A few years ago, I stood in a terminal in DeGaulle Airport, France...aggravated because an airline had caused us to miss our connecting flight.

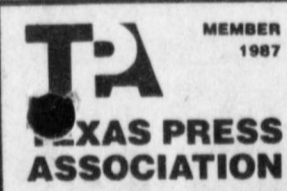
Two minutes later, the airline had called up New York flight schedules for another airline, found out which of the rival airline's flights matched up with our needs, and booked us seats on that flight!

Rain Relieves, More Still Needed

Two thunderstorms which left behind about 79 one-hundredths of an inch of rain provided welcome relief from what area farmers were already calling a drought.

Records were set during the month of April for both low rainfall and extreme heat, with several days being in the middle 90 degree range.

The moisture that has fallen still leaves things short however, and hopes for more rain continue.

To go along with the lack of rain and high heat, insects have done

heavy damage to milo crops, and a number of farmers have begun replanting, both because of the insects and because there was just enough moisture to sprout seeds, but not enough to allow the seedling to live.

The added expense of replanting will make hopes for a profit even dimmer, as farm prices show little sign of increasing.

Wheat farmers are discovering that the late, hard freeze experienced in the last days of March has affected their yields, and the freeze worsened

leaf rust, already a factor in diminishing yields.

Cattlemen, however, are experiencing higher cattle prices and following the mild winter, when little feeding was necessary, hope to recoup some of the past few year's

bad prices.

Long range weather forecasters are cautious about predicting whether rain and normal temperatures will occur on schedule this late spring and early summer, since indications of the past few months seem to point

toward drier, hotter conditions.

In the meanwhile, those with an eye for beauty might consider taking a drive through the back roads and country lanes to view the profusion of brilliant wildflowers brought out by the recent moisture.

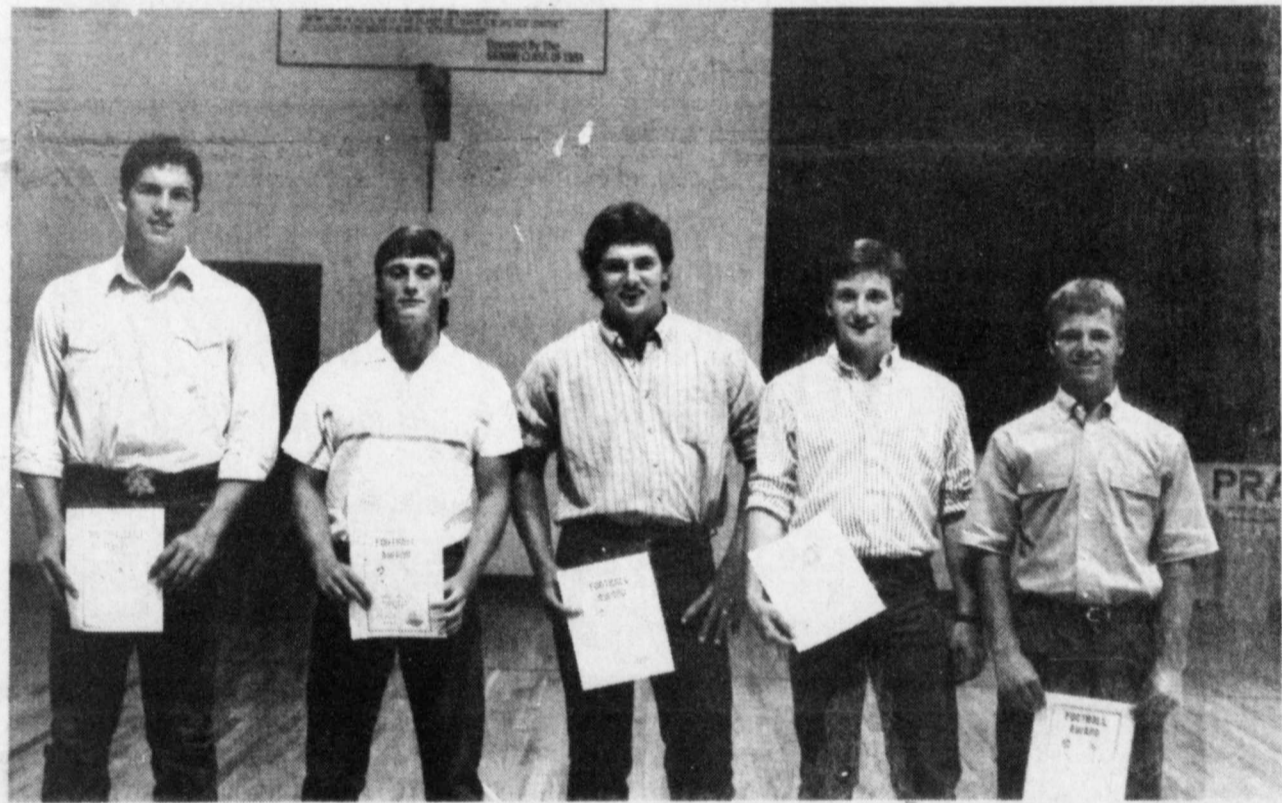

Pre-Kindergarten Has Eligibility Requirements

Prairiland CISD will offer pre-kindergarten classes to students living in the school district, provided the district can identify 15 or more eligible students.

To be eligible for pre-kindergarten classes, the child must be four years of age by September 1. They must also meet one of the following criteria:

1. Unable to speak and comprehend the English language.
2. Come from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below subsistence level.

Procedures:

1. Pre-Kindergarten will be operated on a half-day basis.
2. Classes will be for three hours each morning.
3. Transportation will be furnished to school, one-way only. (Parents, or responsible parties, will have to pick the child up at school by 11:30 each day.)
4. Breakfast will be served to students in this program if desired. (No lunches will be served.)
5. Students must have their medical records up to date.
6. Classes will probably be held on the high school campus which is located at Pattonville.

7. Students must be registered no later than May 11, 1987.

This is a one-half day program which will be taught the entire school

year. If you have any questions, please contact the elementary principals.

in district and improved the team's record to 9 and 2.

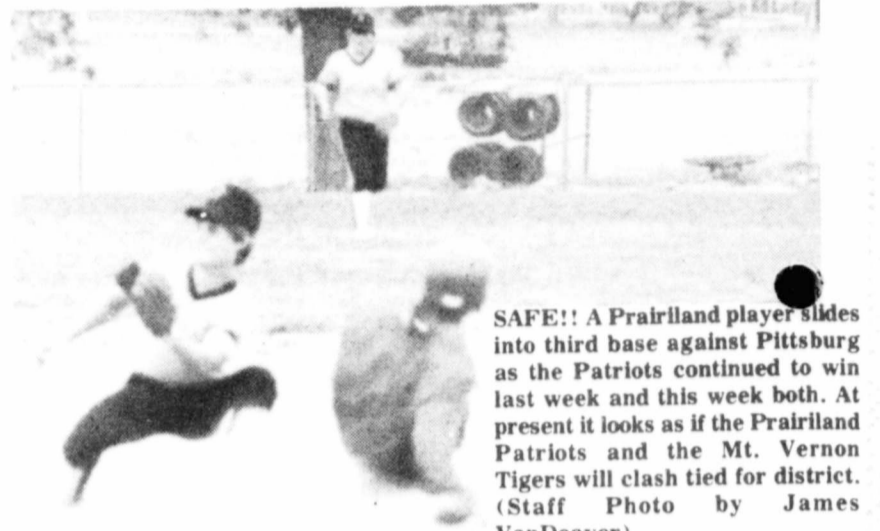
In their best come-from-behind victory of the season, the Patriots defeated the Daingerfield Tigers 5 to 4 Tuesday afternoon on the road.

Rep. Patterson Reports

As we enter the final month of this legislative session, I view this session climaxing in a tug of war over the budget for the next biennium. The appropriations bill as reported from the House Appropriations Committee totals \$39.4 billion as opposed to the Senate version totalling \$39.9 billion and the Governor's proposal of \$36.9 billion. I am optimistic that we will agree on an appropriation for the biennium. However, even the proposal supported by the governor will require an increase in taxes either at the state or local level due to expenditures mandated by statute, particularly education reform.

Several bills in my legislative program are receiving good public support. Legislation to establish English as the official language of Texas, H.J.R. 55, was heard in State Affairs Committee on April 20. Approximately 150 people traveled to Austin from across the state to testify in support

of this legislation. The only persons testifying against were representatives of the Christian Life Commission, the Civil Liberties Union and a few individuals from the Hispanic community. I would be very pleased if this constitutional amendment could be sent to the voters because I am confident it would pass.

Another bill eliminating liability of owners, lessees, or occupants of real property for trespassers has been heard in committee. I would hope that this bill will make it through the legislative process.

House Bill 966 places a tax on all oil in Texas on first sale. Currently, Texas produced oil is taxed at 4.6 percent while imported oil is not taxed. This bill not only would generate approximately \$1 billion, enough to balance our state budget, in revenue over the biennium, but it would also stimulate our sagging oil industry. This bill is also pending in committee.
