Rain Relieves Drought For Some

There are few things that Texans, and especially East Texans, enjoy more than talking about the weather. But lately talking about the weather has been depressing and frustrating, as drought scores the area.

Average rainfall for the 1988 year has been nearly 20 inches below normal, with the major lack occurring in April and May, crucial times for

farmers, hay producers, ranchers and gardeners.

The fourth of July weekend provided area residents with some better news. Thunderstorms, high winds and some hail whipped the area, relieving severe drought for some, while others did without.

Up to three inches pounded desperately parched fields and mead-

ows, while Mother Nature put on an unprecedented display of lightning and high winds.

Talco suffered a number of power disruptions, requiring Texas New Mexico to removed downed limbs from lines. Also suffering power loss were portions of Red River County and Lamar County. Servicemen for electric companies and telephone

companies found themselves spread thin when the worst storm hit on Saturday.

Sunday; morning thunderheads built and built, but no rain fell on most of the area.

July Fourth was mostly cloudy, with scattered showers during the morning, but bright sunshine and smothering humidity in the afternoon. Trees and limbs were ripped up in

some places, but basically damage was minor.

Whether the summer will continue to provide much needed rain or not, is of course, yet to be seen.

Damage is already evident among crops blooming, but cotton, always hardy in dry weather, should do well in those areas that received the rain.

For those that missed the storms sweeping the area, they must continue to anxiously scan brilliant blue skies.

"A Winner For Agriculture"

Next week over 5,000 people will go to San Antonio to attend the annual Convention of the Texas Future Farmers of America. During the convention, the FFA members will choose their new president. Keith Reep of Blossom, is one of the candidates for the highly regarded office.

Keith, who has been a member of Prairiland FFA for four years, will compete against nine other candidates, one from each part of the state. They will be required to give a short speech and answer three questions before they are voted on by the convention delegates.

Keith has been very active in the FFA during his four years at Prairiland. He most recently served as Area VI President and has also served as Paris District Reporter. At Prairiland, he has served as reporter, vice-president and president. Keith has also earned the Star Greenhand, Star Chapter Farmer, and Star Lone Star Farmer degrees. His Lone Star Farmer degree was even ranked third in the state.

Keith's FFA project program has consisted of registered Simmental cattle, steers, beef cattle, contract steers and heifers, and broilers.

Through these projects, he has been able to receive several proficiency awards from his chapter, including the beef production, agricultural processing and soil and water management awards. Keith has also participated on Prairiland's chapter conducting team, livestock judging team and dairy judging team.

But, Keith's activities are not confined to the FFA. He is also an active member of the American Junior Simmental Simbrah Association and the Northeast Texas Simmental/Simbrah Association. Keith has also competed in the U.I.L. Speech contest, the Rotary 4-Way public speaking contest, and also played football for three years. Keith has served as sophomore class reporter and was recently elected as "Student of the Month" at Prairiland.

Keith plans to attend Paris Junior College for two years and then transfer to Texas A&M University where he will major in animal science with a science option. He hopes his undergraduate work will allow him to attend either medical, dental or veterinary school.

Keith's parents are Fred and Martha Reep, both teachers in the Prairiland

school district. He has one sister, Kim, who will be a freshman at Prairiland this fall.

If selected president of the Texas Associated, Keith has high hopes for the year. Even if he does not win, he will be one of the state association's vice-presidents, which is an honor very few members even achieve.

"As a state officer, I would like to make the public more aware of the FFA and what it stands for," Keith said.

Keith has attended several leadership conferences this summer in preparation for the election next week. He even traveled to Possum Kingdom Lake to join the Area IV Association's camp.

"That was a new experience for me," Keith said. "We had to sleep outside, but I met a lot of people."

Keith says that he feels the FFA is an asset to Prairiland.

"I feel that it has taught me responsibility, cooperation and how to accept defeat," Keith said.

Keith has definitely applied what he has learned. His activities in and out of the FFA has enabled him to become the outstanding young leader that he is today. Regardless of next week's election, Keith Reep is a true winner.

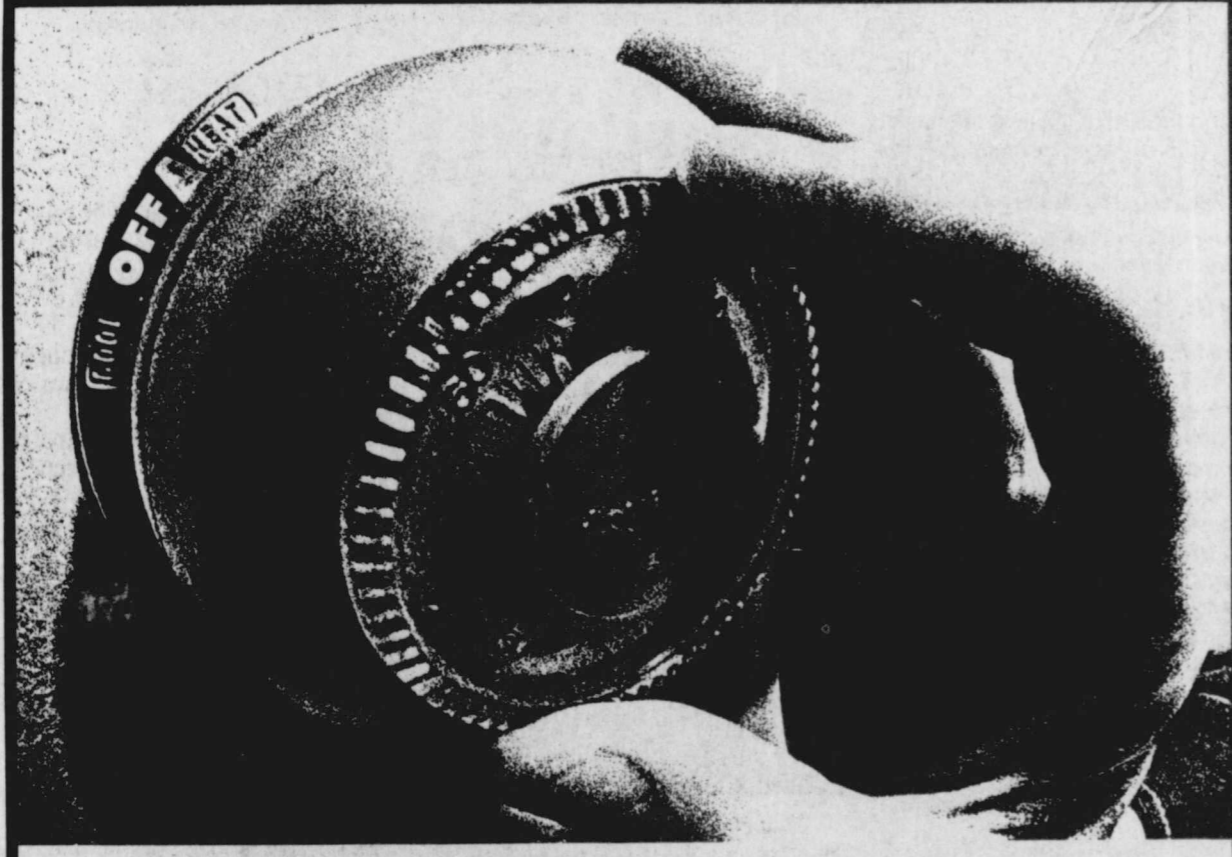

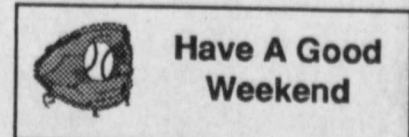
Taxes May Be Postponed On Drought Sales

Producers of livestock, including poultry, may elect to postpone for one year the reporting of income from sales due to drought conditions, according to Dr. Greg Clary, economist-management for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.
This election applies to all livestock held for sale, whether raised or bought for resale. It also applies to livestock used for draft, breeding, dairy or sporting purposes and held less than two years in the case of cattle and horses or less than one year in the case of other livestock.
This second group of livestock, for breeding or dairy purposes, must be replaced within two years after the close of the first year in which any part of the gain from drought sales is realized, Clary pointed out.

Livestock do not have to be raised in a drought area and the sale does not have to take place in a drought area to qualify for postponement. However, Clary emphasized that the sale must occur solely because of drought conditions that affected the water supply or grazing conditions.
To make the election to postpone income, a statement must be attached to the tax return for the year of the sale. The statement must include the person's name, address and the following information for each class of livestock for which the election is made:

This two year replacement period may be extended with approval of the IRS district director.
Clary, headquartered at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton, said only income from livestock sold in excess of the number sold under usual business practices in the absence of drought is eligible for postponement. For example, if under usual business practices, a producer would sell five dairy animals during the year, but because of drought in 1988 must sell 20 dairy animals, the proceeds from 15 animals could be reported as income on tax return for 1989.
Producers must meet the following conditions in order to postpone reporting of this income: (1) their principal business is farming; (2) they use the cash method of accounting; (3) they can show that the sale would not have occurred except for the drought; and (4) the drought has resulted in an area being designated as eligible for assistance by the federal government.
Sales made before the area became eligible for federal assistance still qualify.

1. a statement that the election under section 451(e) is being made;
 2. evidence of drought conditions and the date, if known, on which the area was designated as eligible for assistance by the federal government;
 3. the gain realized on the sale;
 4. number and kind of livestock sold; and
 5. the number of animals that would have been sold in the tax year had normal business practices been followed.
- The tax return for the year in which breeding and dairy livestock are replaced should contain information showing:
1. date replacement livestock was purchased;
 2. cost of the replacement livestock; and
 3. number and kind of the replacement livestock.
- The statement and the return must be filed by the due date of the return, including extensions. The statement can be filed with an amended return, if due dates are met. Clary said that once the election has been made, it may be changed only by approval of the IRS. Separate elections must be made for each year drought sales occur.

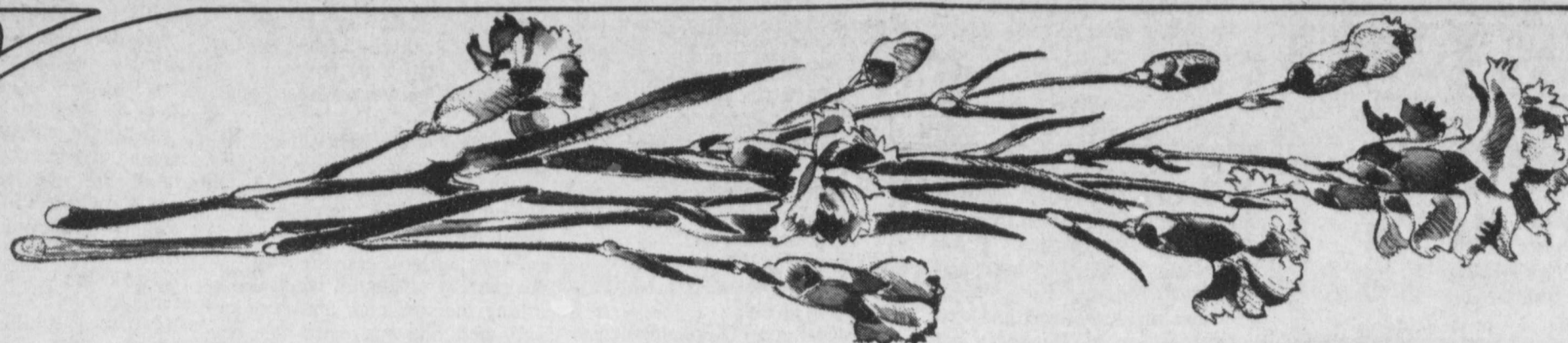
