Local Sales Tax Figures Mostly Down

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$55.3 million in local sales tax to 904 cities levying the one-percent city tax. According to Bullock, this year's payments are down by 5.5 percent overall compared to payments made by October last year.

Houston's check was the largest, \$8.6 million, bringing total payments

in 1987 to 108.6 million, down 6.9 percent from last year.

Mt. Pleasant received \$73,668.98 for a 5.69 percent decrease over last year's payments to date.

Talco received \$2,181.84 for an 85.24 percent increase over last year's payment of \$1,128.36. Total payments to date are \$29,508.95.

Blossom received \$993.16 for this

period, a 17.76 percent increase over payments to date last year. Blossom received \$1,058.32 for the same period last year.

Deport received \$533.29 for this period, a 13.98 percent increase over 1987 total payments to date over 1986. Payment of \$500.29 was received for the same period last year.

Paris received \$143,785.35 for a 1.20 percent increase over 1986 payments to date.

Bogata received \$1,619.65 for a 16.98 percent decrease over 1986 payments to date. Payment for the same period last year was \$2,757.66.

Clarksville received \$12,697.55 for a

1.09 percent decrease while Detroit received \$2,567.51 for a 13.82 percent increase over 1986 payments to date.

October checks represent taxes collected on sales made in August and reported to the Comptroller by September 20.

5. A contestant is construed to mean cooking team and can include up to two cooks and up to two helpers.

6. The American Legion will have helpers available to assist with non-cooking chores, answer questions, directions and help with selling tickets and serving cokes and refreshments.

Deport To Enforce Dog Tag Laws

The Deport City Council has decided that they must begin enforcing the resolution requiring all dogs to be vaccinated for rabies and have a current collar and tag if they are running loose.

Loose dogs discovered without a valid vaccination tag will be eliminated immediately.

The problem of these loose dogs has multiplied out of proportion, and with the current rabies outbreak in adjacent Red River County, the possibility of rabies is very likely.

Currently there have been seven cases of rabies discovered in Detroit, only 12 miles away.

In other business, it was reported that the trial of James Elrod versus the City of Deport has been postponed until December, 1987.

It was voted to support the Lamar County Appraisal District on purchasing a lot in the 500 block of Bonham Street in Paris to build a new Appraisal District office.

Rufus Merritt was nominated to represent the area on the Board of Directors for the Lamar County Appraisal District.

A motion was made and approved to adopt a resolution and contract agreement with the Collection Agency of Williamson and Van Pelt, Attorneys at Law of Tyler for the collection of delinquent taxes. The council has decided that all action will be taken to collect delinquent taxes.

It was decided to support the Neighborhood Crime Watch that the Kiwanis Club is trying to form.

Ronald Roddy Appointed To School Board

The Prairiland School Board met Tuesday night and approved bills for payment. They appointed Rufus Merritt as a member of the Lamar County Appraisal Board and appointed Ronald Roddy as school board

member for Prairiland School District to replace Harold Morrison, who has resigned.

They amended the school budget of \$20,000 for construction.

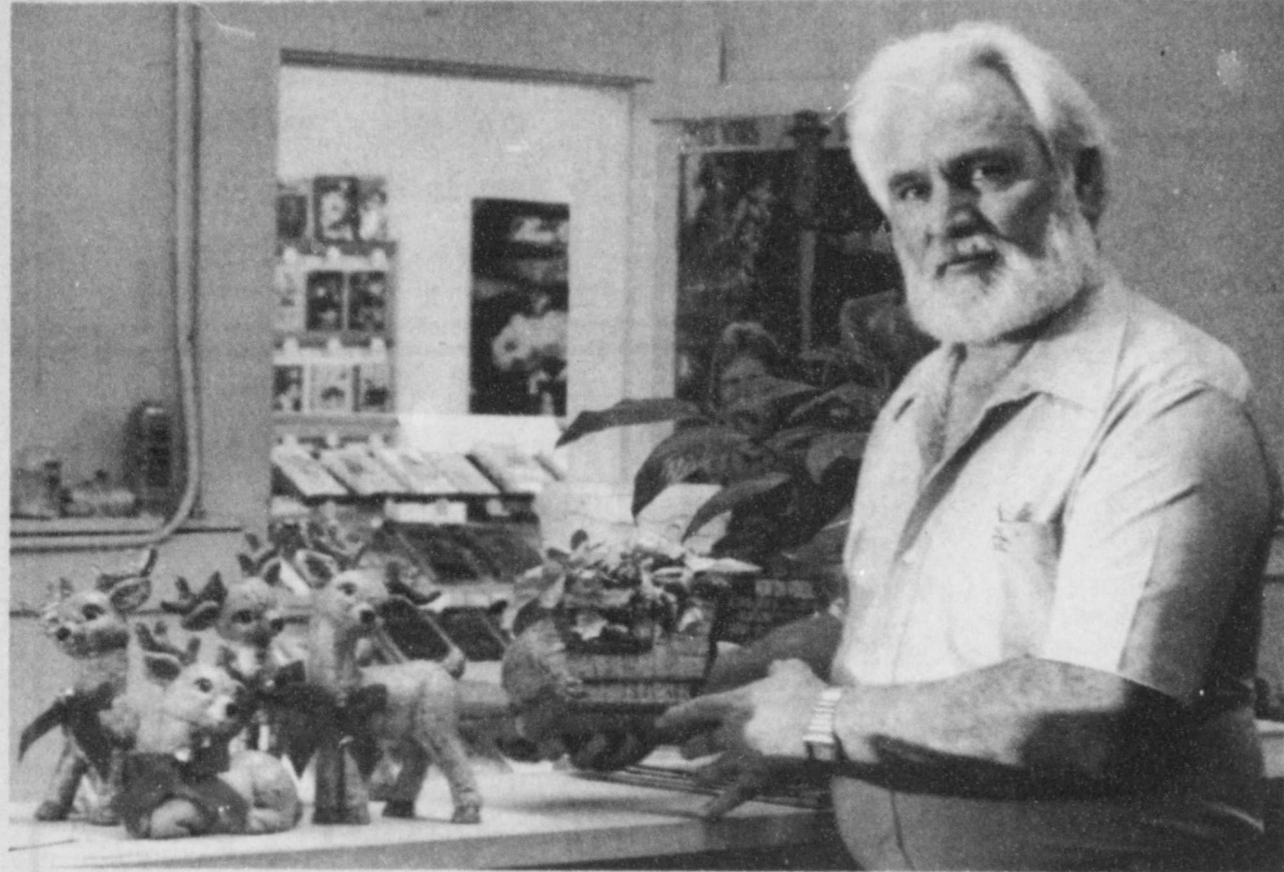
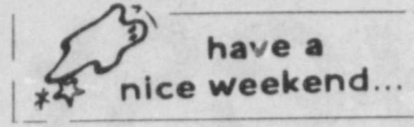

Coach Chambers encouraged his team to put the loss behind them and concentrate on teams in the weeks ahead.

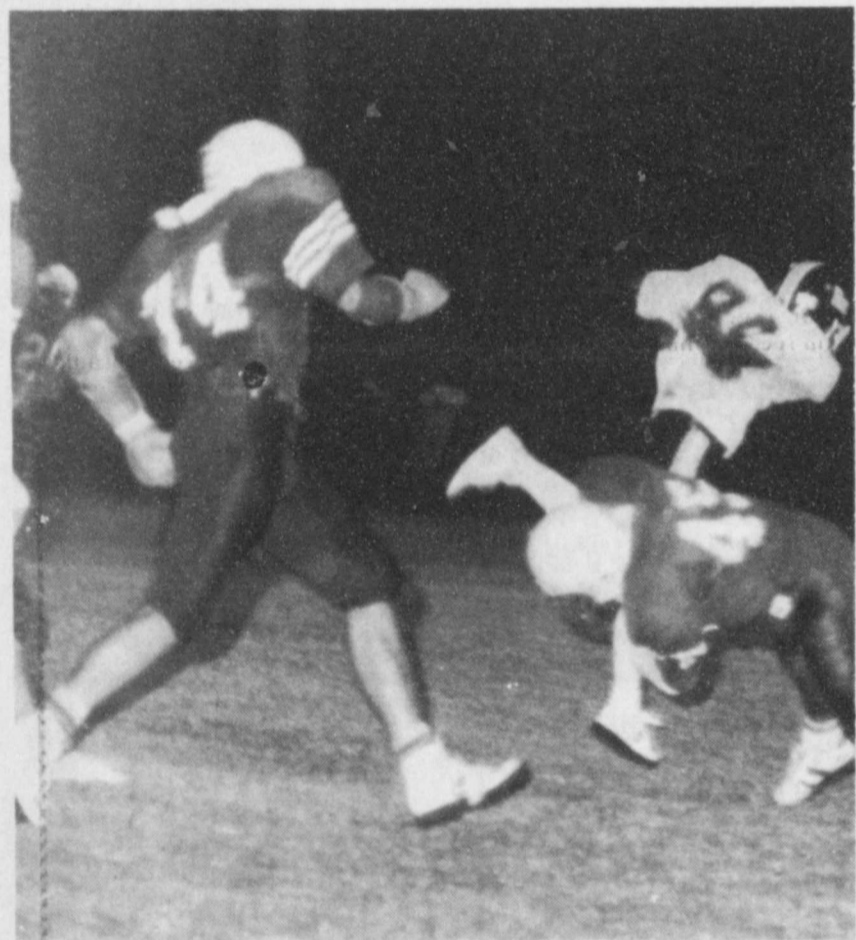
In closing, "We played hard, and I saw some things I really liked. I'm proud of them," Chambers stated.

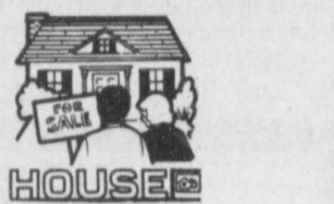

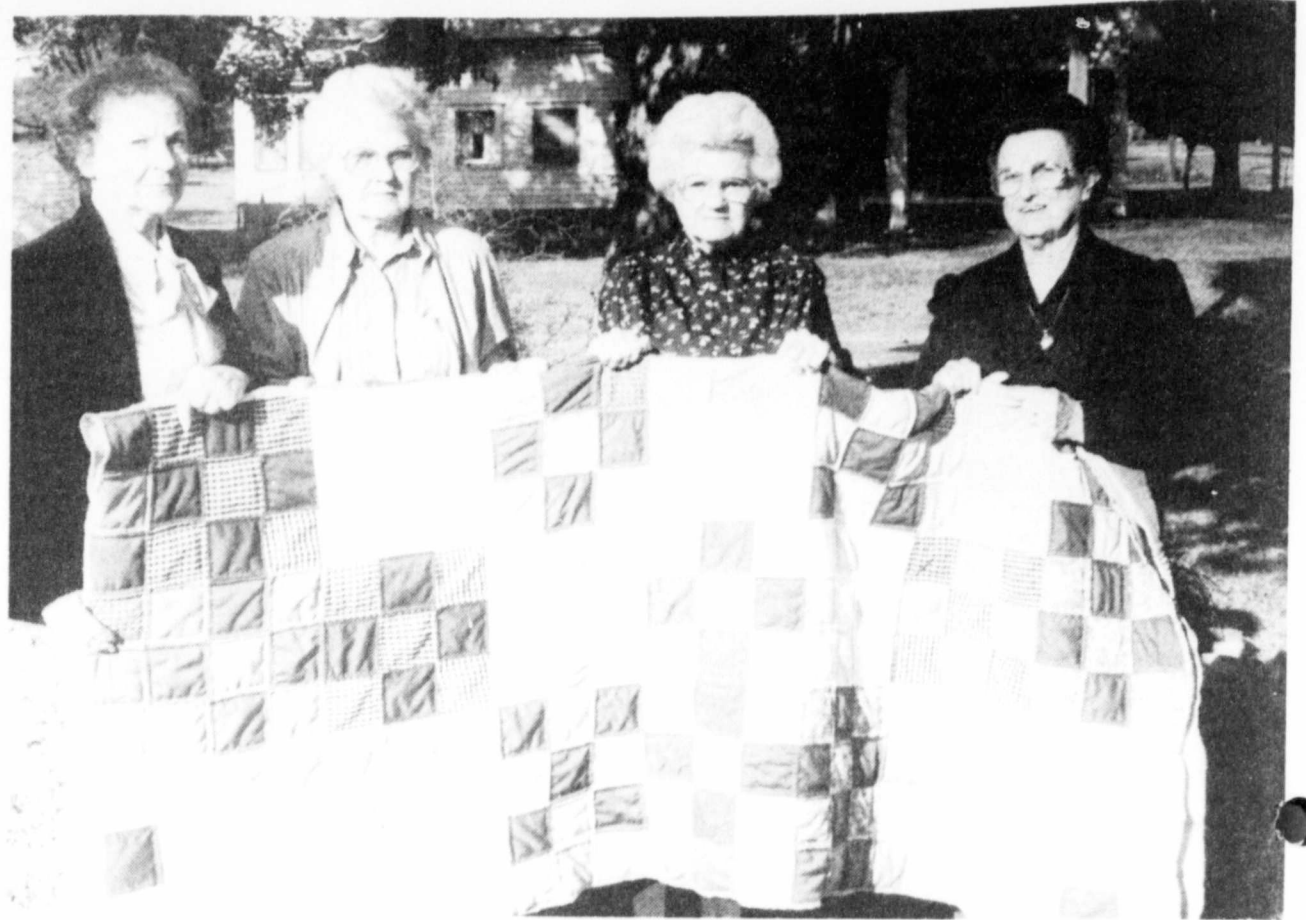
