ESPN Coming To Deport, Bogata

Home Cable TV is pleased to announce the launch of ESPN, the nation's foremost sports programming service, on the cable system in Deport and Bogata beginning in early January of 1988. ESPN carries sports programming 24 hours a day and can be seen on Channel 9. It will be included with Home Cable TV's basic service package.

"We have had hundreds of requests for ESPN to be added to the cable service in Bogata and Deport," said Jim Short, Home Cable TV's General Manager. "I am delighted that we can finally provide this excellent programming service to all subscribers in the area."

To kick off the New Year, ESPN's January programming highlights 42 live regular-season college basketball games featuring exclusive agreements with seven of the nation's top NCAA basketball conferences. Many of these games will not be able to be seen anywhere except on cable TV. In addition, ESPN will feature a live WBC Super Welterweight Championship from Genoa, Italy on Sunday, January 3.

ESPN will present its annual Super Bown warm-up featuring NFL

Film's highlight programs of all 21 previous Super Bowls, "Zenith's NFL Super Bowl Match-up" plus live "This Week in Sports" and "Super Bowl Game Day" shows. In all, ESPN will present 15½ hours of Super Bowl related programming on Sunday, January 31 beginning at 1:30 AM central time.

ESPN will present exclusive live tennis coverage of the men's and women's finals of the Australian Open, the first Grand Slam event of the year. Coverage of the women's final will be Friday, January 22 at 8 p.m. central with the men's final scheduled for Saturday, January 23 at 9 p.m. central.

Exclusive National Hockey League coverage will continue with ten telecasts, including a doubleheader on Tuesday, January 12. World Cup Skiing can be seen each Sunday in January as the world's top skiers prepare for the 1988 Winter Olympics in Calgary. Featured events will include the Men's Downhill from Garmisch, West Germany, the Men's Slalom from Kitzbuehel, Austria and the Men's Downhill and Men's Super G from Wengen, Switzerland.

Chapman Provision Becomes Law

The president has signed the 1988 budget bill and the deficit reduction bill into law, giving final approval to the Chapman provision striking federal pay raises to members of Congress and top government executives.

"I am extremely pleased that the proposed 3 percent pay increase to members of Congress and high-paid government executives has finally been repealed.

"I believe that a pay raise for top federal employees, however modest, is outrageous. It sends the wrong signal to the American people about how this Congress intends to reduce the deficit," Jim Chapman said.

Under Chapman's provision, cost of living adjustments to all employees level V and above are stricken from next year's budget. This would affect

nearly 10,000 top federal employees, and will save \$27 million.

Those affected would include, among others, the president, cabinet secretaries and under secretaries, all federal judges and members of Congress.

The congressman explained that the 1988 budget bill contained important projects for economic development in East Texas. "We had so much from my district in the appropriations bill that it would have been an absolute disaster if it had not passed."

The bill also contains legislative language authored by Chapman, which removes the obstacle to construction of a supply modernization facility at Red River Army Depot. Groundbreaking for the new facility is scheduled for February 19.

Clarence L. Malone Announces For Commissioner Pct. 1

Clarence L. Malone has announced that he will run for Commissioner of Precinct 1.

He is 56 years old and has lived in Precinct 1 of Lamar County for most of his life. He worked for Babcock and Wilcox for 34½ years and has been a rancher for 32 years.

He has been in the construction business for 20 years. He says "I have built roads and driveways all over Red River, Lamar and Delta counties. I served on the Cunningham I.S.D. School Board and on the Babcock and Wilcox Employees Association."

He was chief and assistant chief of the Taylortown Fire Department for several years and is also a member of the Lamar County Firefighters

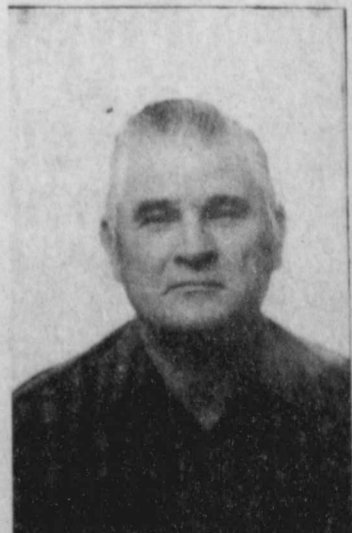

Drunk Drivers Still Number One Killer On Roads

Drunk driving remains the number one killer on our roads, striking with a frequency and ferocity that would be national news if its victims were reported in total each day instead of individually in the obituaries in thousands of cities and towns where the tragedies occur. Its victims are a cross-section of America; the rich, the poor, the young, the old, the safety-conscious and the not-so-safety-conscious. But they share a common demise that is always unexpected, always needless and often grudgingly tolerated because our social norms won't quite permit them to be characterized as other than accidental deaths.

For many years in this country we talked about drunk driving in statistical terms only; lives lost and public expenditures. The higher the numbers, the more the public would pay attention, or so we thought. But the opposite was true. The numbers were largely ignored because they were, after all, just numbers. There were no faces or shattered lives attached to tug at the heart strings.

But something changed all that in the early 1980's. Citizen activist groups, like Mothers Against Drunk Driving, moved drunk driving off the bar graphs and brought it up close and personal, laying its dire consequences squarely on the doorsteps of virtually every American. Suddenly, the blinders came off, the outrage swelled and things began to change, and change dramatically.

Thanks to that awakening, the United States, to its credit, has made remarkable progress in just a handful of years. Forty-one percent of the total traffic deaths in 1986 involved at least one driver or pedestrian who was intoxicated, a shocking figure but one that represents a significant decline from the 46 percent that was reported in 1982. The percentage of intoxicated teenage drivers involved in fatal crashes also dropped, from 28 percent in 1982 to 21 percent in 1986, the largest decrease among all age groups.

As promising as the improved statistics are, they are not much comfort to the families and friends of the 19,000 people who were killed last year in alcohol-related crashes. We are holding our own, keeping things from getting worse, but we are still a long way from the point where we can drive our roads, reasonably assured that the approaching car or truck is not driven by someone who has had too much to drink. Alcohol has played and probably will continue to play a major role in how we socialize in this country. The challenge is to convince people to use alcohol in moderation and to avoid driving after drinking. This is especially true during the Christmas/New Year's holiday season when travel increases, office parties abound and it's common to get together with family, friends and neighbors for a little holiday cheer.

Tougher laws, more enforcement and increased public and media attention over the past few years helped reduce alcohol-related crashes by nearly 30 percent in some parts of the

nation. Many responsible people have gotten the message and have modified their drinking habits for the better. But the problem is far from solved and complacency should not replace the concern and anger of the early 1980's that motivated government, the private sector and citizen groups to stop wringing hands over drunk driving and start fighting it.

We continue to be too tolerant of a dangerous minority who leave parties, bars and restaurants with attitudes like "I drive better when I'm drunk," "I only had a few," and "nobody drives my car but me."

It may be difficult as a host to stick your neck out and actively prevent someone from driving who has been celebrating too much. But isn't it better to call a cab, offer a ride or provide a bed than to allow friends or co-workers to put themselves and everyone else at risk?

The old adage about an ounce of prevention being worth a pound of cure is particularly appropriate when developing strategies to curb drunk drivers. Remember, drunk driving IS

preventable and drinking too much and then getting behind the wheel and killing someone is not an accidental event. People know better today, and we should all be held accountable for our actions.

But the concept of accountability is dependent on public awareness. The news media has played a significant role in bringing about a greater awareness of the drunk driving problem. In fairness, an unprecedented amount of news and public service time has been devoted to the subject for a far longer period of time than most issues. But as media attention wanes, the public's awareness and heightened sensitivity wane with it. Drunk and Drugged Driving Awareness Week is the one special week during the year when we stop and take stock of something that deserves special emphasis.

Drunk driving is not only a national tragedy, it is a national disgrace. As we begin 1988, let each of us individually resolve to do our part to eliminate this disgrace and make it a resolution that is kept.

Cattle Lice On Increase

Cattle lice are common this time of year on both beef and dairy cattle, according to Dr. James Robinson, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Cattle may be infested with two types of lice, the chewing type which feeds on skin and the sucking type which feeds on blood.

Cattle infested with lice appear unthrifty, bare spots appear where the hair has fallen out or the animals may rub against objects.

Both types of lice can be controlled by ready to use materials such as

pour-ons, spot-ons or dusts. Sprays can also be used but must be mixed with water and applied with pressure sprayers. Robinson says that when using pressure sprayers, select one with a minimum of 250 pounds pressure to force the spray material to the skin.

There are restrictions on these materials based on days to slaughter, age of animal and days between applications. Read and follow label directions.

Cattle grubs will be cutting holes in the backs of cattle in December through February. Control is not recommended at this stage because of the size of the grub and the harm the control measures may cause the animal. Robinson says that if cattle grub infestations are present, plan control measures in the summer of 1988.
