Go do something else entirely. That's the only way to ever regain the lost shred of information!

All this seems to point to one conclusion. Our brains won't be bullied. But they never really forget anything, either.

All the desired data is there, we just don't use the right signals to reclaim it.

The brain is so marvelous that it works on things even when we are unaware that it is working.

But like that kid at bat, when we try too hard, we may strike out!

Local Sales Taxes On The Increase

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Tuesday that payments to cities that collect local sales tax continued to show an increase this month, with July payments up 14.3 percent over those sent in July last year.

"The gaining strength in our state economy is being reflected on a local level, and local governments can continue to expect a steady increase in their share of sales tax collections," Bullock said.

Statewide, year-to-date payments are 10.8 percent higher than the same period last year, according to Bul-

lock.

Houston's payment of \$10 million was up 17.5 percent over last year's allocation, Bullock said, and Dallas' payment showed a 10.1 percent increase.

Bullock said that 915 checks totaling \$61.3 million in local sales taxes were sent Tuesday to cities that collect the local option sales tax at either one or one and one-half percent rates.

Allocations to the state's six metropolitan transit authorities also

showed an increase of 17.5 percent, with their checks totaling \$28.9 million. El Paso's city transit department, the only CTD in Texas, received a payment of \$794,658.

Checks totaling \$5.8 million were also mailed Tuesday to 81 counties that collect the one-half percent county tax, Bullock said.

July's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in May and reported to the Comptroller's Office by June 20, according to Bullock.

Locally, Blossom received \$1,147.28 for this period, compared to \$862.13 for the prior year, for a 1.48% decrease over total payments to date.

Deport received no payment for this period, as compared to \$512.97 for the previous year, for an 0.29% increase over total payments to date for the year.

Paris received \$137,147.93 for a 7.41% increase over payments to date. Bogata received \$1,019.66 for its

payment for this period, compared to \$2,268.27 for last year, for a 4.80% decrease in total payments to date.

Clarksville received \$12,446.21 for this period, for a 6.09% increase over the payment for the same period last year of \$12,014.23.

Detroit received no payment this period, but experienced a 66.07% change from the same period last year.

Mt. Pleasant received \$73,484.56 for an 8.25% increase over last year's payment.

Talco received \$1,752.16 for this period, compared to \$1,167.49 for the same period last year, marking a 4.22% increase in total payments to date.

Sometimes we may pay a little too much attention to the news that deplores the condition of American youth.

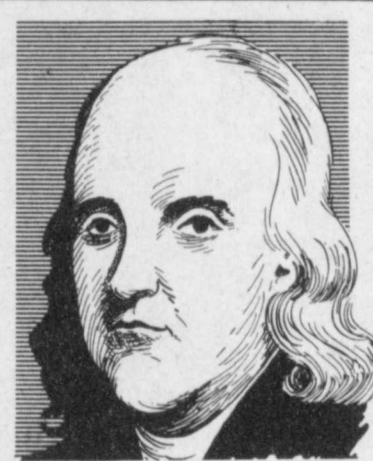
Georgia Anderson Dies In Cooper July 13

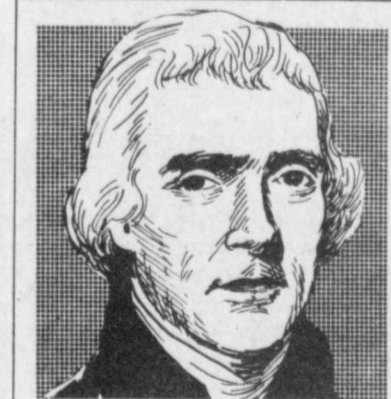

Tree Care Pointers For Dry Weather

A large number of trees are stressed in the Red River Valley area as the drought of 1988 continues. We are seeing valuable shade trees succumb to a variety of problems. However, the lack of moisture leads to death of trees that are stressed from these other problems.

One of the major problems that we have observed leading to tree deaths is man-made. Large trees are not able to compensate for a loss of their roots. Post Oak trees will not form new roots to compensate for the loss of roots according to Dr. Jerral Johnson, Extension Plant Pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This theory explains why so many Post Oak trees have died.

It has been my observation that oak trees in particular will not survive where a new home, shopping center and other buildings are built. No matter how careful one is in the construction process the oak tree will eventually die. I call your attention to many of the housing additions in Paris. The addition west of Crocket School was built among stately oak trees. One by one they died. Today most of the trees that are there were either small at the time of construction or have since been planted.

Most tree roots are in the top 18 inches of the soil. However, most of the feeder roots that feed the tree are in the top eight inches. Therefore, it is so important that one not remove that top soil in the root area of the tree or stress will be placed on the tree.

Another point to remember in caring for trees is that their roots will extend outward two or three times the height of the tree. For example, the roots of a 50 foot tree will go out between 100 and 150 feet. If the roots extend that far outward and if oak trees do not form new roots to replace those roots that have been destroyed, then is it any wonder that those trees die?

So, the next time you place a concrete slab, asphalt driveway, or several inches of top soil over the root area of an important shade tree, stop and consider the consequences. If you must do that, then you should get another younger tree started to take its place.

Another no-no is applying water at the base of the tree. Remember the location of a majority of the feeder roots. They are not at the trunk. Keeping the base of the tree wet will only encourage wood rot disease development and no fungicide will take care of those diseases.

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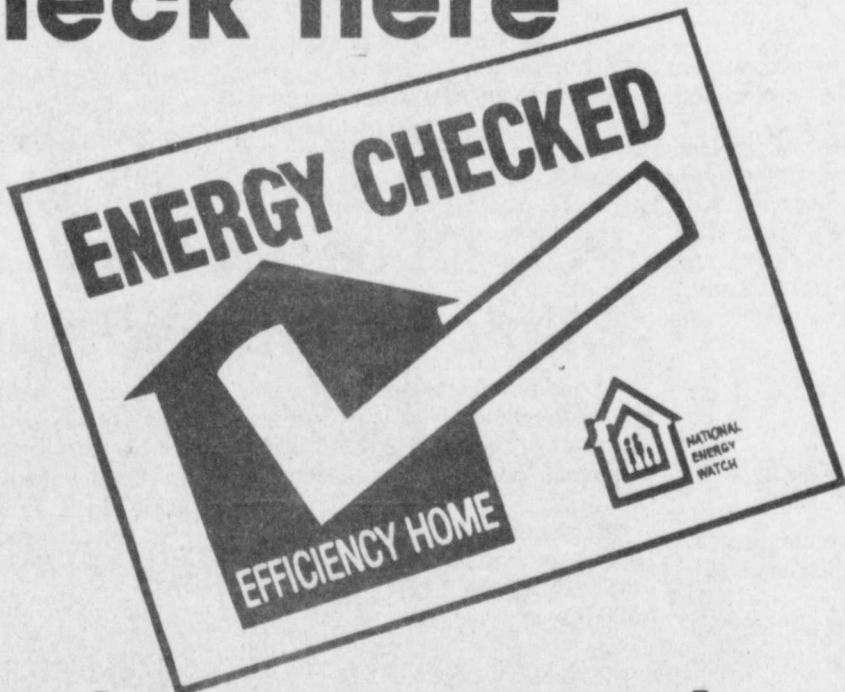
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Reception Honors Thelma Ladd On Birthday

The Red River Valley Limousin Association will sponsor a Junior Limousin cattle show to be held at the Lamar County Fairgrounds on Saturday, July 30. The show is open to all junior Limousin exhibitors. The show will be sanctioned by the Texas Club Calf Association and any points earned will count toward the end of the year standings in the TCCA. There will be classes for bulls born since February 1, 1986 and heifers born since August 1, 1986. Classes will be broken at four month intervals. Premiums will be paid in all classes and plaques, satin jackets and special Texas plaques will be given for showmanship winners and class winners, respectively. In addition, the champion heifer will receive a \$250 and the reserve heifer will receive \$150.

Dr. Roger Arnold will be the judge for the show. Health and registration papers will be checked. Entries are due before July 25 and will be \$20 per head. Late entries will be taken but will cost \$25 each. If you need entry forms or more info, call the office.

APPLE-CHERRY SWIRL CAKE

- 1 package yellow cake mix
- 1/4 cup cornstarch
- 1 cup Lucky Leaf/Musselman's Apple-Cherry Fruit 'N Sauce
- 1/2 cup oil
- 4 eggs
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/4 cup sugar mixed with 1 teaspoon cinnamon confectioners sugar.

Combine yellow cake mix, cornstarch, Fruit 'N Sauce, oil and eggs. Beat for 2 minutes. Stir in raisins and vanilla. Pour into well-greased bundt pan. Sprinkle sugar cinnamon mixture over batter and swirl through batter with a knife. Bake at 350°F for 50 minutes or until cake tests done with a toothpick inserted in center. Cool in pan 10 minutes, then loosen edges and turn out onto a rack to cool completely. Sprinkle with confectioners sugar.

Stressed Sorghum-Type Could Be Deadly

Prussic acid can be a problem in drouth stressed sorghum-type plants just as easily as it can be in frost damaged. Therefore, cattle producers should be extremely cautious when turning cattle into pastures containing Johnson Grass, milo and the sudan-haygrazer forages.

The danger appears to increase following a light rain when the plant growth mechanism begins to function. Prussic acid can be deadly, and in fact normally is deadly and swift. Once cattle eat plants containing the hydrocyanic acid that causes the disease, very little time elapses until the animal is dead.

Much of the set aside land that was released last week for haying and grazing contains Johnson Grass. There is a good chance that this stressed grass could present a problem if grazed. To have a better idea of the prussic acid possibilities, cattle producers should have a test run on a sample of the grass.

The Hopkins County Forage Lab located in Sulphur Springs can analyze forage samples for prussic acid. A representative sample should be collected from throughout the field and either mailed or carried to Sulphur Springs. A small sack full is sufficient. Gordon Ford, Hopkins County Agent, reports that a high percentage of samples analyzed recently show positive for prussic acid.

Plants that should be checked include Johnson Grass, sudans, hay-grazers and milo. An alternative to grazing is to make hay as the curing process destroys the hydrocyanic acid. Hay should be thoroughly cured. A thumb rule would be cure longer than normally cured just to be sure.

Another problem that one should be aware this summer is nitrate poisoning in some of the highly fertilized stressed corn and sorghum type plants. Very seldom does this occur in our area, but it is more likely to appear when the plants are stressed from the lack of moisture.

If a plant has high rates of nitrates it is almost impossible to destroy them through curing or silage fermentation process. However, dairy specialist at Texas A&M reports that silage fermentation can take care of most of the nitrates.

As with the prussic acid problem the lab at Sulphur Springs can analyze plant specimen for nitrate poison. If a plant has high rates of nitrates, they will be in the bottom 18 inches of the plant, so one should randomly collect the bottom 15 to 18

inches of 10 to 12 inch stalks and submit to the lab for check.

Land owners that have not set aside land or CRP land and desire to utilize the grass can now do so, but must check with the ASC Office before haying or grazing. Individuals with set aside land may hay or graze land through 1988 but restrictions on the CRP land are more specific. One must request permission to cut for hay July 5 and the hay must be harvested within 30 days from date requested. CRP grass may be sold and a \$10 per acre fee will be withheld from the annual CRP payment paid October 1. There are other restrictions such as three inch stubble and buffer strips. Check James Allcorn's column for additional information. Remember, check with ASC Office before haying or grazing.

Erosion Plans Available

To some farmers, determining what level of erosion must be reduced on highly erodible land has become an area of concern. These farmers are trying to figure out what must be done to adhere to the conservation compliance provision of the Food Security Act of 1985. A provision that says farmers have until December 31, 1989 to get a conservation plan for their highly erodible lands to retain eligibility for USDA farm program benefits. Wilson Scaling, Chief of the USDA's Soil Conservation Service in Washington, says his agency is assisting farmers in developing nervation plans that are practical and flexible.

"A lot of conservation practices such as conservation tillage or minimum tillage, contour farming, stripcropping, all of these practices are available. They do not require a lot of capital expenditures, sometimes you can modify some equipment you already have. I guess I feel very strongly that what will work in one part of the country just will not necessarily work in another. To be even more specific, a conservation plan has got to be tailored to the individual that is using it for his own purpose there on that local farm."

Scaling says this is a common sense approach in helping farmers comply with the law.

"Because if a producer is going to be successful in applying a conservation plan, its got to be his plan, it cannot be a USDA plan or an SCS plan. That's the reason I have in-

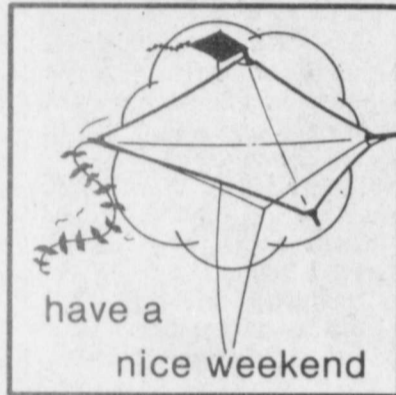
structed our state conservationist to be sure that they've got alternatives contained in every field office tech guide." Scaling also says that he's telling his staff to work with those farmers who may have developed their own conservation plans.

"This is a give and take situation. We have some farmers who have been controlling erosion for years and they've got a certain way of doing it."

If this erosion is at an acceptable level than sure we'll put that in our tech guides and we can learn from that. A lot of farmers also have had conservation plan even before the passage of the Farm Bill. If this plan is reasonably current and represents the current cropping patterns and other conditions, in most cases, all we'll have to do is re-sign the existing plan he's got and he is still in business like he has been."

Scaling urges those farmers with highly erodible land to get a conservation plan now.

"We've got about 800,000 plans on highly erodible land that are going to have to be either developed or updated by New Year's Eve 1989 in order for producers to be in compliance and that is a tremendous workload. It is probably the greatest workload this agency has ever had. I still think we can do it because I still think we have time to do so. But it's very important that producers not wait until the last minute to come in because it would be an impossibility."



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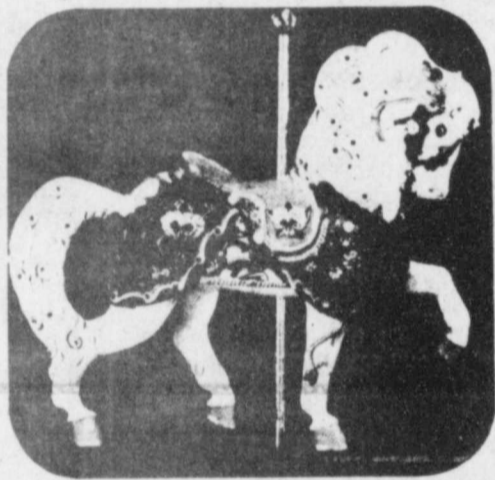


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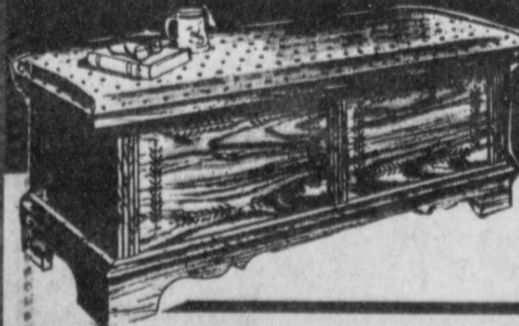

Fruited Pot Roast

In a large heavy skillet or dutch oven, brown 3 pounds boneless chuck roast in 2 tbsp. cooking oil. Simmer for 2 hours, covered, with 1 tsp. salt, 1/8 tsp. pepper, 1 minced garlic clove and 1/2 cup each sliced onion, chopped carrot and water. Add 1-11 oz. pkg. (2 cups) Sunsweet Dried Mixed Fruit (pit prunes before using) and 1 cup water and continue cooking 30 minutes or until meat is tender. Remove meat to serving platter. Skim fat; thicken pan liquid with 1 tbsp. cornstarch mixed with 1 tbsp. water, stirring. Pour over meat. Makes 6 servings.

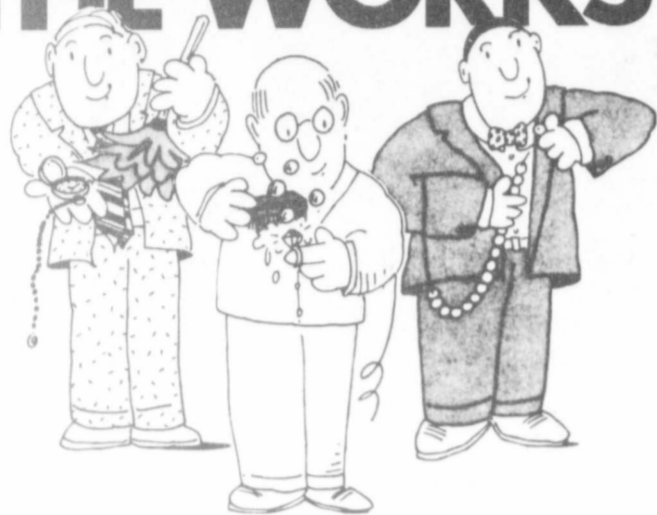

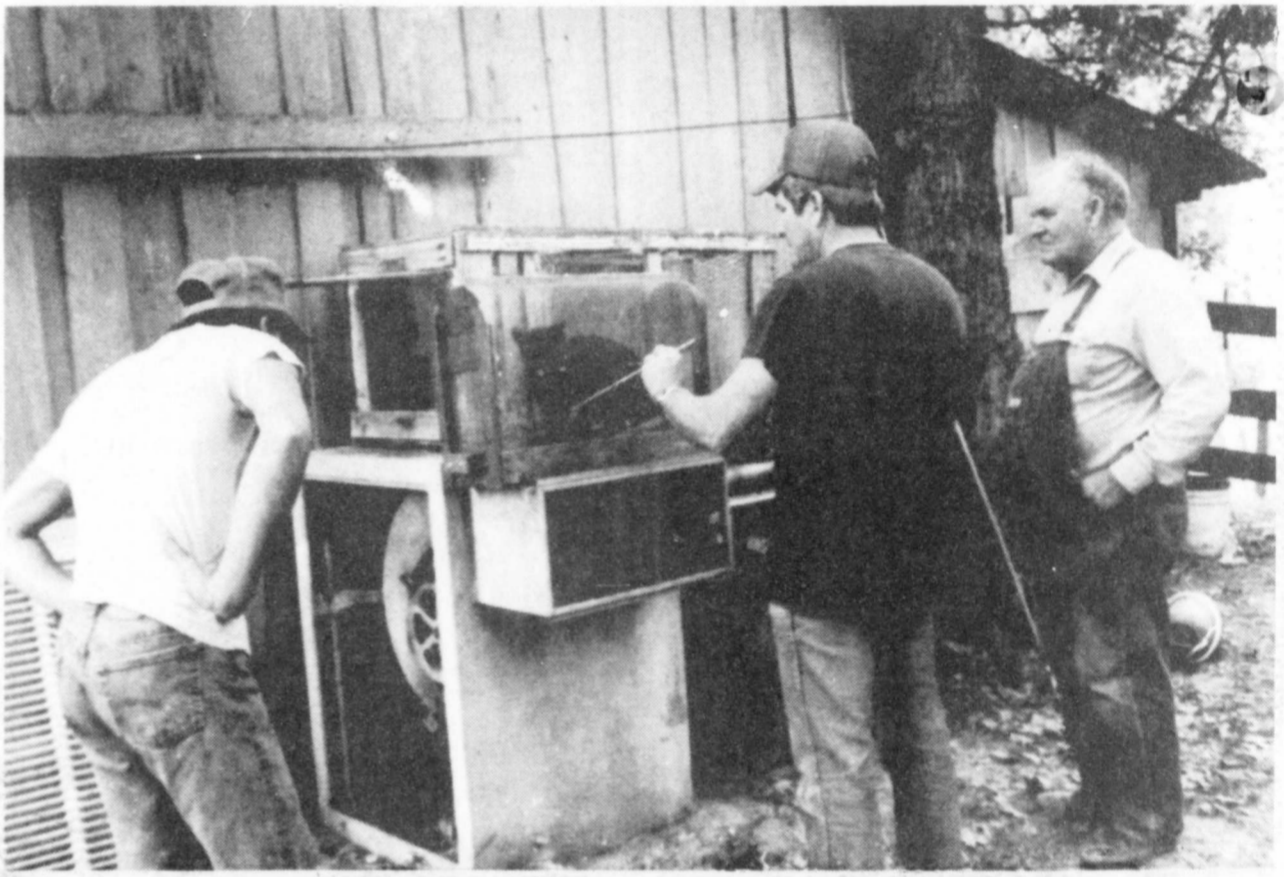
