The Wonders Of Windsor Wowed Us!

Editor's Note: I meant to close this column out this week, but a number of people have told me not to do that just yet...they want to hear more. Since no one has voiced an opinion to the contrary, I shall continue for this week and next.

One Wednesday there was Windsor. Oh, was there Windsor!

Windsor Castle is located outside London in rolling, misty countryside that looks like the epitome of every English movie ever seen.

It is, of course, the Duke of Windsor's "place". The Duke of Windsor, for those who may not do any royalty watching, is Queen Elizabeth II's

The castle is absolutely fabulous. It is a huge complex, a mile on each side of it's four outer walls.

Within there are all kinds of "grace and favor" apartments, abodes for those who have devoted their lives in one way or another to serving the country, and beautiful lavish state rooms used upon ceremonial

St. George's Chapel is an experience within itself as one walks into ancient, outstanding stained glass, intricately carved ceilings, and monuments and plaques in memory of those famous and not so famous who served the British Empire and the people before their death.

The crests of the barons hang from the ceiling, emblazoned like a roll of honor from long ago.

A box with a note pad and pencil beside it states that "prayers are made for specific people and needs, please note down the persons name and need and we will offer a prayer.'

Absolutely stunning choir pews were carved hundreds of years ago. Every now and again I was struck by the multitude of lives that went into

the creation of all this beauty. One can picture the wood carvers and gilders going about their business within some huge structure before it's completion, hundreds upon hundreds of them painstakingly chipping out works of art.

In Windsor Castle itself, we entered a room which almost literally took me to my knees in shock.

Overhead was the most fabulous ceiling I had ever seen. Done all in gold, it was intricate, yet so perfectly proportioned that the immense size

of the room seemed perfectly natural. Huge chandeliers of Waterford crystal grace the length of the room. Light sparkled and bounced off the gold and crystal, and one could only gaze and gaze until the neck gave out!

Closets were big rooms with priceless paintings within, bedrooms held beds fifteen feet high and decked with golden embroidery and velvets, carved woods and ostrich plumes.

We spent hours going from room to room. We saw the mahogany dining table where President and Mrs.

Reagan dined with the heads of state. The table was closed to its smaller proportion walls while we were there, it would only seat 75 people. When all the leaves are in it, it will

Also at Windsor, Madame Trussard's waxworks had an exhibition called "Royalty and Empire". These hundreds of wax figures were absolutely astonishing. One expected them to move and breath.

Devoted to the reign of Queen Victoria, they followed her through the course of her lifetime, from young

Inside the theatre, the most amazing figures of all spoke, moved and commented upon the age. Charles

spoke their piece, and Victoria and Albert told their dreams at the beginning of her rule. Even her little dog, lying at her feet,

perked his ears at her voice, wagged his tale and yawned!

After the awesome experience of Windsor, it was pleasant to drive out into the countryside to Runnymeade.

Here, breeze touched meadows rolled while peaceful cattle grazed upon the hillside.

Runnymeade is famous for being the site the Magna Carta was signed on. This world famous document was the beginning of "Justice Under The Law" and the beginning of legal process as we know it.

It wasn't hard, as we wandered across the empty meadow, to imagine the jingle of harness and bits, the flast of bright cloaks and armour as mounted knights and barons, kings and dignitaries met on this hallowed ground for various ceremonies, including the signing of the Magna Carta, back in the ten hundreds.

We walked on down a fence line, then up a winding path through handsome trees. There, inscribed on plain granite, was a monument to John F. Kennedy, set in the center of an acre of land that Great Britian gave to America in memory of the assassinated president.

The rain began again after we had our walk, and we drove home (how easy it was to think of our friend's place as home), through gathering dusk.

A fire, (yes, in July) took away the chill and we sat in Mic's living room sipping iced team (we had the craving, old habits are hard to break).

We began to talk about some of the expressions we heard among the British. "Full of beans and bus tickets" is

their expression for feeling happy and ready to go. "There's not enough room to swing


a cat in" speaks of tight spaces. For me, the one that sent me off into gales of laughter was "To hell with

SOME BEDROOM! The King's State Bedchamber at Windsor



Hearing To Be Held On Moving Old Jail

The Deport City Council has set September 14 at 6:30 p.m. as the time for a public hearing to discover how the citizens of Deport feel about moving the old Deport jail to a new site a short distance from its present location, in order to be renovated.

The Deport Kiwanis Club plans to build a concrete foundation close to the front of the walking track in the American Legion Park

It would be moved to this new site and restored to its original state as closely as possible.

The present location is somewhat inaccessible, and inconvenient.

The Kiwanis Club hopes that by moving and restoring the old jail, which is one of the few such structures left, they can make it a treasured part of Deport's history, to be viewed and enjoyed by all.

Time To Prepare Land For Winter Pasture

By Herb Brevard

The time has arrived to start preparing land for winter pastures. says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. If planting small grains on a prepared seedbed, the ground must be broken

Smal grains and ryegrass are sensitive to acid soils. The production will be limited if the pH of the soil is less than six. The lower the pH, the more limited production will be. To determine the nutritive needs of the soil, a soil test must be run.

If lime is needed, it should be applied before preparing the seedbed. Also, phosphorus and potassium should be put on before breaking. This enables the nutrients to be incorporated into the soil where the roots

will pick them up easier. Wait to apply nitrogen until planting or until the plants are growing.

Rye is th ebest choice of small grains in East Texas, Reeves says. Rye will make more growth than other species during cold weather and is not likely to winter kill.

Combinations of different small grains may be advisable as long as one-half of the seed is rve. Include

ryegrass in the mixture to extend the grazing season in the spring.

Open cattle and sheep shows will be held during the week of August 31 and the Junior Shows will be held on Saturday, September 5.


All entry fees are due to the Fair Association office almost immediately so do not waste time.

Keeping Healthy

Hot Weather Hard on the Elderly

Older people have an increased risk of heat-related illness and the National Institute of Aging of the National Institutes of Health warns against heat exhaustion, heat cramps and heat stroke.

The Institute suggests several ways to cool off during a hot spell: taking lukewarm or cool baths or showers, allowing the body to air dry; placing an ice bag or wet towels on the body; staying out of direct sunlight and avoiding strenuous activity; wearing lightweight, lightcolored, loose-fitting clothing; wearing a hat outdoors. Whenever possible, remaining indoors in a cool place is

Another suggestion from the Institute is to drink plenty of water or fruit juices to replace fluids lost through perspiration but to avoid alcoholic beverages.

Elderly relatives or neighbors should be checked on routinely, and especially those who live alone. Danger signs such as nausea, dizziness, fatigue or fever require prompt medical attention.
