Scott Scudder Turning Dream Into Reality

When Scott Scudder was just a kid, he often dreamed of playing major-league baseball, as do many young boys. But unlike most of the youngsters, whose dreams never come true, Scott has a chance to turn his dream into reality.

Scott, a 1986 graduate of Prairiland High School, will report to the Cincinnati Reds' spring training camp in Plant City, Florida, February 18 with hopes of making the major-league roster.

At Prairiland, Scott played quarterback on the football team that posted the best record in school history. He was also the leading scorer of the basketball team. But it was on the pitcher's mound that he gained most of the attention.

The Blossom native was selected in the first round, the 16th pick overall, of the 1986 major-league draft, and has spent the last three years pitching in the Reds' minor-league system.

Scott knows that making the major-league squad will be a difficult task and says he will not be disappointed if the Reds assign him to their Class AAA team in Nashville.

"I'll be up there with the major-league team during spring training, but I don't know for how long," Scott said. "Probably the only way I'll stay will be if there's an injury to someone."

"But they said that at the end of the year when they expand their roster, I'll have a good chance of being called up."

A team carries 25 players on its major-league roster during the year, but at the end of the minor-league season can expand its roster to a maximum of 40 players. Usually a team brings up only six or seven players from its farm system instead of the allowed 15.

Scott spent his first minor-league season with the Billings (Mont.) Mustangs, the Reds' rookie-league team. In 1987, he pitched for the class A Cedar Rapids (Iowa) Reds.

Last season, Scott began the year in Cedar Rapids but was moved up to the class AA Chattanooga (Tenn.) Lookouts midway through the season.

The hard-throwing right-hander had a 7-3 record at Cedar Rapids and posted a perfect 8-0 mark after being promoted to Chattanooga. His earned run average in 1988 was 2.93.

The Lookouts won the 1988 Southern League Championship. In his only playoff outing, Scott pitched Chattanooga to a 2-1 victory over the Memphis Chicks, a Kansas City Royals farm team.

Winning is not something new to Scott. At Prairiland, the lanky hurler helped the Patriots to a 30-1 record and a class 3A state championship his senior year.

Scott finished the year with an

unblemished 19-0 record and struck out more than 200 batters. To show that he was not a one-dimensional player, Scott played first base when he was not pitching. On the offensive side, he posted a .398 batting average.

During the 1986 season, the Patriots had quite a following. Not only did Patriot faithful fill the stands at the Prairiland baseball field, but at times there were as many as 25 scouts, both college and professional, who lined the chain-link fence with notepads and radar guns.

Scott's father, Bill, who is the head coach at Prairiland, said that the 1986 season was quite an experience, and it would have been easy for Scott and the rest of the team to have gotten distracted by all of the hoopla.

"I was usually so wrapped up in the game that it was more exciting than nerve-wracking," Bill said. "I don't remember saying much before the games...just to play hard and don't worry."

Tony Duncan, a teammate of Scott's at Prairiland, remembers that Scott was very intense before each outing.

"Before the games, the rest of the team would be cutting up and joking around, but Scott always had his game face on...especially on days that he was pitching. You could tell how serious he was about winning," Duncan said.

Scott said his life has not changed a great deal since signing with Cincinnati, and he has learned that he must stay relaxed if he wants to succeed in the big leagues.

"Really the biggest change is just the fact of getting out and having a place of my own," he said. "You've got to be laid back and relaxed. Since the team plays every night, you can't afford to be uptight."

Scott is generally away from Blossom from February through September, but he always comes home to the quiet and relaxed atmosphere. "It's a welcome to come home and not be traveling and all," he said. "I kind of look forward to coming back and just relaxing and not doing anything at all."

Those who have known him most of his life will say that Scott has not let success go to his head. He still enjoys the simple things in life, the things that are found in Blossom.

Scudder enjoys a hamburger at the local cafe with his grandmothers, Robbie Nell Scudder and Rosella Carter. He will quickly join in a pickup game of basketball, one of which can always be found, and he still enjoys a good fishing hole.

"He's still the same old Scott," Tony Duncan said. "You can tell that he has matured a lot by being out on his own most of the time. But he still acts the same and likes to do the same old thing she used to do."

However, Scott said that some

people tend to treat him differently and to shy away at times.

"Some people treat me different, but they are the ones I really don't know well," he said. "I guess they think I won't talk to them or something. But the people that I know and the ones who know me treat me the same as they always have...they should, I'm not any different."

The people in Blossom may treat him the same, but opposing batters are learning that Scott is no ordinary pitcher.

Scudder said that the biggest thrill of his young career was a no-hitter he threw against the Wausau (Wis.) Mariners last season. Scudder threw two no-hitters while at Prairiland, both during his junior year.

It is only fitting that Scudder's brightest memory is of a no-hitter, since the pitcher he admires the most, Nolan Ryan, holds the major-league record with five no-hitters.

Ryan, who formally played with the Houston Astros of the National League, the same league as the Reds, recently signed with the Texas Rangers of the American League, ending the possibility that Scott might square off against his hero. The only possibility now will be if they meet in the World Series.

"At one time, the Reds were talking about signing Nolan. We were really hoping that would happen and Scott would have a chance to play on the same team with him," Bill, who played college baseball at the University of Alabama, said.

Both Scott and Ryan rely on the fastball. Ryan holds the record for the fastest baseball ever measured at 100.9 mph. At age 20, Scott has been clocked at about 95 mph.

"One thing about Scott is that he has always been loose and flexible, that's good for a pitcher," Bill said. "But his ability to throw is just a gift from God. God blessed him with that."

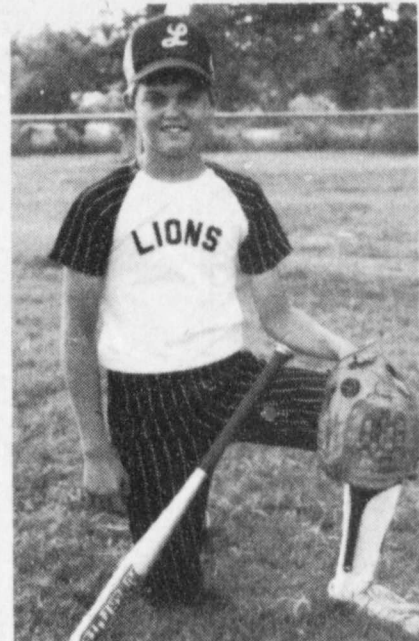
Just as Ryan has left memories in major league baseball, Scott has left many memories around Blossom,--the no-hitters, the pro scouts, the state championship--but the event that Tony Duncan remembers most happened during Scott's junior year at Prairiland.

We were playing Paul Pewitt; Scott was coming around third and Bill was pushing him toward home plate," Duncan recalled. "Scott turned around to go back to third base and he and Bill got tangled up."

"Both of them were rolling around on the ground...everyone on the bench was cracking up."

When and if Scott makes it in the big leagues, one thing is certain, there will always be a homeing instinct calling him back to East Texas.

"If I make it in the pro's, I'll probably live somewhere around Blossom," Scott said. "I'll come back here to the small-town life."

Key Club Promoting "Just Say NO"

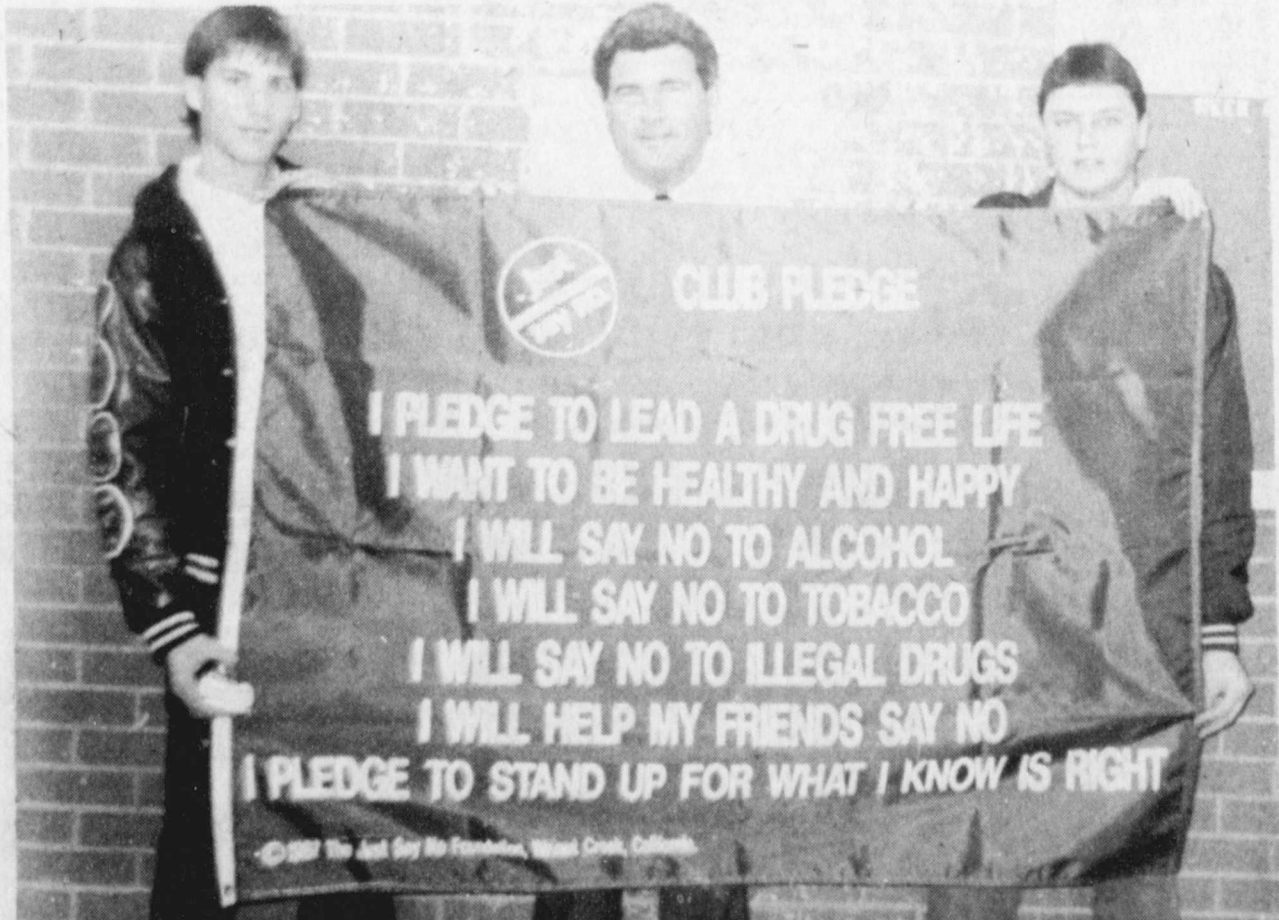

Manhunt Combs Post Oak Area Monday, Tuesday

A manhunt that began at 3:30 p.m. on Monday, ended Tuesday morning when the suspect apparently walked up to a residence asking for "help" only to find himself held at gunpoint until law enforcement officers arrived moments later.

The incident began Monday afternoon when Drug Enforcement Agency officers attempted to make a drug-related arrest.

Two suspects fled in a vehicle at that time, but spun out into a ditch at Post Oak, a small community near Blossom, reports indicate.

The fugitives fled on foot, but one was apprehended almost immediately. The other made it into the woods.

Described as a "white male, around

40 years old," the subject became the object of an intensive search.

Five Lamar County Constables, two DPS troopers, a Game Warden, Lamar County Sheriff's Deputies and the Precinct 1 Commissioner, were among those who joined in the chase, as well as dogs and a dog handler from McCloud, OK.

The dogs ran the subject until around 7 p.m. that night when the fugitive apparently plunged into a deep creek to shake them.

The man was sighted several times, dodging in and out of heavily wooded areas.

Residents were warned to be sure and lock doors and vehicles up and be on guard and the search continued until late that night, then resumed at

daybreak.

According to reports, the suspect walked up to a residence on the Lamar-Red River County line, but just inside Red River County, and told a man that he had his 4-wheeler stuck, sometime Tuesday morning. The resident, alerted to the fact the manhunt was going on, demanded identification, then held the suspect at gunpoint until officers could close in and make the arrest without further incident. At that time, law enforcement officers were only a short distance behind.

Charges are being prepared, and the suspect will be taken from Red River County to Lamar County. Further details were unavailable Wednesday morning.

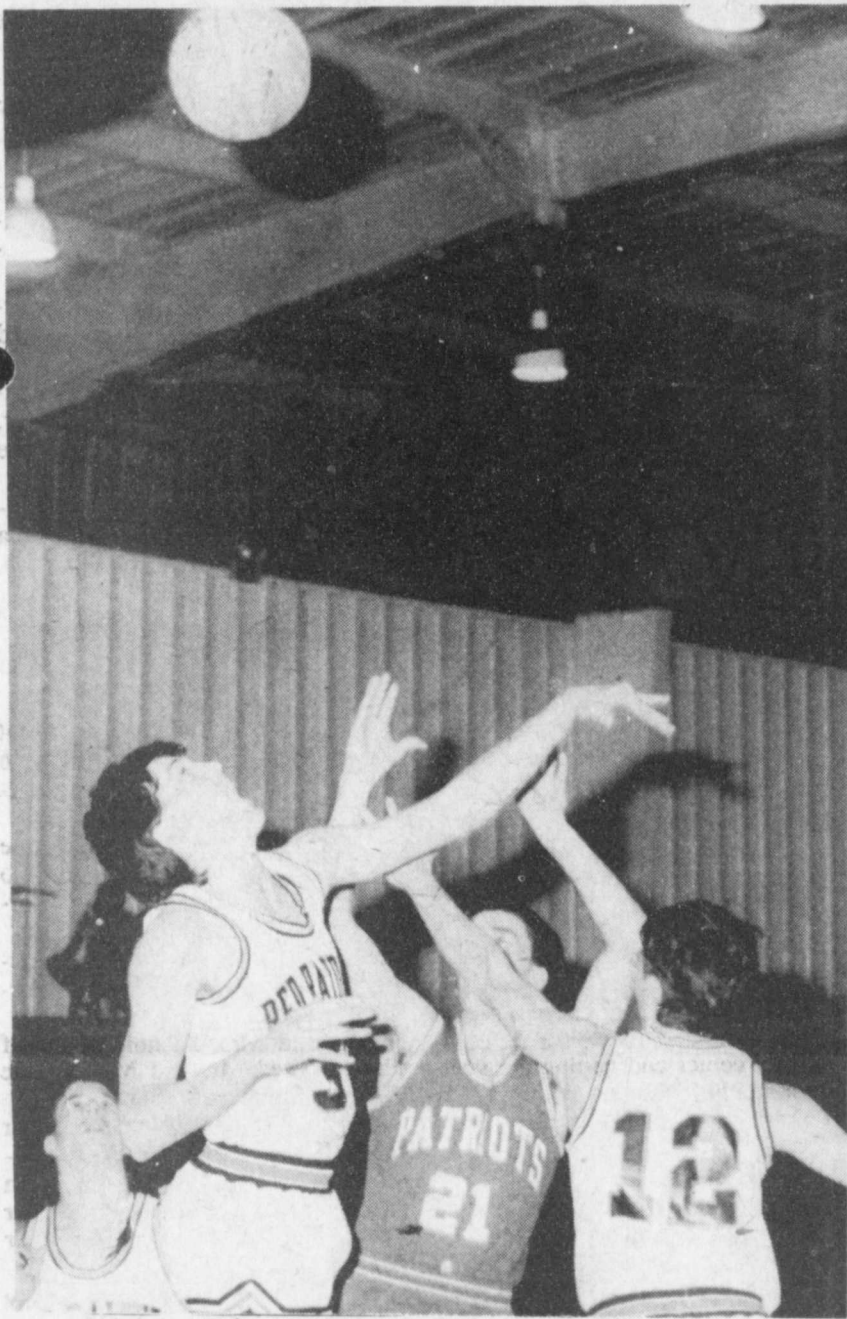

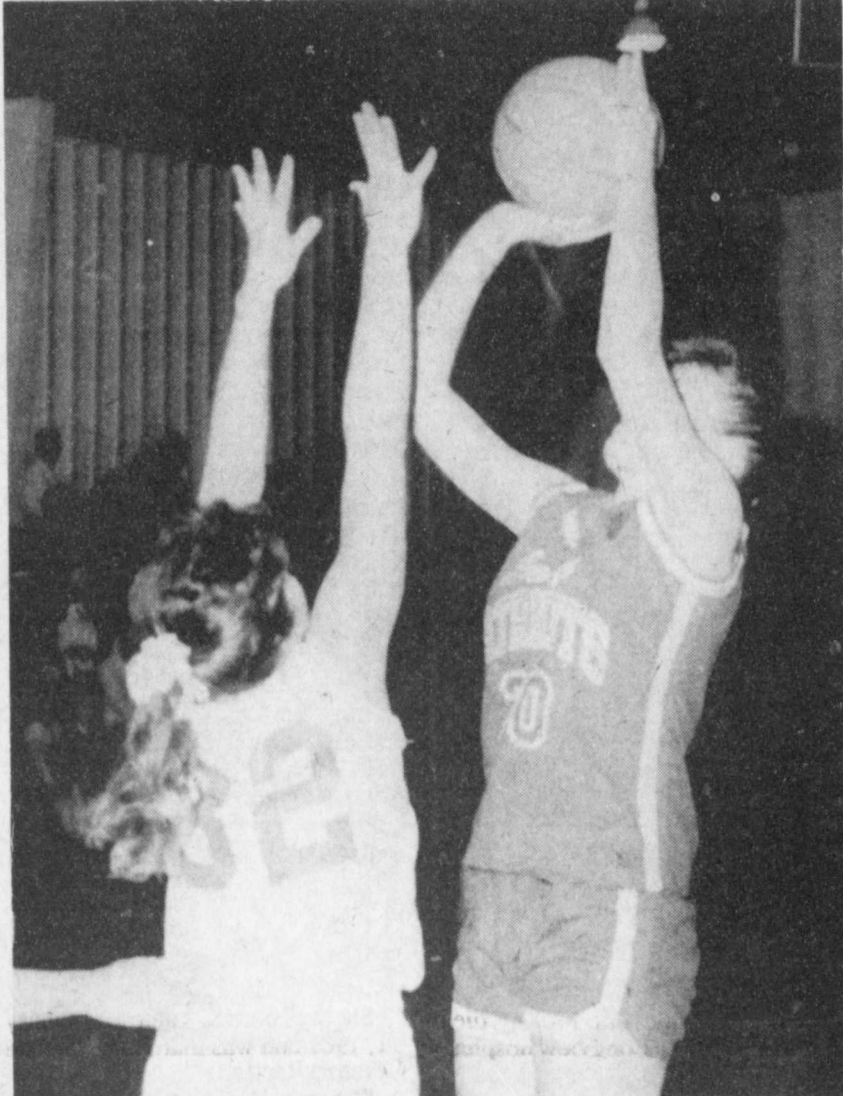
Kindle led the Patriots with 22, while Baker and Borden each added 10.

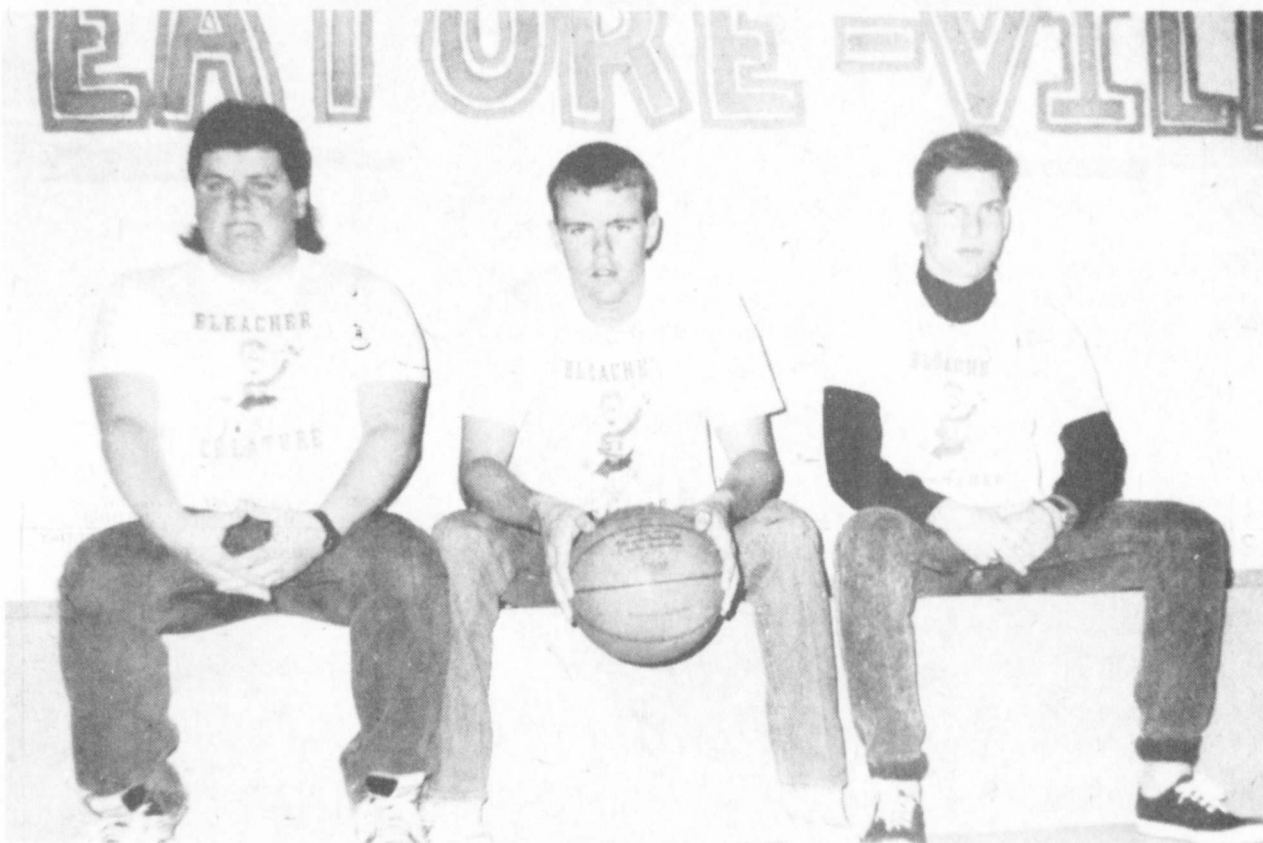

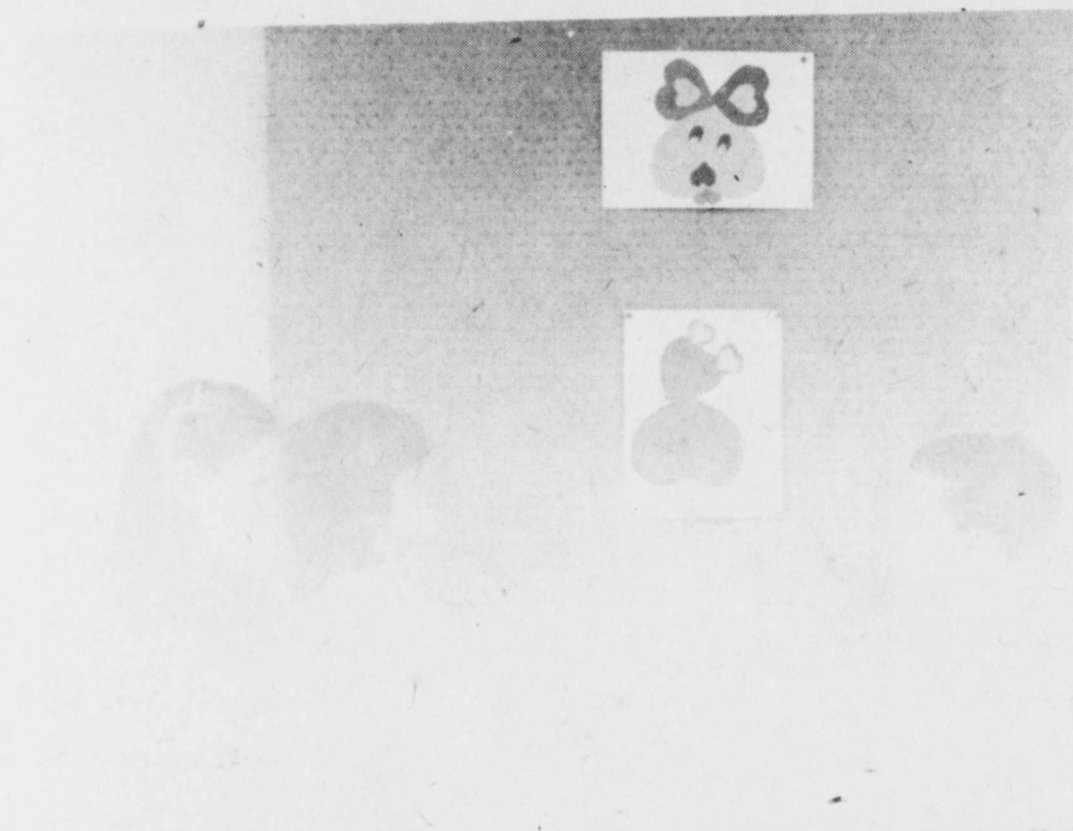

Patterson Files Bill

State Representative L.P. (Pete) Patterson, D-Brookston, has filed HB 971 which imposes a \$10 fee on persons convicted of a felony or misdemeanor. The money collected will be deposited into a special county jail fund in each county for the purpose of acquiring, constructing, maintaining or operating county jail facilities.

WHAT A NERVE
Some people experience a
stabbing, burning pain and
cramps, especially around the
third and fourth toes, that is not
relieved with massage. That is
because this type of pain, which
often moves toward the toes, is
not a result of a muscle prob-
lem. Most probably, it is the result
of a neuroma. This refers to
thickened nerve tissue which
develops as a response to con-
stant pressure on the nerve.
Most often, the site of this prob-
lem is the front of the foot. It is
here that too-narrow shoes
restrict the foot from spread-
ing as a person walks. The re-
sultant constriction and pres-
sure causes nerves and bursas

The meeting was closed with "The Lord's Prayer".

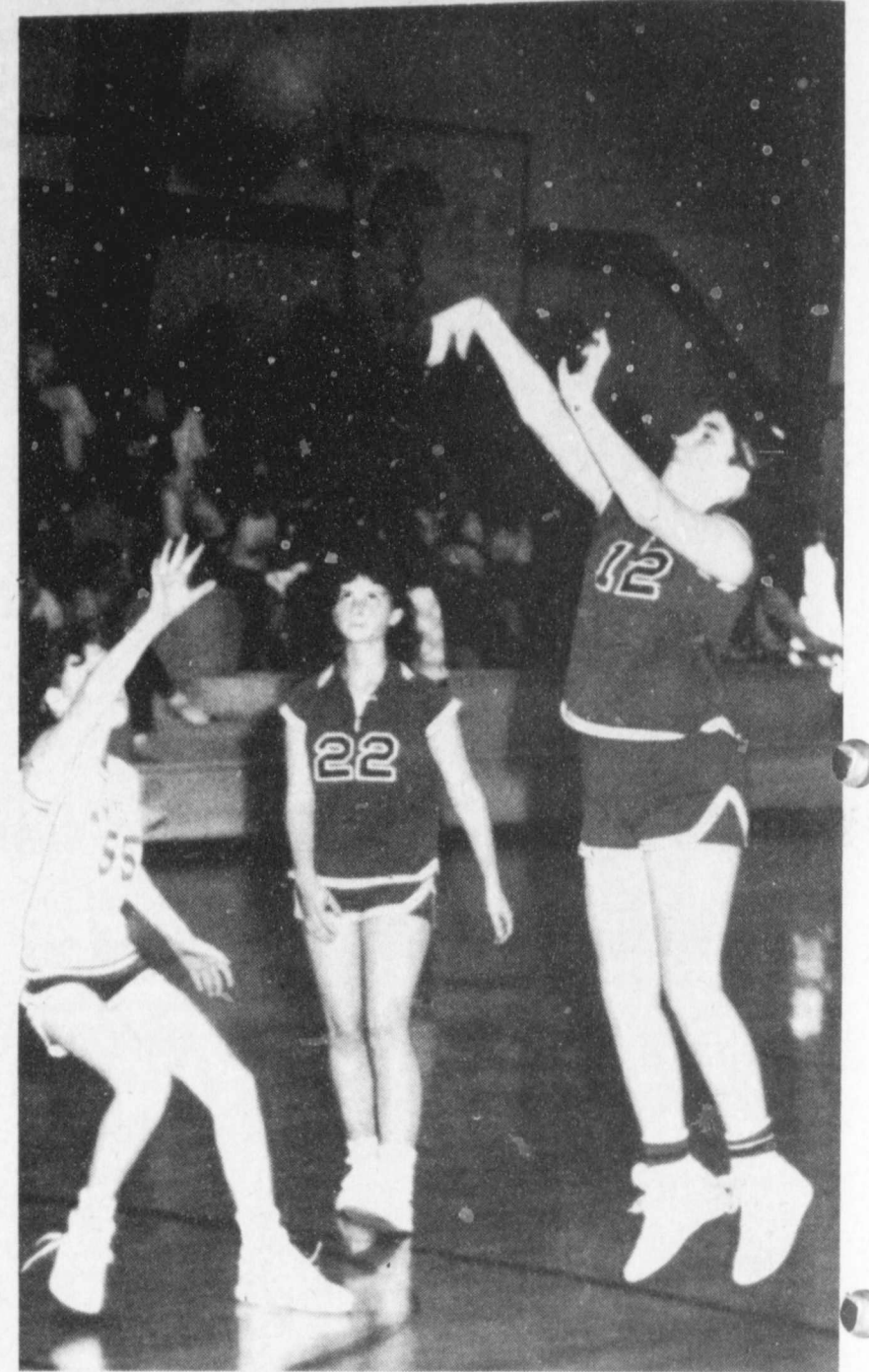

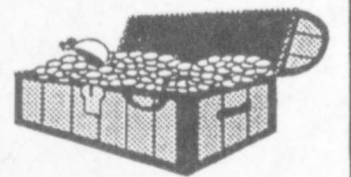
