Commissioner, Constable Candidates Answer Questions

About 50 people turned out at Prairiland High School Cafeteria on Thursday, February 18 for a candidate forum hosted by Dan Tatum.

The forum was for the commissioners and constable candidates of Lamar County Precinct 1. The forum focused on topics such as the new county jail, budget and taxes. This was the third forum to be hosted for these candidates in Lamar County.

The commissioners that attended the forum were Ernie Sparks, Hugh Pope, Dean Watson, Eugene Norwood, T.L. Owens and Clarence Malone. Constables attending were Leon Whitsell, Greg Griffin, Randy Boren and Al Parks. Not attending the forum were Virgil Seats and Gene Brown.

A series of questions concerning the commissioners were asked. The first question asked was "Do you support the building of a new jail?" Clarence Malone replied "No, if the county grows, a jail will need to be built, but not now." Troy Owens said "I need to have time to study the documents on that. I am not in favor of building a jail for the sake of building a jail." Hugh Pope said "I have to look at the recommendations from the committee, county judge, jail commission before commenting on that. I hope the money spent on the jail renovation is not wasted." Eugene Norwood said "I need to sit in on a jail committee meeting and study it real close." Ernie Sparks replied, "I have read letters from the jail commission and commissioner's court pertaining to the jail standards and feel the county should have renovated the old jail in 1986 and looked into a long term plan. If we had to have a new jail, if the fourth and fifth floors could hold us for five years, it would give us time to look at the long term plan and save the taxpayers money." Dean Watson said, "Yes, and no. Most candidates are not familiar with all the aspects enough to decide at this time."

The second question asked was "Would you support a movement to limit expenditures of all department heads in their respective 1988 budgets and every year thereafter?" Clarence Malone said yes. Dean Watson said yes. Troy Owens said "That's what you set a budget for." Hugh Pope said "Each department should manage as if it were their own money." Eugene Norwood said yes. Ernie Sparks said "We need to live within our means, that's what a budget is for, but you need a miscellaneous fund for holding trials that might need to be raised such as murder, etc."

The third question asked was "If elected, would you support raising taxes or vote bond issues as long as the economy is like it is?" Clarence Malone said "Depends on the circumstances." Dean Watson said "Give careful consideration to it." Troy Owens said "Not in favor of raising taxes unless it is an emergency." Hugh Pope said "As long as the economy is in a slump, we need to manage with the present budget we have now." Eugene Norwood said, "I would not". Ernie Sparks said "I would not, people can hardly pay their taxes now."

The fourth question was "What roads are a major priority?" Clarence Malone said "The school bus routes and mail routes." Dean Watson replied, "The school bus routes and mail routes." Troy Owens replied, "Bus and mail routes are important but people who live on county roads need consideration, too." Hugh Pope said "Any county road with a high density of population, a school bus or mail route or a linking road is important." Ernie Sparks replied, "All roads are important, of course bus and mail routes are important."

Question number five was "Do you feel it is necessary for the commissioners court to listen to what the people have to say?" All the candidates replied "Yes" to the question.

The sixth question was "Where is the most important time a commissioner spends?" Troy Owens said "Serving on the Commissioner's Court." Hugh Pope said "In the courthouse." Eugene Norwood said "In the courthouse." Ernie Sparks said "The most important time for a commissioner is the time he spends with the people."

The first constable's question asked was to briefly outline the most important items of violations that needed to be corrected.

Al Parks replied, "We have all crimes going on, with drugs, that no one man can handle by himself. If you don't have help, you can't do much."

Leon Whitsell said "Criminal mischief and probably drugs."

Randy Boren said "Burglaries, and drug problems and criminal mischief."

Greg Griffin said "We have crimes constantly changing, but we now have burglaries, criminal mischief and drugs."

The second question asked was "How do you plan to police the precinct?" Parks' answer was "Just as I have in the past." Whitsell's answer was "Take it as it comes, whatever it takes." Randy Boren stated, "I will be available 24 hours a day, people can call day or night and I will be out working." Greg Griffin said "Police the precinct by changing patrol hours."

The third question was, "Do you realize you work for the taxpayers of this precinct?"

All candidates affirmed that they did realize that.

The fourth question was, "When violations are obvious, how do you propose to pursue them, in a passive or active manner?"

Al Parks stated "Active." Whitsell said "If in my view I presume I would arrest the one violating. If not in my view, I guess I would have to get a warrant for his arrest, but I'd say he would be arrested."

Randy Boren said "I would handle in a professional manner the way I've been trained in school, and make good reports so that if something comes back there would be a good report to bounce back on."

Greg Griffin said "Make arrests and if dispatched, make investigations."

The fifth question was "What is the constable's salary?" Al Parks said it was \$1,025 per month. Whitsell said "I don't know, I'll take Al's word for it." Randy Boren stated that it was \$1,020 per month, plus 21 cents per mile and the county paid for 1,000 miles automatically, which is \$210 plus 21 cents for every mile logged over that."

Greg Griffin, too, was satisfied with the salary of the position. He added that if a man wanted to earn more money he could work at a plant.

The next question asked was "Would you be satisfied with the salary or complain about salaries not being sufficient to properly execute duties and severely curtail efforts to enforce the law?"

Parks said he had never complained about salary, he knew what it paid when he ran for office.

Whitsell replied that he would be satisfied with the salary.

Boren, too, expressed that he was satisfied with the salary as it was.

Griffin, too, was satisfied with the amount paid.

After answering the questions, each candidate was given two to three minutes to tell why he is running for the position and their qualifications. The forum lasted about 90 minutes.

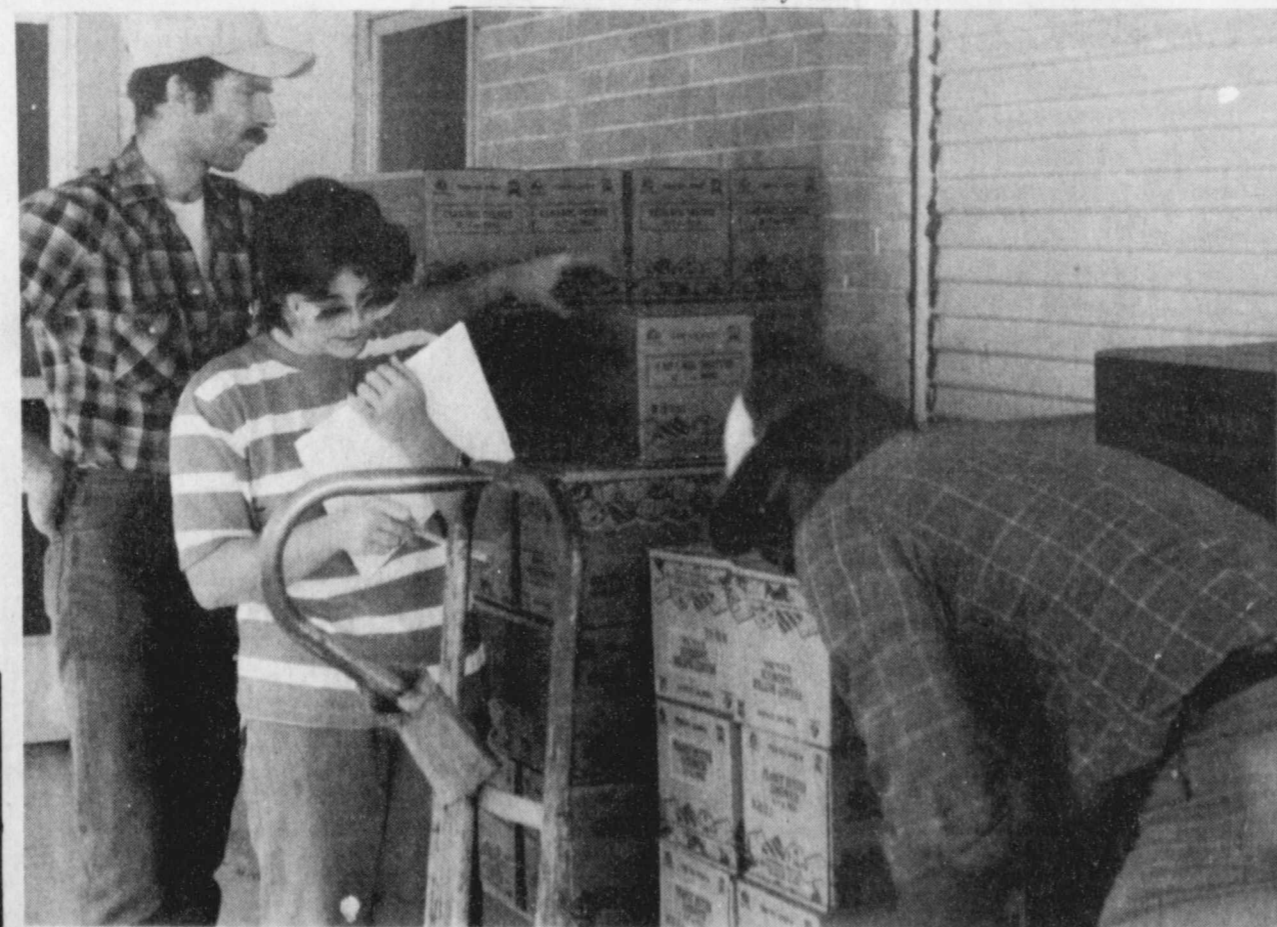
Gordon Isbell To Be Write-In Candidate For Chairman

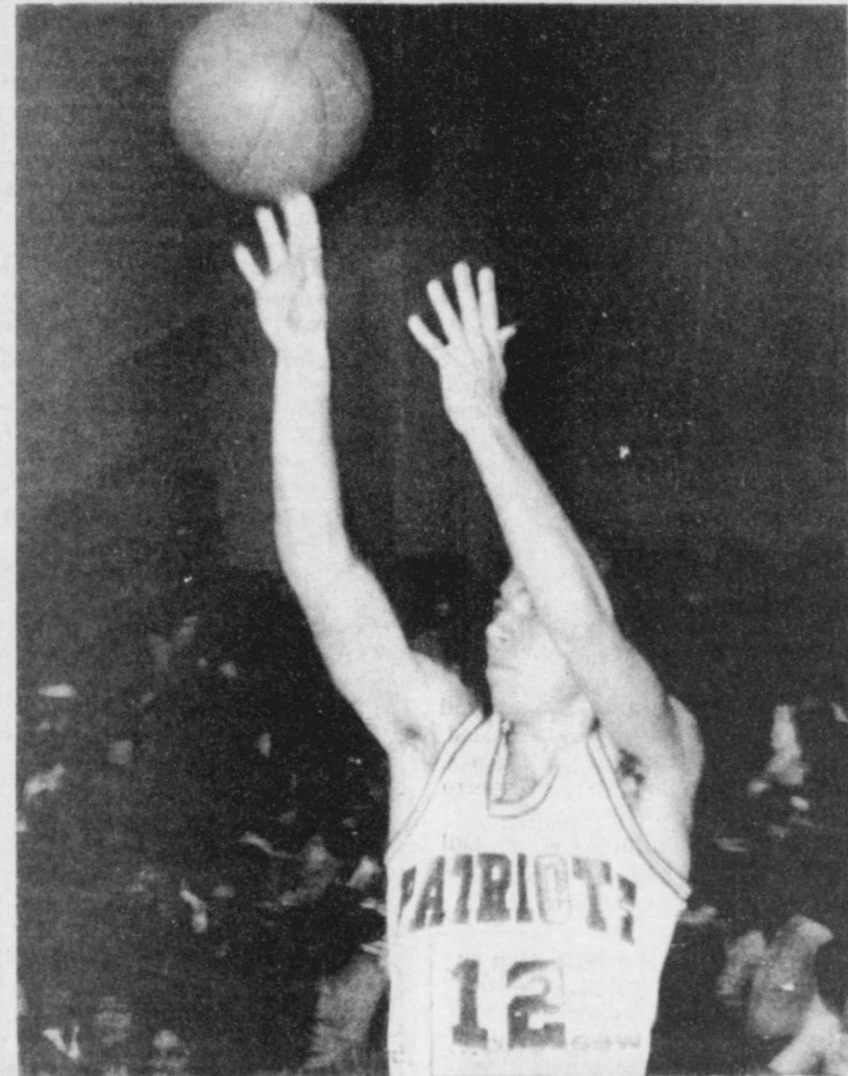

lead at the end of the first quarter.

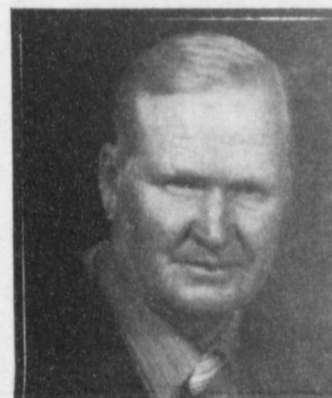

Ten Days In The Life Of A Missionary

The Choir Festival began at 2:00 p.m., and I was one of the judges of the choirs and small groups who were to sing. After about eight choirs and five small groups sang so beautifully, we then had time for my message which I was to have delivered in the morning. The festival was closed after all participating music groups received their certificates. Those at the conference were having a three-day meeting consisting of Bible studies, prayer, preaching and much

good music.

We left the Music Conference and returned to Kitwe where I had planned to stay in a missionary residence which was vacant except for some bare sheds. I dropped Aaron Kowa, a music worker, off and then went to the residence of the Norton family to get a key for the house where I was to stay. I had helped the Nortons, who are missionaries with the Four Square Gospel Church, when they first arrived in Zambia in October, by securing their employment permit from the Government and meeting them at the airport and arranging lodging for them in our Baptist Guest House. Perhaps that's why they were so nice in providing sheets, blankets and a pillow for my bed, and inviting me for supper and breakfast with them. We enjoyed delicious food and warm fellowship with them. Soon after supper I went to bed and slept very soundly, for I had had only two hours sleep since Thursday night!

Sunday, December 6, 1987
 After a delicious breakfast with the Nortons, I picked up Pastor Edwin Mukumbo and we were on our way to the rural area off the Solwezi Highway in Northwestern Province, about 80 miles from Kitwe. We arrived at the small village church before they started their services, and they danced and sang as we off-loaded the roofing material which they needed so very much, as the rains had now started and their church was built up to the roof.

We drove ten miles further west on the Solwezi Highway to worship with Mutende Baptist Church, whose pastor is Reverend Lumba, the father of Thomas, whom we had helped to ordain to the Gospel Ministry the previous Sunday. Although their service had already started, Brother Lumba gave us a royal welcome.

Pastor Lumba asked me to bring the message. Well, I felt like I should decline since I knew he had already prepared to preach, and I knew also that I had only one sermon with me at that time: the one I had preached at the Music Conference the previous day. Nevertheless, he insisted and I agreed. After much good music, I preached as best I could, speaking through an interpreter, since the Zambian language which I speak, Nyanja, could not be understood there. I preached in English.

As I had felt so often before on this trip, God was in charge! When the invitation was given, people started coming to make public decisions for Christ. I was overwhelmed as more and more people came. Of the 60 or

so who were present, 42 made decisions for Christ!

Seven came on profession of faith in Christ as their Saviour; three young men accepted God's call to the Pastoral Ministry; four ladies accepted God's call to special service in His Kingdom; one asked to join that church from another denomination; three moved their membership from another Baptist Church; and 24 made rededications of their lives to Christ.

It was a humbling experience, for I know I am not a strong preacher, and I had only one sermon ready that day; but God in His great power, used what little I did to touch the hearts of all those people. Not only were their hearts touched, but my heart was greatly blessed also, as God reminded me of how He can bring victory in times of adversity and difficulty if we stay true to Him and trust in Him completely, giving Him our best at all times.

We ate corn mush (nshima) and impala for lunch that day in Pastor Lumba's home. He and his dear wife were most gracious to receive us into their home. Some of their 15 children were there and were a real joy. In fact, two of them, along with two of their cousins, returned with me to Lusaka, three of them riding in the back all the way!

As we left Pastor Lumba's home, I was so thrilled by the wonderful service and the warm reception by the good pastor and his family that I told Edwin to get the Gospel tracts and Scripture portions ready, because I wanted to give a free ride to as many people along the road as possible and to give them tracts and a few words of encouragement. We stopped dozens of times until we reached Kitwe, helping many people and sharing Christian literature.

When we reached Kitwe on Sunday afternoon, I asked Edwin where I could find some food to buy and take home for breakfast. Also, I asked him to take me to the place where he thought I might find the three young men who had robbed me, for I wanted to witness to them about Jesus. We found some food for my breakfast, but we did not find those men.

I dropped Edwin off at his home and thanked him for his great help. He led us in a prayer of thanksgiving to God for the wonderful way He had worked that weekend. Several of his children joined us in this prayer in his front yard. It was a beautiful fellowship with a fine Christian family.

As I returned to the Norton's home, I offered to take them out to eat, but they did not know a place in town where we could eat since they were

new in town. So we ate at their home and again fellowshiped together. Soon I was ready for another good night of sleep in the vacant house nearby. I called Joy in Lusaka for the third time that weekend to assure her that I was all right and to let her know I missed her.

Monday, December 7, 1987
 I picked up the Lumba children from Pastor Mukumbo's house where they had spent the night, for they were going to Lusaka with me. I stopped by the Baptist Office to take care of some music business with Aaron; then we began our journey for Lusaka about 10 a.m. I told the two who were riding in the cab with me to get the tracts and Scriptures ready, for I wanted to help those people along the way who needed transportation. That's what we did; picking up people who were looking for a ride.

We stopped in the small town of Kapiri Mposhi where I had planned to buy some samoosas, one of my favorite Indian foods in Zambia, for my lunch. I was disappointed to find that the only food they had ready to serve was plain cake and sausages, cold drinks and cookies. That was the first time I had made a meal of sausage and a piece of cake! The children riding with me had brought plenty of food for their journey.

As I returned to my truck, I found a crowd of people waiting to ask for a lift to Kabwe (35 miles) or Lusaka (125 miles). One man had four large, heavy boxes which he requested to take along and I agreed. He was extremely happy. I dropped off a large number of people at Kabwe, giving each of them literature. They were most grateful. Then, I replaced them with others along the way who were going to Lusaka.

Finally, in the late afternoon, I reached Lusaka and drove by the city market to drop off those riding with me. We gave literature to them and urged them to go to church the next Sunday. But the one man with the four large boxes asked me to take him a few blocks further where his brother worked. His brother had a car to help him with his boxes. I agreed to help him, although it was some blocks out of my way. After he lifted off his last box, he asked me to wait. He opened one of those boxes and brought me a beautiful little glass on which was printed, Merry Christmas and Happy New Year. He handed it to me and said, "I want to give this to you to say thank you for helping me so much." What a beautiful climax to a beautiful 10 days in the life of a missionary! I arrived home just before a huge cloudburst hit Lusaka. I was tired but very happy that God had chosen to bless me so very much during the last 10 days.

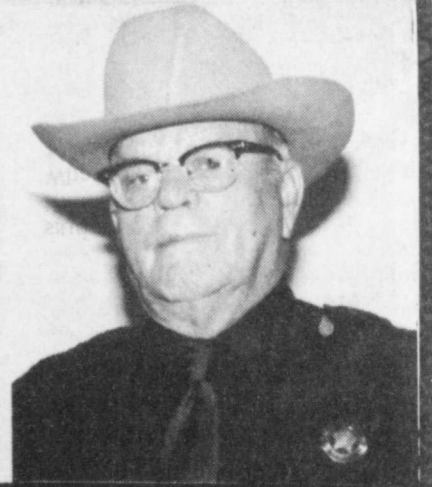

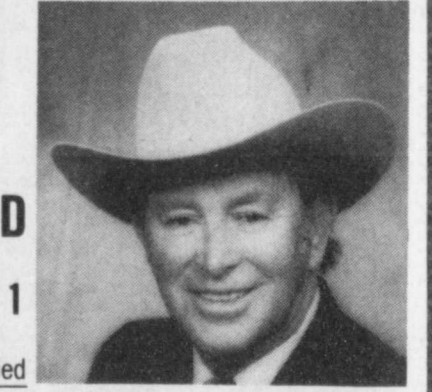
