"Chainsaw" Willie Makes Art From Wood Talco Man Uses Only A Chainsaw For His Unusual Sculpture

W.D. (Willie D.) Holt, nicknamed "Chainsaw Willie" by one of the local folks, was born and raised in Wilkinson (Sugar Hill), a small community about nine miles east of Talco on Highway 71. He grew up working with his father in the woods, so he has come to love and respect the timber he works with at his saw mill and also the wood he uses to create his unusual

works of art.

Mr. Holt and his wife, Shirley, who have been married 32 years, have five children and 15 grandchildren. He is self-employed, working at his sawmill located next to his home in Wilkinson. After work and in his spare time, he uses the chainsaw for something else besides cutting wood. He sculpts animals and carves Indian pieces out of wood with it.

When asked why he got into chainsaw sculpting, he said that he had seen someone else doing it so he decided to try it. He found out he enjoyed the challenge of being able to take an ugly stump and make something useful or eye appealing out of it.

W.D. displays a lot of his work in a building beside his house and the sawmill where he makes his living.

You can tell what type of wood he uses when you walk into the room and smell the cedar and see the rich red color in many of the pieces of work in the room. He uses mostly cedar because it cracks less when it shrinks and the wood is softer.

Some of his creations are small, like the squirrels, razorbacks, rabbits and other animals. But some of them are quite large, like the Indian pieces he does.

On the front porch of his building stands "Sugar Hill Slim", a life size man just waiting to be waved at. In fact, it's not uncommon for passer-by's to wave at Slim because he is dressed in blue painted on pants and a red hat. He was shirtless until the wintertime came and someone told W.D. that Slim might get cold, so they put a shirt on him.

W.D. cuts and shapes his creations with only a chainsaw as his tool. That's why at first glance you may think he's not thorough, but after looking closer, you can see the eyes he has for detail and the skill he has used in being able to control the saw for a lot of the intricate work.

He prefers not to polish or treat the wood, so that the natural color and smell will be preserved. Each work of art he does is done from a solid piece of wood and can stand on it's own. He can turn a cedar stump into a squirrel in less than thirty minutes. The Indian sculptures, which his wife prefers, take a while longer. When asked what his favorite piece of work was, he stated he really didn't have one but he preferred to do the animals because they didn't have as much detail work. Although the eagle he carved while set up at Canton's First Monday Trades Day this month has quite a bit of detail. While there, someone from the Chicago Tribune interviewed him.

Mr. Holt also takes pride in the fact that Glenn Fowler, owner of the riverboat Queen Mria on Lake Bob Sandlin listed him as one of the ten most interesting attractions in this area for his tourist information.

Deport VFD Hears Report

The Deport Fire Department heard a briefing from Duane Glover on the Lamar County Quarterly Meeting held in Paris.

They adopted bylaws at the meeting. Election of a president, vice-president and secretary was provided for, with each office being a two-year term.

All county departments will have one vote per department so that they can vote on changes or pass procedures. A two-thirds majority will be required to pass a measure.

On business not pertaining to bylaws, a majority of votes will be required.

Each department will receive \$30.00 per unit per quarter, as well as a check based on the number of fires each department attends. To draw the additional funds, a department must have at least one representative at each quarterly meeting with a

departmental report.

The annual fire school, sponsored by the Paris Fire Department has been cancelled, Glover reorted, because of the insurance complications covering firemen at the school.

The fire department also heard a report from Kenneth Gifford, a member of the Deport Ball Association, concerning the ball program, and the fire department voted to pay one-half of the cost of installing new lights at the baseball field. The other one-half of the cost will come from other sources. The Deport Fire Department owns the Deport Ball Field, and cooperates with the Deport Ball Association in maintaining, improving and overseeing the field.

Texas-New Mexico Power crew employees will donate their time after work hours to install the new lighting.

If you're driving down Highway 71 east of Talco and pass through Wilkinson and notice "Sugar Hill Slim", don't just wave, stop and visit with W.D. and Shirley and look at his work. The impression you get may be of amusement that a chainsaw is not only something that can destroy, but can also create something unusual and beautiful.

Parents Should Nominate Children For Gifted Program

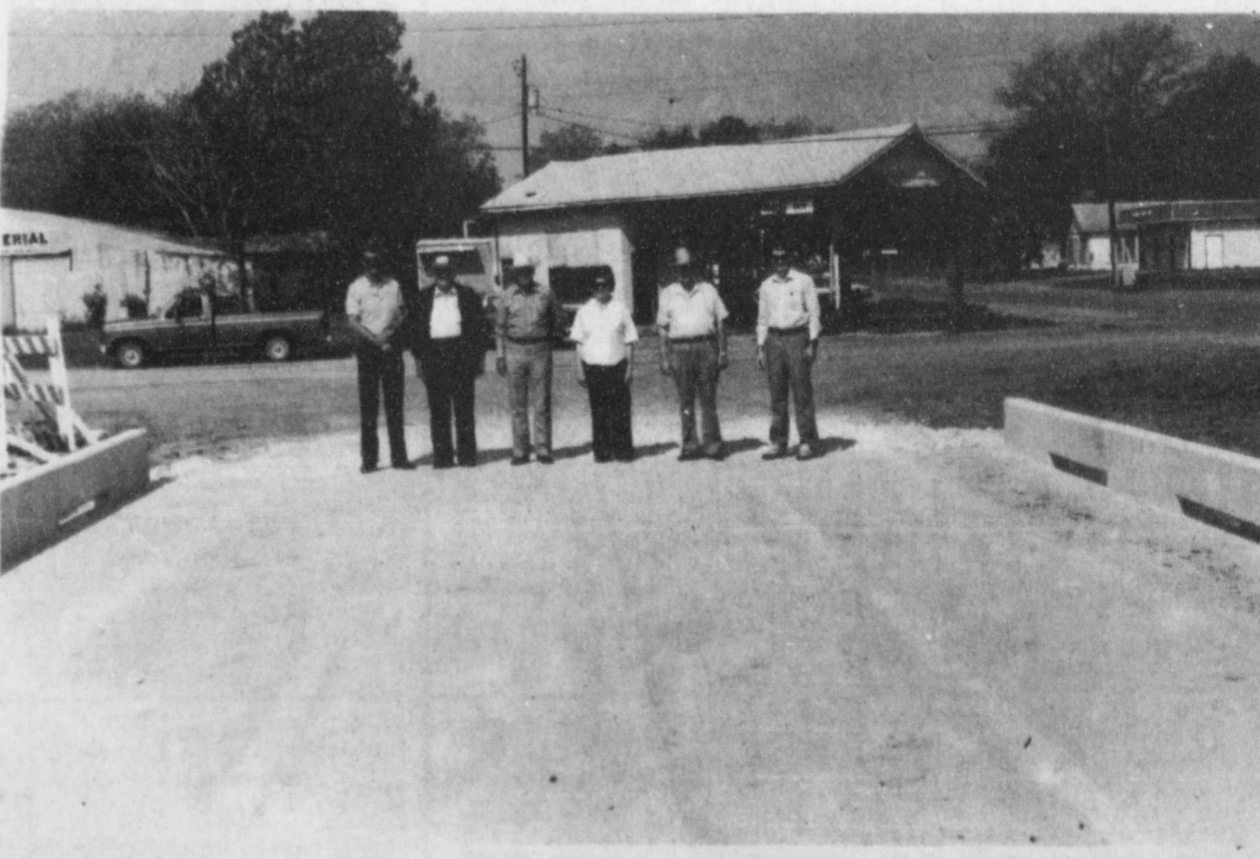
According to Jerry Leverett, Director of Prairiland CISD's Gifted and Talented Program, (PATS), parents who wish to nominate their children

for the PATS Program may do so during the next two weeks. Parents should obtain the nomination form from their child's school, complete it, and return it to the school by May 8. Nominations will be accepted for students who will be in grades 3-7 during the 1987-88 school year. Students who are already participating in the PATS Program need not be renominated.

The PATS Program, which is in its first year of operation, specifically addresses the following areas: creative/productive thinking ability

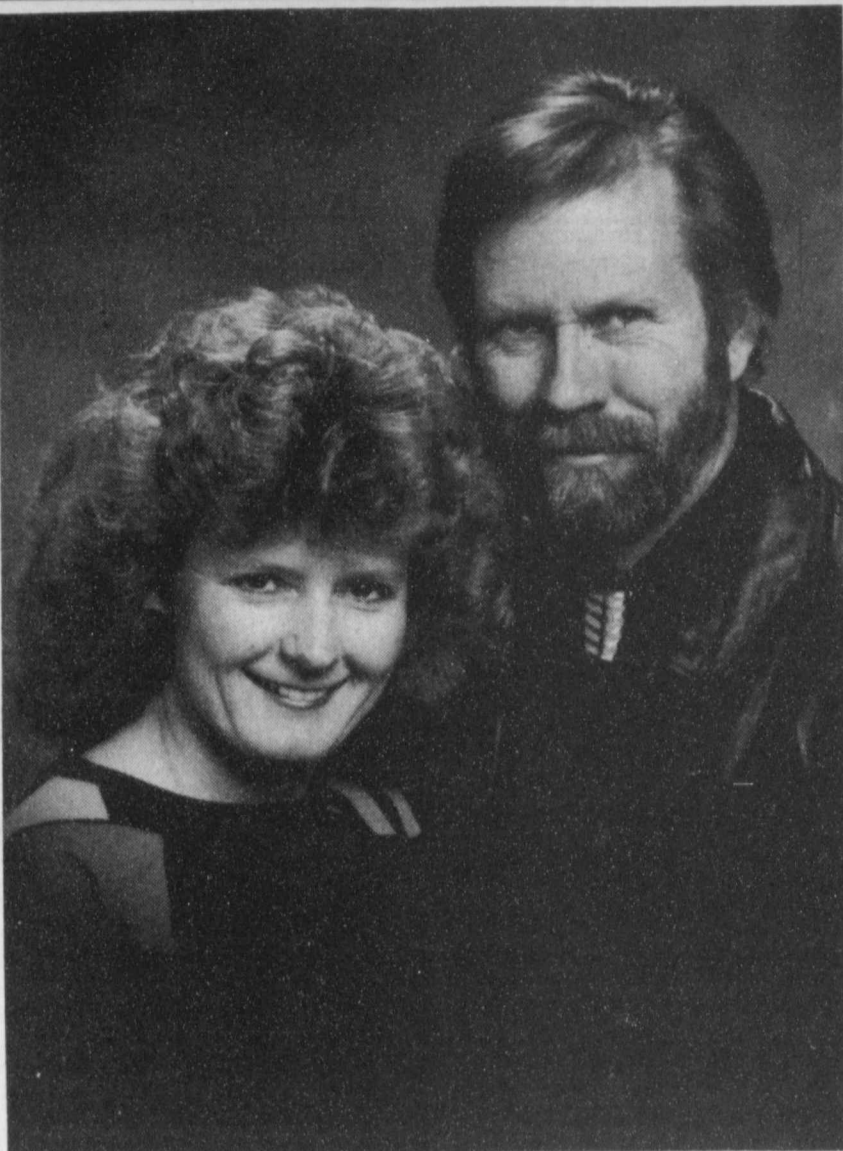

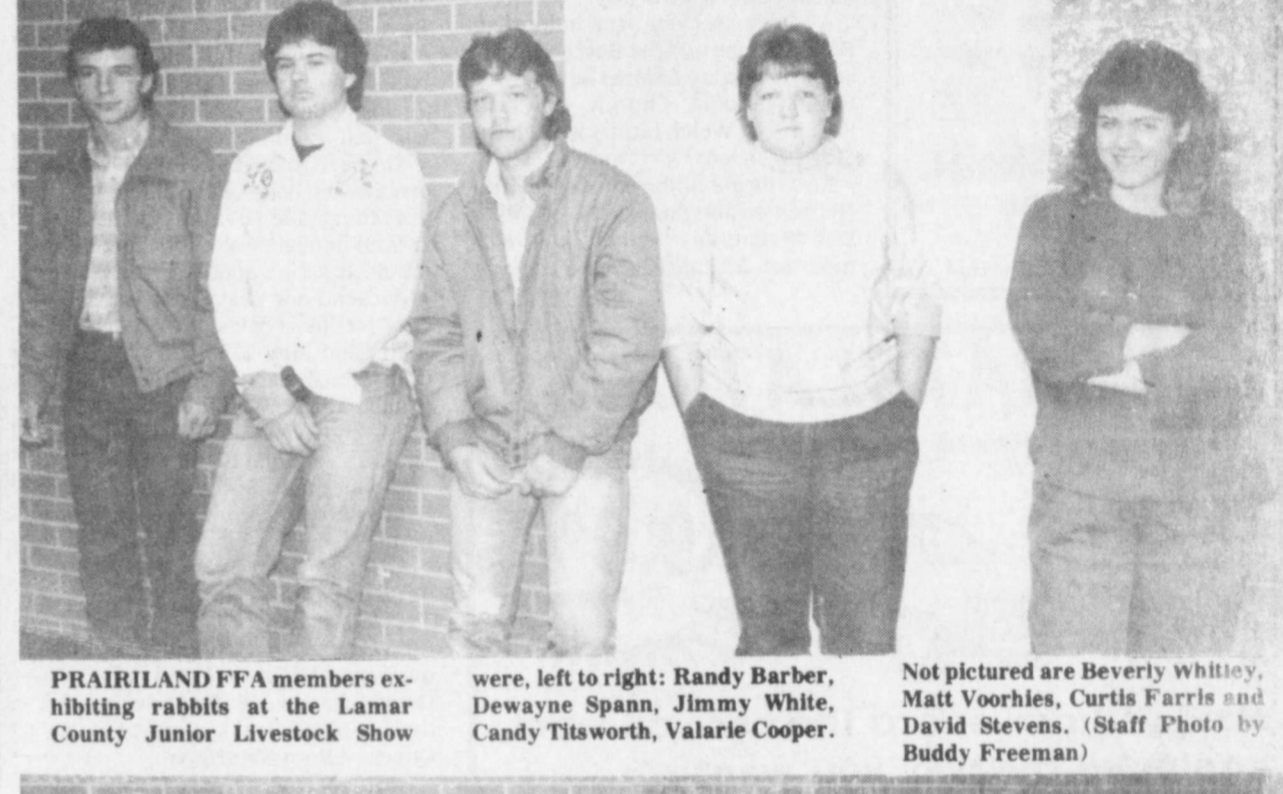

Patriots Drop One, Win One

Friday afternoon at Prairiland, the Patriots' hopes of a perfect district season came to an end as they were defeated by the Daingerfield Tigers, 9-7.

As an indicative of things to come, the Tigers led off the first inning with a bad hop triple to right field off of Patriot pitcher Mike Blackburn. After a walk, the Tigers scored the first run of the game off of a deep sacrifice fly to right field. Fortunately, with the aid of shortstop Carey Borden cutting down a runner at the plate, the Tigers did not score again in the inning and led 1-0.

In the bottom of the second inning, the Patriots had a rally of their own. With one out, Blackburn reached first base on an error. Then, Kevin Mowery, who pinch-ran for Blackburn, swiped second base. Although the Patriots did not score again in the inning, they held a 3-1 lead.

After Blackburn held the Tigers scoreless in the top of the third inning, the Patriots held a two-out rally in the bottom of the inning. Steven Johnson started the rally with a walk and then stole second base. Blackburn followed with a single by the shortstop to score Johnson. This hit by Blackburn was the end of the rally, but it gave the Patriots a 4-1 lead.

In the top of the fourth inning, the Tigers once again threatened. After a single was given up by Blackburn, the next two batters hit fly ball outs to centerfielder Wade Sparks. A walk moved the baserunner to second base, and then a single up the middle scored the second Tiger run of the game. On the single, a Tiger got thrown out at third base to end the scoring and the Patriots led 4-2.

With hopes of widening the lead, P.G. Morrison led off the bottom of the fourth inning by reaching base on an error. Sparks then laid down a perfect bunt down the third baseline for a single to put runners at first and second base. After an out, the Patriots executed their second double steal of the game to put runners at second and third. Martin Babb then hit a sacrifice

ground ball to score Morrison and to give the Patriots a 5-2 lead. Then, for the second time in the game, Sparks came in to score, via yet another Tiger balk. Richard Eatherly brought the fourth inning to a close by grounding out and the Patriots led 6-2.

The top of the fifth inning was what cost the Patriots the game. While barely hitting Blackburn's pitches, they somehow reached base. Two of the Tigers hits in the inning were perfect bunts. However, the big blows came when the seventh and eighth hitters in the inning blooped singles into the outfield to score two runs apiece. Jack Kindle relieved Blackburn after the second blooper and closed out the inning with good defensive plays by Borden at shortstop. After four and a half innings, the Tigers led 8-6.

Following a non-memorable Patriot bottom in the fifth inning, the Tigers led off with a single to centerfield off of Kindle. Two outs later, another single to centerfield scored a Tiger to give them a 9-6 lead. The inning came to a close with a groundball out to third baseman, Martin Babb.

Trailing by three runs, Scarano led off the bottom of the sixth inning with a walk. Morrison was quick to take advantage of the situation, as he hit perhaps the hardest hit of the game to score Scarano with a double. As fate would have it, Morrison was forced out at second after a line drive was caught by the second baseman off the bat of Sparks. 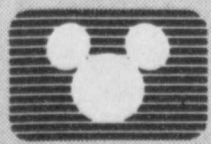
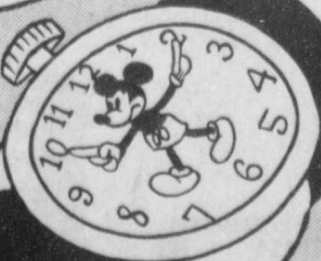
