## Local Sales Tax Figures Released

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$97.9 million in local sales tax to 1,039 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said 1987 payments were down seven percent as compared to payments to date made in May of last year.

Houston's check was the largest, \$14.8 million, bringing total payments in 1987 to \$58.3 million, down ten percent over 1986.

Locally, Mt. Pleasant received \$105,686.79, for a 12.39 percent decrease. Talco received \$2,003.32 for

a 10.17 percent increase making 1987 payments to date \$11,049.77.

Bogata received \$3,842.51 for an 8.54 percent decrease. Total payments to date are \$11,329.93 as compared to \$12,388.49 for 1986.

Clarksville received \$25,102.55 for a 7.45 percent decrease while Detroit received \$1,274.44 for a 13.60 percent decrease over 1986 payments to date.

Blossom received \$3,349.15 for a 22.31 percent increase bringing 1987 payments to \$8,011.26 as compared to \$6,549.71 for last year.

Deport received \$2,040.91 for a 14.68

percent increase over 1986. 1987 payments to date are \$5,654.50, compared to \$4,903.48 for 1986.

Paris received \$227,295.86 for a .09 percent decrease over 1986 payments. May checks represent taxes col-

lected on sales made in March and reported to the Comptroller by April 20.

## Prairiland Seniors Publish Book

When Carolyn Ladd decided that the Prairiland Senior English class could put together a book, she, and her students, came up with more than they bargained for.

When the carefully selected, illustrated volume was typed, copied and bound, they discovered that they had more than a collection of poems and vignettes, they had a volume which revealed some of their deepest feelings, and which has tremendous appeal to all who read it.

Mrs. Ladd first conceived the idea of compiling a collection of the students work after attending a class at East Texas State University. There, she saw a similar book put out by an Honors Class.

"We could do that!", she thought, and came back to Prairiland to begin doing just that.

Once a week, on Fridays, after the usual study of grammar and literature, she explained narrative, descriptive, comparison-construct, autobiographical or some other form of writing. Then she let the students choose their own subject, or read them a list of various topics to express themselves about.

Soon the files were bulging with an unimaginably wide variety of work. Less than half of the work submitted could be included in the book.

Selecting the best pieces for the book was a difficult task, and one which both students and teacher participated in.

"We learned a lot about writing," Mrs. Ladd says. She critiqued each student's work, then it was resubmitted.

Other students in the class with ar-

tistic talent picked out various pieces that they wanted to illustrate. The illustrations range from the beautifully detailed to the light-heartedly futuristic.

A number of different titles for the volume were submitted. "Serendipity" submitted by Stacy Borg, was chosen as the most fitting. "The inside cover page states Serendipity is a term relating to having aptitude for making fortunate discoveries accidentally, such as the discovery of a great treasure". Many "treasures" are created by a pen in hand. True works of art are sometimes produced by writers who, at first, never expect to give birth to such valuable works.

Serendipity is a compilation of written "treasures" presented by the Senior Class of 1987.

The cover design, executed by Toni Davis, carries out the theme, featuring a treasure chest of sparkling diamonds labeled "Poetry and Literature".

Within the forty page column lies insights into the world of today's teenagers...their emotions both good and bad...their fears...their joys and hopes.

It is impossible to read some of the contents without feeling moved, so vivid is the descriptive power.

From "School Is Almost Out":  
Oh, give my diploma  
Send me on my way.  
To make myself a future  
And make my parents so proud.  
To the casual "Dragster, expensive toy, sharp, shiny blue, fastest of all cars...Hotrod". The contents cover

the things that are important to young adults at this crucial point in their life.

The subject matter is varied, indeed. "What is a big brother", "Ice Cream", "Loneliness" are only a few of the things dealt with. Courage,

death, rumours, beauty, love, each subject has something that expresses one of the young writer's feelings intensely.

If adults think that teenagers are blind to the beauty that surrounds them, they have only to read "Fall Plowing", "Two Suns In the Sunset" or "Mountains" to realize that nothing could be further from the truth.

The writing came from class work, the rest of the work, illustrating, typing and binding, came from off periods or in between times.

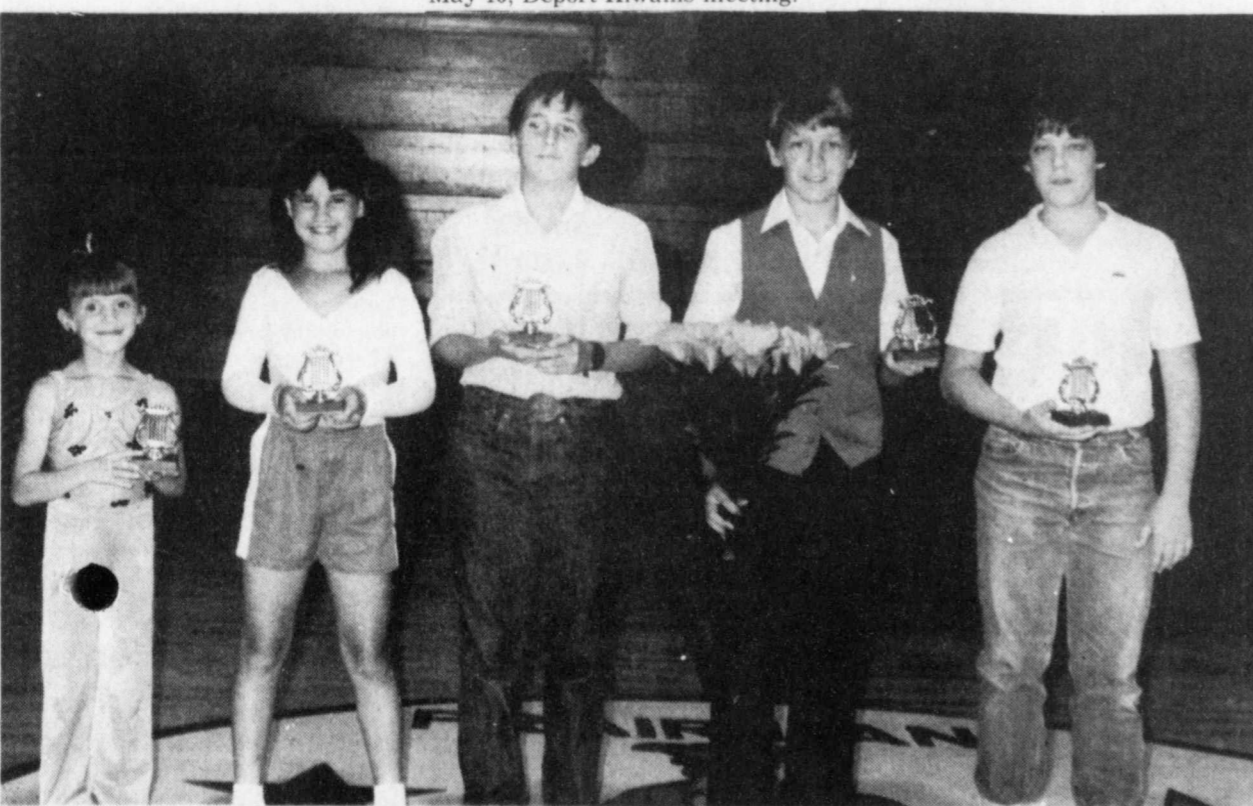

## Deport Kiwanis Hears About Child Abuse

The Deport Kiwanis Club heard Linda Reynolds of the Texas Department of Human Service and Welfare in Lamar County speak on child abuse last Saturday morning.

Ms. Reynolds has been with the department for twelve years.

According to her, the Department's job is to investigate reports of child abuse, and determine if a child is in danger.

Ms. Reynolds told the club that in most investigations children are not removed from the home, but that parents are assigned to attend parenting classes to learn how to cope with the pressures that create child abuse situations.

However, intakes (children removed from their homes) do occur daily.

When a child is removed from the home, Ms. Reynolds says, they are placed in foster homes. Lamar County does not have enough foster parents to take all removed children, and some must be sent to homes outside the county.

Ms. Reynolds stated that there are different kinds of abuse: sexual, emotional, physical and neglect. Sexual abuse is the number one form of abuse in Lamar County, with children from two years old and up the most likely victims.

Neglect, she says, is the hardest form of abuse to prove in court.

One-third of all sexually abused children are boys. About 15% of the abused children are from minority groups, the majority being white. She stressed that not all abused children come from low income families.

Most children spend six months in a foster home except in special cases.

Children that cannot be returned to their parents are released for adoption outside of the county to guard against future problems with family.

Ms. Reynolds praised the judges in Lamar County for their reputation of a strong stand on punishment of child abuse.

Even though the department is state funded, she says, many service organizations donated funds and equipment to help prove abuse or care for children.

Foster parents, she said, can choose the age group of children they prefer, but teenagers are not recommended for foster situations. Most teenagers must be sent to children's homes.

Ms. Reynolds urged members of the Kiwanis Club to report any suspected child abuse they might see or hear of to authorities.

Texas, she said, has more deaths from child abuse than any other state.

Kindle retired the Brahmans successfully in the top of the fifth inning and the Patriots won the game 14-1 as a result of the ten run rule. This game

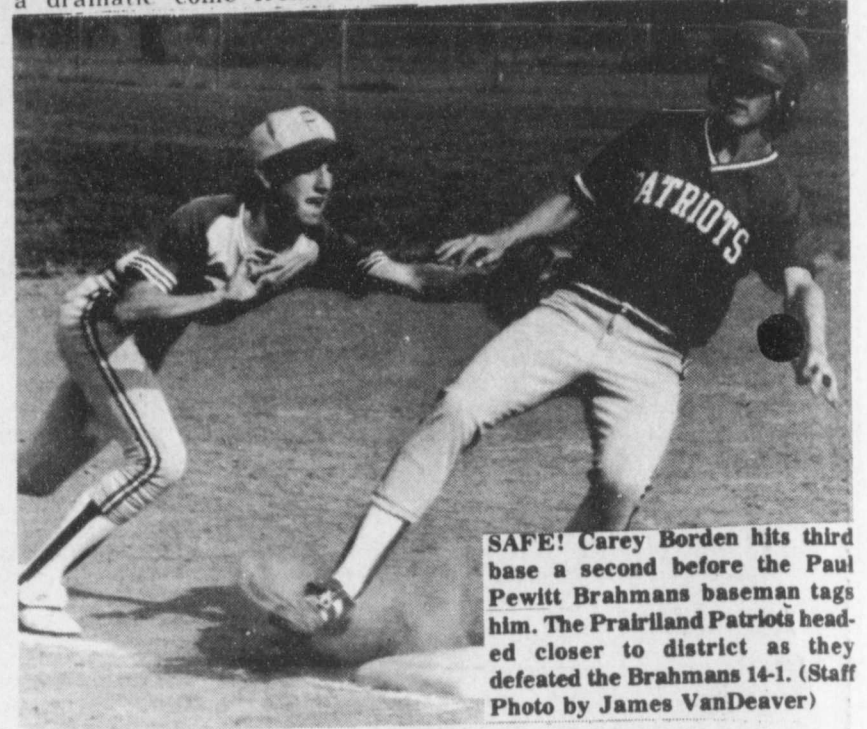
was probably the last cake walk of the season for the Patriots.
