


"You don't understand," she sobbed. "It's over 100 miles from here to where my daughter lives." He assured her that he would take care of her, set her down and told her to



Most Local Sales Taxes Up

Friday sent checks totaling \$57.6 million in local sales tax to 852 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Bullock said this month's allocations showed an increase of \$3.3 million over last year's December allocations, an increase of 6.2 percent.

However, statewide year-end totals for the monthly city allocatin decreased to \$850.7 million from the 1986 total payment of \$886.3 million, Bullcok added.

"The increase in this month's payments is the result of two factors--statewide economic recovery and a widening of the state's tax base," Bullock said. "Our economy is recovering, but it's going to take some time," he added.

December checks represent taxes collected in October and reported by November 20. October was the first month that the broadened tax base went into effect, according to Bullock.

The tax base was widened as a result of state legislation passed during last summer's special session.

This month's largest allocation, \$9.2 million, was to Houston, an increase of 9.4 percent. Dallas received the second-largest allocation, \$6.9

million, a decrease of three percent San Antonio's check totaled \$3.7 million, an 8.7 percent increase from last year.

Locally, Bogata received \$1,098.74 for a 15.67 percent decrease over total payments to date for the same period last year. Clarksville received \$14,861.35 for a 0.51 percent increase while Detroit received no payment for this period.

Mt. Pleasant received \$74,732.88 for

a 5.71 percent decrease. Talco received \$1,354.80 for a 75.72 percent increase over total payments to date for the year.

Blossom received \$636.82 for a 14.30 percent increase over last year's payments to date.

Deport received no payment for this period, as compared to no payment for the same period last year while Paris received \$156,418.31 for a 0.58 percent increase from last year.

Bullock sent checks totaling \$26.2 million to the state's six metropolitan transit authorities, an increase of 5.6 percent over December 1986 allocations. Dallas' DART payment of \$10.4 million was highest, while Houston's MTA received a payment of \$10.2

Disabled English Man **Dreams Of Disneyland**

Those readers who "went with us" to Great Britain this past summer may recall that we were visiting friends, Mic Fuller and Lee Symonds. Those who live near us may have actually met Mic and Lee when the ladies visited us summer before last, spending time drinking coffee in City Drug Store, visiting with us in Bogata, Blossom and Talco, meeting friends in Paris.

Both retired, the two sisters are active correspondents, and for many years have been raising money to aid the poor elderly of London.

Now they have a new cause, and we thought readers here might like to share in the insights they have gained from helping Patrick, a 21-year old man, trapped within a three foot high body

Patrick is the victim of a rare disease, Morquise Syndrome, which causes the skeleton and external body to remain that of a child while the internal organs grow to normal size, causing pain, and even death.

Patrick has been at death's door four times, at age four, seven, 11 and 15...but now that he has reached 21, there is hope than his internal organs have stopped growing. He gets around on small crutches as best he can...or he did until Mic, Lee and others decided that they would find a way to raise the money for an electric wheel chair, which will give him much greater mobility.

It has taken some time, but they have succeeded, the wheel chari cost 2,800 pounds...and with the dollar about 1.65 to make a pound, that tells just how much money they have

"Jumble Sales" (rummage sales to us), car boot (trunk) sales, "pub crawls" have all been used to raise these funds.

Patrick's sense of humor is what makes him so special. He laughs that he won't smoke because it might stunt his growth. He has to buy his clothes at a children's store, but undaughted,

smiles that he wants a job as a lumberjack in a mushroom farm or

a brick carrier for Leggo Bricks! Now that he has his wheel chair, the folks helping him are starting to work on making another dream of his come true. Patrick wants to come to America..to Disneyland. Meeting Mickey Mouse has, he quips, "been a dream of mine since I was small."

The trip has been booked for March, and Patrick says that if he can only get to Disneyland, he can die a happy man.

Mic and Lee, are "extracting" more money from customers in pubs, on street corners, or wherever they can find a "quid" to help this cause. They have no doubts that in March,

having his dream come true. Those of us who know Mic and Lee have no doubt either, for their determination and zeal knows no bounds





She is married to R.A. Benningfield, Jr., and the couple have two children: Mike a teacher at Prairiland High School and Mrs. Mike


(Pam) Russell, a Marriage and Family Therapist in Paris.



As a concerned citizen of Deport, I would like to comment on our annual Deport Christmas Parade.

The parade was beautiful. We had a good crowd and as we all know, lots of time and hard work went into preparing for this event, along with braving the freezing weather.

If I may, I would like to go a bit further than the decorated cars and floats and each individual that made this event possible and comment on the time and hard work contributed by the Prairiland High School Band and Flag Corps. These students have practiced long and hard to contribute to our parade, among other events, for us and our surrounding area. My daughter is a member of the Prairiland Flag Corp and she ha sput forth lots of time and effort to perfect her performance. As she was performing for the senior citizens in front of the Deport Nursing Home Tuesday afternoon in the beginning of the parade, she was run down by a child on a three wheeler. As I have been informed, these vehicles do not belong on our city streets in any event. Even with their bright Christmas decorations, they are still no less illegal.

I am not sure whether or not everyone is aware of the fact that in all total, three different people were involved in accidents Tuesday by three different drivers of three wheelers during the parade, one of which was the Mayor of Deport. I truly admire him, in that he did stop this person and make him park the demon. The balance of the group of three wheelers and four wheelers were allowed to continue right behind the band and their people on foot throughout the parade. The band instructor said later and I quote, "Some of them don't even know how to handle them." He was upset also.

I was told the party responsible for my daughter's injury did not even have the courtesy to stop at the time of the accident and check to see how seriously she was hurt. Neither has he or his parents yet come by or called this family to inquire or show any kind of concern.

My daughter was not seriously hurt. She was courageous and determined enough to be driven by automobile from the nursing home downtown after the accident and perform with the band in front of the bank in spite of the pain.

Even though she was not seriously hurt she very likely could have been. We hear very often of someone getting killed on this type vehicle and with all our small children involved in this event this incident could have been much worse. If a 16 year old can be run down so easily we know what the end results could be for a small child. In my opinion the only way to assure that there will not be a repeat performance of such an incident is to band these vehicles entirely. All of our children should be able to participate and view our parade in the future without a fear of being injured.

I would also like to say a heartfelt thank you to the staff at Deport Nursing Home, especially Roy Castleberry and Marilyn Crawford for their help and concern.



The permit also authorizes an intermittent discharge from the River Crest Reservoir to canal; thence to the Sulphur River in Segment No. 0303 of the Sulphur River Basin. The River Crest Steam Electric Station is located adjacent to River Crest Reservoir, which is approximate-ly 504 miles southeast via U.S. Highway 271 of the City of Bogata, Red River

The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a draft permit which, if approved by the Commission, will specify conditions and limitations generally the same as-those currently enforced by the existing permit except that monitoring reirements for Total Dissolved Solids have been added to Outfall 001 and Total Residual Chlorine has been substituted for Free Available Chlorine. The renewed permit will also monitor the metal cleaning wastes from the new Outfall 501 instead of from Outfall 301. The expiration date of the existing permit was July 5, 1987. It is proposed that the expiration date be 12-24 specified as midnight, five years after date of Commission approval.
