Palette Of Color Marks Autumn Season

October provided some rare opportunities this year for fall foliage appreciation, as dry weather early in the month set up a perfect colorcreating situation.

Heavy rains and high winds have generally ended the palette of colors that motorists and hikers have been enjoying up until this week, however,

area residents took advantage of Oklahoma, Arkansas or south Texas

Before it came to an end, numerous mild, sunny days to travel up into

to view roadsides ablaze with color What plants and trees create this show? They are many and varied. Maples provide one of the finest

sources of color, ranging from dark red to a gorgeous yellow-red or even pure golden. Hickory provides splashes of

brilliant yellow with their large oblong leaves and shumack, the glowing wine-red bushes on the fence rows, counterpoint the taller trees.

Virginia Creeper frequently shawis the trunks of trees in an autumn afghan of delicate color, and sassafras on sandy land is astonishingly bright.

One of the real surprises of the fall season is poison ivy. It's all too familiar three leaf cluster changes from a dark green into a glorious bright red or orange..but beware, the same rash-creating properties of summer still remain!

Sweetgum, the hackberry turn yellow and send leaves scuttling

through the breezes.

Another surprise is the oftenignored bois 'd arc tree. All along roadsides, fence rows and creeks, the bois 'd arc casts a canopy of brilliant yellow, interspersed with the round globes of yellow-green fruit that squirrels delight in.

To add a muting, subtle tone to the whole natural pallette are various other trees which turn, but not to the fiery colors one associates with fall.

Pecans and some oak trees provide a softening influence on the woods and roadsides. Darker and more dramatic than ever are the cedars and pines to that furnish even more contrast.

The whole choreography of color is a delight to the eye and to the soul. Fragile, the rains and winds of winter have swept it away, except from the hearts of those who have taken advantage of one of the loveliest autumn seasons in years, and carry it inscribed in their memories

Deport Neighborhood Crime Watch Formed

Nearly 60 people attended the formative meeting of the Deport Neighborhood Crime Watch last Thursday night.

Lamar County Deputy Cary Lawler was on hand to present the program. Among the major points brought up at the meeting about ways to prevent crime wee: engraving household items, including electronics and tools with a driver's license number; secondary locks on windows, dead bolt door locks; and neighbors watching for unusual or suspicious

According to Lawler, 92% of criminals say that they are deterred by a Neighborhood Crime Watch program.

What the county law enforcement officers need, Lawler said, is advance notice of a crime in progress. Neighbors who notice something going on can phone the deputies and they have a much better chance of stopping or solving a crime than if the crime is discovered hours later.

People, he continued, should learn to identify vehicles by size, color, whether pickup, van or car, and major features like that.

The sheriff's department will provide the electric engravers needed to use on marking items. Numbers should be close together

so that thieves cannot add an additional number at the end or in the middle. For example, an item should be marked as TXDL000000* with no

symbol at the end. All serial numbers should be recorded so that they can be provided to law enforcement in case of theft.

A question and answer session resulted in many questions being posed by residents, varying from how to mark antiques, trespassing laws and

four-wheeler problems. Residents, the deputy stressed, should be willing to file a complaint when they want something done, as many problems cannot be touched by the Sheriff's Department without a complaint being filed.


Lawler stressed that a Neighborhood Crime Watch program was a way for people to help themselves, and was proven to cut down on crime.

Crime Watch signs cost \$1.30 each, and are 12 inches by 12 inches. People wishing to order these signs can contact James C. Short, Carlos Ladd

or Thomas Nichols to order the signsl. The Deport Kiwanis Club will be dividing the city into sections and there will be neighborhood captains with maps that will identify houses in

order to facilitate the crime watch. Country people can also take advantage of the program, posting crime watch signs and having passers-by watch their property for







We received this letter from Bill Farney, State Athletic Director, in reply to the letter we sent asking for help in more fairly dividing District 13-AAA competition. Needless to say, we were extremely unhappy with the tone and unhelpfulness of the letter.

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Babb:

Over the past eleven years, three separate committees involving citizens, superintendents, legislators and officials from the UIL have studied the problems of reclassification/realignment. One of the difficulties expressed in every meeting was the problem of smaller schools within a conference playing schools in the upper range of enrollment in that conference. There have been a number of recommendations to try to offset this problem. Every suggestion for remediation ended with a final conclusion that travel would be increased so extensively by changing the procedure we now use that the end result would be counterproductive to the original intention.

I know it does not solve the problem. We at the League office understand that it is difficult for youngsters to participate against schools with larger numbers. Even though having a smaller number of students is a disadvantage, a number of schools with smaller enrollments do compete well. Factors which cannot be isolated are those of community support, attitude of the students, traditions of the school, and ability level of participants in the contest. Invariably when a community gets "down", the students at that school perceive low expectations for themselves. Oftne the result is a performance less than it should be. I am not saying this is true in your school, but it has been proven true in other places. A positive outlook is difficult to maintain if the scoreboard is always lopsided. But parents and boosters can influence youngsters with a negative attitude to the extent that it produces negative

We can assure you that everything will be done to make the realignment fair and impartial within the guidelines and policies that we must follow. If you would like to make specific recommendationsn or even a personal presentation to the Policy Committee in June, 1988, please let us know. The League is a democratic organization that receives input from any individual or organization.

In closing, I do not agree with all of your logic, particularly in the area in academic competition. Many smaller schools participate well and even dominate against larger schools in the academic area. But, obviously, you do have a problem or you would not have written. We hope for your child and other children that the University Interscholastic League will provide an avenue for educational competition to benefit the students involved. Respectfully,

Winter Forage Information

By Herb Brevard

In determining when to begin grazing winter pasture, Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist, says that the height of the forage is not as important as a good root system. If the root system has not developed sufficiently, the cattle will pull up the forage instead of biting it off.

If fertilizer was applied at planting, most of it is still available because of the lack of rain in many areas. Due to the shortage of rain, the plants have not been able to utilize the fertilizer and it should not have leached. Consequently, if adequate fertilizer was put out at planting, no additional

fertilizer should be needed now. If less than 50 pounds of nitrogen was put down at planting, additinal fertilizer, at least 50 pounds of nitrogen, will be needed when the plants begin growing.

Before fertilizing, regardless of when you planted, the producer should adjust the fertilizer rate to the stand of forage, Reeves says. If thick stands are present, fertilize heavier. If the stand is scattered, use less

If the winter pasure was planted in a sod and the winter pasture is taller than the sod, fertilizer can be applied. If the sod is still taller than the winter pasture, delay fertilizing.





The recent rains received in the county were generally received, but enough is enough. What was good for one producer is not necessarily what was needed for another. The rains were very much needed to bring up the wheat, but soaked ground could lead to a disaster for the peanut producer with peanuts remaining in the soil. Only time will tell.

Some truck farmers have sweet potatoes to dig and the water logged soil will not be good for them. Also, some fallen pecans could have been lost in the rain swollen creeks Sunday night.

Officials with the Red River Valley Limousin Association were pleased with the results of the special Limousin feeder calf sale held Saturday at the Cattlemen's Livestock Commission on Friday. Troy Ashby, sale chairman, reports that between 500 and 600 head were consigned which is about the number they hoped

as a result of the Wall Street happenings. Consequently, one cannot compare this week's market with the previous week. It took a really fancy 400 pound steer to bring \$1.00 per pound. Few calves at the sale Saturday reached that level, however, a number of Limousin calves sold in the \$1.02 and \$1.09 range.

The question on every beef producers mind is how did the Limousin cattle sell? The 400 weight Limousin steers averaged 419 pounds and sold for an average of \$.94 a pound or \$394 a calf. The same number sale run steer calves selected randomly from the sale sheets averaged 429 pounds and \$.86 per pound for an average of

Quality cattle bring top money irrespective of breed. Beef productioned to make a few sales to see type cattle in demand.

Changes are definitely taking place in the markets and one had better strive to produce the type cattle in demand or be prepared to absorb greater losses.

The Brahman breed has made a valuable contribution to the industry. Some Brahman blood is great, but it appears that too much results in a big penalty.




