Cake mixes come to my rescue over and over, but I realize that they won't match a truly home-created effort.

It has to be because of those strange ingredients and cost effective additives! Just knowing that a cake has a dose of caoujeon in it tends to put one off!!

Hydrogenated soybean oil? Artificial natural flavorings? Food colorings and off proteins?

The best cooks just don't reach for them. That, my friends, is why they are the best cooks...and most likely won't ever be replaced by any store-bought item, no matter how down-homey the label looks!

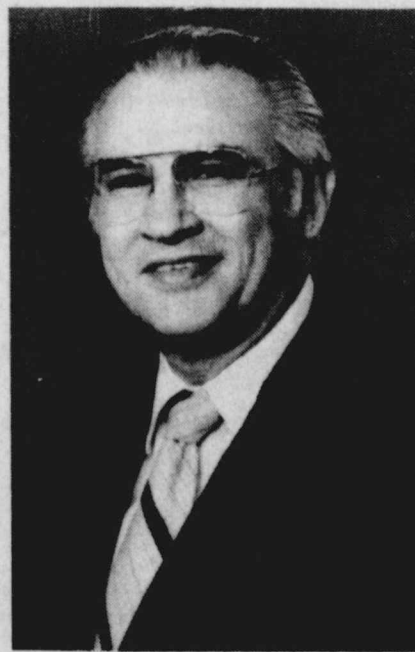
Dr. Riddle is an outstanding preacher of the gospel and you will not want to miss hearing him preach.

Lamar County Farmers Can Run For Committee

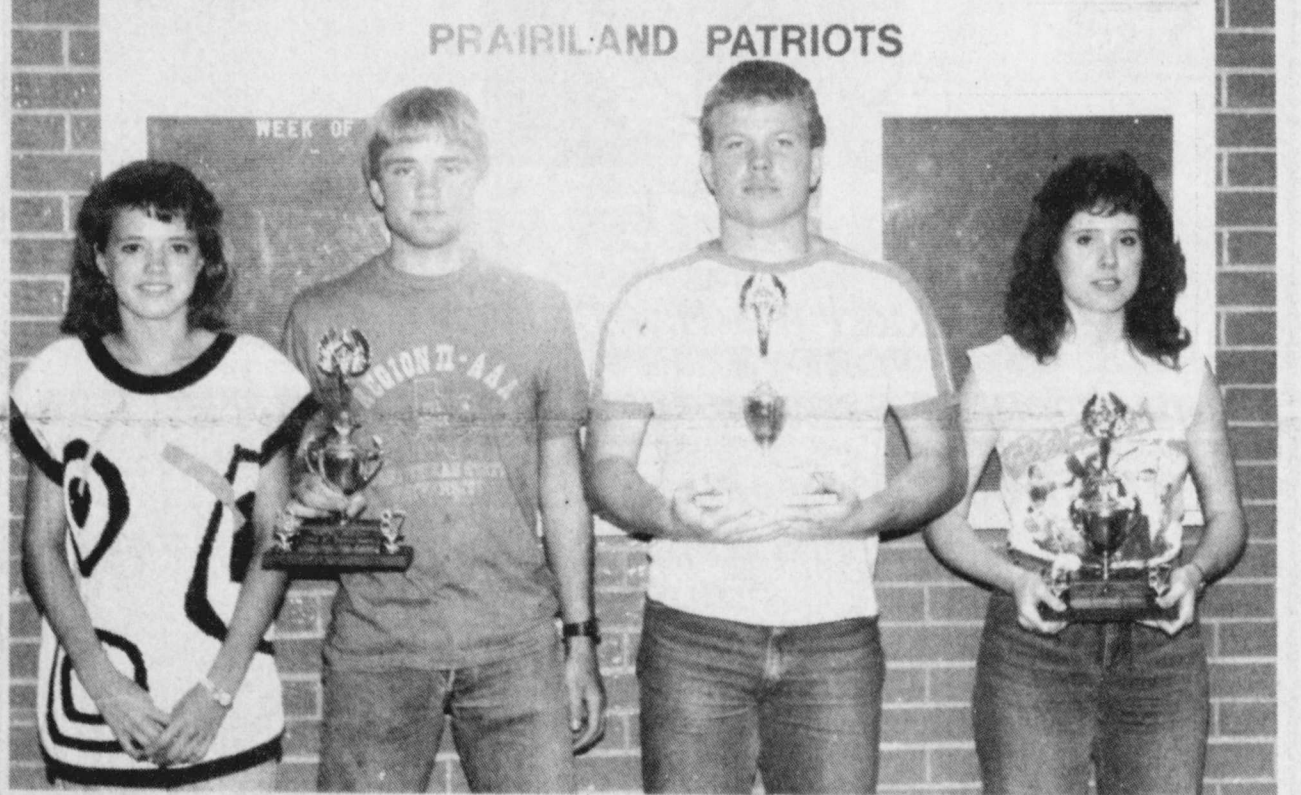
Eligible farmers in Lamar County are invited to become nominees for the Farmers Home Administration County Committee, FmHA County Supervisor, Billy L. Curb announced.

As a result of the 1985 farm bill, two of the three members of FmHA County Committee must be elected. The third member is appointed by FmHA. The Lamar County Committee assists the FmHA County office in reviewing

applications for FmHA farm loans and on other farm credit matters.

Generally, farmers who are residents of the county but not FmHA borrowers are eligible to become nominees for the FmHA county committee. Only one vacancy will be filled.

"Farmers in this county, serving on the committee, can play an important role by assisting in the process of loan

Patriots Fall To Lindale At Bi-District

Friday afternoon in Sulphur Springs, the Prairiland Patriots lost to Lindale in bi-district action 7 to 2 to bring their season to a close.

In the first inning, the Lindale hit-

ters were not fooled by many of Mike Blackburn's pitches. After Lindale's first four hitters had hit two singles, a solo home run and drawn a base on balls, Patriot Coach Bill Scudder lifted Blackburn in favor of Martin Babb. Already behind 2-0, Babb struck out the first two hitters he faced to end the rally.

Still behind 2-0 in the bottom of the second inning, the Patriots staged a mini-rally of their own. Leading off, Blackburn singled to centerfield. Then, catcher Giovanni Scarano reached base on an error to put runners at the corners. After P.G. Morrison hit into a double play, Wade Sparks singled to left field to score Blackburn. Carey Borden grounded out to end the inning, but the Lindale lead had been cut in half at 2-1.

However, Lindale quickly retaliated in the top of the third inning. With the aid of a single, an error and a walk, the bases were loaded with only one out. Babb walked in one run and then gave up a two run single. Babb brought the inning to a close by striking out the last two hitters. Unfortunately, the Patriots were further behind at 5-1.

Leading off with a chance to help his cause, Babb began the bottom of the third inning with a double to centerfield. After Richard Eatherly popped out, Jack Kindle continued his clutch hitting by driving in Babb with a single. The run was the only one that the Patriots were able to score but it put them within striking distance at 5-2.

After pitching brilliantly in the fourth and fifth innings, Babb was touched for two runs in the top of the sixth inning. After getting the leadoff man out on strikes, Babb gave up a single and later a two out, two run homer over the left field fence. The runs, the last of the game, gave Lindale a 7-2 lead.

The final inning and a half was scoreless. The 7 to 2 loss brought the Patriots surprisingly successful season to a close. The leading hitters in the game were Martin Babb and Jack Kindle who both went three for four.

Scott Scudder Featured In Paper

Scott Scudder, a graduate of Prairiland High School in 1986 and Cincinnati's number one draft choice in baseball, has been written up along with two other Cincinnati Reds players in the Cedar Rapids Gazette.

The star pitcher of Prairiland's State Championship baseball team last year was billed in the news article as "Cincinnati's No. 1 Draft Choice last June, the 17th overall selection."

The article continues that "Scudder, a 19 year-old native of Blossom, Texas, signed a letter of intent to attend the University of Texas prior to last June's draft, but opted for the professional baseball route instead."

Scudder was 1-3 with a 4.78 ERA at Billings, Montana last summer. He struck out 38 batters in 53 2/3 innings of work. His current stats are W-2, L-1, ERA 1.72.

Unlike many young prospects,

Scudder did not go to the Florida Instructional League last fall. He attended college, at the Red's expense, instead.

"I had thrown a lot of innings in high school and at Billings, so we didn't think it would be a good idea," he said. Scudder also had a light load this spring.

"I didn't pitch much in spring training," he said. "I felt good and just worked on getting in shape."

Scudder was anxious to get his professional career going. "I needed to get started in pro ball," he said. "I figured after four years at Texas I'd still start out in A-ball. This way, in a few years, I might challenge for the 40-man roster."

The article in the Cedar Rapids paper was written by Mike Koolbeck.

Scudder's parents report that he is extremely happy where he is now.

A second article in the Cedar

Rapids Gazette which came out May 17, again by Mike Koolbeck, reports that Cincinnati Vice-president-Player Development Sheldon "Chief" Bender, has been evaluating and developing talent for the Cedar Rapids team.

He has over 40 years of experience and says of Scott, "It's hard to say about future major leaguers, but you can see some of the young kids, like the kid who pitched (Wednesday) night, Scott Scudder. He was our No. 1 draft choice last June. You can't find a kid with a better arm. He was throwing in the 90's and he's come up with a better breaking ball. He's a terrific athlete and made a couple of great fielding plays."

"I can envision him being a potential 20-game winner for the Reds in the future, three, four or five years from now."

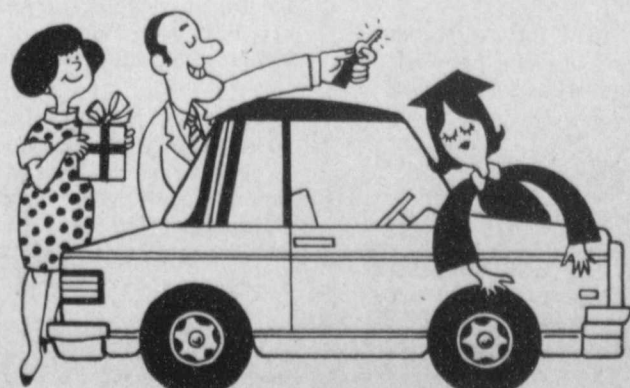
