So, I informed D.J. that he was a wonderful cat, and I appreciated the mouse very much, but he could KILL IT NOW!

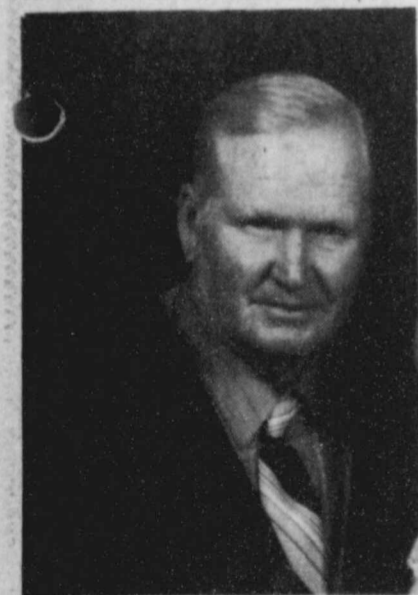

Memories Of Pearl Harbor Still Vivid

Pearl Harbor Day was this past Monday. Like millions of Americans, I wasn't even born then...and the day is something in history books and war movies, and in the stories I've heard my parents tell.

But for millions of Americans, the events of December 7, 1941 are real...for it was a day that affected their lives forever.

While newspapers and radio give fleeting mention to the day Pearl Harbor was bombed, the people old enough to recall those terrible times

go back in years to the past...remembering exactly what they were doing when news of the attack came through.

All day Monday I showed people coming into my office a fascimile of the Honolulu Star-Bulletin's special editions through the first few days after the attack...and without fail that paper gets them to remembering.

Several ex-servicemen recalled that they had been expecting to be out of the service within weeks...only to be back in for years!

One man, John D. Ball of Paris, remembered that he had friends who had actually been sent home when the attack hurled the United States into the desperate fight against Japan. Those friends were back in the service within days.

Juanita Davis of Deport remembers that she was four years old at the time of the attack...but can still remember exactly what she was doing.

Another woman recalls that she was listening to the radio when the

news was broadcast, and at first was puzzled as to what Pearl Harbor's destruction might mean...but it became all too clear within minutes.

The people who see the headlines in the reproduction of the Honolulu Star-Buletin become pensive as they look at the four-inch print screaming "WAR!" "Martial Law Declared...Death Mounting...Over 400 Killed Here", "Japanese Raids On Guam, Panama Are Reported".

Their eyes look back in time to an era now behind...but an era that

ushered in the nuclear age.

For them, Pearl Harbor day is more than a paragraph in a history lesson...it is still real, and the prickles they feel at the back of their neck remind them just how uncertain and frightening those times must have been.

Not a single person I spoke to Monday failed to recall what they were doing that fateful day...but one would not expect to forget a day that altered history forever. I thank them for sharing their experiences with me...because it made Pearl Harbor Day much more of a reality for me, too.

Leon Whitsell Running For Constable

Leon Whitsell, a farmer and rancher from Deport, said Thursday that he will file for the Precinct 1 constable's post.

Two others have already filed in the Democratic Party Chairman's office for the same office.

A 20-year resident of Deport, Whitsell said he wants to be elected so he can do his part in helping alleviate some of the area's problems.

"My biggest concern is with the youth and with the old. And I'm concerned about the drug problem...I believe in law enforcement and if I am elected, I will be available to the public," said Whitsell.

He was born in Farmersville. Whitsell has driven a school bus for

most of the last ten years and says "I feel like I have the respect of most of the kids who ride it."

"I don't feel like a person has to be a hot-head to do this job, my main objective is to win the confidence of the people of this precinct." Whitsell lived in Princeton and Wylie before moving to Deport in 1966.

"No matter how much patrolling is done, without the cooperation of the citizens, nothing can get done. I believe I can get this cooperation."

Whitsell and his wife, Pearl, have five children: Glen of Deport, Calvin of Paris, Nila Phelps of Waxahachie, Kenneth and LaVoyce Sims, both of Garland. They have 17 grandchildren. He and his wife belong to the Faith Baptist Church in Deport.

Al Parks Running For Constable

Incumbent Constable of Precinct 1, Lamar County, Al Parks has announced that he has filed for a fourth term.

Parks, who was born and raised in the area, served as Lamar County Deputy Sheriff before becoming constable.

Parks has also been a farmer but is currently retired from farming and says he will be on the job full time.

"I will be available to the public twenty-four hours a day, and I feel I can continue to serve the people in Precinct 1."

He and his wife, Mary, have two

boys, Burl Parks of Paris and George Parks of Irving. They have four grandchildren.

He has a lifetime certification as a peace officer. "Without certification you can no longer be a peace officer of any kind," he says.

He and his wife belong to the First United Methodist Church of Deport.

"I feel I've been able to perform my duties over the years and retain the respect of the majority of the citizens in Precinct 1," Parks stated. "If re-elected, I'm certain I can continue in the same manner."

"I'm equipped for the job and am familiar with the entire patrol area."

William Ball Running For Constable

A Deport volunteer firefighter, William "Bill" Ball, filed for candidacy Thursday in the Democratic Party chairman's office for Precinct 1, Constable.

He is the second to officially file for the post. However, another candidate has announced he, too, will run in the race.

Ball, 40 who has spent the past four years with the Deport Volunteer Fire Department, said he wants to work with young adults in Precinct 1 in an effort to deter crime.

"I want to be able to work with the kids down there...many times I have been asked to go out at night just to talk to kids who are on drugs...I do think this would be an important step in deterring crime," he said.

He was licensed with the Dallas Police Department and worked for Smith Security System. He also worked at Commonwealth National Bank as a bank guard, and as a security officer at First Presbyterian Hospital. And he served in the U.S. Army for two years.

A native of Syracuse, Ball was raised in Irving and attended Irving High School. He also attended Arizona State University, where he took courses in criminology. He moved to Deport in 1983.

Ball is a member of the American Legion, Post 199 in Deport and is unmarried.

Ball states that "this will be a full time job for me with no other permanent job to detract from my duties."

Randy Boren Running For Constable

A reserve for the Lamar County Sheriff's Department, Randy Boren of Pattonville, has announced he will file for the constable Precinct 1, post within the next week.

He will be running against two other candidates who have already filed with the Democratic Party Chairman's office, including the incumbent.

Boren, 28, is a native Lamar County resident, is fully certified as a Texas Peace Officer. He has worked as a reserve for the sheriff's depart-

ment for six years, following work at Estes Chemicals Inc. as a computer operator.

"I'm trying to get across to the public what a constable's duties really are-to uphold the peace in his precinct."

"I have completed a 440-hour training program to become a certified peace officer. You have to complete this training to meet one of the requirements of the position of con-

stable. I feel that with the successful completion of this course and my six years experience with the Lamar County Sheriff's Department I am well qualified for the job."

Boren attended Delmar High School. He is married to Kristi Parsons Boren, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Keith Parsons. They have one son.

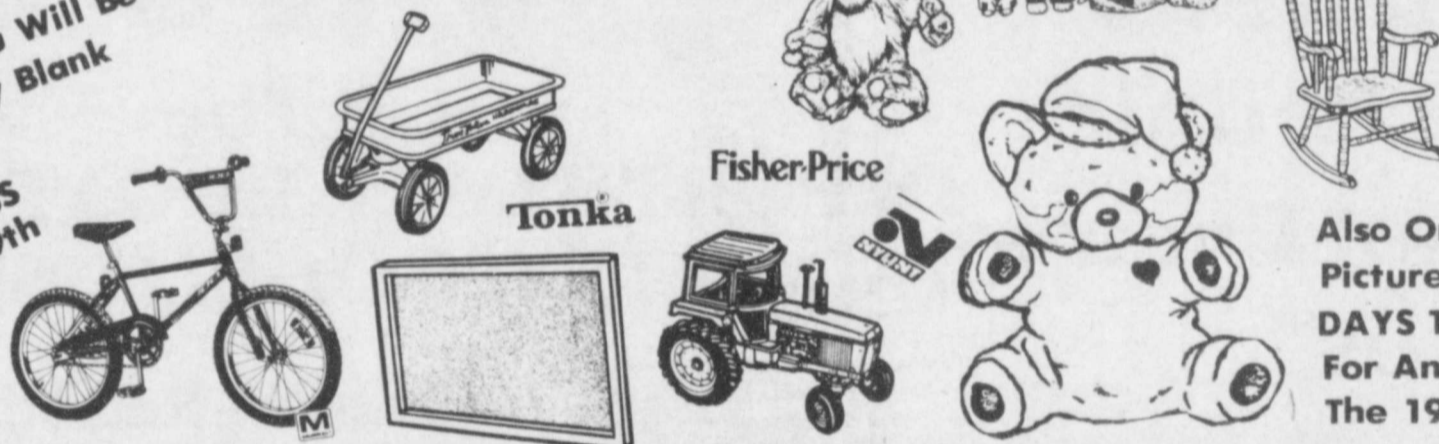

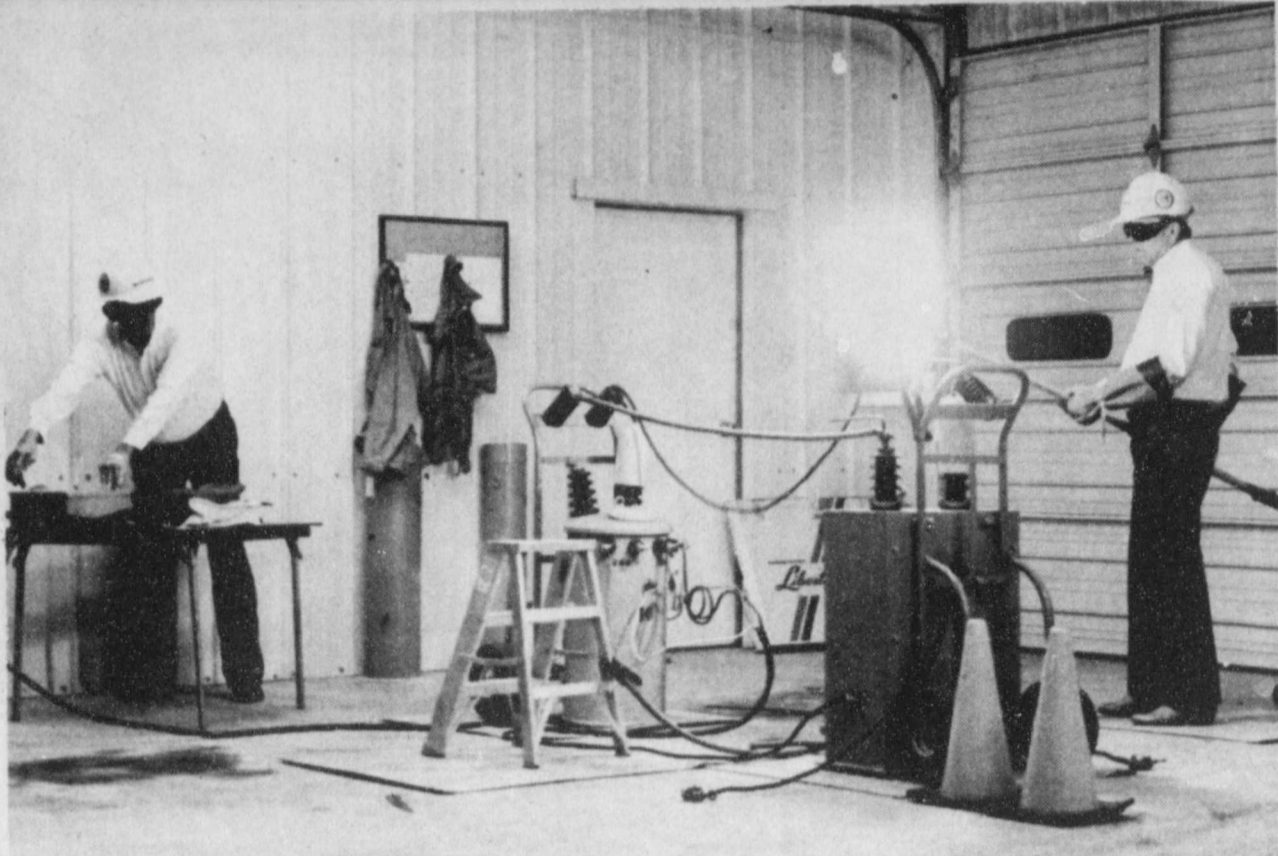

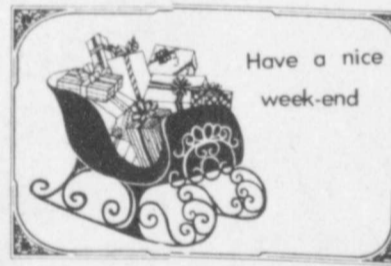

FmHa Administrator Receives IFA Award

Vance L. Clark, Administrator of The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration, received one of the highest honors bestowed by the Future Farmers of America at its national convention in Kansas City. Clark, whose agency is called the "lender of last resort", was awarded the Degree of Honorary American Farmer for his contributions in assisting young farmers entering the agricultural vocation.

"This award is especially meaningful since it came from the FFA," Clark said, "because these young people are the hope and the future of farming. It makes me feel good to know that they see a future in farming, and are facing the future with optimism and enthusiasm."

Texas FmHA State Director J. Lynn Futch echoed Clark's sentiments.

The Farmers Home Administration makes loans to established farmers in financial difficulty as well as young farmers with no credit history. In the

past year, FmHA dispensed \$4.3 billion in farm loans to over 21,500 borrowers for operating, real estate and emergency assistance.

Additionally, FmHA makes youth loans to high school students for worthwhile agricultural projects. The loans are limited to \$10,000 and are

subject to the same repayment provisions as other loans.

The Future Farmers of America, founded in 1928, is a national organization for students of vocational agriculture. The award was made at FFA's 60th national convention, held annually in Kansas City.

Girl Scouts Accepting Applications For Wyoming Trek

The Red River Valley Girl Scout Council was recently awarded a grant from the DeWitt Wallace Reader's Digest Scholarship Fund to send a patrol of eight girls and two adults to Wyoming next summer on a wider opportunity trip.

The council is accepting applications now through January 2, from girls between the ages of 12 and 17, and interested adults who would like to participate. Membership in Girl Scouts is not a requirement for applying, but will be required by the time of the event. The trek is scheduled for July 30-August 5.

According to project director, Debbie Janeway, the grant will make it possible for those who would not otherwise be able to afford it, to participate.

The Wyoming Trek is an opportunity for organized groups of girls and their adult leaders to travel to National Center West, which is owned and operated by Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. The site is located on over 14,000 acres bordered by the Big Horn National Forest near Ten Sleep, Wyoming. Campsites are situated on gently sloping land bordered by two canyons.

Trek groups plan to cook their own meals. The center staff offers a variety of programs each day in which the trekkers may choose to participate. Programs include horseback riding, backpacking, archaeology, fishing, geology and stargazing.
