Wet Winter Has Farmers Far Behind

Area farmers will find themselves going day and night when it finally dries up, after one of the wettest winters in recent history.

After a very dry fall, the rain set in early in October, and since that time, farmers have been unable to get into the fields.

Winter plowing is undone, and getting the ground ready for planting this spring will be a big job.

Hard freezes and the extreme damp have had cattle producers feeding out more hay than they had anticipated, and many report that their supplies are running low sooner than expected.

The ice which paralyzed the area two weeks ago softened the soil, and mud has become a serious problem for many people feeding livestock.

Most livestock is reported in good

condition, however, and if the area can avoid more serious ice storms, spring grazing will begin to come up within a month or so.

Winter is far from over, however, as weathermen predict more bitter temperatures after the current warming trend.

Armchair gardeners are ordering seed and potato and English pea planting time is fast approaching.

Now is a good time for building new flower beds, if the weather allows, or fertilizing old ones. Rose growers are busy pruning, and the cold freeze may reduce insect populations enough to be a benefit during the coming spring and summer months.

Economists predict that cotton will be in big demand again this year, and local ag specialists expect to see more

acreage planted in cotton locally.

Most people, whether involved in agriculture or not, are ready for a drying trend which will allow them some freedom of movement outside.

Whether or not the winter rains will slack up before spring rains begin is, of course, still to be seen.

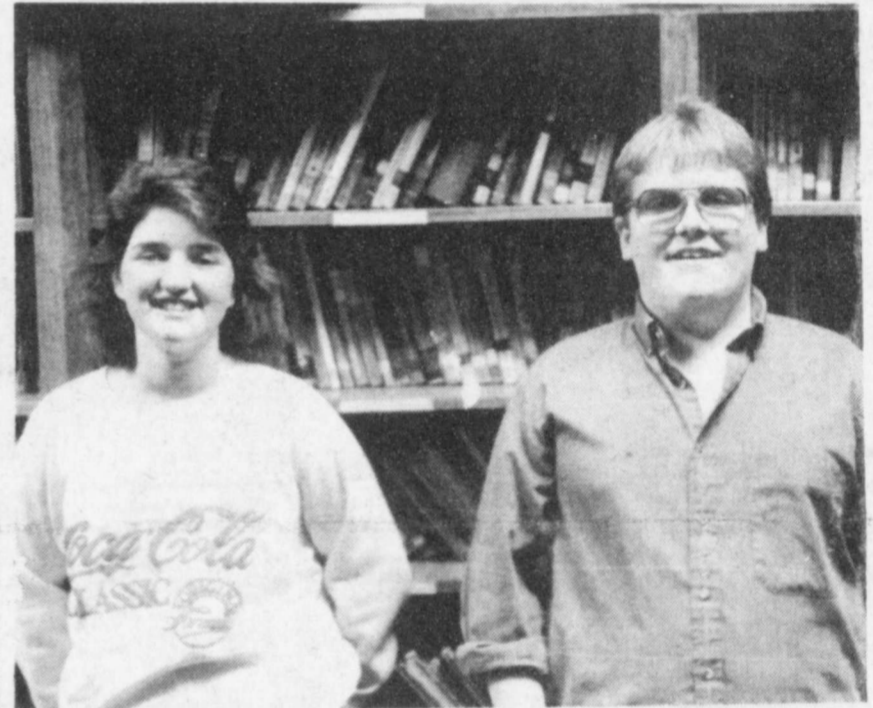

Kiwanis Club Hears Program On Literacy

Daisy Redding spoke to the Deport Kiwanis Club Saturday morning. She is the Lamar County Coordinator of the Literacy Council.

The Literacy Program is designed to teach people from 16 years of age and older to read. Any age can learn

to read, she stressed. However, any subject such as Math, English language, etc. will be available if tutors for the subjects are available.

Redding says that the program runs about one year. A place is

selected and a time and date set for the tutor and student to meet. Classes are usually from one to two hours long.

The program, she stressed, is for anyone, housewives or business executives, and classes are kept private.

School Receives Map Of Lamar Co.

A framed map of early Lamar County was presented to the Deport Junior High School in honor of Lamar Day, January 26. Presentation was made by Mrs. James Lowry, Historian of the George Washington Stell Chapter of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas. The Paris chapter sponsored the gift to the school.

In September, 1836, in the first national election, Mirabeau B. Lamar was elected vice-president. He was inaugurated as president on December 10, 1838. An important event of his administration was to select the site of the capitol of Texas. A little place called Waterloo on the Colorado River was chosen. The place was named Austin in honor of Stephen F. Austin, the "Father of Texas".

Lamar's proposal that the congress establish a system of public education endowed by public lands resulted in the act of January 26, 1838, which set aside lands for public schools and two universities. Although it was decades before the school system was established, Lamar's advocacy of the program earned him the title of "Father of Education". This date has become Lamar Day, one of the honor days of Texas.

The town of Lamar and Lamar County, created in 1841, were named for President Lamar.

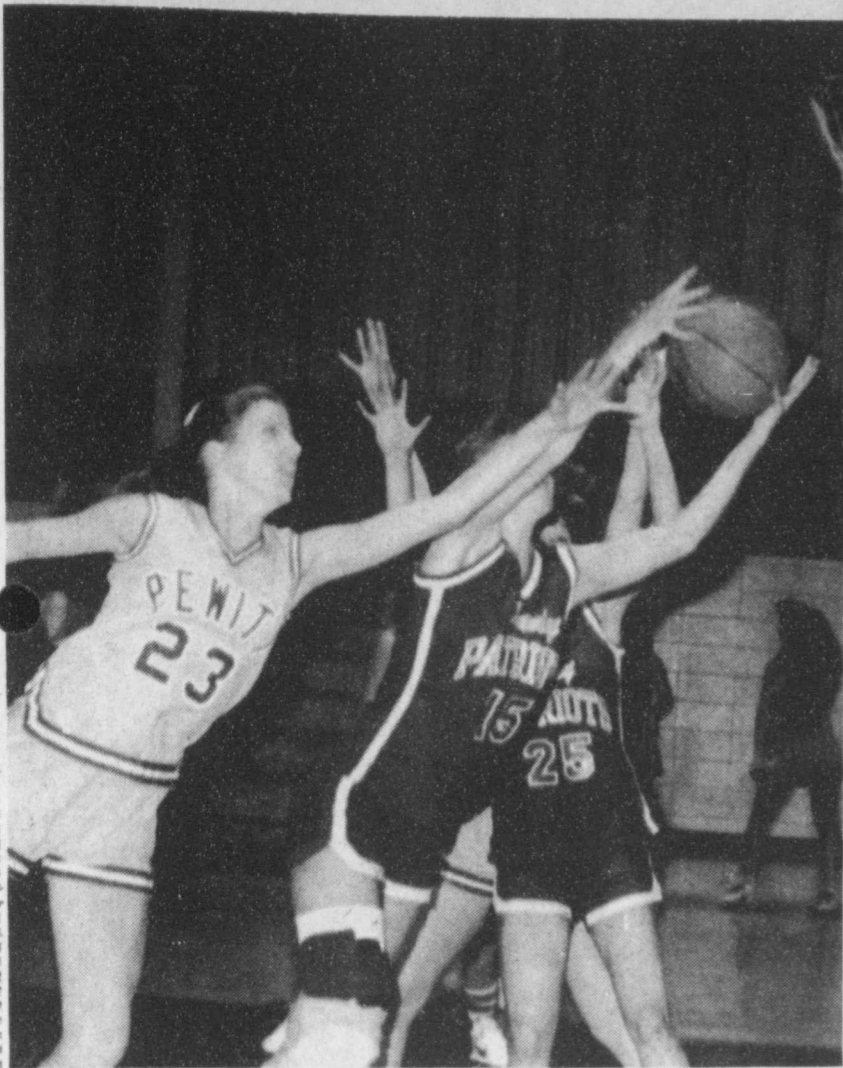
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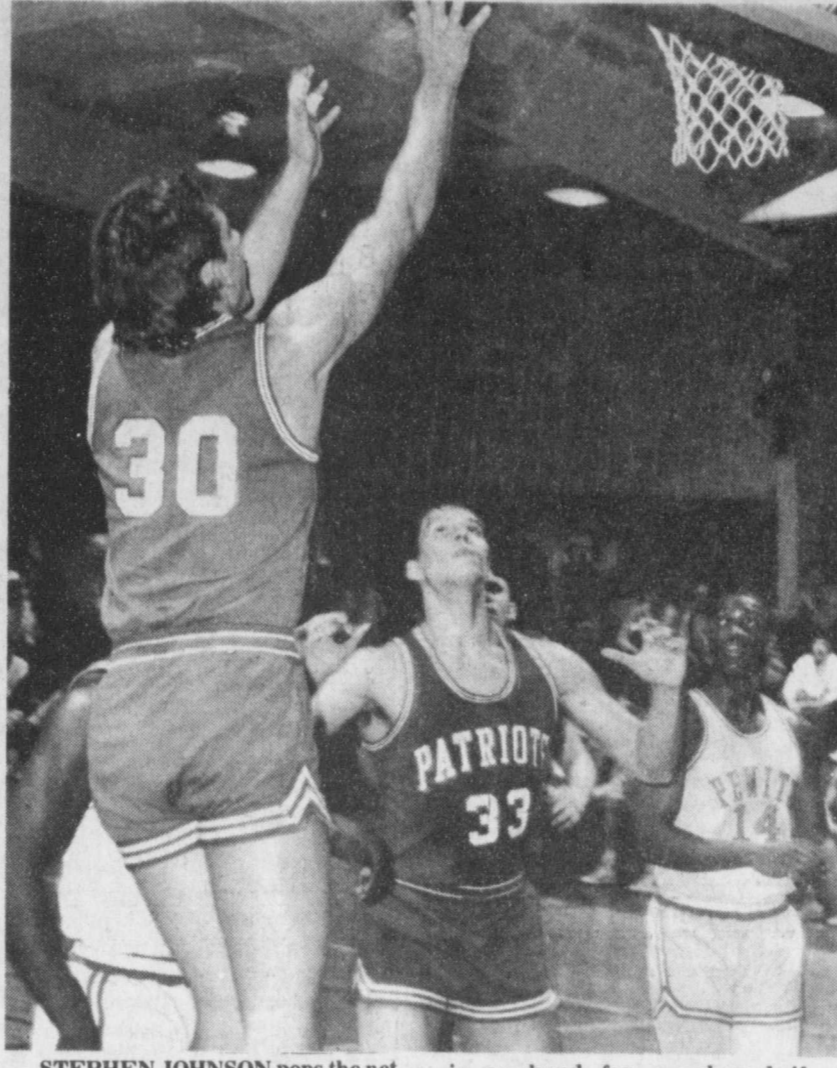
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TONI DOCKRAY, number 15, keeps the ball away from a Paul Pewitt player. Number 25, Melissa LaRue, is also visible. The

Prairiland Outlasts Brahmas

Jack Kindle scored 16 points, including four 3-pointers, to lead the Patriots in a 57-54 victory over the Paul Pewitt Brahms Friday night in the Pewitt gym. This win gives the Patriots a nine game winning streak and a 14-5 season record. It also puts Prairiland in place in district with a 3-0 record.
Prairiland led from the very start of the game as Kindle hit his first 3-pointer of the night. Joseph Whelchel then scored six more points for the Patriots. Pewitt's Kevin ALEN, who had an outstanding 30 points, scored four points in the first quarter, however, the Pats led 13-8 at the end of one quarter of play.
In the second quarter, Jamie Borden and Steven Johnson scored nice shots for the Pats, including Kindle's second 3-pointer of the night. Terry Williams and Allen each dropped in four points, but Prairiland still kept their lead, 22-20 at the half.
The Patriots broke the game wide open as Kindle scored ten of his 16 points in the third quarter. Kindle hit

two 10-foot jumpshots before Allen nailed his two 16-footers. Lloyd Whelchel scored five points, including a 15-foot jumpshot. Kindle also dropped in his last two 3-pointers in the third quarter. Borden sank two free throws with 43 seconds left in the third quarter to give the Pats their biggest lead of the game, 43-31.
In the fourth quarter, Paul Pewitt came alive. Before Prairiland knew what happened, the Brahms had scored eight unanswered points with the help of Anthony Boyd. Prairiland's lead dropped from 12 to four within a matter of seconds. The Whelchel twins combined for the Pats' next eight points. Pewitt's Allen took charge for the Brahms with 14 straight points. Allen's 3-pointer at the :25 mark cut the Patriot lead to 55-54. The Brahms turned the ball over with :03 left on the clock which ruined their chances of winning. The Patriots won the game by a score of 57-54.
Kindle and L. Whelchel were high scorers for Prairiland with 16 and 13 points respectively. Kevin Allen

scored a game high 30 points for the Brahms.
The Patriots defeated the Daingerfield Tigers 45-36 last Tuesday night at home in the second district game. Kindle again was high scorer with 16 points while the Whelchel brothers combined for 23 points.
Prairiland plays at home Friday night against the Mt. Vernon Tigers. Prairiland's JV boys easily defeated Daingerfield's JV boys by a score of 77-44 last Tuesday night. The JV boys are now 3-0 in district.
Toni Dockray led all scorers with a game high 22 points to give the Lady Patriots a 51-46 victory over the Paul Pewitt Lady Brahms. Not only did they win, but they won the first half of their district competition with a perfect 5-0 record.
J. Griffin gave the Lady Brahms an early lead with a lay-up at the 7:30 mark. Prairiland's Melissa LaRue answered with two of her first quarter eight points. Next, Dockray hit two jumpers for the Lady Pats; however, E. Pate sank two buckets to even up the game at 6-6. LaRue dropped in six

more points to give Prairiland a 14-10 lead at the end of the first quarter.
Dockray nailed two jumpshots at the beginning of the second quarter to give the Lady Patriots an 18-12 lead. Pewitt's Y. Knox hit six points to try to keep the Lady Brahms in the game. Dana Bradford sank five points for the Lady Pats to give them a 27-20 lead. Prairiland's Stephanie Upton scored four points, including a 16-foot jumper at the buzzer, to give the Lady Patriots their biggest lead of the game, 31-22 at the half.
Although Pate scored six straight points for the Lady Brahms in the third quarter, Dockray answered with eight more points for Prairiland. The Lady Patriots again kept a nine point lead over Paul Pewitt, 43-34 at the end of the third quarter.
Pewitt's Pate scored five of her 17 points in the fourth quarter. But that wasn't enough as Toni Dockray made a lay-up at the :35 mark that gave the Lady Patriots a 51-46 win over the Brahms.
Dockray was high scorer for the Lady Pats with a game high 22 points. LaRue and Bradford added 12 and 9 points respectively.
For Paul Pewitt, Pate dropped in 17 points, and teammate Knox added 12 points.
The Prairiland girls won their fourth district game last Tuesday night over the Daingerfield Tigertettes, 36-33. Amy Scudder, Melissa LaRue and Dana Bradford scored 10 points each.
In the JV girls' action, they defeated the Paul Pewitt JV girls 25-24. The Prairiland JV girls are also undefeated with a 5-0 district record.
Both girls teams host the Mt. Vernon Tigertettes Friday night starting at 5 p.m.

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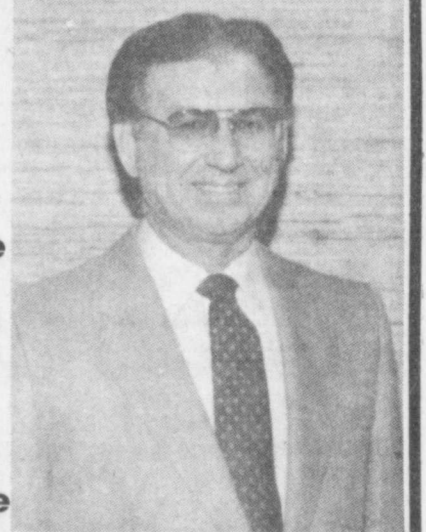
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Dear Friends:


