Run-Offs For Sheriff, Commissioner, Constable Tuesday

It won't be Super Tuesday, but Tuesday, April 12 is an important day in Lamar County politics as run-offs for the County Sheriff, several Constable's and Commissioner's races take place.

Voting will begin at 7 a.m. and continue until 7 p.m.

In the run-off for Lamar County Sheriff, incumbent Jim Parker will

face Gene Burns. Burns led the vote tally on March 8 with 4,350 to Parker's 3,739. Roger Peterson received 2,361 votes in that election.

In Precinct I Constable's race, the run-off is between Randy Boren, who garnered 415 votes to incumbent Al Parks' 257 votes at the last go around. There were four other contestants in that original contest.

Also with a commanding lead was the Precinct 4 Constable position, Billy Foreman ahead with a wide margin over Albert Jones going into the run-off.

In Precinct 1 Commissioner's race, which originally had seven contestants, boiled down to the final contest between Ernie Sparks and Troy Owens. Sparks received 825 votes in

the first election to Owens' 625.

Without presidential candidates to vote for the balloting is expected to be much smaller than the Super Tuesday vote, but the races for Sheriff and Commissioner have been exciting enough that considerable interest is shown in them. This should provide for a higher than usual run-off voter turnout.

As usual, this paper reminds everyone that it is not only a privilege, but a responsibility to vote. Remember "Vote as you please, but please vote!!"

Grand Champion Steer and Reserve Champion Heifer were won

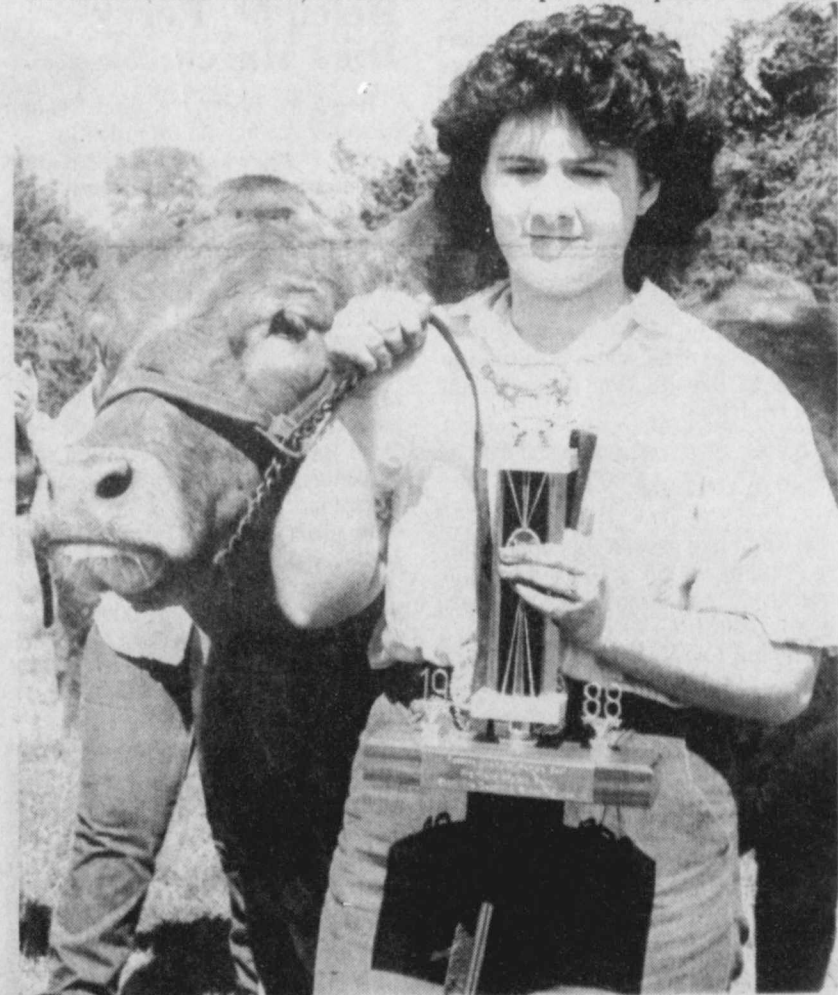
by Tracy Hicks. Reserve Champion Steer went to Amy Irwin and Rachael Dawson had the Reserve Champion Bull.

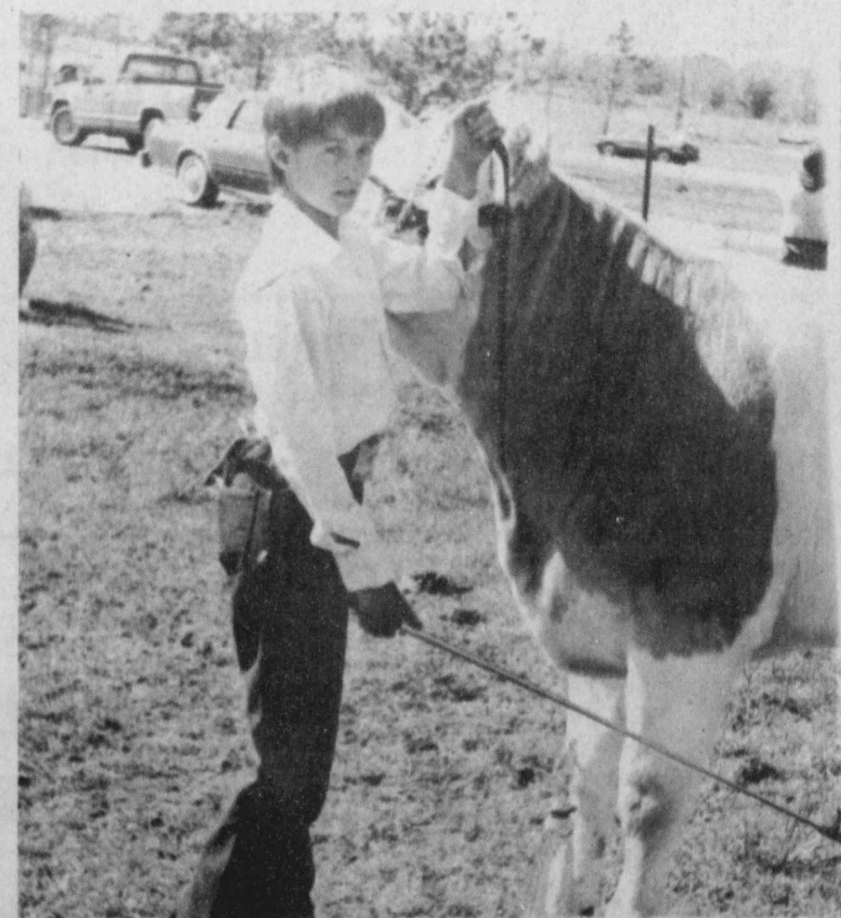

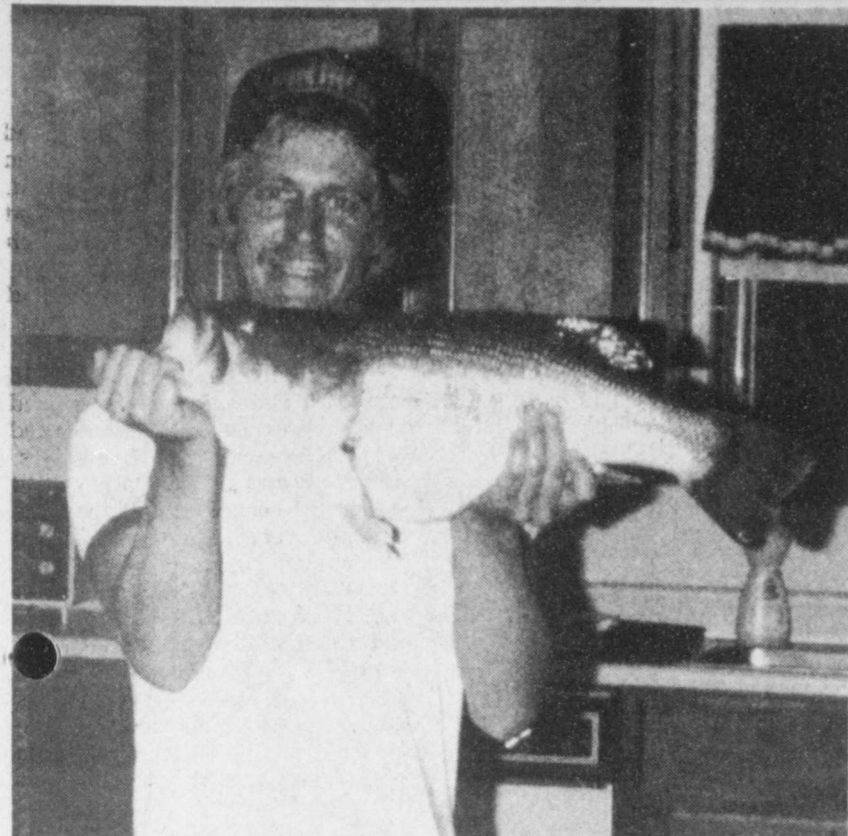

Tammy Ross Needs Sponsors For Space Camp

Tammy Ross, daughter of Bill and Iva Mae Ross of Rt. 3, Paris, and a senior at Prairiland High School is seeking sponsors so that she can go to U.S. Space Academy for a seven-day camp.

The camp will be held in Huntsville, Alabama. During her stay there she would become familiar with the space

shuttle cockpit and ground control simulators, developed exclusively for the space academy program.

The full-scale Spacelab module is derived from the actual payload crew training model they tour at the Marshall Space Flight Center, NASA's lead facility where payload crews train.

On the second day, teams will be established and begin "training for mission assignments".

Countdown on day three begins and the students will do mission experiments including satellite deployment, pallets and operation of manipulating arms.

As the week progresses, the students will acquire more and more knowledge about this nation's space program.

Tuition for the camp is \$575.00.

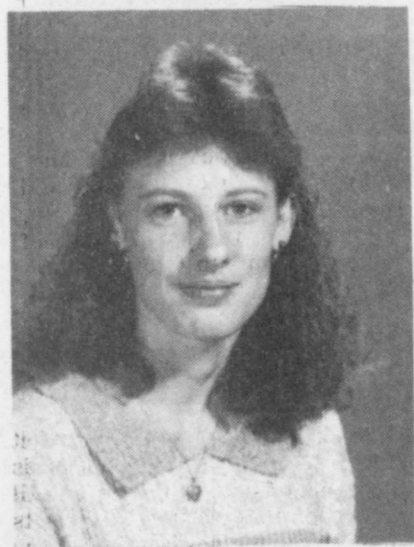
Tammy says she would like to be able to attend this camp "because I want to be an astronaut, and this would help me to learn what courses I want to take in college".

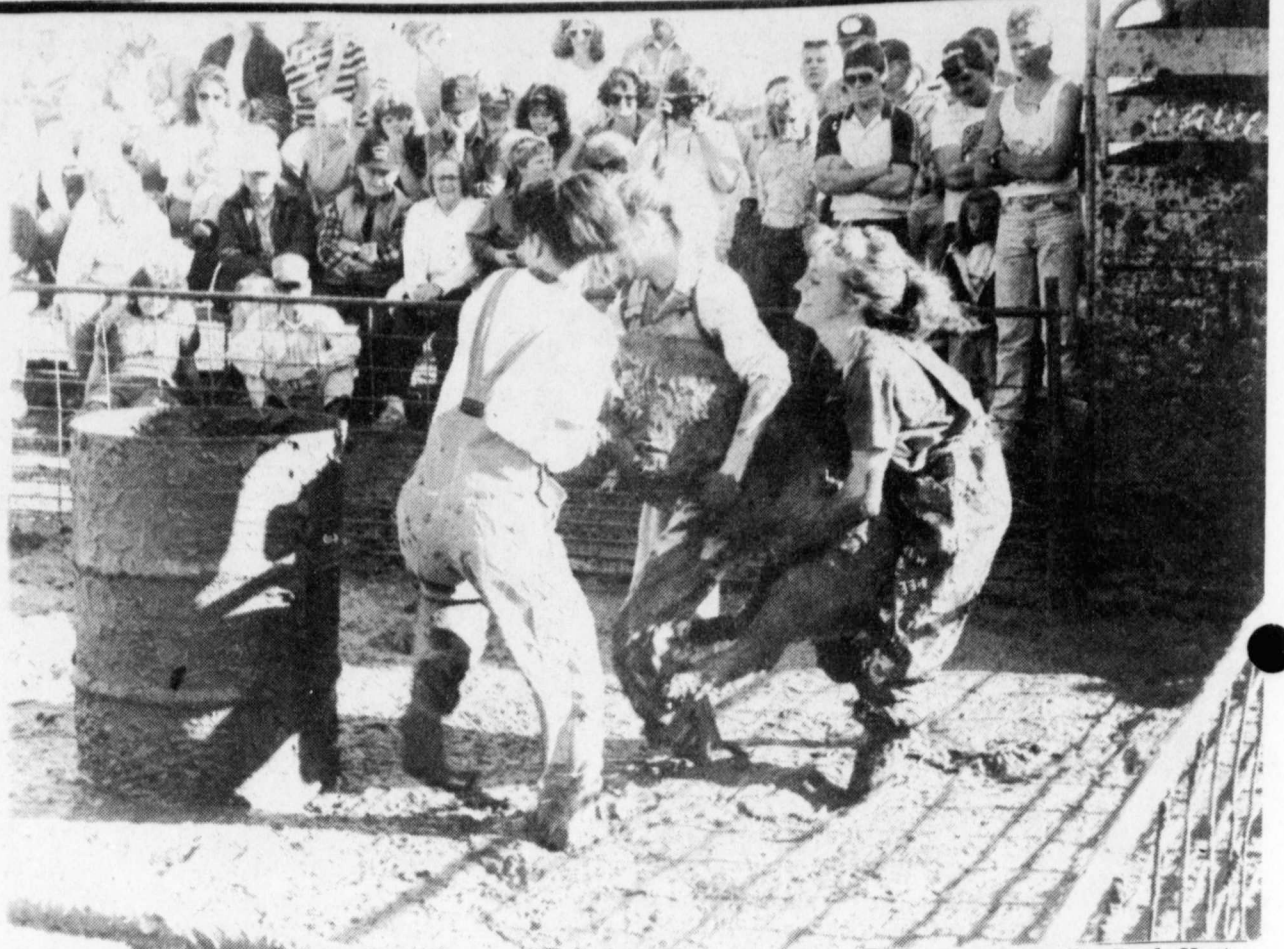
