

Nances Lead Lives Filled With Interest Hobbies & Helping, Part Of Couple's Life

Richard and Helen Nance have lived in a variety of places, done some unusual things, and most of all, kept a keen interest in the world around

Richard grew up in the Deport and Paris area, but left in 1942 to join the U.S. Coast Guard. In 1982, he and Helen, his wife, returned and built a brick home on land his father farmed, just west of Deport. Supposedly, hey retired, but it's a pretty busy retirement.

Helen is a native of Sioux Falls, South Dakota. When questioned as to why she ever left she will laugh and reply"When you can go from making 17 cents an hour to making 90 cents an hour ... you go!"

That's exactly what she did, going from the Dakotas to Tacoma, Washington to the shipyards during the war

The couple met there, thus beginning a life together which had them living in Washington, Colorado, Missouri, back to Colorado, Utah and then finally back to Texas.

During his career, Richard was in the Coast Guard, the Army Reserve, and worked as a civilian for the Army Reserve. He has, all told, a total of 30 years of Government service.







The "Dog Days" of summer get their name from the canine constellation known as Sirius, because it appeared in the sky during the hottest days of the year. It's 8.6 light years from earth and over four billion years old.

Although Earth's Northern Hemisphere reaches its annual farthest point from the Sun in early July, ironically that's the beginning of what are called the "Dog Days"the hottest and stickiest days of the year. That point—the aphelion—occurs about 9 p.m. EDT July 3. For people trying to keep their cool, however, even being 94,510,000 miles from the sun may not be far

Senate Revises House Bill

A \$5.3 billion tax bill was approved by the Senate after six hours of debate and heated argument during the climax of floor debate which had to be quieted by Lt. Gov. Hobby. The Senate Substitute for H.B. 61 passed the Senate on a vote of 23-7, but was rejected by the House necessitating the appointment of a conference committee to resolve the differences. The insurance sales tax was removed from the bill; however, a number of items affecting both consumers and businesses were added to the bill.

The Senate Plan includes: an increase in the state sales tax from 51/4 cents per dollar to 6 cents; broadening the sales tax base to labor charges on auto repairs, interstate long distance telephone calls, and custom computer software; doubling the inspection fee for automobiles to \$15.50, but making it good for two years; raising the cost of a driver's license from \$16 to \$25, but making it good for five years rather than four; establishing a sales tax permit fee at \$50 annually; increasing the 5 percent sales tax on sales, rental and use of motor vehicles to 5.5 percent; boosting the corporate franchise tax of \$5.25 per \$1,000 of capital value to \$7.50 and arranging a 50 percent surtax payment due in 1989. However, the tax could be taken as a credit in 1990 against whatever franchise tax is owed; raising the cigarette tax 9.5 cents, to 30 cents per pack; eliminating the miscellaneous gross receipts tax on local exchange telephone revenues in 1988; increasing the hotel occupancy tax to six percent; imposing a 16 percent surtax on the insurance company premiums tax (The companies already pay a tax based on their premiums, but this long-established tax is different from surance premiums.);

Doubling numerous fees for professional occupatins such as doctors, nurses, dentists, dietitians, pharmacists, court reporters, surveyors, real estate agents, accountants, architects, lawyers and other professions; enacting a 2.5 percent administrative services tax on insurance carriers; reducing the required number of license plates from two to one on twenty-one classes of vehicles (resulting in a savings to the state and counties in mailing the

license plates.) A compromise on taxes will not be easy, but time is running out on the session and hopefully an agreement can be reached. The Governor also added 19 more issues to his list of items to be considered, but of course, the objective is to ease the state's budget crisis
