## Statewide Tax Rebates Are Up For First Quarter

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that statewide sales tax rebates for the first four months of 1989 are up 13.4 percent over last year's tax allocations for the same period.

"The economy is in good shape, which is being reflected in our state and local sales tax collections," Bullock said.

Last year's sales tax rebates through April were up 6.5 percent over the 1987 rebates for the same period, while 1987 rebates through April actually fell 6.3 percent compared to the same period in 1986, Bullock said.

Bullock warned that the monthly comparisons in this month's report are skewed because merchants col-

lected and reported an extra day's worth of sales taxes in February 1988, which was a leap year.

"We estimated that as much as \$1.9 million in sales tax could have been reported statewide for February 29 last year. One day may not seem like much, but it's enough to throw the numbers off," Bullock said.

Checks totaling \$57.2 million were sent Friday to 902 cities that collect local sales tax at either one or one-half percent, and the state's six metropolitan transit authorities and one city transit department received \$27.1 million. Another \$5.7 million was allocated to 91 counties that collect the one-half percent county sales tax.

Mt. Pleasant received \$89,119.44 for an 11.83% increase while Talco received \$2,078.46, showing a 16.41% decrease over payments to date from 1988.

Bogata received \$1,207.10 for this period, for an 11.23% increase while Clarksville received \$11,318.59 for a 10.13% increase. Detroit received \$925.85 for a 22.55% decrease.

Blossom received \$613.51 for a 35.68% increase for payments to date in 1989.

Deport received no payment this period. 1989 payments to date total \$4,273.67 for a 32.58% increase.

Paris received \$112,501.84 for a 5.96% increase over 1988.

Ushers were Dustin and Justin O'Neill of Hugo, OK, who also served as candlelighters.

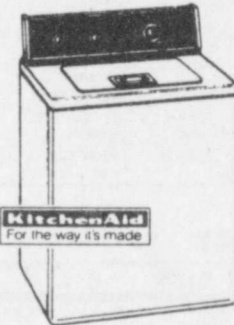

## Patriot Sports Report

### Patriots Defeat Quitman, Mt. Vernon

Prairiland's Patriots used timely hitting, outstanding fielding and Martin Babb's two hit pitching to defeat Quitman's Bulldogs for their fourth straight District win.

The Pats improved their District record to 4-1 and their season mark moved to 10-4. They finish the first of three District rounds in first place all by themselves.

Quitman's outstanding freshman, Carlos Berry, matched Babb pitch for pitch for the first three innings. Outstanding defensive plays by their baseman, Kevin Mowery and second baseman, P.G. Morrison, highlighted the Pat's defensive efforts early in the game.

Prairiland scored their first two runs in the fourth inning as Shannon Baker led off with a walk, moved to second on a perfect sacrifice bunt by Wade Sparks, and scored on a single by Jack Kindle. Kindle then scored courtesy of two errors by Quitman's infield.

Two more runs were scored in the fifth inning. Kevin Mowery walked and advanced to third on a single by Baker. After Wade Sparks was hit by a pitch, Mowery and Baker both

scored on a ringing double to left centerfield by Babb. This made the score 4-0 after five innings.

Shannon Osborn left off the top half of the sixth inning by blasting a long home run over the left centerfield fence. The Pats then scored another run in the top of the seventh to make the final score 6-0.

Babb fanned eleven batters as he was in complete control of the game. Babb and Scarano each had two base hits for Prairiland.

Prairiland exploded for five runs in the top half of the fourth inning to break open a close game as they blasted Mt. Vernon's Tigers here Monday afternoon.

With the win, the Pats extended their District mark to 5-1 and their season record moved to 11-4.

Jack Kindle went the distance on the mound for Prairiland, giving up only three base hits. The three Mt. Vernon runs came on a three run home run by second baseman Stout in the fifth inning.

Prairiland scored the first run of the game in the second inning. Shannon Osborne led off with a walk and scored on a double by David Miller.

They scored their second run in the third inning as Wade Sparks led off with a single and scored on a double down the left field line by Martin Babb.

The big fourth inning began with Kevin Mowery flying out to rightfield. Shannon Baker and Wade Sparks both singled and advanced to second and third as Babb walked. Jack Kindle then drove in two runs with a long double to the gap in right centerfield. Babb scored as Giovanni Scarano grounded to the shortstop and the throw to the plate was late. After P.G. Morrison singled, Trevor Upchurch lined a single to right that hit the foul line. Scarano and Kindle both scored but upchurch rounded first too far and was thrown out.

After Mt. Vernon scored their three runs in the bottom of the fifth, Scarano scored in the sixth inning to make the final score 8-3.

Kevin Mowery made several fine plays at third base as did P.G. Morrison and Shannon Osborne on second and first.

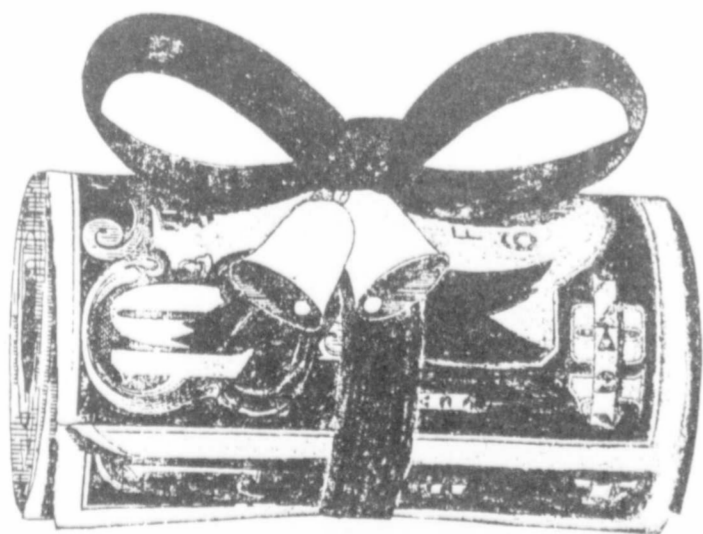

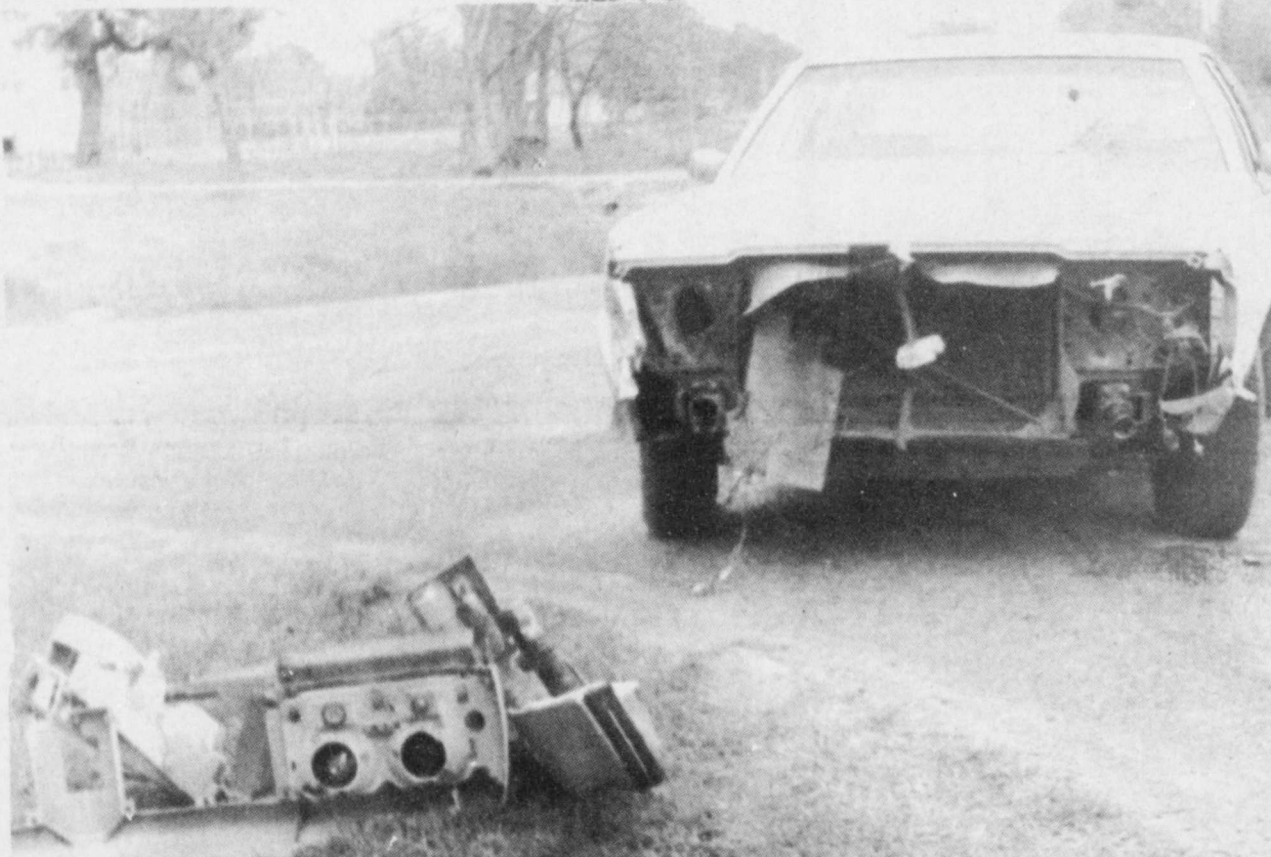

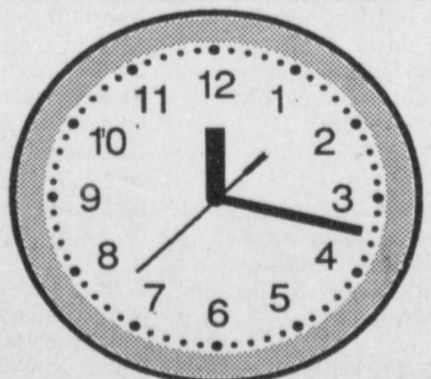
