We're Only Giving To Ourselves Deport's Firemen Need A Truck...To Protect Us All.

Most people know that the Deport Volunteer Fire Department is seeking donations so that they can purchase a new fire truck. This truck, which is not bigger or even better equipped than the old one, would be used for grass fires, and small structure fires, plus being used to help with large fires requiring both trucks. The cost of this truck is \$35,000. That's a staggering amount of money.

It's easy to shrug the whole thing off, or pitch in just a few dollars and let it go at that.

But when the Deport Fire Department gets a call they certainly don't shrug it off and "let it go at that".

Since they always put out their best effort, shouldn't we?

And "we" doesn't mean just citizens of Deport. Seventy-Five percent of the calls they respond to are outside the city limits! They answer well over 100 calls a year.

Their excellent performance and good equipment have resulted in lower insurance rates, and a feeling of security that we are all protected by these volunteers.

But no job can be done well without the proper tools...and a fire truck is a tool. The twenty-five year old truck can't be fixed any more. It's brakes are marginal. Parts are unavailable, and it is mostly a matter of

faith that holds it together every time it must be taken out.

The State Insurance Board will not certify the truck any more because it is too old.

How many grass fires would have consumed houses and barns if this truck hadn't been there to extinguish them?

How many tractors, combines or trucks would have burned without this truck?

How much fuel has been washed away from the scene of accidents by it's water supply?

What happens when it finally won't make "just one more run"?

The Deport Volunteer Fire Department is always there for "us".

They get up when it's 10 degrees and go to pour water on a burning house.

They go out when it's 100 degrees to battle a fire that boosts the temperatures to 140.

They do the things no one else wants to have to do: prying the doors from wrecks to extract both the injured and the dead.

searching through the ashes of a smoldering structure to recover a charred body; pulling the drowned from pools, wells or ditches; telling just arrived families that they have lost everything they owned to the destructive force that is fire.

They don't ask anything in return.

They offer their hard work, their time, their hearts.

They draw no salary, if they miss sleep, they have no chance to recoup it.

They ruin clothes, which they pay for themselves.

They disrupt their family life, miss meals and pull muscles.

No one thinks of it much, but it takes a lot of courage to stand next to a blazing wall and pour water on it. It takes courage to walk into a burning building, air pack or not.

The threat of explosion, collapsing roofs, asphyxiation, broken bones or serious burns, even death, is always there.

So now they are asking for help. What do they ask for? Not glory, not glamour, not even thanks.

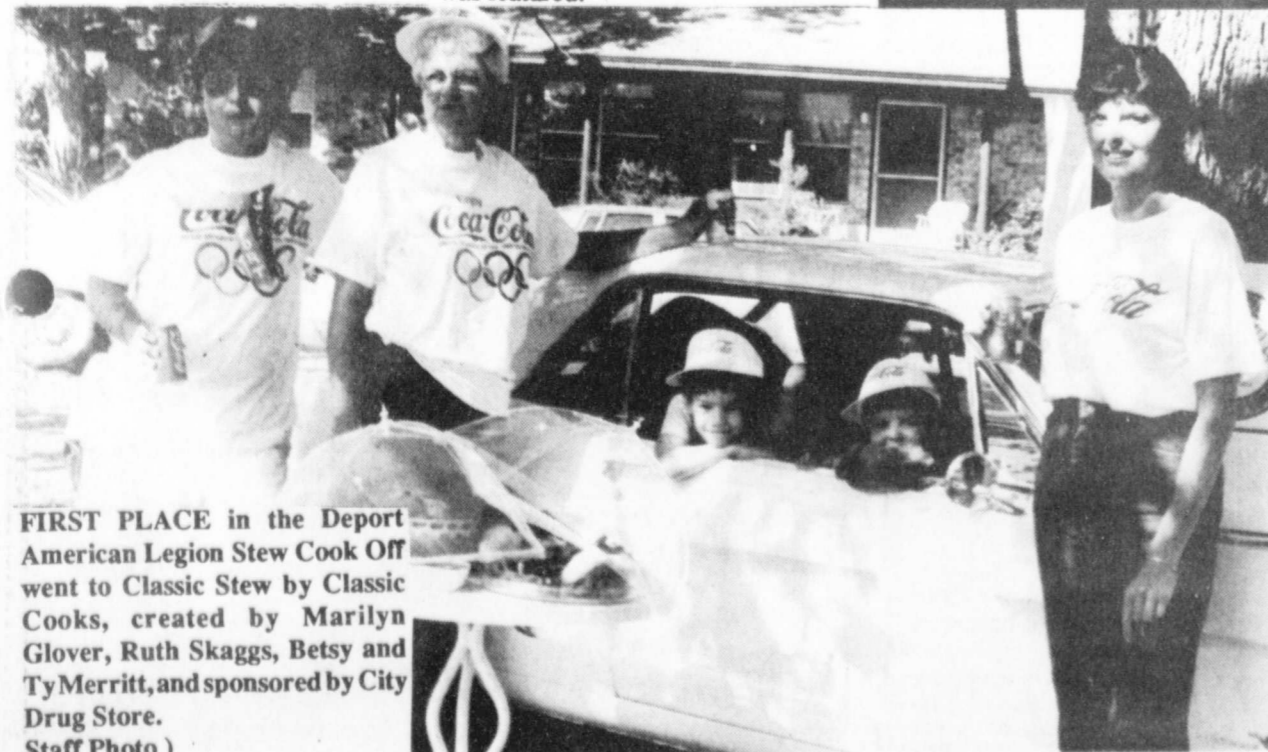
They are asking for donations. Donations so that they can buy a new truck to HELP KEEP ON HELPING US.

The score remained unchanged until late in the third quarter. With 3:52 left in the quarter, Trevor Upchurch bulled through the Foxes defensive line to give the Patriots their second T.D.

Once again, the conversion failed, and the Patriots led by five with a score of 12-7.

The Patriot defense for the most part proved to be unyielding to the Foxes drives and the Patriot offense contented to move the ball on the ground pounded the Foxes' defense.

The Foxes challenged the Patriot defense with passing attacks, reverses and draw plays to no avail.

After the game, Coach Chambers urged his team to not celebrate their well-deserved victory past Saturday noon. Chambers predicted next Friday's homecoming game against Mt. Vernon will be their greatest challenge so far this year. The Mt. Vernon Tigers have a 3-2 record thus far.

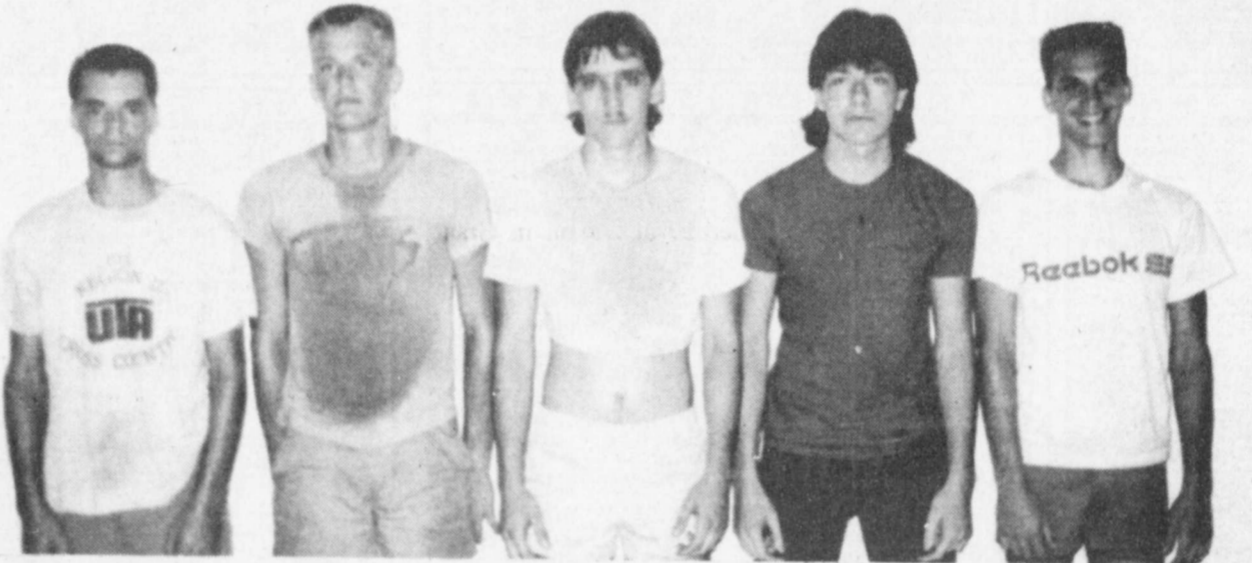

Leading tacklers were Jeff Jones and Clay Francis.

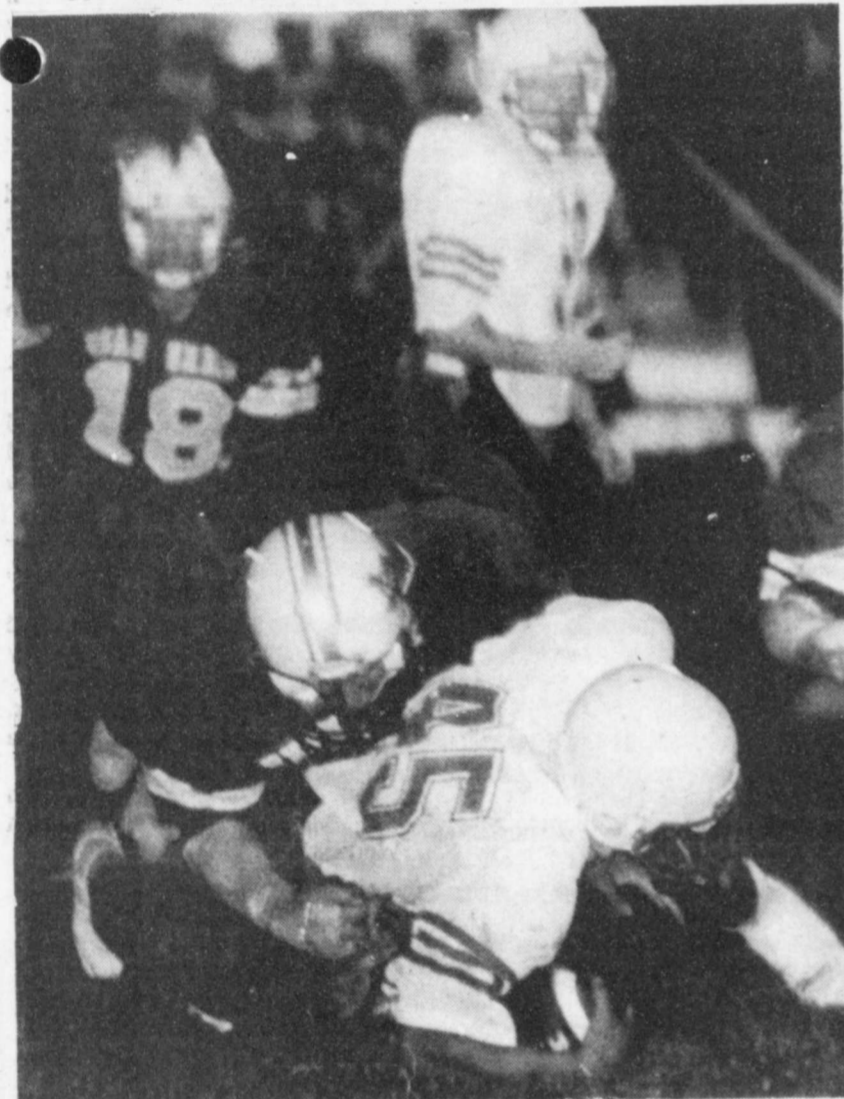
Next week, the Pats host Mt. Vernon to get homecoming activities started with school-wide pep rally following the game.

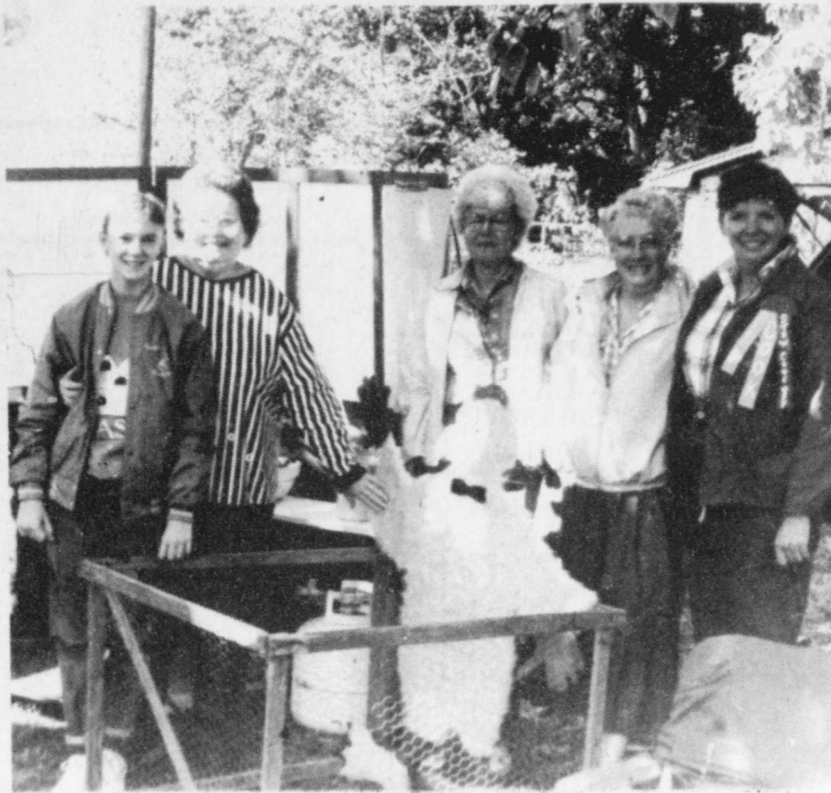
