Sales Tax Figures Wide, Varied Locally

State Comptroller Bob Bullock on Friday sent checks totaling \$105.9 million in local sales tax to 1,039 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. According to Bullock, this year's payments are down by nearly five percent overall compared to payments made by November of last

year.

The City of Houston received the largest payment, \$16.8 million, bringing total payments in 1987 to \$125.5 million, down 5.5 percent from last year's totals to date.

Blossom received \$1,824.74 for a 17.32 percent increase over the same

period for the previous year.

Deport received \$1,957.32 for a 16.16 percent increase over last year's payment of \$1,533.17 for the same period.

Paris received \$240,958.17, for a 0.22 percent increase over last year.

Bogata received \$3,339.62 for a 14.82 percent decrease over total payments

to date, compared to last year.

Clarksville received \$23,267.60 for a 97 percent decrease while Detroit received \$1,141.42 for a 13.02 percent increase over last year.

Mt. Pleasant received \$110,414.13 for a 6.27 percent decrease while Talco received \$2,472.38 for a 78.34 percent increase over last year's

totals to date.

November checks represent taxes collected on sales made in September and reported to the Comptroller by October 20. This month's checks also include third quarter allocations, which reflect sales reported to the Comptroller on a quarterly basis.

Mailbox Vandalism, Everyone Loses

Through rain, sleet, snow or dead of night, the U.S. Mail gets delivered to postal customers across the nation. The elements of nature don't stop letter carriers from getting the mail into a customer's mailbox, but sometimes mailbox vandalism does.

Mailbox vandalism comes in a variety of shapes and sizes from the placement of objects inside the mailbox to the actual theft or destruction of the mail receptacle.

postal customer time and money to repair or replace, mailbox vandalism sometimes causes the loss or destruction of valuable and important mail.

U.S. Mail receptacles and the mail inside are protected by Federal law from theft, damage and destruction. The violations are felonies which carry penalties of between three to five years imprisonment and/or fines between \$1,000 and \$2,000.

Through the years it has been discovered that the vast majority of incidents of mailbox vandalism are the result of juveniles playing pranks. Juveniles, those under the age of 18, cannot be prosecuted in Federal court, so frequently, even though vandalism is a Federal offense, the local sheriff or police are called upon to investigate. They can respond quickly and usually have a good idea which individuals are most likely to be involved. In addition, juveniles can be prosecuted for vandalism of mailboxes under the State law con-

templated as a harmless prank is actually against the law and that everyone involved loses; the prankster who can end up in jail; the customer who has to pay for the repair or replacement of the damaged mailbox and mail; and the community who pays the local sheriff or police to investigate the incident.

It's your mail, protect it. Any act of vandalism or information concerning vandalism of mailboxes should be immediately reported to the local sheriff or police and to your local postmaster.

The best way to prevent the destruction and vandalism of mailboxes is through education. Parents with young children should take a few moments to explain the importance of an individual's mail to them. They should also let their older children know that what may be in-

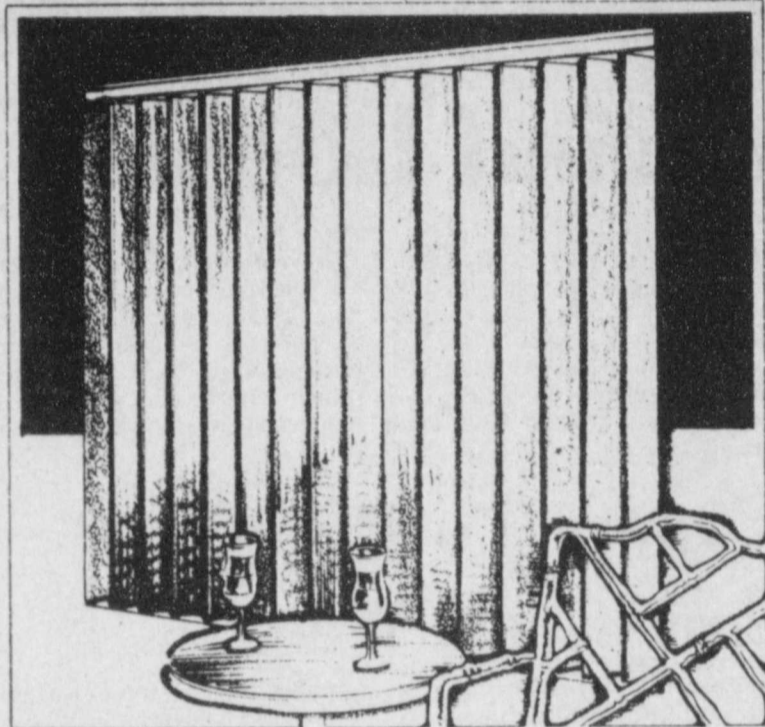

Hunters Should Consider Insect Problems

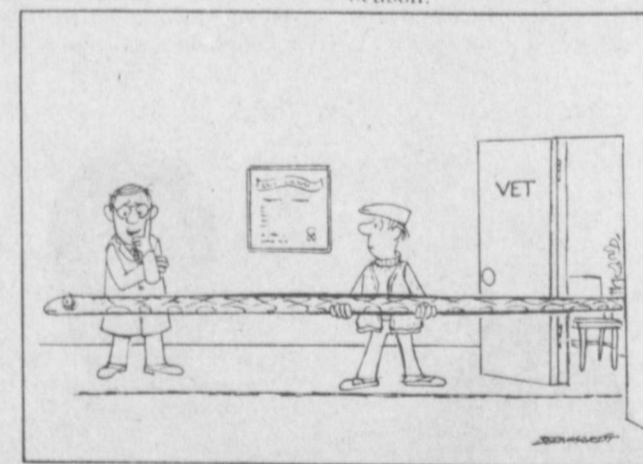

With hunting season getting into full swing, many people will be exposing themselves to the elements and potentially dangerous insect bites.

Wasps, spiders, ticks and mosquitoes may infest camp houses or campsites. When setting up camp, be prepared with the proper insecticides to eliminate the pests. Hornet and wasp spray can be obtained in pressurized cans with accuracy up to 30 or 40 feet. Most mosquito repellents work fairly well and should be used according to directions.

Several cases of Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever have been reported in Texas this year. This often fatal disease is carried by ticks, therefore extra precautions should be taken to avoid tick bites. Thorough inspection of the body should be done after each hunt. Tick repellents may be successful in most instances.

Inspect game carcasses for tick infestations and be careful in handling the carcass if ticks are found. Just a few extra precautions can prevent problems from ticks and other insects which might otherwise spoil a hunting season.

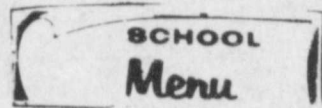

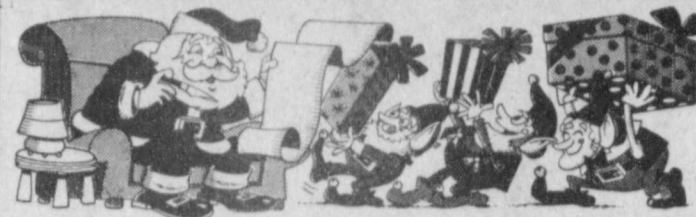

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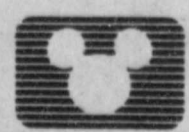

Chapman Votes For Reduction

The House narrowly passed a deficit-reduction package last night that will trim more than \$109 billion from the budget deficit over the next three years, according to U.S. Rep. Jim Chapman.

Chapman, D-Texas, said that this bill addresses the top priority on the minds of East Texas, reducing the federal deficit. "Although I have many misgivings about some provisions of the bill, the bigger concern is clearly the on-range problem of the deficit."

"I could not see the process to reduce the deficit stopped," he said. "It is important that people understand that this bill has \$109 billion in real deficit reduction without affecting income tax rates. Taxpayers in East Texas and middle-income Americans would not be affected significantly by this bill."

The congressman had initially cast a "no" vote on the bill, then returned to the floor and changed his vote to "yea" after concluding that he did not want to be the one who derailed deficit reduction. The final vote was 206-205.

"I came back to the floor because I could not see this process stopped," I said Chapman. "For the future of deficit reduction, for the stability of our economy, I put the interests of East Texas and the country ahead of my specific misgivings about this bill."

The bill, which the Texas congressional delegation supported by a 15-12 margin, increases revenues by including an extension of the three percent telephone excise tax, repealing cuts in the top estate and gift tax rate, ending the interest deduction for home mortgages over \$1 million and repealing an accounting tax break used by defense contractors.

The package projects a savings of \$29 million from the required labeling of frozen pizzas that use artificial cheese. "This will be a big boost to dairy farmers," said Chapman. "The bill also maintains cost accounting for farmers, which is critical to East Texas agricultural producers."

Nearly \$1 billion in revenue comes from new user-fees and collections, including a fee charged to commercial vessels escorted by U.S. naval forces in the Persian Gulf.

"To support this bill was a difficult decision but I could not allow the deficit reduction process to stop. This is too important to our national economy and in the end to my constituents in East Texas," he concluded.

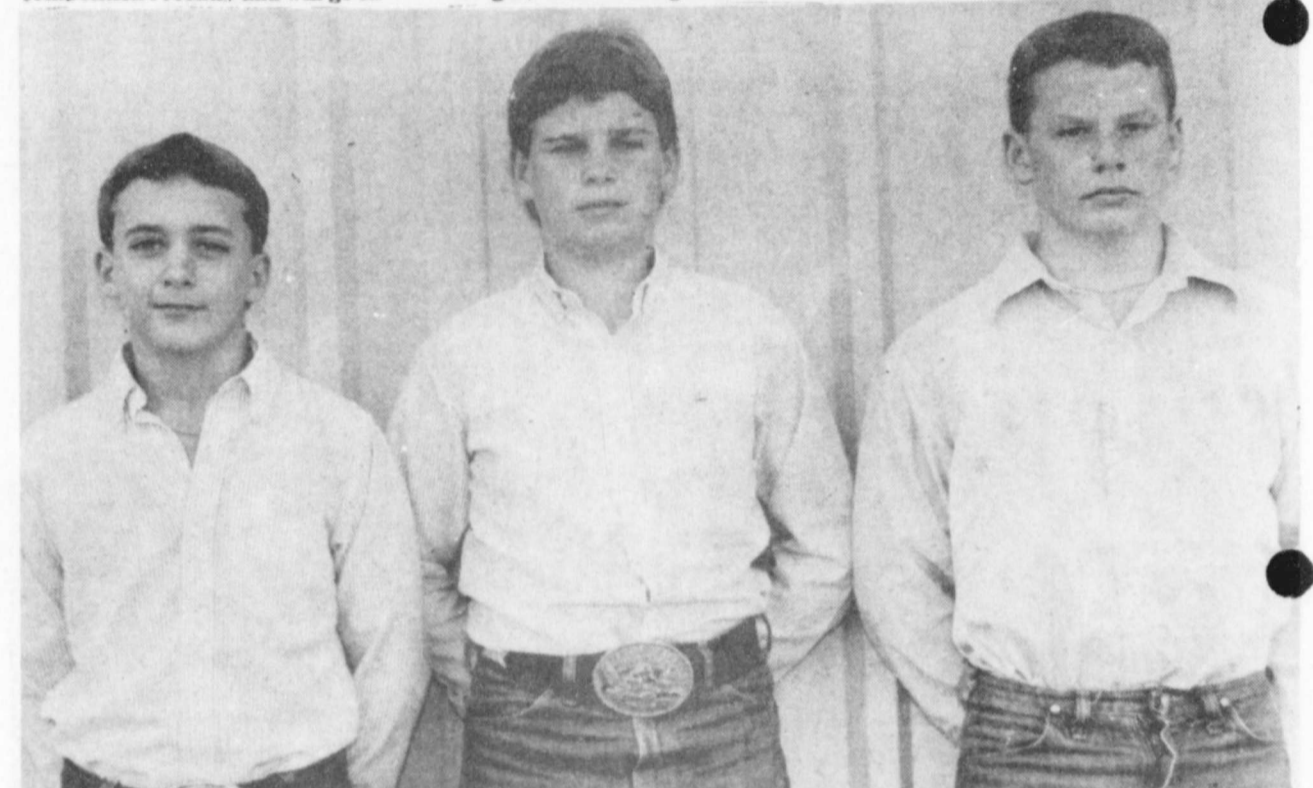

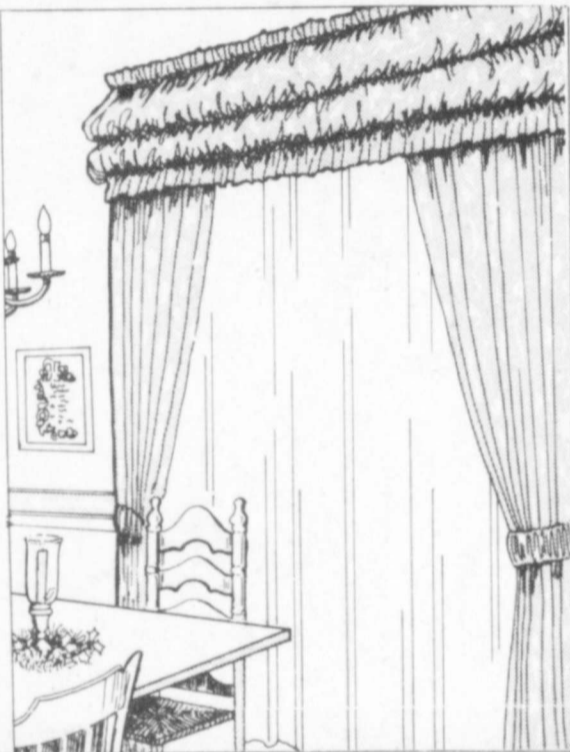

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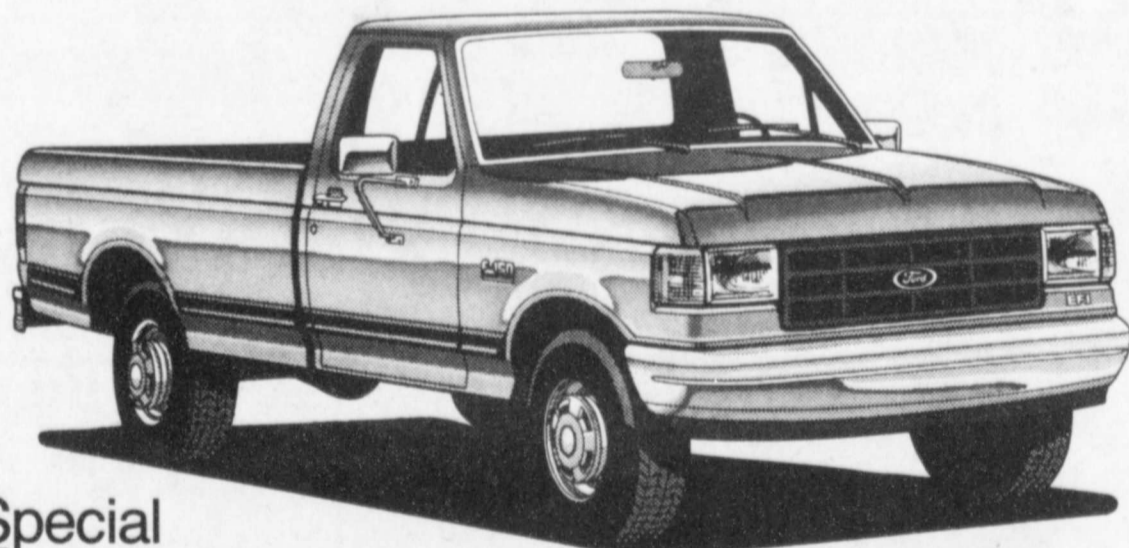
