## More News, Better News

### Some Ideas To Help Paper Contributors

The papers are starting a campaign to get people to contribute more locals. Our renewals this Christmas sale were gratifying, and one of the suggestions we received from a number of out of town subscribers was that we try and receive more "Locals" as that is how they keep up with "home folks".

There are also a number of "do's and don'ts" about turning in news items, which follow here.

We appreciate our readers and contributors more than you can ever know...but these are just a few explanations of why we must have deadlines, and of ways that can help everyone to get the news in a clear, correct manner.

Unlike larger papers, we tend to be really flexible, bending deadlines for important items, accepting handwritten material, etc.

But there are a few things that would help us to serve our readers better.

Some of the "do's" are: Do send in your news. Never assume that someone else will do it...or that we will automatically "know" that an event is happening. We would much rather have something turned in twice than to miss it altogether.

Do call and ask us questions if you need to.

Political announcements have only to be turned in, we will run any legitimate announcement once, with photo. After that all further political information will be considered advertising. We run these announcements as they are submitted...there is no ulterior motive or candidate support in them.

We will run any news item no matter how small it might seem...please turn them in.

Birth announcements are very much welcome, but they will be printed, as they always have been, in a standard form. If something special like "there's a new buckaroo at the

ranch house" is desired, it must be paid for as an ad.

Some of the "don'ts" are: We don't publish poetry. Sometimes some really beautiful poems are submitted, but if we were to run all the poems we receive, there would be no room for anything else.

Please realize that we cannot run copies of syndicated columns such as "Dear Abby" or "Ann Landers" or editorials run in other papers. It is very illegal for us to do so as newspapers pay big money for the right to use them, and don't want us "cannibalizing" for them.

Please don't send pictures that have been run through a copy machine. We have to have a clear photograph, which we, in turn, take a picture of. This picture is called a "half-tone" and has tiny dots which are necessary for the picture to reproduce for the paper.

Please don't write on the back of a piece of paper, it complicates matters

for us, and can easily result in something being left out. Please don't write in pencil, use a clearly legible pen, as it decreases eye strain.

Please don't send letters that have no signature or signed "Hot in Hattsville" or "Concerned Citizen" we will not run them, no matter how pertinent they are or how much we may agree with them.

Letters which commit outright slander won't be run whether there is a signature or not.

Do try and remember that we have a deadline. It's sometimes hard for people to realize just how much work goes into getting these papers out. For instance, one piece of copy (say a wedding) comes in to the office.

It must be edited, then a headline written for it. The picture that comes with it must be sent to the dark room for a half-tone to be made of it. The story must be typeset on the computer. It must be run through the

computer, developed in the processor, dried on the dryer, and the excess paper trimmed from the ends and edges. Then it is run through a waxing machine and put on a table for use in the page make-up process. It all takes a lot of time, and news should be in by Tuesday noon at the latest.

Wednesday morning we make up the pages, shoot them on a big camera, develop the negatives in big trays, hang them to dry, opague them (mark out blemishes) and take them to Paris, where they are printed. They must be in Paris by noon on Wednesday to be printed in time for Wednesday night newsstand release and stamping for the post office.

We truly want to avoid mistakes, but sometimes handwriting is difficult to decipher, and sometimes we simply DO make mistakes. If it is truly a serious mistake, we will print a correction.

We appreciate all our readers, and want to make a better paper week by week.

## Ladd, Newman Selected As Mr. & Ms. PHS

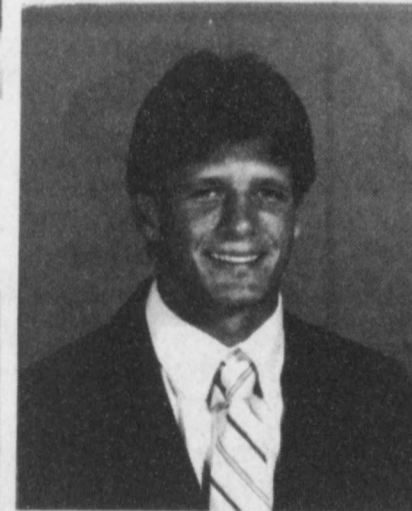

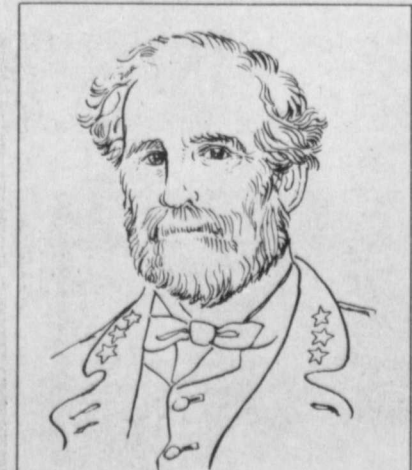

# Ten Days In The Life Of A Missionary

Editors Note: Fred Allen, a long time missionary in Zambia, Africa, has generously provided us with this interesting chronicle of life as a missionary. It will be run in several parts, with this being the first of them.

Life on a mission field is never dull. From time to time, a number of events take place which are particularly interesting, and according to some who observed them, deserve to be shared with others. With that in mind I decided to narrate the events which took place during a 10 day period in late 1987 in Zambia.

Saturday, November 28, 1987  
My wife, Joy, and I attended the graduation of 10 students from our Baptist Theological Seminary in the capital city of Lusaka, in the afternoon. It was a beautiful ceremony which was held in the new Multi-Purpose Building of International Schol. Special music was presented by the Senior Gospel Choir of Chawama Baptist Church and the Seminary Choir. Missionary Tom Small brought the main message. He and his wife, Mary, received special recognition for their 28 years of service in Zambia. They'll retire from Zambia in 1988.

That night around 8 o'clock I received a call from Ross Collier, Southern Baptist Missionary serving in Malawi, the country just east of Zambia. He was in Lusaka to show support for the couple from Malawi who were graduating from our seminary. He called me to say he had been robbed and forced at gunpoint to drive all over Lusaka and out in the rural "bush" for more than an hour. Apparently the man had planned to steal the VW Kombi Ross was driving, but when Ross pointed out that the vehicle would be easy for the police to find since it had foreign license plates, he just demanded Ross's money instead. When the man finally ordered Ross to stop and let him out, it was in a totally unfamiliar place to Ross. Finally, he found his way to the hotel where we found him after he called and asked for help. Bill Trautman, a volunteer missionary from Illinois, went with me to meet Ross and drive Ross's vehicle for him. He was not hurt, but quite shaken up.

Once we were safely back in a missionary residence, we gathered together to have a prayer meeting and to thank God for sparing Ross's life. I gave him 200 kwacha (about \$25) to replace that which the armed robber took. I used the last of the money which Cunningham Baptist Church in Cunningham, Texas, had sent to us.

Sunday, November 29, 1987  
Joy and I took Bill and Mary Dean Phillips to the airport for their trip back to Harare, Zimbabwe. They had come for the graduation. Bill is the Associate to the Area Director for Central Africa. We then attended the early service at Venter Baptist Church which is located near the airport turnoff.

After lunch at home Joy and I, with four other missionaries, drove 30 miles south to Kafue to assist in the questioning and ordination of Pastor Thomas Lumba of Bethel Baptist Church there. It was beautiful service, with much singing by the congregation, and choirs and stirring messages from several speakers, including Moses Chimfumpa, David Parker and Tom Small.

We returned to Lusaka too late to attend the non-denominational service of Woodlands Fellowship, so we just went home and enjoyed our usual Sunday night treat: Popcorn!

Monday, November 30, 1987  
This being the end of the month we were very busy in the Mission Treasurer's Office, preparing the monthly checks and other materials for the various ministries in the Mission. At 3:30 in the afternoon I received a call from Missionary Wanda Brown in Petauke, located 250 miles east of Lusaka. She said Ross Collier (the missionary who had been robbed in Lusaka) had just arrived at their house having received a ride from a

motorist going toward Malawi. The fan belt had broken on his VW and he was not able to get a ride back to Lusaka, so he hitched a ride to Petauke so he could call Lusaka for help. I waked Wanda where the Kusowa Family was, and she said "They're in the vehicle with their four children, it's located about 90 miles east of Lusaka." I asked what they were planning to do, for I knew it was not safe for them to spend the night on that onely highway where thieves so often rob and do harm to stranded motorists. She shared with me how tired her husband, Delos was, for he had spent the day driving a 3 ton truck through rough terrain, delivering roofing materials to churches, and didn't think he could make a round trip to pick up the Kusowas and the vehicle without some rest. Also, Ross was still in a state of shock after the robbery, and didn't feel he could make the drive after dark. I told Wanda I would try to work something out.

I described the situation to Bill Trautman, our business manager, I said "Bill, I can't leave that family out there on that dangerous highway all night." He asked "What are you going to do?" I said "If I can get one other missionary to go with me, we'll take a new fan belt, put it on the VW and drive both vehicles on to Petauke". He agreed to help, and we left the office to make preparations to go.

We got together tools, sleeping bags, food, water, various sizes of fan belts, flashlights, extra cans of fuel, towing rope and other things which we thought might be useful to us. By 5:30 we were on the road.

Some of our neighbors couldn't believe we were heading out of town for such a long drive at such a late hour. But I said "We can't leave the Kusowa Family out on that highway all night".

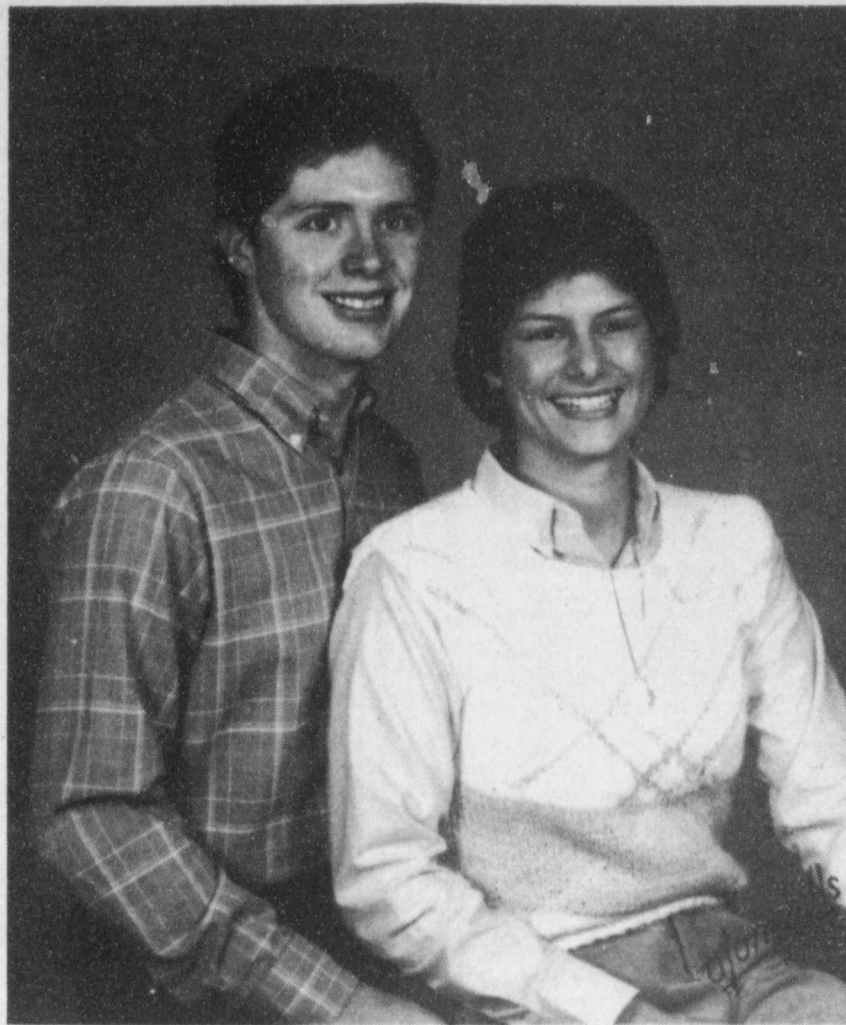
As a rule we don't travel at night, particularly on the highways, because it is so dangerous.

Stalled vehicles, especially trucks and buses, are left overnight right in the lane, and cannot be seen when coming headlights are blinding. Chug holes and dips or bumps are hard to see at night, and if a breakdown occurs there is no highway patrol or phone available to help.

Bill and I reached the VW just after dark, around 7 p.m. It was many miles from any house or village. I drove up behind the vehicle, blinked my lights and blew my horn. No one moved in the VW. I was concerned, but suspected they were afraid. I opened the door and called Brother Kusowa by name, telling him who I was. Immediately the door opened and out he came. He saw me and rushed to me, shaking my hand with both hands. He was so relieved to see Bill and me, for he was afraid we were robbers. His wife and their four lovely children got out to greet us too. We shared food and water, as their supply was already exhausted.

Bill and I began putting on the new fan belt, only to find that some mechanic in the past had used a liquid weld to assure that the bolt holding the alternator held tight. It worked! In fact, we finally were forced to use a hammer, hack saw, lock pliers and other tools before we finally broke it loose. Then, we found none of the fan belts would fit! We realized that we were going to have to use some MacGyver-type ingenuity or spend the night on the road. To make a long story short, we managed to bend the brace considerably and fit a new bolt with two nuts in just the right place to maintain the proper tension on the fan belt. (Move Over, MacGyver!)

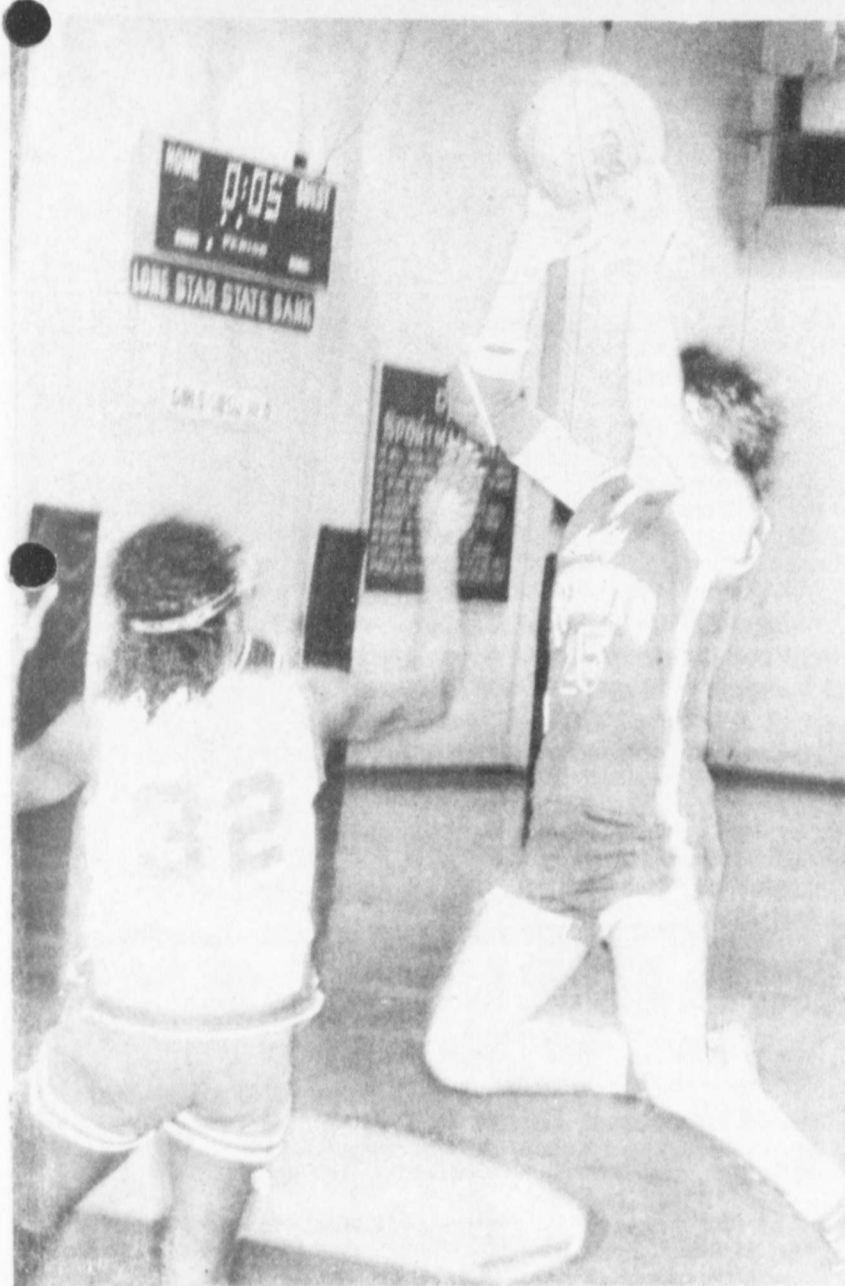
Kindle led all scorers with 23 pints, while Jackson and Joseph Whelchel added 9 and 8 points respectively.

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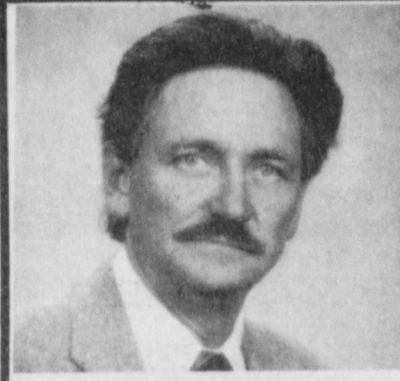

## Burglary Is Crime Of Week

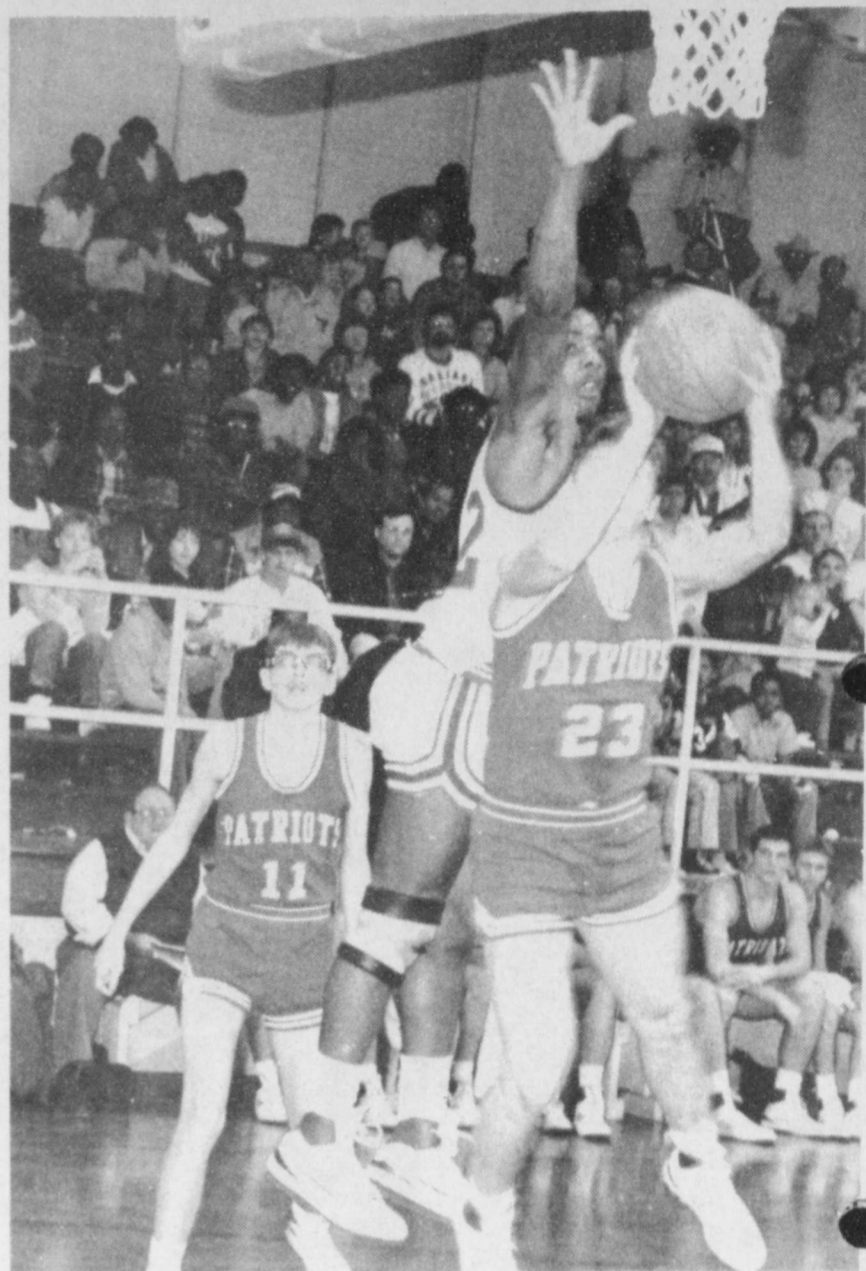
