applications for FmHA farm loans and on other farm credit matters.

Generally, farmers who are residents of the county but not FmHA borrowers are eligible to become nominees for the FmHA county committee. Only one vacancy will be filled.

"Farmers in this county, serving on the committee, can play an important role by assisting in the process of loan applications and reviews," said Mr. Curb. Nominating petitions must be returned to the FmHA County Office by June 10.
