Some Tips To Make Halloween Safe

Halloween evokes images of goblins, witches and other cleverly-disguised children who go trick-or-treating each year. But it also can bring images of danger if parents, motorists and homeowners do not take certain safety precautions, according to the Texas Medical Association.

Costumes, especially dark-colored

ones, are difficult for motorists to see at night. Parents should include reflective tape or reflective liquid paint available in hardware stores on costumes and bags to improve a child's visibility.

Make certain the costume is not so long that a child can trip on it, or so loose that it may catch on bushes and other obstacles.

Cloth masks and entire head masks can block a child's vision or breathing. Instead, consider painting a mask on the child's face with cosmetics or grease paint.

Parents should review safety rules with their children, including walking on sidewalks or staying on the side of the road, and not eating any candy or

fruit they receive until it has been checked at home.

Motorists must be especially attentive on Halloween. Slow down and drive with extra caution through residential areas.

Homeowners can help out by having outside lights on as a sign of

welcome and so trick-or-treaters do not trip over stairs or other obstacles.

The Texas Medical Association suggests follow these easy guidelines and help make Halloween safe and fun.

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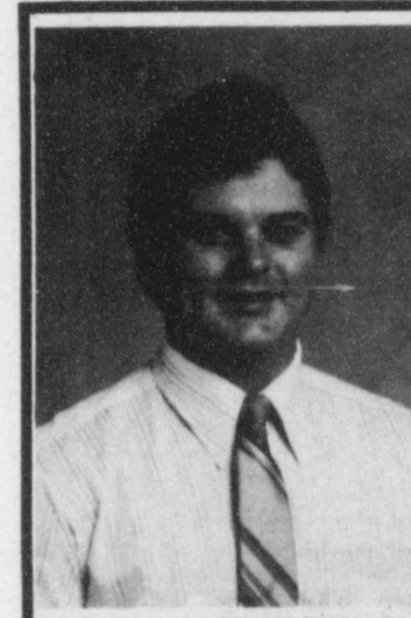

Eleventh Grade Students To Take TEAMS

During the 1985-86 school year, the Texas Education Agency (TEA) instituted the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) assessment program. This program, mandated by the House Bill 72, passed by the Second Called Session of the 68th Texas Legislature in July, 1984, measures minimum basic skills in the areas of mathematics, reading and writing in grades 1,3,5,7,9 and in mathematics and English language arts in Grades 11/12. The test is given

to eleventh and twelfth graders is an exit level examination and both the mathematics and English language arts sections of the test must be passed by students prior to their receiving a high school diploma.

The TEAMS exit level is administered at least twice each school year. For the October 1987 test administration, eleventh graders will be tested for the first time and students who previously have not demonstrated mastery on both sec-

tions of the test will have the opportunity to retake the assessment instrument.

The students at Prairiland will be taking test on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings, the 27th and 28th of October. Parents are encouraged to help their children by seeing that they get to bed early and a good breakfast before the test.

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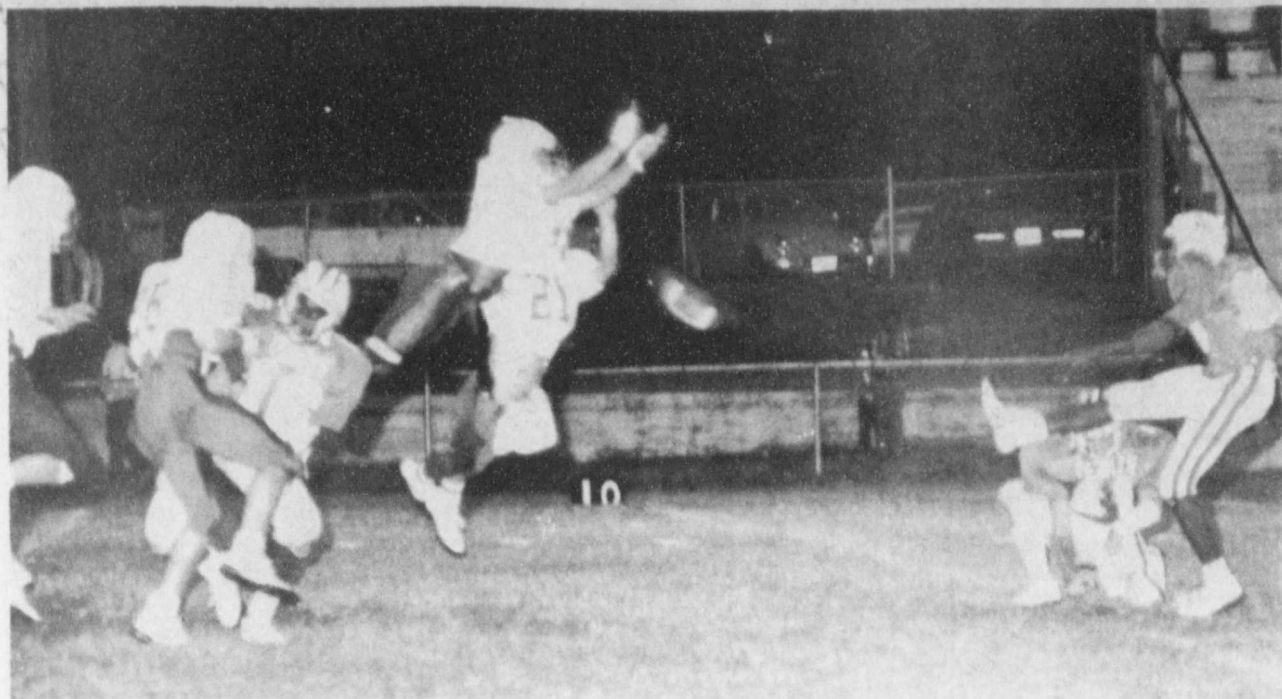

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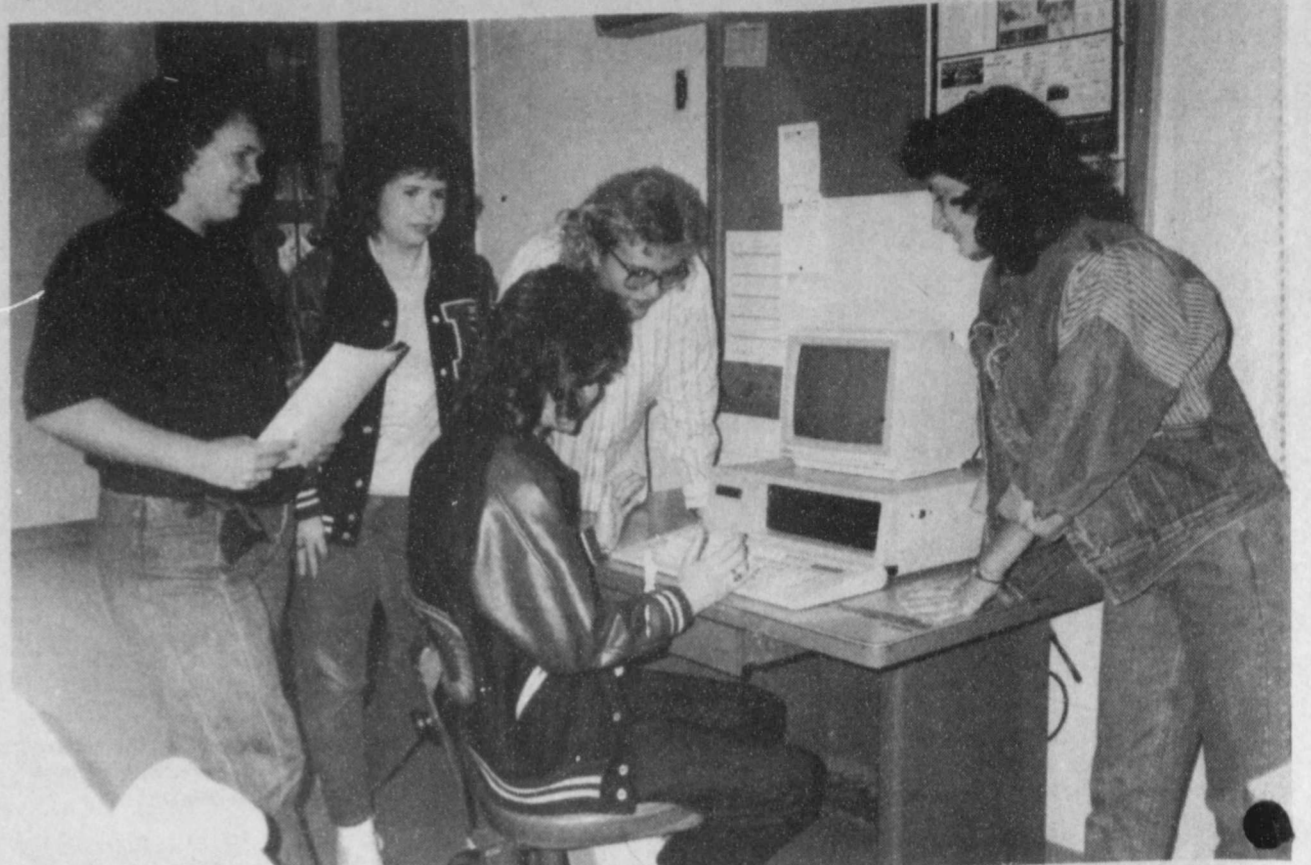

"LETTER TO EDITOR"

The voters of Texas need to return the State Board of Education to one that is elected by the people. The State appointed board was set up as a temporary measure to help implement the educational reforms under House Bill 72. The people of Texas were promised in 1984 that the appointed board would be in place for four years as a transitional body and would then revert back to an elected board. Under pressure from Mr. Perot and others, lawmakers this year decided to let Texans decide which system they prefer.

While the appointed board has been doing an adequate job of meeting their responsibility to oversee the initial implementation of House Bill 72,

I feel that a democratically elected board that is directly accountable to the voters rather than to a small group of legislators is better public policy.

At the present time a Legislative Education Board is made up of the Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, four senators and four Representatives. Each of them nominate three persons for each board position. The Governor then appoints the members from this nominated group. Mr. Perot is very involved behind the scenes in the selection process.

During the last three years the Texas Education Agency has changed from an educational organization to

a political bureaucracy. The Commissioner of Education is subject to political pressure from the Legislative Education Board and Mr. Perot.

Most of House Bill 72 has benefited the Texas public education.

Most of House Bill 72 has benefited the Texas public education. However, some fine-tuning needs to be done to make the improvements function better for all students in public schools. It will be difficult to accomplish this as long as Mr. Perot has so much influence on the Legislative Education Board and they greatly influence the State Board of Education.

Representative Bill Haley of Center, Texas, a sponsor of House Bill 72, recently said that the appointed board has done its job, but it is time to go back to an elected board. "You do not cure the ills of democracy by removing from the people their democratic rights, one of which is the right of election."

I urge that each person protect his or her right to vote and select the State Board of Education by voting NO for an appointed State Board of Education on November 3.

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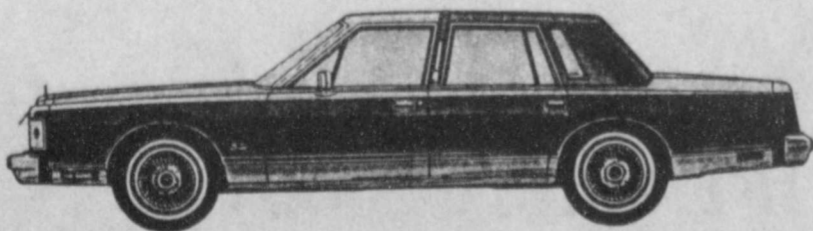

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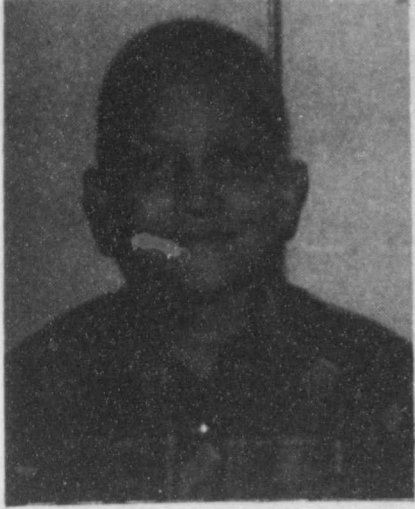
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Benefit Set For Shrimp Bailon

1 envelope unflavored gelatin
1 carton (8 oz.) strawberry yogurt
1 pkg. (10 oz.) frozen strawberries, thawed
1 tsp. freshly grated lemon peel
Crisp lettuce leaves
