Treasure it, each one is different and unique, yet miraculously part of an endless chain of continuity.

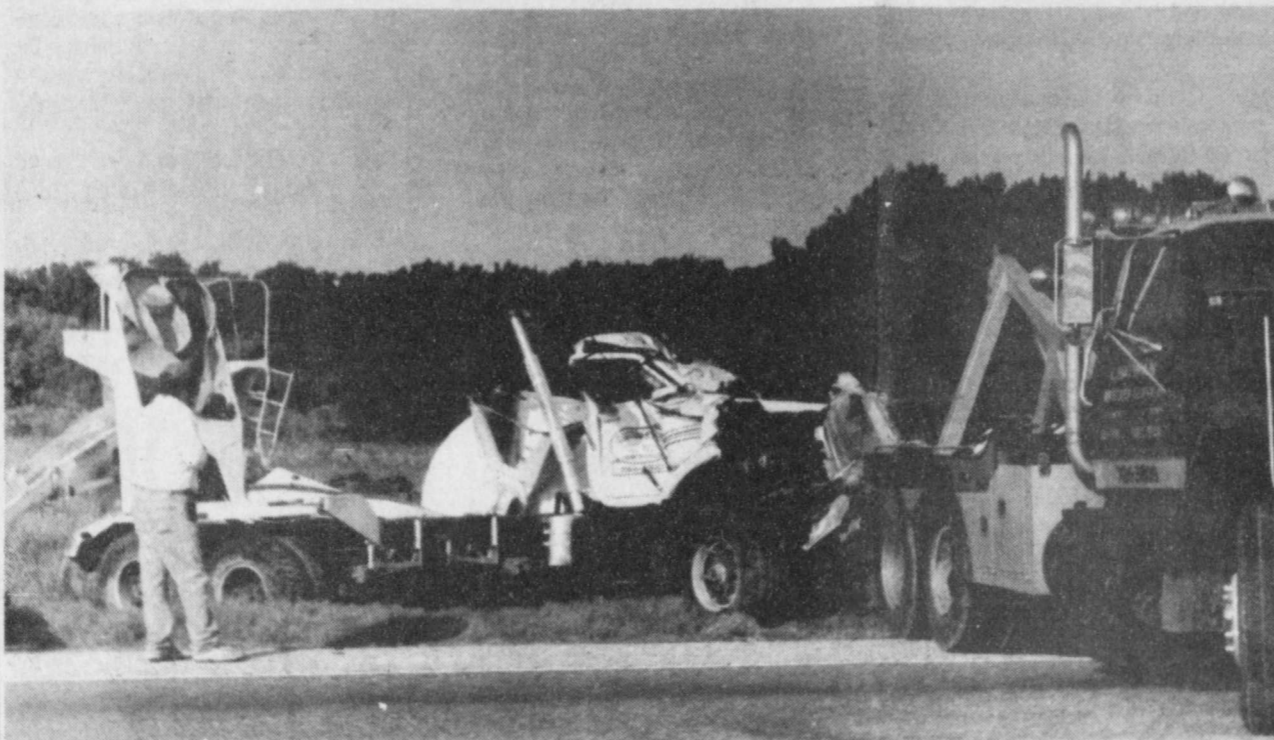

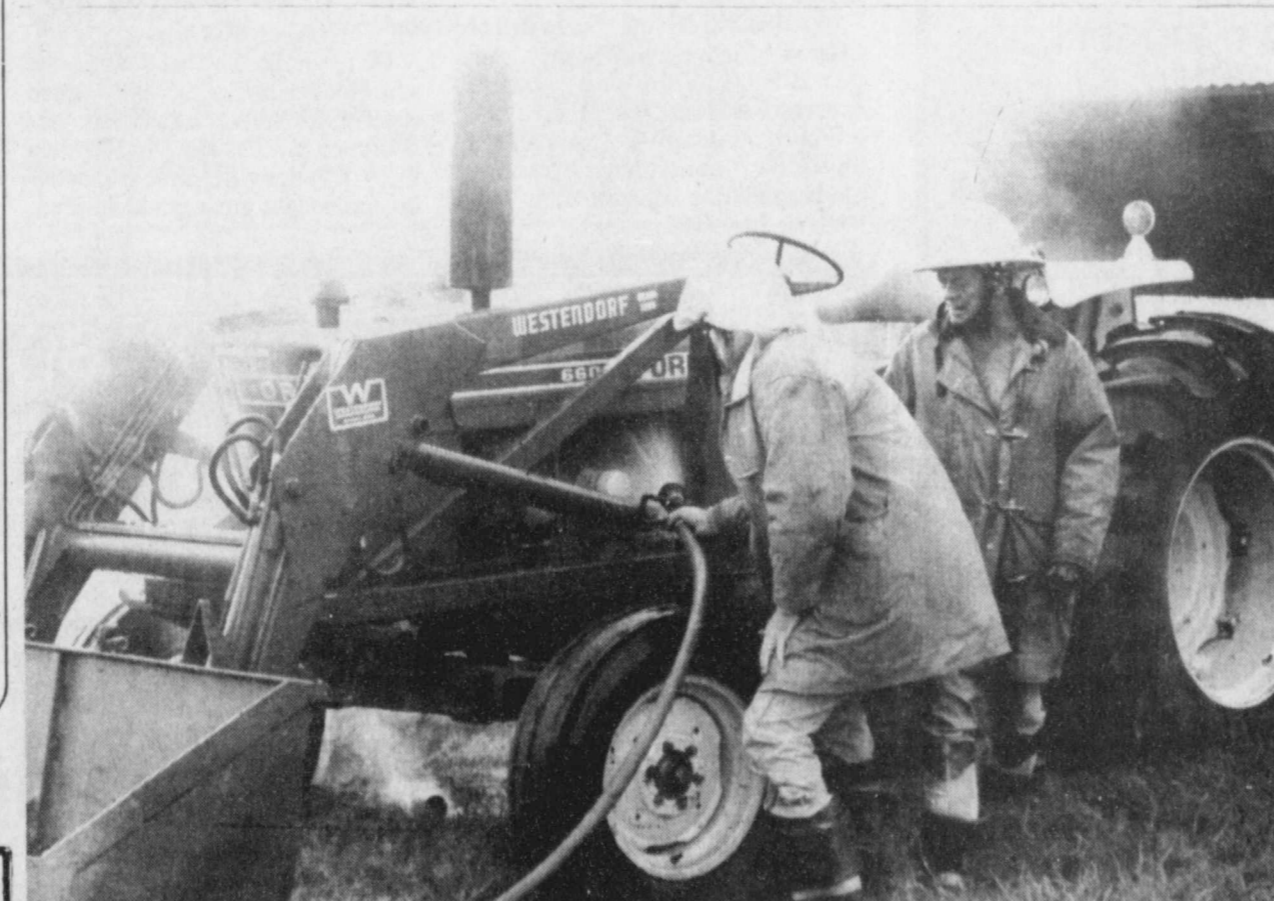

Lake Louise, Banff Balance Beauty And Tourism Well

For those who chose to read our trip account last week, yes, we did end it a little abruptly. There was a closing paragraph, but it didn't fit!

Thanks to everyone who called or dropped by to tell us you enjoyed the column.

Lake Louise was one of our first stops at the lower end of the Icefields Parkway.

Lake Louise is one of the most beautiful spots in the world.

Perfectly composed, the spectacularly aqua water is flanked by deep greens fir trees interspersed with noisy little aspen whispering their secrets to one another on the slightest breeze.

This tapers to one of the most majestic mountains the imagination could conjure, perfectly set like a jewel at the end of this panorama.

The Chateau Lake Louise stands solidly at the wide end of this picture-postcard beauty, angled so that the view is available to all guests.

Colorful canoes paddle by, walks and hikes from easy to difficult weave all the way around the lake.

Artists have been painting this place for 100 years, and the present generation of painters stand with their easels trying to capture the incredible beauty before them.

After admiring the scenery we stopped at a place called Paradise Cafe and Grocery, where the front yard was so covered with brilliant flowers that it was worthy of photos.

Cream cheese, wheat crackers and biscuits (like the English, Canadians call what we call cookies "biscuits") completed a picnic we shared with ground squirrels, jackdaws, Canadian Jays and chipmunks.

At Lake Louise Village we admired the beautiful log or lumber condos and ski resorts.

Then we had to get on down the road to Banff, where our hotel reservations were waiting for the next four nights.

For the first time in our vacationing life we had four straight nights in the same place. With my gypsy instincts, two nights has been maximum!

Our hotel was fantastic, with a balcony overlooking the mountains, and lots of room. The hotel-car package we had used had proved to be excellent.

Our first evening in Banff we discovered several things.

Banff is much larger than Jasper, and much more tourist oriented.

Prices are higher, food in particular is more expensive, and the mosquitoes are a rival for anything the state of Texas ever produced!

Banff mosquitoes cheat, anyway. They don't whine. The first thing one becomes aware of is the actual bite. They are huge!

One drive we took along Vermilion Lakes yielded a flock of Canadian geese, a bald Eagle, and over 50 mosquito bites!

But that first night we were faced with a more important problem. That was finding our way around the hotel.

Attractive and comfortable as it

was, the Inns of Banff Park have a peculiarity. They are built up the side of a mountain, on four levels. Each level is connected by a cross walk, and for some peculiar reason one can start on the third floor, go down to the second, cross the cross walk and come out on the third floor again!

We managed fairly well, but the idly people arriving from a tour bus were wandering around desperately.

For the next four days, every single time either of us was in the hall or moving through the hotel, we had to help some group or another find their way to the lobby or back to their proper level. I actually wondered if we were going to find some poor soul starved to death in a corner, after wandering around lost for days!

But that first night we simply read every sign in sight and managed to find our way down.

After dinner we walked to downtown Banff. We had been told it was a fifteen minute walk. It was nearly an hour's walk...it one walked briskly..

The purpose of our walk was to find a pair of sissors...necessary because we had to have shorts for our raft trip, and had failed to bring any..

The sissors were hard to find, but cheaper than buying shorts...which ranged from \$20 to \$70 at the sports shop.

Back in the room I plied my poor seamstress skills by whacking off Thomas a pair of slacks and myself some cotton pants and hemming them up.

The raft trip required bathing suits or shorts because of the wet suits we had to wear, and for the first time ever I had failed to pack any.

Early the next morning we took what was by far the most fascinating drive of the trip.

We had an hour and a half drive into British Columbia for the raft trip, which was on the Kicking Horse River in Yoho National Park.

But we had allowed ourselves extra time, and it was a good thing, because along that leisurely drive we stopped to take pictures of: an entire elk herd; a beautiful Mule Deer doe, a magnificent bull Elk grazing in the trees, antlers in velvet; and several dozen roaring waterfalls.

When we had been told that the Canadian National Parks of Alberta and British Columbia were more beautiful than those Colorado and Wyoming we had scoffed.

They truly are, though. The mountain driving is so easy, without the sheer drops on the side of the road that they can be better enjoyed, too.

The amazing color of the water, and the wide-spread scope of the mountains, makes them even more breath-taking than most of the Rockies.

At Golden, we linked up with the rest of our rafting band and loaded up on a bus to wind down a narrow gravel road to the side of the Kicking Horse River.

Since most of you probably read my column last week, we'll close here, and give rafting a rest for a week!

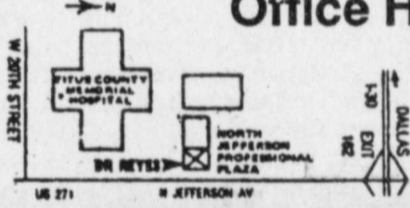

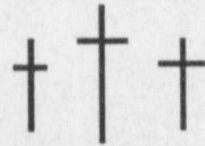
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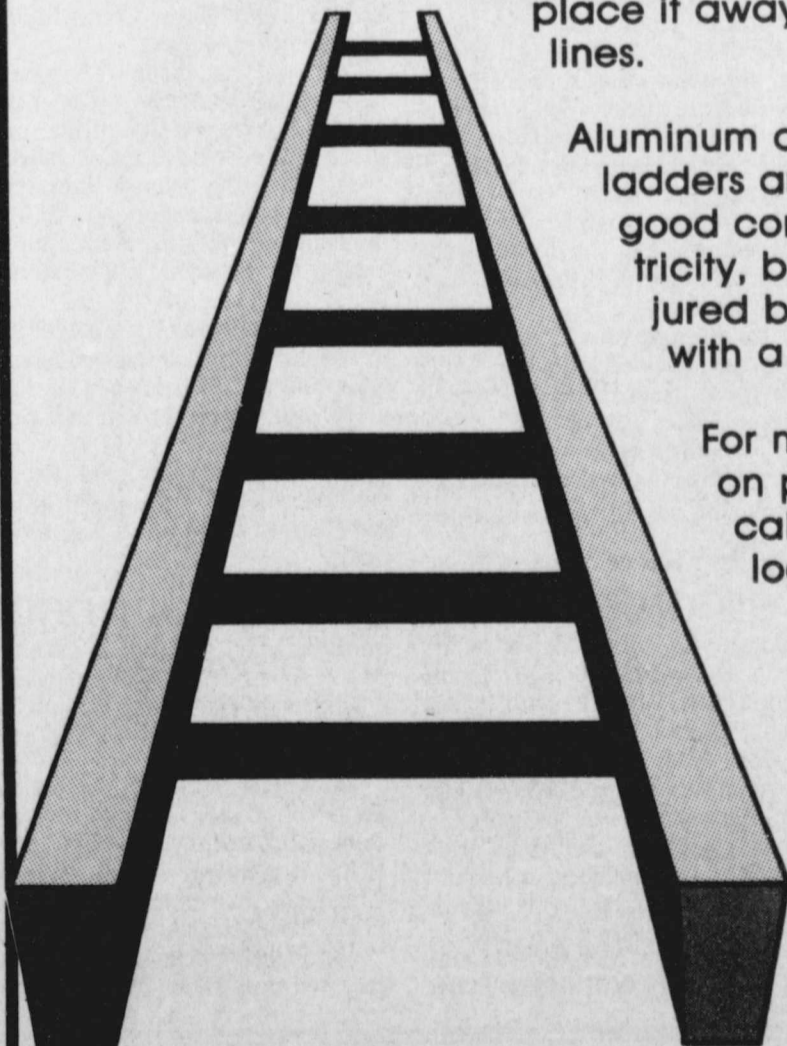

PEACH-KEEN POUND CAKE

Topping

- 1/4 cup sliced almonds
- 1/4 cup shredded coconut
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1/4 cup light brown sugar
- 2 peaches, peeled and diced,
- or 1-1/2 cups frozen peaches

Cake

- 1 cup butter or margarine
- 1 cup sugar
- 1-2/3 cup Swans Grace Cake Flour
- 4 eggs
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon almond extract

Place almonds and coconut in a microwave-safe dish and microwave on HIGH 3 to 4 minutes, stirring occasionally. Place 1/4 cup butter in 8-cup microwave-safe tub. Microwave on HIGH 1 minute or until melted. Crumble brown sugar into pan. Top with half the coconut-almond mixture, peaches and the remaining coconut-almond mixture; set aside. In a mixer bowl, cream 1 cup butter and sugar until fluffy. Add remaining cake ingredients and beat at low speed 1 minute. Spoon batter over topping. Microwave on MEDIUM (50% power) 9 minutes, rotating pan every 2 minutes. Microwave on HIGH 1 to 3 minutes or until the surface is almost set. Let stand on counter 10 minutes. Loosen sides with knife; turn out onto cake rack to cool. Garnish with additional peaches if desired.

Note: Wattage of microwave ovens varies. Recipe kitchen-tested in 650-700 watt ovens. Consult instruction manual for your oven's wattage and possible adjustments in cooking times.

Winter Pasture Can Supplement Hay Supply

By Herb Brevard

Winter pastures can stretch hay supplies for drought stricken livestock producers, according to an agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Winter pasture can be cost less than hay and provides a higher quality forage than hay, said Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., Extension Agronomist at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton.

Producers need to decide if they will plant small grain or ryegrass and clover for winter grazing. Small grain is better adapted for planting in a prepared seedbed. Ryegrass and clover can be successfully broadcast or drilled into an existing sod.

Reeves said that producers must decide this month what kind of winter pasture to plant and where to plant it. If small grain is chosen, seedbeds need to be prepared now for planting by September 15. If ryegrass and clover is the choice, planting time is not until late September or October.

All the forage plants that grow during the winter like a pH of at least 6. Therefore, Reeves suggests taking a soil test now to determine the nutrients involved. If lime is needed, it, plus any recommended phosphorus and potassium, should be applied before disking or breaking the land. The incorporation of these nutrients will speed their interaction with the soil.

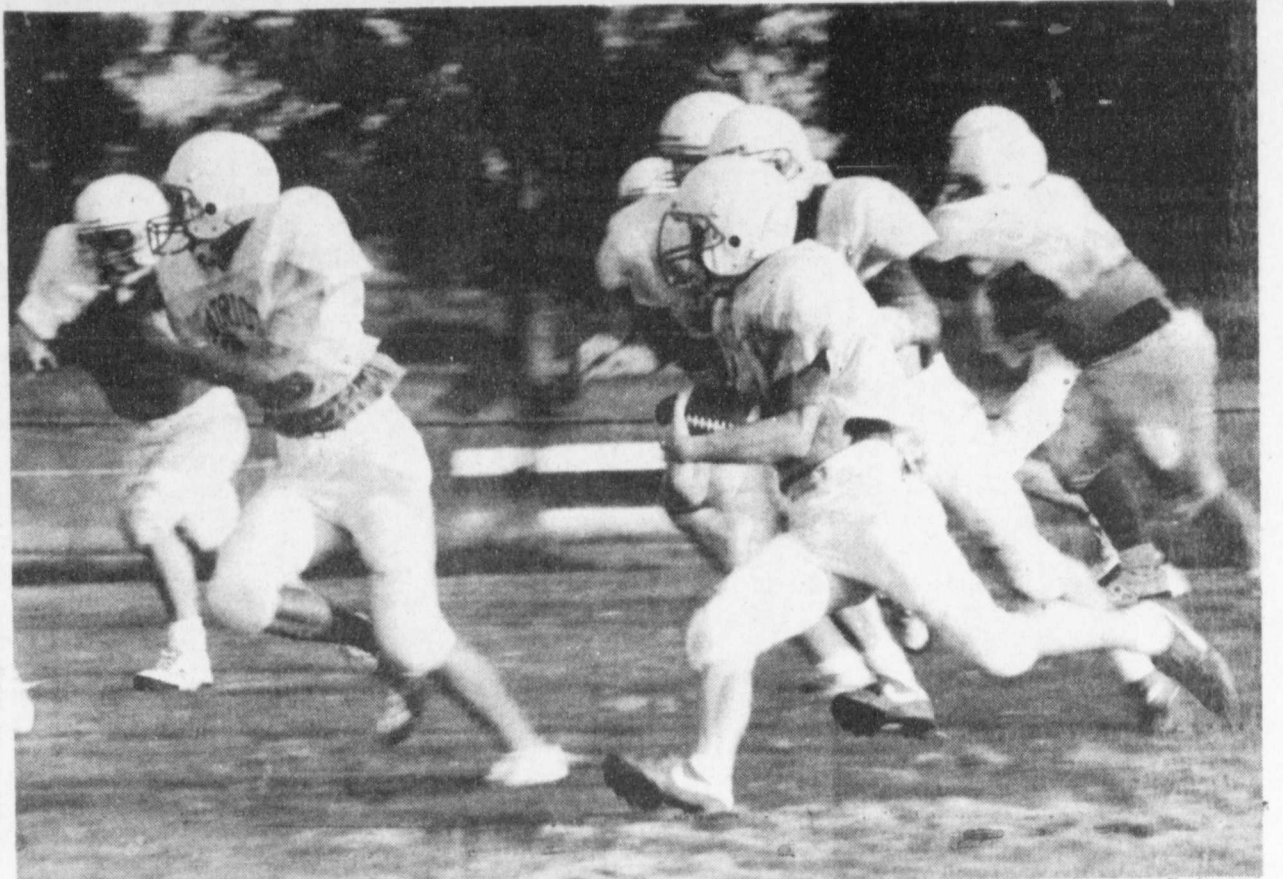
Producers should check seed supplies and prices with dealers so that this information may be used in making final winter pasture decisions.

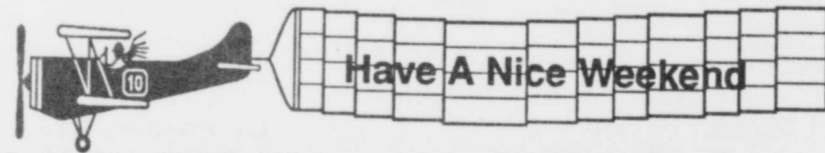

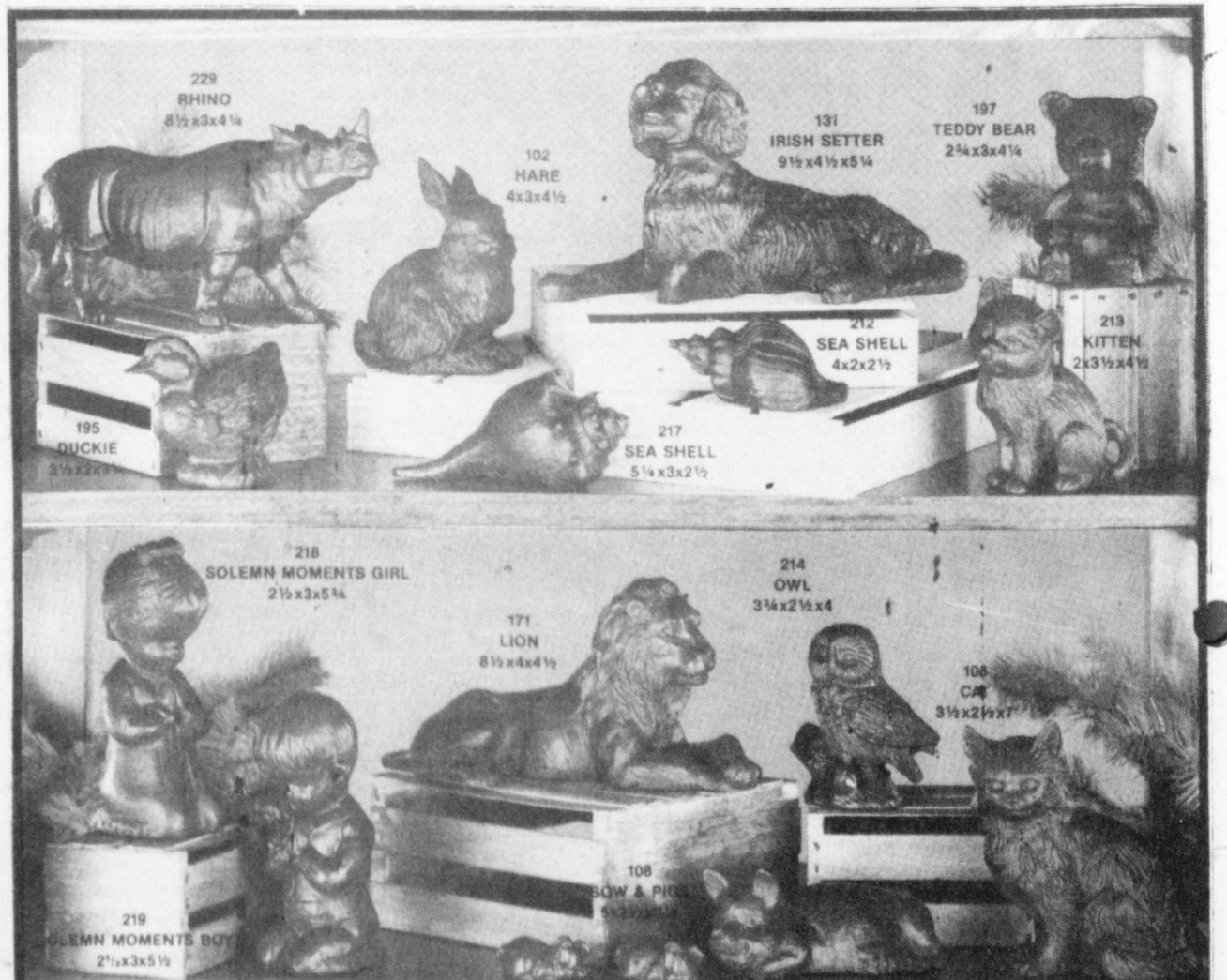
