#### TEAMS Scores Up At Prairiland

Graduates

Students in grades three, five and seven of the Prairiland Independent School District have received higher test scores in the recent TEAMS tests than a year ago, Superintendent Leslie Taylor told the school board

graders scored 35 percent higher in mathematics, 18 percent higher in reading and 29 percent higher in writing, Taylor said.

Fifth graders received 10 percent higher scores in math and 13 percent higher scores in writing. Seventh graders scored 9 percent higher in writing, 7 percent higher in reading and 2 percent higher in math, the superintendent said.

The percentage of students who passed the TEAMS test, Taylor said, was third grade, 88 percent; fifth grade, 92 percent; seventh grade, 97 percent; and ninth grade, 79 percent.
