## Prairiland FFA Teaches Valuable Skills

This is National FFA Week across the nation. All across the country, Future Farmers of America are observing "their" week and Prairiland FFA is no different.

A trip to the Prairiland Ag Shop and classroom complex reveals just how important and successful the program is.

There are 165 members in the program this year, which features an ag mechanics class, a co-op program and Ag I, II, III and IV.

In the courses they take, they learn skills which will last them through their entire lives.

Learning to build a small shop, rockerless rocking chairs, barbecue grills, entire stock trailers, or even a simple potato bin or birdhouse establishes carpentry skills that will be with the students forever. The knowledge of power tools, the ability

to measure, calculate and plan can be applied to almost any project, from building a house to rewiring a porch!

Basic knowledge of electricity and wiring serves young men and women well in a society so dependent upon electrical appliances.

Painting, welding, planning and the cost of livestock projects, feed costs, amounts of feed used, all these skills are every day knowledge that is invaluable.

Besides the knowledge of breed histories, bookkeeping, biology and

the world of other useful information that the students learn, they also strengthen their ability to function in a competitive world.

The learn speaking skills, compete in livestock shows which do much to improve confidence and self-esteem.

Among the awards the chapter has captured recently is having a State Greenhand Award and the Chapter Farmer Skills Award.

The Farm Radio Team was second in Area competition, and the Greenhand Chapter Conducting Team won sixth at area.

Last November, the chapter received the Silver Chapter Rating Award at the National Convention.

This past summer there were 13 Lone Star Farmer recipients.

The young adults put on their own livestock show in April, along with a stew cookoff and meal, auction (which features items they have made) and a pig wrestling. The proceeds from these activities pay for the chapter's expenses.

FFA is overall a comprehensive, interesting and learning experience.

At the shop, the radio may be blaring, there may be a lot of laughter and eagerness, but their hands and minds are always very busy...creating, their minds are stimulated. Future Farmers is not just for those who are considering a life in the agricultural field, it is for any young person who wants to improve his life...to function at a high level in life...to be self-sustaining, confident and a well rounded human being.

FFA, and all those who assist or participate, deserve a big "Well Done" in this, their week.

## Lady Pats Defeated In Bi-District Bid

Quitman's Lady Bulldogs, led by Jennifer Clark, turned a four-point lead into a 19-point lead in a matter of minutes as they defeated Prairiland's Lady Patriots, 66-45, at Sulphur Springs Friday night. Although the Lady Pats lost, they finished with a 16-13 season record and the champions of District 13AAA with a record of 9-1.

Melissa LaRue, who had a very good night with 17 points, gave the Lady Patriots a 2-0 lead at the 7:15 mark with a 10-foot jumpshot; however, Quitman's Clark and Kristy Bowen hit some nice jumpers to give the Bulldogettes the lead. LaRue scored nine points in the first quarter, and Toni Dockray dropped in the rest of the points for the Lady Patriots as they trailed, 14-13, after one quarter of play.

In the second quarter, Sheila Speir gave Prairiland a 16-15 lead as she nailed a 3-pointer at the 6:05 mark. The Bulldogettes ran off six unanswered points to give themselves a 21-16 lead. The Lady Patriots battled back and tied the game at 21-21 with Dockray's two free throws. The Lady Pats trailed 27-23 at the half.

The third quarter was a disaster for the Lady Pats, scoring only six points in the eight minutes of action, while their opponents managed a 21-point performance. Again it was Clark that led the Bulldogettes in scoring with

seven points. Her teammates, Lisa Langhoff and Bowen, each added four more points. The 21-6 differential gave Quitman a 48-29 lead at the end of the third quarter.

LaRue scored four points and Dockray scored eight points, including six straight points for the Lady Patriots; however, Misti Darby and Clark combined for ten points to give Quitman a 66-45 victory.

Melissa LaRue led the Prairiland scoring with 17 points while Toni Dockray added 14 points. For the Bulldogettes, Jennifer Clark scored a game high 19 points, while Bowen and Darby dropped in 13 and 10 points respectively.

The Prairiland boys play Thursday night when they meet Brownsboro Bears at Sulphur Springs. Time of the game is pending.

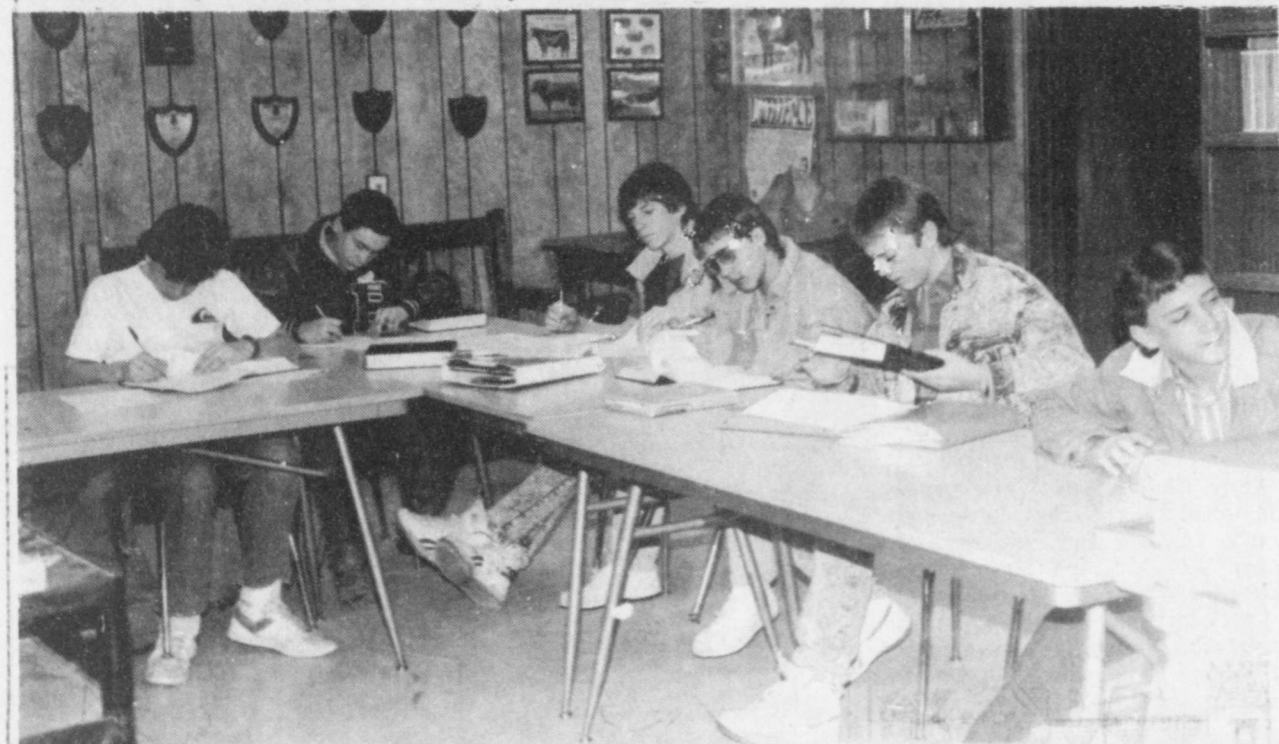

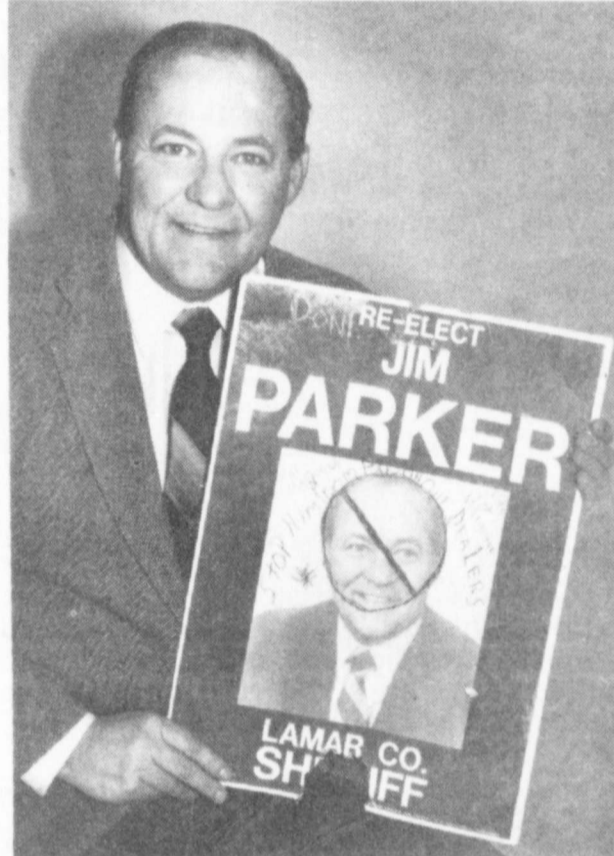

Prairiland AgScience To Have New Curriculum

The Prairiland Agriscience Department will begin the entire new curriculum, adopted by the State Board of Education next year. There will no longer be courses such as VoAg I, II, III and IV. The new curriculum will consist of semester courses instead of year long courses. These semester courses will be chosen from the following list of courses.

These courses are the courses adopted by the State Board of Education.

AGSC 101, A basic introductory course designed to introduce beginning students in Agricultural Science to global agriculture. This is a ninth grade level course.

AGSC 102, A ninth grade level course designed to enhance the agricultural comprehension of beginning students.

AGSC 221, Introduction To Agricultural Mechanics, A 10-12 grade level course designed to familiarize the student with basic theory and specialized skills in the areas of tool I.D., carpentry, electricity, plumbing, masonry, fencing, painting, metal working and welding processes.

AGSC 222, Home Maintenance and Improvement, A 10-12 grade level course designed to prepare students to improve and maintain the urban or rural home and adjacent buildings.

AGSC 231, Animal and Plant Pro-

duction, A 10-12 grade level course designed to include principles of animal and plant production and the management of soils as related to agriculture.

AGSC 261, Introduction to Horticultural Sciences, A 10-12 grade level course designed to introduce students to horticultural sciences with emphasis on technical skills, entrepreneurship, and occupational opportunities.

AGSC 321, Agricultural Structures Technology, A 10-12 grade level course preparing students to maintain, evaluate, design and build agricultural structures using approved construction techniques.

AGSC 322, Agricultural Metal Fabrication Technology, A 10-12 grade level course to develop skills in metal equipment assembly and joining processes.

AGSC 323, Agricultural Power Technology, A 10-12 grade level course designed to develop skills in selection of small air-cooled engines, multi-cylinder engines, hydraulic motors, electric motors and agricultural machinery and tractors.

AGSC 332, Animal Science, A 10-12 grade level course designed to develop knowledge and skills pertaining to the nutrition, reproduction, health and management of domestic animals.

AGSC 333, Plant and Soil Science, A 10-12 level course designed to examine soil and plant relationships that affect the production of food and fiber.

AGSC 334, Equine Science, A 10-12 grade level course designed to develop knowledge and skills pertaining to the selection, nutrition, reproduction, health and management of horses.

AGSC 361, Landscape Design, Construction and Maintenance, A 10-12 grade level course that prepares students to design, construct, and maintain planted areas and devices for the beautification of home grounds

and other areas of human habitation and recreation.


AGSC 362, Horticultural Plant Production, A 10-12 grade level course that prepares students to produce greenhouse/nursery plants and to maintain plant growth and propagation structures.

AGSC 381, Wildlife and Recreation Management, A 10-12 grade level course designed to examine the importance of wildlife and outdoor recreation with emphasis on using wildlife and natural resources.

AGSC 422, Agricultural Mechanics, An 11-12 grade level shop/laboratory oriented course including the essential agribusiness elements and the concepts and skills related to agricultural mechanics.

Ag-Coop, An 11-12 grade level class providing the student with on the job training in some field of agriculture. This course will be the same as it has been in the past.

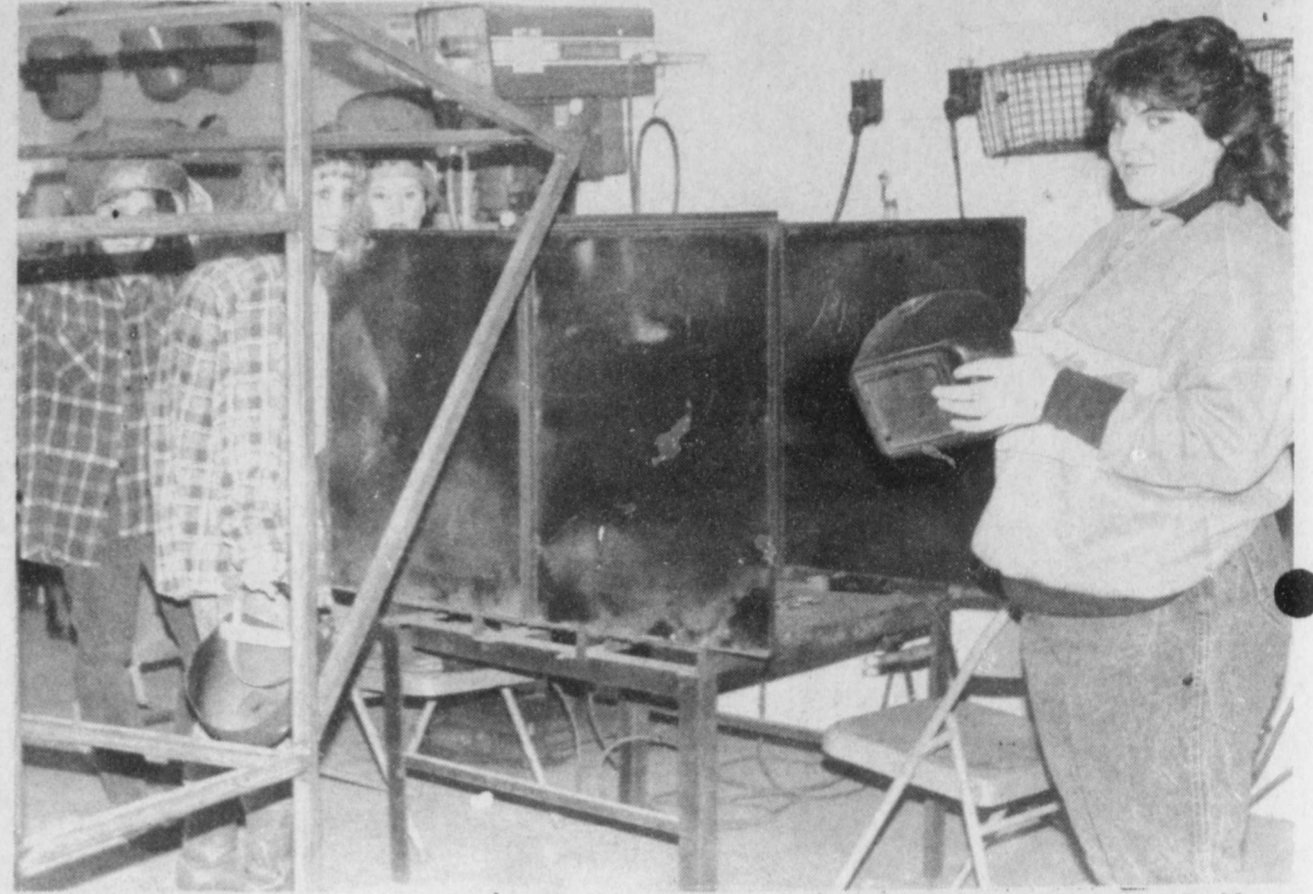

**Crime Stoppers Clear Cases**

In the month of January, Lamar County Crime Stoppers in association with the Lamar County Sheriff's Office and the Paris Police Department made 6 felony arrests, cleared 19 felony cases, recovered \$17,200.00 in stolen property and seized drugs and approved \$1,650 in cash rewards.

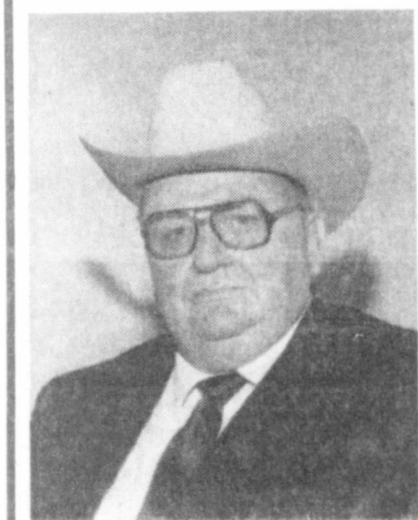
### Gardeness Getting "Itchy"

By Herb Brevard  
Avid gardeners are getting itchy to begin activities, says Dr. George Philley, plant pathologist. Two important considerations in planting gardens are selecting varieties adapted to the area and waiting until the soil temperature is warm enough for that particular vegetable.  
Philley says that if planted too early, certain vegetables may be killed, severely stunted or made susceptible to diseases. Irish potatoes are a good example of disease susceptibility. After Irish potatoes are cut for planting, the pieces should be allowed to suberize or heal over for at least 24 hours. This helps protect the potato

piece from diseases that are present in the soil.

Other seed may be treated with a fungicide before planting to help in disease prevention. Some seed suppliers offer seed that have been treated with a fungicide. Disease prevention is easier to accomplish than to cure a disease after it has attacked the vegetable.

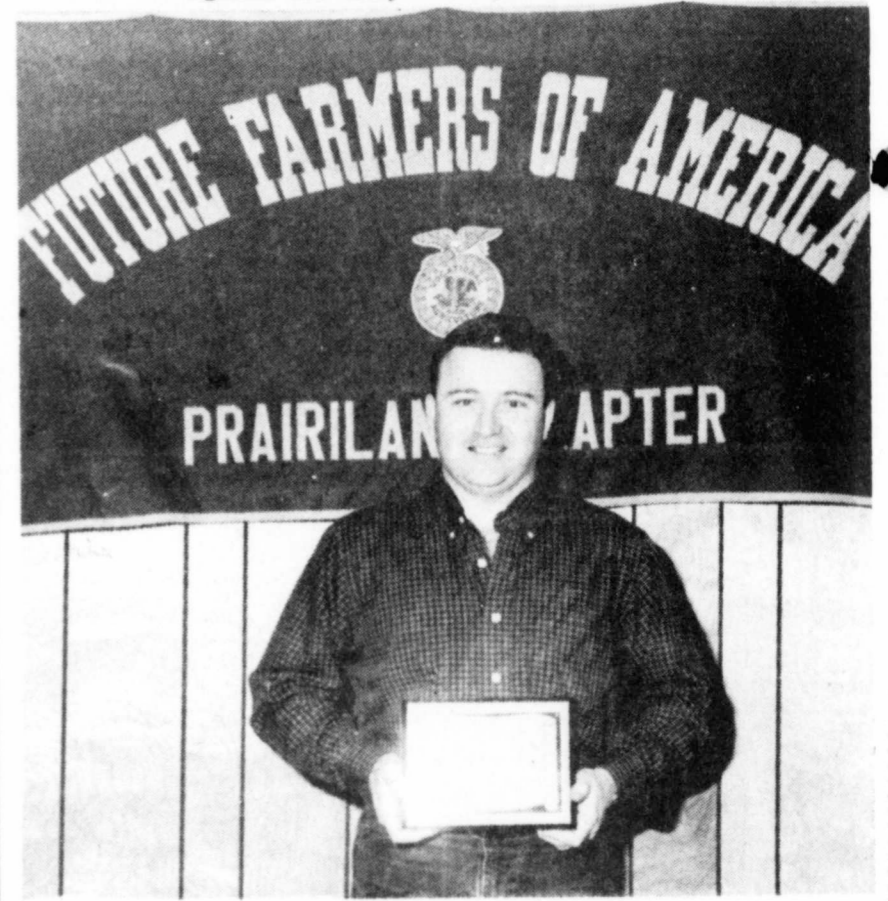
Philley cautions not to rush the planting season. Warm season vegetables will not grow fast in cool soil. Seeding disease losses could mandate replanting. Generally, vegetables planted at the correct time catch up with those planted too early.

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
