Texas Economy Should Show Growth

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday issued a state revenue estimate that reaffirms previous reports from his office that the Texas economy will show modest growth in 1988-89.

The report, provided in accordance with a provision in this year's ap-

propriation bill, also shows that the state could have a 1989 ending balance of nearly \$200 million in the General Revenue Fund.

According to the estimate, most of the gain in the ending balance is the result of \$133 million in vetoes by the Governor.

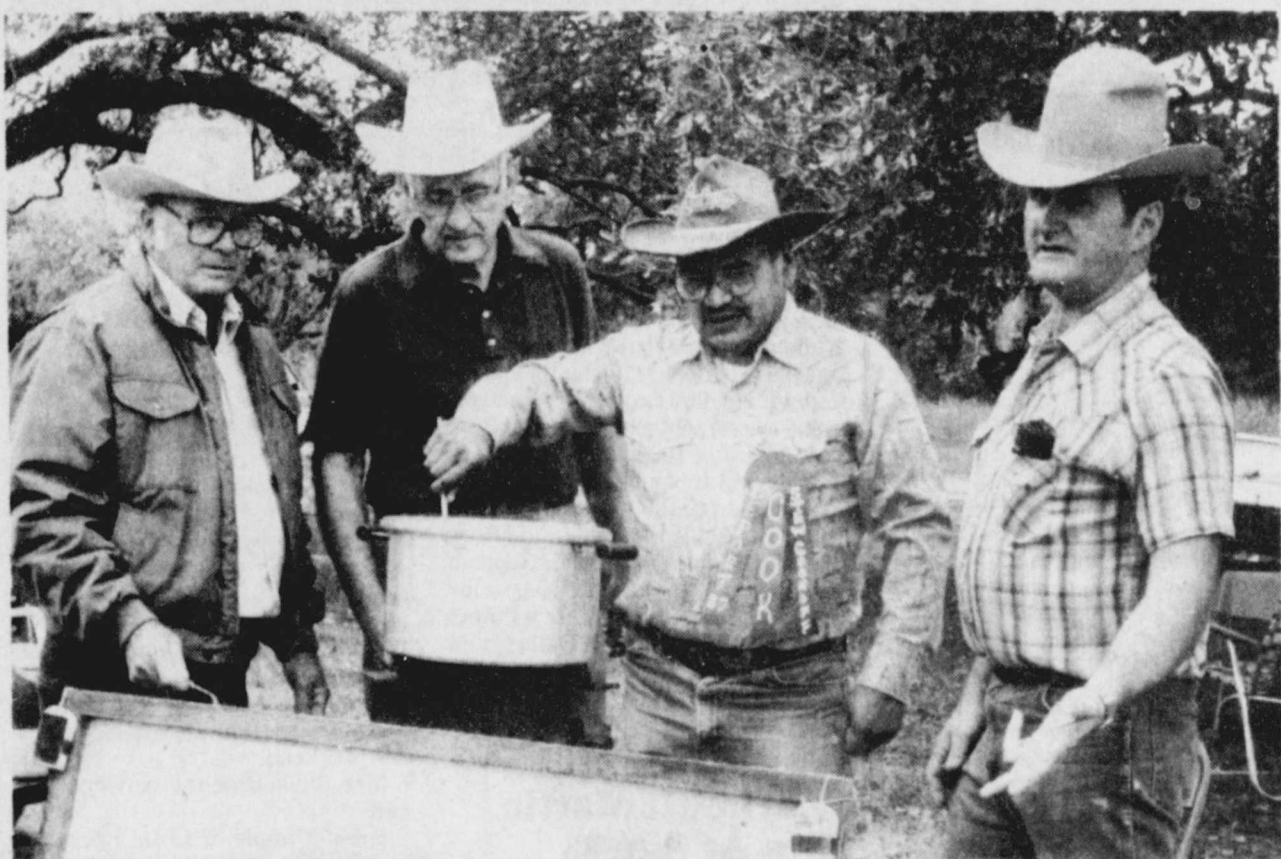
The estimate also notes that the state closed its books for the 1987 fiscal year \$745 million in the red, which is about \$267 million smaller, than anticipated last July.

The estimate pointed out that the \$267 was an "artificial improvement" in what was projected to be a billion-

dollar deficit because spending was simply postponed until the 1988 fiscal year.

Bullock's estimate showed that he now forecasts the price of a taxable barrel of oil at \$17.40 for 1988 and \$18.00 for 1989, up about \$1.00 a barrel each year.

Bullock attributed the oil price increase to continued stability in world oil markets, but cautioned that declining Texas oil production would actually result in 22% less tax income from oil.

Stew Cook-Off Success

The First Annual Deport American Legion Stew Cook Off can be deemed a huge success in several ways. It can be marked as a successful fund raiser, and a successful food event, and a successful fun day! Total of \$522 was cleared after all the expenses were paid.

The Legion, which plans to use the money they made to improve Charles Foster Park, sponsored the stew cook-off, complete with trophies, cash awards and ribbons, and also had a stew lunch, cow-chip throwing contest, tobacco spitting contest and egg toss.

There were 13 teams entered in the cook-off, most of them setting up and beginning to cook by 6 a.m. Saturday morning.

Throughout the day, the teams mixed and mingled with one another and the crowd, some, entered in the showmanship division, dressed rather "weirdly".

Spooks, Mama Gabor and the girls, Ava, Zsa Zsa and Eva, Cowboys and sportsmen dotted the assortment.

Winning first place in the showmanship division was Gifford's Food Store. They featured Spooky Stew, complete with two frightening monsters. Second place went to the stew group sponsored by City Drug Store. Sportsmen with saddles, boats, three-wheelers and all the rest marked that group. Third place went to the First National Bank of Deport and their "Pot of Gold" stew. The girls from the bank, with cook John Gifford, sported black and gold outfits.

In the stew cook-off itself, Gilbert

Arriaga and his group, sponsored by Deport Insurance Agency, won first. Second place went to the City Drug Store entry and third went to the First National Bank of Deport. The \$60, \$35 and \$15 prize monies were donated by each group back to the Legion.

Two door prizes were awarded. Throughout the day, impromptu football games, and heated games of horseshoes sprang up.

Group Trying To Get 13AAA District "Balanced More Fairly"

A group of concerned citizens made up of parents, fans and others involved in Prairiland school activities have begun an active campaign to solve the districting problem which results in Prairiland, Mt. Vernon and Paul

Pewitt having to play Daingerfield and Pittsburg.

Because of the way the school size classifications are set up, these people feel that it is nearly impossible to compete in sports, band or anything else on a realistic basis, and indeed, there is a vast difference between the sizes of the schools.

At the present time the classifications are organized as follows: 1A-134 students and below; 2A-135 to 284 students; 3A-285 to 714 students; 4A-715 to 1439; 5A-1440 and up.

Prairiland, Mt. Vernon and Paul Pewitt all fall at the bottom range of the 3A size, while Daingerfield and Pittsburg fall in the upper range.

According to Coach Bill Scudder, "It is very clear to see that the 3A classification is unfair for insuring as much equality of competition as possible."

When a band of 45 students has to compete with a band of almost 200, the results are fairly predictable. It's predictable in football, too, and in any other competition.

State Representative L.P. (Pete) Patterson has already sent a letter to Bill Farney, Director of Athletics, University Interscholastic League.

The letter reads: Dear Mr. Farney: Several citizen groups in my district have been concerned for some time about the division of schools into district categories. We feel that there is too great a range in the numbers of school enrollments contained within District 3A to allow for fair competition.

During your considerations of the upcoming realignment, we request that you give serious thought to a plan which will provide more equitable competition between 3A schools.

The citizens group now wants anyone interested to write a handwritten letter to Mr. Farney, and also to send copies of the letter to U.S. Senators, Congressmen and State Representatives to help a decision be made on the problem.

They urge people to use their own words, but provide the following as a guideline: I, (blank), a parent/interested party, of a student of the Prairiland School District, wish to voice my concern about the problems resulting from the extreme difference in enrollment of the schools in District 3AAA. I am particularly concerned with the disadvantages our students face with such schools as Daingerfield and Pittsburg in sports events. These two schools are rated as two of the highest in the state in football, and this results in us, a very small AAA school competing with schools where the outcome is totally evident before any competition ever begins. This results in problems for the individual players in the area of moral and school spirit, as well as being a problem due to competing with teams who have players selected from a much greater enrollment and thus having players of greater size and ability.

Please voice our concern as District 3AAA groupings are discussed.

Booster Clubs and parents at Mt. Vernon and Paul Pewitt are being contacted and they are expected, the group feels, to begin sending letters of their own.

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Patriots Suffer Through Evening, Lose 55-6

The Prairiland Patriots suffered a 55-6 defeat for the second time in as many weeks Friday night, as the Daingerfield Tigers followed in the wake of Pittsburg's raid on October 9.

The Patriot nightmare started half-way through the first quarter. The Patriots managed to hold the Tigers offense on their first possession of the night, and took the ball back on downs when the Tigers were forced with a fourth and 12-yards to go.

However, after the Patriot offense stalled on their first possession, the Tigers came alive on a 55-yard run for their first TD! Joseph Wheelchel blocked the point after and held the Tigers to six points.

Again, the Tiger defense forced the

There were only three minutes and twenty-one seconds left in the first quarter, but the Tigers managed another TD. With nineteen seconds to spare. Again the point after was good and the Patriots trailed by 20 points.

Late in the second quarter, the Patriots showed signs of coming back with a plan. Unable to pick up a first down from the Patriot 45-yard line, Martin Babb faked a punt and raced for the first down. Unfortunately the Patriots were called for a clip and wiped out the first down. Babb booted an excellent punt the next attempt

and the Tigers were forced to start from their own 6-yard line.

The Patriots defense forced the Tigers to fumble and Randy Barber recovered for the Pats. With 40 seconds left in the half, quarterback Martin Babb found Ron Griffin for a Patriot first and ten on the Daingerfield 14-yard line. Unable to invade the Tiger endzone before the clock expired, Jack Kindle marched on the field faced with a fourth down and 10 yards to go, drilled the uprights and put the Patriots on the board with three points.

The Patriots put three unanswered TD's on the board in the third quarter, and finished out their 55 point total in the fourth quarter.

The Patriots, however, don't ever quit competing, even down by 52 points, with 25 seconds left to play. Jack Kindle picked up his second field goal of the night and gave the Patriots a total of six points.

With 22 seconds left, the Patriots attempted an on-sides kick, but it was unsuccessful.

After the game, Coach Chambers summed up the last two games by saying "We finally got that mess behind us." A sentiment echoed by parents and fans alike.

Chambers said he wouldn't make excuses, "We just didn't play well, but we will be back Monday ready to work in preparation for next Friday night."

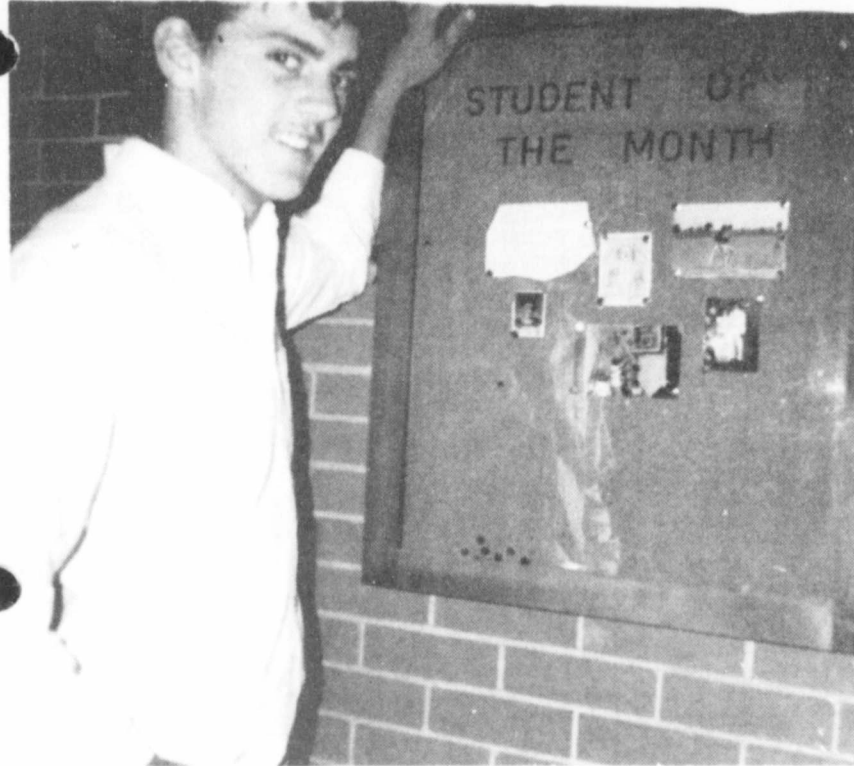
The Patriots travel to Paul Hewitt Friday night for a 7:30 kickoff.

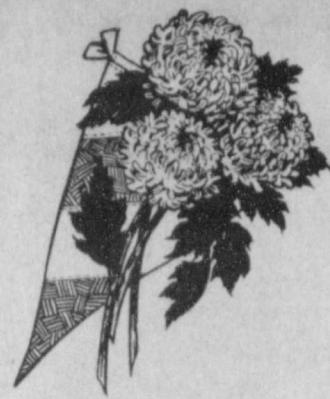

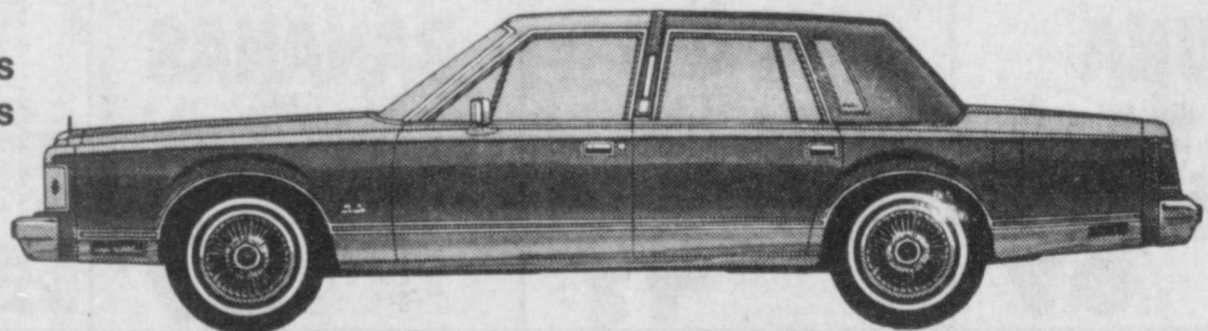

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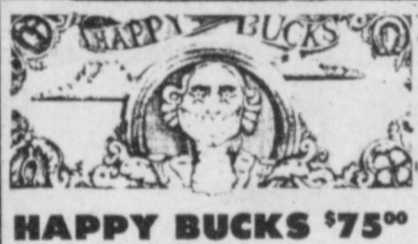

WHEREAS, the newly created State Board of Education was appointed as a "transition" board to implement the evaluation reforms included in House Bill 72, and

WHEREAS, this significant legislation also provided for the return to an elected 15-member State Board of Education on January 1, 1989, and

WHEREAS, in September 1987, Texas public schools entered their third school year following enactment of the House Bill 72 reform legislation and rules and regulations responsive to all phases of this historic legislation have now been adopted by the "transition" board, and

WHEREAS, in July, 1987, the Texas Legislature enacted legislation that placed the following referendum proposition on the November 3 election ballot:

"The State Board of Education shall be composed of members who are appointed from districts instead of elected, with equal representation from throughout the State of Texas," and

WHEREAS, elected officials are directly accountable to the citizens who elect them to the office they hold, and

WHEREAS, appointed State Board of Education members could be held accountable only by those responsible for their appointment, thus leading to greater centralized control of public education.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Independent School District to vote against Referendum Proposition No. 1, relating to the State Board of Education, on the November 3 ballot.

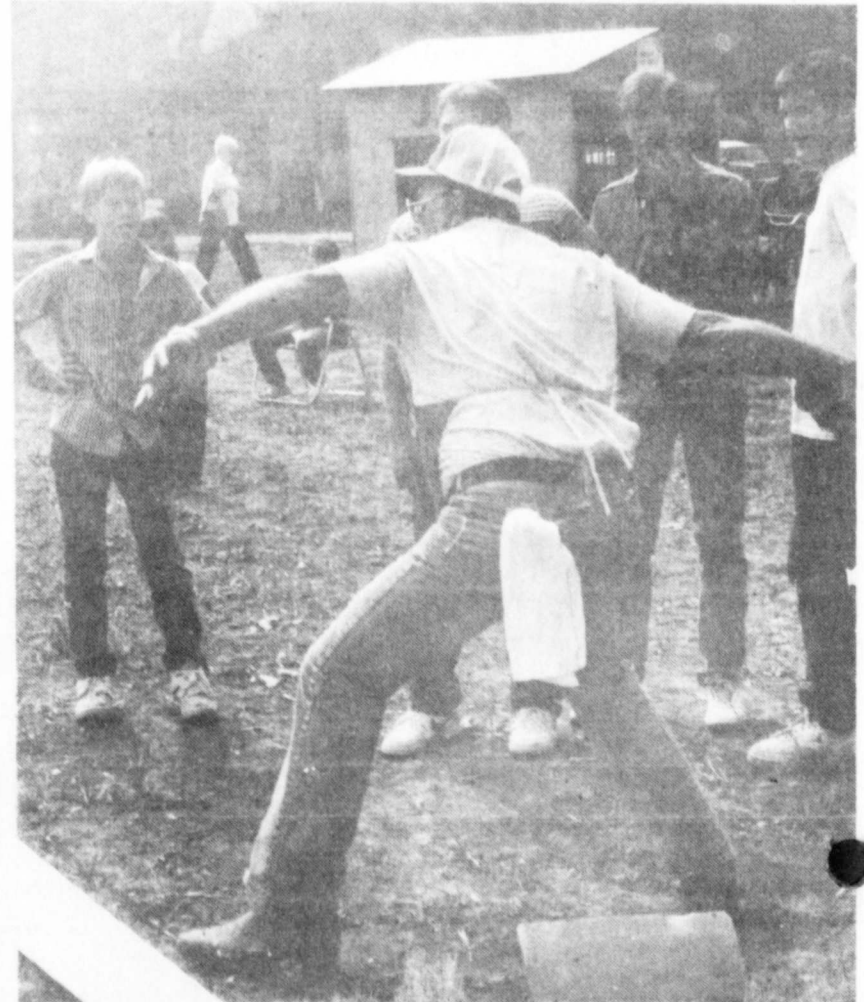
