## Most Area Sales Taxes Show Drop

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Wednesday that 54 cities and 81 counties that collect a half-percent local option sales tax will receive their first rebates from the tax in this month's sales tax allocation.

"Local governments whose voters adopted this tax will find extra money in this month's check," Bullock said. City rebates from the new tax are included in the monthly allocation checks Bullock mails to cities that col-

lect the optional one-percent city tax. County checks are sent at the same time.

March's checks also include rebates from two services that became taxable on January 1, data processing and real property repair and remodeling, Bullock said.

This month's rebates totaling \$52.4 million were sent to 834 cities and 81 counties that collect the local option taxes, Bullock said.

The largest city allocation this month, \$8.3 million, went to Houston.

In Lamar County, Blossom received \$537.48, compared to \$873.25 for the same period last year, for a total of \$4,515.69 to date this year.

Deport received no payment this period, compared to \$536.38 for last year's payment, marking a 10.79 percent decrease.

Paris received \$104,322.85 for a 7.30 percent increase over last year.

In Red River County, Bogata received no payment for this period, compared to \$1,119.65 for last year's payment, marking a 7.55 percent decrease over payments to date from last year.

Clarksville received \$12,743.44 for an 11.77 percent increase while Detroit received no payment this period for a 3.07 percent decrease over the same period last year.

In Titus County, Mt. Pleasant received \$61,934.54 for an 8.00 percent decrease.

Talco received \$1,105.91, compared to \$1,072.92 for the same period last year, for a 14.78 percent decrease.

March's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in January and reported to the Comptroller's Office by February 22, Bullock said.

property but certainly no permission would ever be given to hunt on the cemetery grounds.

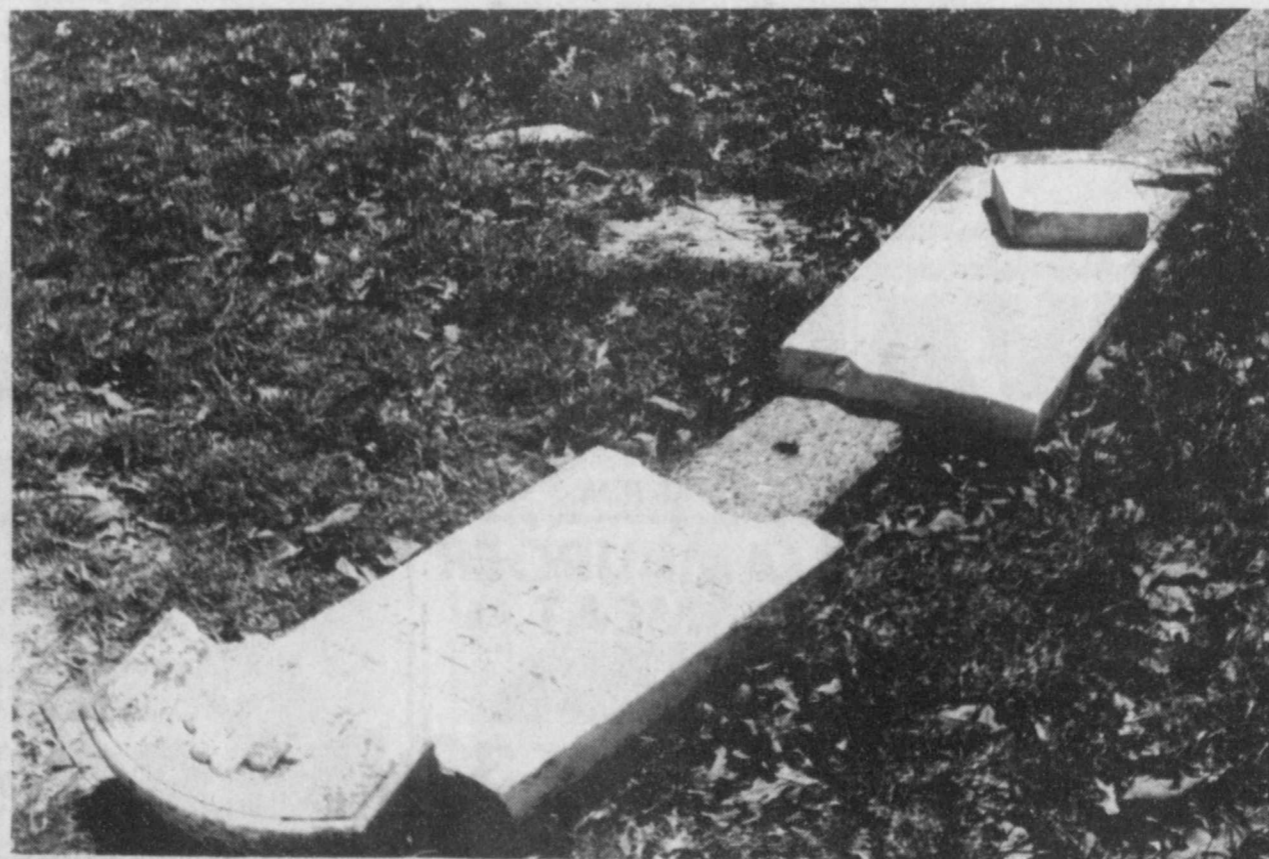

They are the ones who supply irresponsible teenagers and younger with equipment for killing animals, while unattended or supervised...are allowed to destroy heritage. Some of the markers damaged this week were more than 100 years old. They cannot be replaced...they are the thin, concrete type and the vandals went to great difficulty to tear them from the ground and break them into many pieces. Is this our next generation of leaders? Do parents believe this the proper teachings to our future? Some

markers were dug from the ground and left standing on end or on their sides. I was just sick. ## Mrs. Cliff Adams Dies March 16

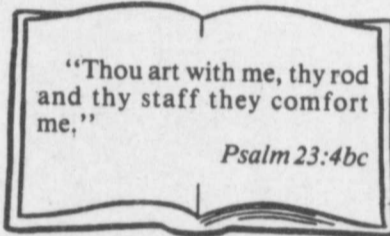
Mrs. Cliff (Lela) Adams of Bogata died in Franklin County Hospital in Mt. Vernon on Wednesday, March 16.

## Spinal Screening Set At Prairiland

The Legislature passed a new law in 1985 that requires all sixth and ninth grade students to be screened for spinal deformities.

Early detection of abnormal spinal curvature can prevent serious health problems. This is a problem that may begin during the early adolescent years, from 10-14 years of age, with an estimated 1 in 10 adolescents having some degree of abnormal curvature. Curves that are detected early may only require periodic observation by a specialist. Moderate curves may require the wearing of a brace, which is usually supervised by an orthopedic specialist. In most cases, the need for major surgery for this deformity can be eliminated through early detection.

Spinal screening for Prairiland I.S.D. school children has been scheduled to begin the week of March 28-April 1.

Children will be screened for two types of spinal deformities: scoliosis and kyphosis. Scoliosis is a condition in which the spine is twisted, causing misalignment of the upper body or lower back. This condition can worsen and lead to much pain, as well as complications of the heart and lungs.
