gave the Patriots a 3-1 lead. The final run of the inning came when Kindle streaked home on a wild pitch to give the Patriots a 4-1 lead.

In the bottom of the eighth inning, Blackburn slammed the door on the Tigers by striking out a batter and getting the next two batters to ground out to Babb at third base to insure a 4-1 win.

Blackburn allowed only two hits while striking out five to earn a 2 and 0 record in district. The game marked the end of the first third of district play.

Tuesday, the Prairiland Patriots traveled to Pittsburg and defeated the Pirates 12-2 in six innings.

Martin Babb went the distance on the mound for the Patriots as he recorded four strike-outs in improving his pitching record to 2-0.

Catcher Giovanni Scarano got the longest hit of the day on his second

home run of the district season.

After the game, Patriot coach Bill Scudder said that he was pleased with the Patriots' consistency at the plate. Also, Scudder said, "We are getting good pitching and playing good team defense."

The next game for the Patriots will be a home encounter with the Daingerfield Tigers at 4 p.m. Friday.

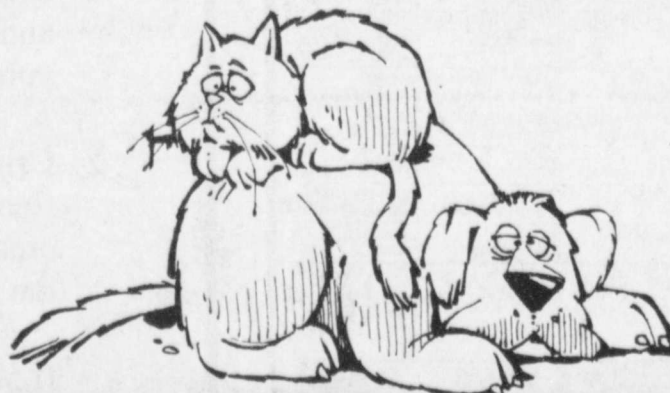

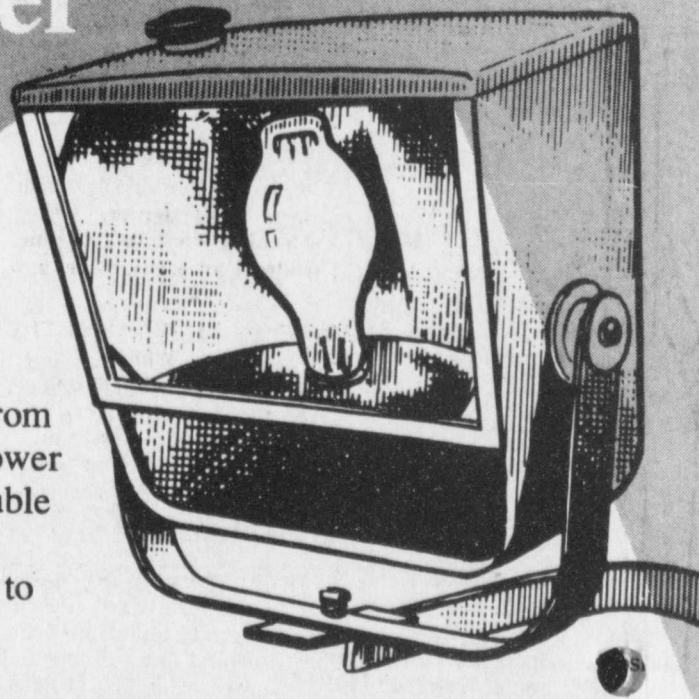

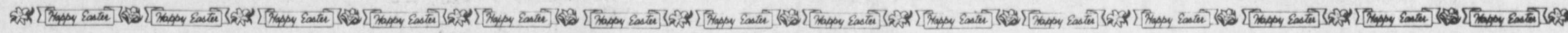

The Jacksons have come to know the oil crew well, and are fascinated by the "whole different world" of oil drilling.

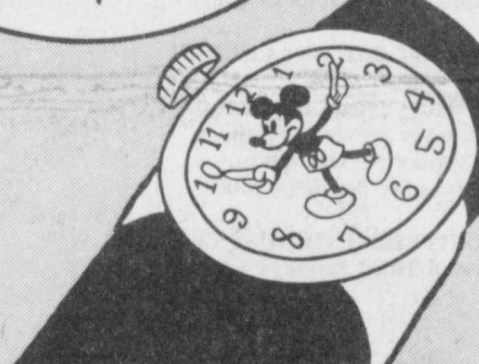

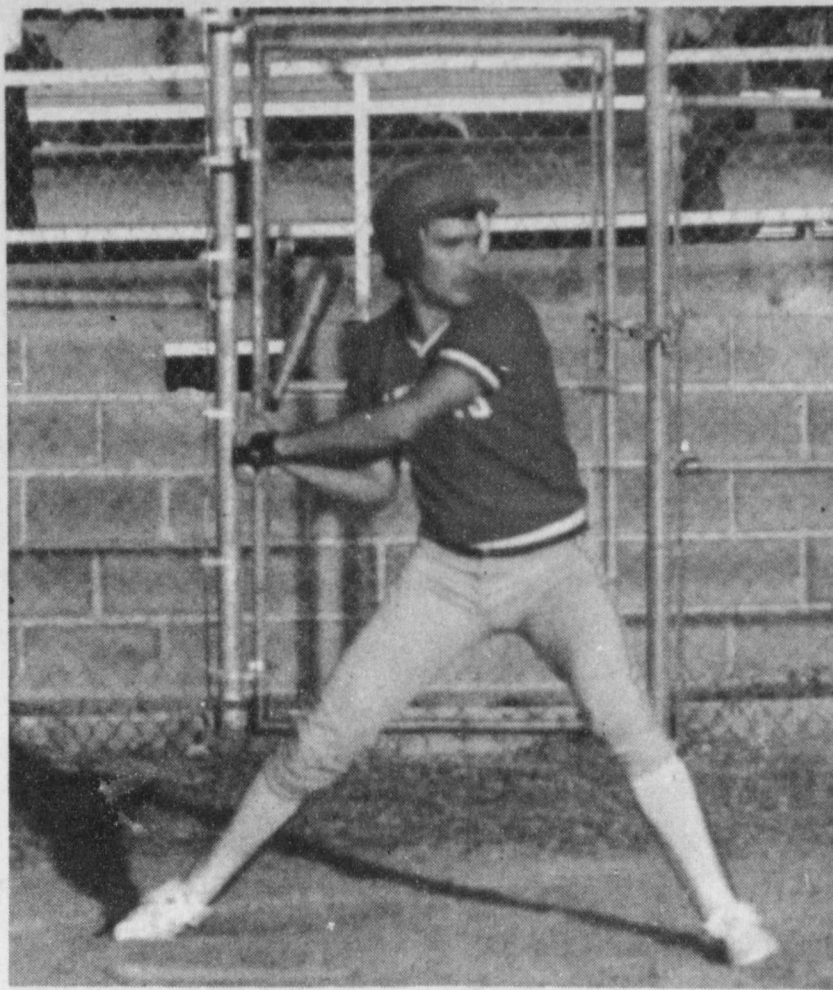
