Two Burglaries Occur On Same Night

Two burglaries occurred on the same night last week, at two different locations in the Deport area.

Isbell's Service Station was broken into when thieves cut the chain either late Thursday, September 17 or early in the morning on Friday,

September 18.

The burglars took several batteries, stole the change maker off the coke machine, took the money out of the coke machine and made off with some miscellaneous items.

This was the second time the station has been burglarized this month.

Glover Farms of Deport suffered a loss of an estimated \$10,000 on the same evening when thieves stole 20 weaned heifers, one pure-bred

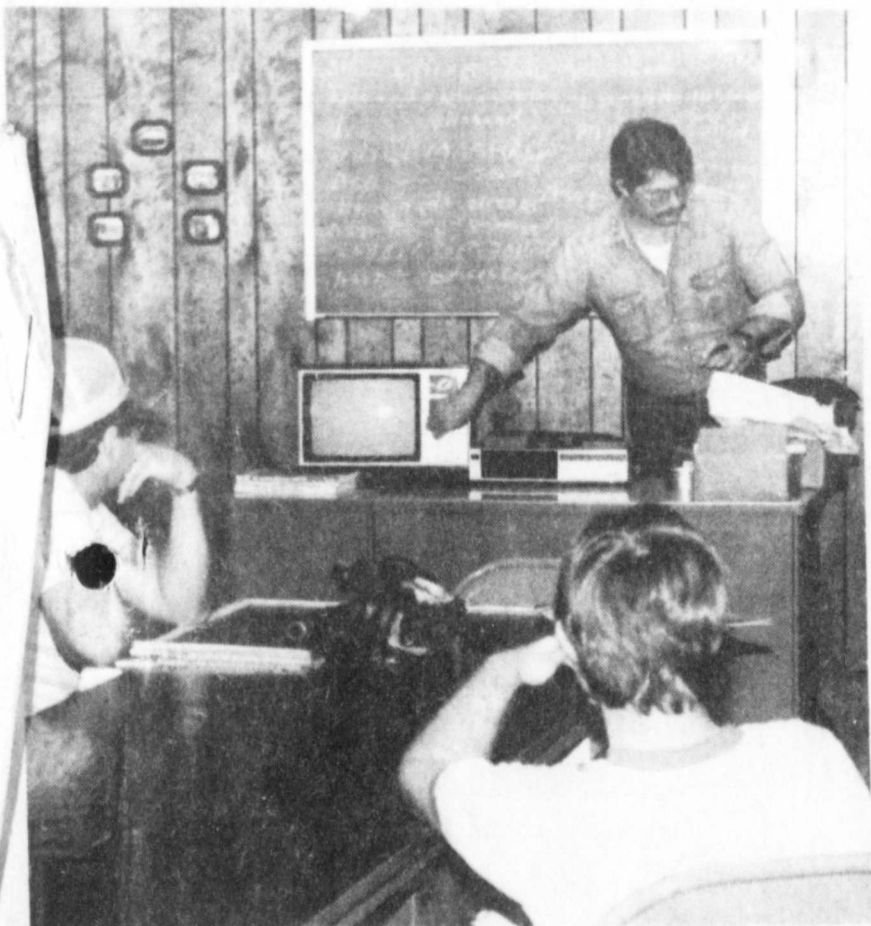
Longhorn bull and a large assortment of shop equipment and tools.

Among the missing items were kerosene cans, trash cans, ropes, hot wire, water hoses, tools, filters for Ford tractors, the burglars leaving behind filters for a Massey-Ferguson tractor, brooms, log chains, chicken wire, mounted new tires, grease guns, hoes, shovels and axes, a Briggs & Stratton engine, bolts and nuts, air compressor, bench grinder and a

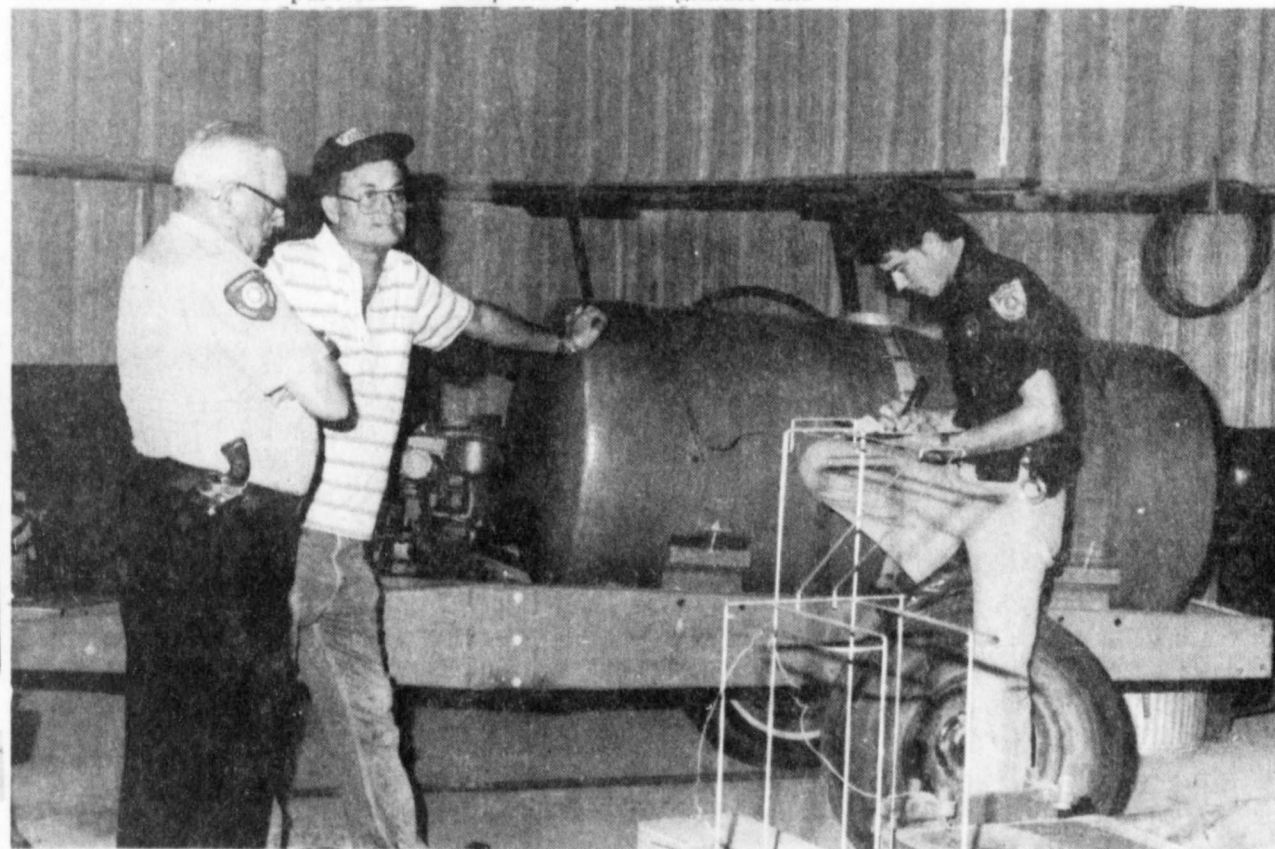
variety of other items, including 15 bales of hay.

A special investigator has been assigned to the case by Lamar County Sheriff's deputies.

Heavy rains obliterated tracks made by the vehicles used in the theft, but it is estimated that two trailers must have been used, at least one of them being a gooseneck type rig.

Army Worms Showing Up

With recent rains, armyworms will be showing up, especially in winter pastures, says Dr. James Robinson, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Armyworm infestations have no set pattern and may be general or very scattered. Small worms generally appear about two weeks after a rain. Either Sevin or Dylox may be used for control with no waiting period.

September is the best time to spray for control of peach tree borers. Commercial producers may use Lorsban while home owners or non-commercial producers should use Thiodan or Lindane. The trees should be sprayed to saturation from the scaffold limbs down to the ground.

As cooler weather approaches, insects will be entering the home for overwintering. Precautions such as caulking and keeping firewood away from the house will help. Spraying around the foundation with a residual insecticide such as diazinon or dursban is also recommended. Do not use chlordane for this purpose.

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Sales Tax Change To Take Place

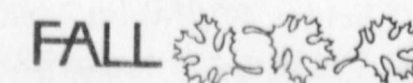
State Comptroller Bob Bullock today said changes in the state sales tax law will bring Texas into compliance with federal regulations on food stamp purchases.

Bullock said that Texas law exempts all food stamp purchases from the state's sales tax starting October 1, 1987. The exemption will cost the state

about \$5 million in lost revenue in 1988 but will prevent the federal government from withholding a projected \$808 million in annual assistance to 1.4 million Texans.

Last year's reauthorization of the federal food stamp program added new language that prohibits states from receiving food stamps if they collect taxes on food stamp

purchases. Although most food items are exempt in Texas, the state does collect tax on candy, soft drinks, diluted juices and other foods.

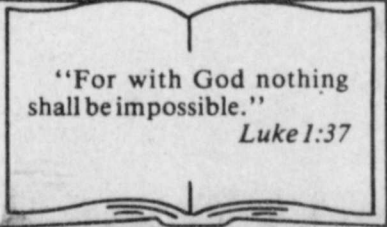

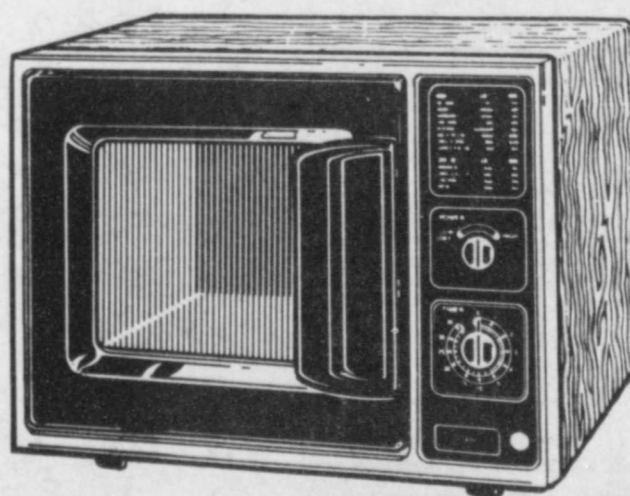

The Patriots put together an awesome attack on the Bulldogs in the final three minutes of the contest, starting when Patriot Jeff Fendley

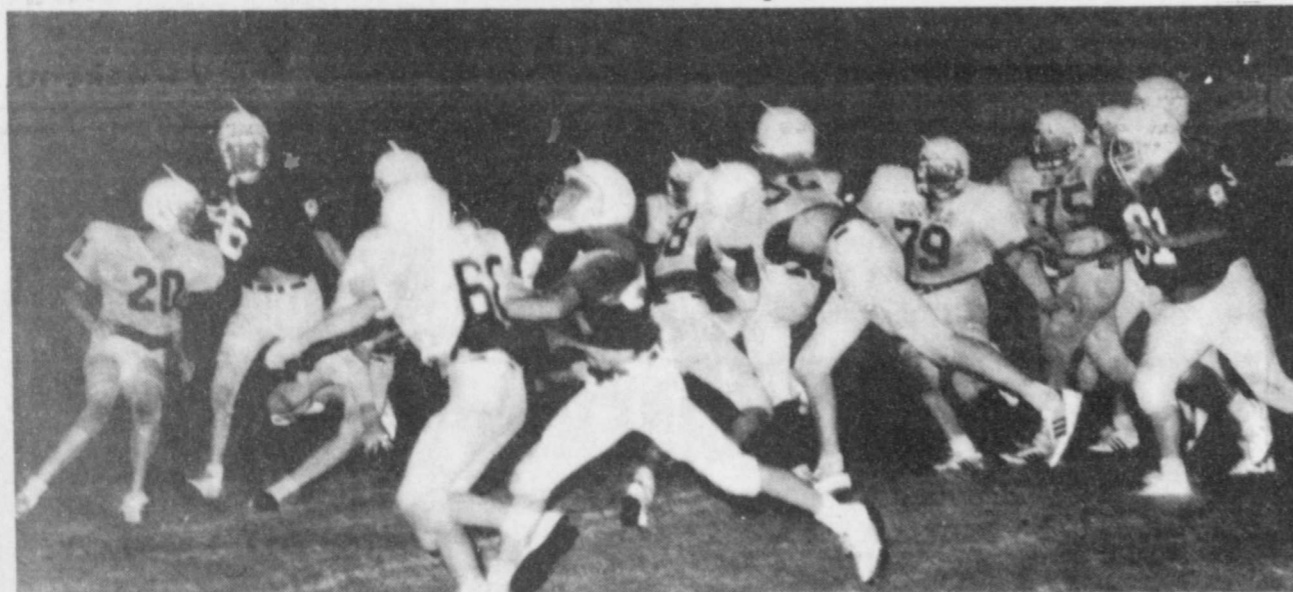

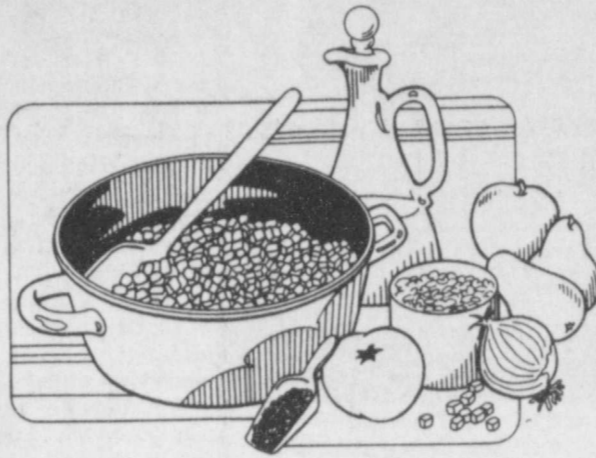

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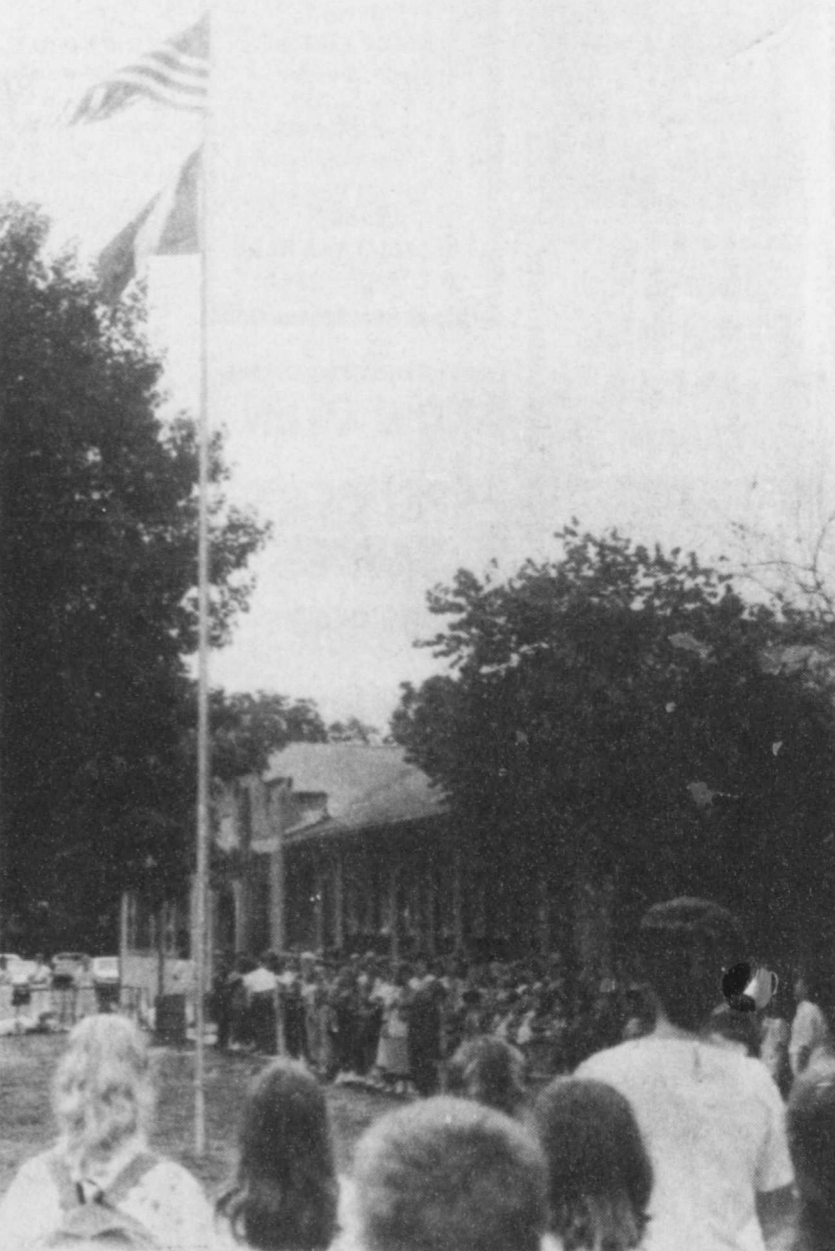
