Old barbed wire fences, coated in glistening ice, stately trees outlined with snow, the beauty as the winter sun sparkles off of them, creating blue shadows unseen in our ordinary brown winter world, is breathtaking.

Far from chopped up icy roads, the world is silent, the only noise the sound of boots crunching. The air has a smell unlike its usual odor. It is the ultimate in clean, fresh, scent.

Tucked away between hollows and under brush piles, tiny creatures peer out.

A handful of bread crumbs and some chopped apple yields a harvest of colorful birds to delight the heart. Brilliant against the pristine background, cardinals flash down to feed. Juncos, plain in their charcoal suits, hop everywhere. Field larks and red wing black birds strut among the smaller birds.

The whole episode has provided a rare glimpse at a world we know little about.

Inconvenient, yes, but beautiful...incredibly so.

Winter Storm Keeps Icy Grip On Area

Was it snow or was it sleet? One thing it definitely was, without a doubt, it was cold and slick.

Area residents watched last Wednesday as sleet and freezing rain

fell for hours, then slowly turned to tiny ice crystals that weren't fluffy snow, weren't rounded pellets of sleet.

By Wednesday night, with the temperature in the low 20's, northeast

Texas was partially paralyzed by one of the worst winter storms in many years.

Roads were four inches deep in packed ice, while the rest of the world

was coated with glittering whiteness.

Not a single school system in the area operated, giving youngsters the chance to take advantage of the rare winter wonderland.

Creek banks and hills became sledding slopes as kids used plastic barrels, cardboard boxes and plywood to go skidding down to the bottom. Getting to the top sometimes took as much sliding as going down did, however.

Snowmen were very, very scarce however, as the dry ice crystals simply refused to pack into any kind of shape. Those who persevered made tiny snow sculptures.

Adults tried to stay inside as much as possible, doing their shopping and mail gathering at the same time, and using whatever four-wheel drive vehicles could be mustered.


Front wheel drive, four wheel drive or chains provided the only reliable means of transportation, and accidents were not uncommon.

Ditches slowly filled with vehicles along major highways, trucks pulled over before they jack-knifed and minor "fender benders" abounded.

Throughout the rest of the week, although the weather was clean and free from any more gifts from the skies, the stubborn ice kept a firm grip.

Ranchers were busy feeding cattle, whose nutritional requirements shot up as the mercury plunged down.

By Monday morning roads that had a lot of traffic on them had cleared, but icy patches were still frequent. Tuesday's warmer temperatures helped finish off the ice and snow, but the weather forecast predicted a chance of more sleet.

Girl Scout Cookie Sales Start Saturday

Area Girl Scouts will begin their annual cookie sale Saturday, January 16. Orders will be taken through January 29 and the cookies will be delivered between February 24 and March 6.

Seven varieties of cookies are again being offered this year at a cost of \$2.00 per box. They include old favorites such as the original shortbread, thin mints and peanut butter sandwich, along with chocolate chip, peanut butter patties, caramel delights and lemon pastry cremes.

According to cookie sale coordinator Betsy Mills of Paris, all proceeds from the Girl Scout cookies sold in this area stay in this area. The Red River Valley Council uses the money to purchase equipment, train leaders, maintain and operate Camp Gambill, and provide scholarships for summer camp and extended travel opportunities.

Girl Scout troops keep a certain portion of the proceeds and decide themselves how to spend the money they earn. In recent years the money has been spent on service projects, field trips, campouts and other troop activities.

Girls can earn awards according to the number of boxes they sell. Each

girl who participates in the sale will receive a theme patch. Other awards include a thermo bottle, camping mug, hot lock combinatin lock, canvas tote bag, T-shirt, stuffed toy dragon, travel kit and music gift certificate. The top sales girl in each neighborhood will earn a camping

Prairiland Board Okays Fund Raiser

The Prairiland School Board gave permission for the Prairiland Band Booster Club to hold a donkey ball game in the Deport Gym as a fund raising project. Jerry Gillie, president of the club, heard the news, and is currently arranging for a date for the event.

In other business, it was decided the board will meet at the Blossom campus on February 8 for a tour of the facilities and to discuss the building program, including whether or not to

build a new cafeteria there.

All personnel was re-hired. The three year contract of Leslie Taylor, Superintendent, was extended for one year, and the two year contracts of Dr. Richard Nash and Max Ballard were extended for one year. Jerry Nell Stout and Joyce Allen were also re-hired.

Minutes were read and approved, the financial report heard and payment of bills authorized.

Parker Running For Re-Election

On November 3, 1987, incumbent Lamar County Sheriff Jim Parker filed a campaign treasure declaration initiating his intention to seek a second term as Sheriff. Parker remained J.R. Hutchinson as his campaign treasure.

Parker, a 25-year veteran law enforcement officer, served in the Army military police, spent 18½ years with the Dallas Police Department prior to "coming home" to take office January 1, 1985, as Lamar County Sheriff.

Parker stated he is running solely on his record. "I have given Lamar County an honest, aggressive and professional law enforcement agency accomplished through 24-hour availability seven days a week to answer the needs of my constituents. It has been a total building effort first laying a foundation to build a department on. It has been a learning and growing process as county government is totally different from the 18 years I spent in municipal police work."

In three short years, the Sheriff's Department has achieved goals that often takes years to accomplish. We have taken several major drug dealers off the streets that were selling "dope" to our young people. Drug abuse is the core of most crimes and thus has been the focal point of my efforts. Our drug and alcohol abuse education program has been successful as has been our crime prevention program. I have personally spoken to over 1000 young people in the past 18 months about the pitfalls of drug and alcohol abuse, not to mention the many more that members of my staff has spoken to. The Sheriff's Office has led the way locally and now others are joining in the fight against this all too common problem eating away at our society. We have recovered much stolen property and cracked several burglary rings.

I sincerely feel that under my continued direction there is still much to be done and that our department has only scratched the surface of what still needs to be accomplished. Any success the Sheriff's Office has had, however, is owed in a large way, to the support, help and involvement of the people of Lamar County. There have been thousands of dollars of needed equipment donated for the department because these people knew that had a working sheriff leading dedicated employees in their fight against crime.

Parker cites as major departmental achievements in 1985, the arrest of Patrick Rogers and Willis Cooper after a heinous crime spree and

manhunt, the capture of James Wesley Foote, who fled to Lamar County after a kidnapping, shoot out and escape from Johnson County Jail; several drug pushers have been sent to the penitentiary, some still serving time despite the early release programs. In 1986, the bail bond fee program was instituted. Sheriff Parker helped organize and is administrator of the crime stoppers program for Paris and Lamar County which has been a tremendous aid to law enforcement. In 1987, we successfully conducted the manhunt of the Detroit bank robbers; we had a major undercover drug operation in conjunction with the Department of Public Safety Narcotics Division netting over 50 indictments. In 1987, we started a Lamar County Bail Bond service which earned over 15,000. The first month it was instituted. Parker says he has diligently strived to cut expenses from the jail food bill to every other possible way, by bringing in new revenues, he has helped offset the cost of crime for the taxpayers.

It has been said that a politician is one who is concerned about the next election, and that a public servant is one who is concerned about the next generation. I've never considered myself a skilled politician, but I do consider myself a true, honest and proven public servant who strongly believes he still has much to offer the people of Lamar County.

Jim Parker was born in Paris on October 23, 1942. He graduated from Paris High School and went on to obtain a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice from Abilene Christian University. He is the son of Ernest Parker, a retired grocery dealer in Paris for many years and the late Lillie Carpenter Parker. He is married to the former Dolores LaRue and they have one daughter, Paige.

Sheriff Parker attends the College Church of Christ, is a member of Kiwanis Intl., the Texas Sheriff's Assn., the National Sheriff's Assn., and the Paris Elks Lodge.

Van Dorn Craddock Dies January 6


Van Dorn Craddock of Longview died January 6 at his home there.

High-Potassium Diet May Reduce Risk Of Stroke

A high intake of dietary potassium appears to provide protection against death from stroke, a University of California, San Diego School of Medicine study has shown.
The results indicate that one extra serving of fresh fruits or vegetables a day may decrease the risk of stroke by as much as 40 percent, regardless of other known risk factors.
This relationship between dietary potassium and stroke mortality was still strong even after the researchers accounted for other classic risk factors for stroke, including blood pressure, cigarette smoking, age, sex, blood cholesterol level and fasting blood glucose level.


Bogata Lions Club Sponsoring Mason-Dixon


Steven Johnson made three points to help the Pats pull within three, 13-10 at the end of the first quarter.
