Medical Clinic To Remain Open

Since the announcement by Dr. T.H. Glover that he will retire indefinitely on April 29, 1989, many things have taken place.

A spokesperson at the Deport Medical Clinic told the paper that L.P. McCuiston Regional Medical Center has purchased the clinic and a doctor will be available on Monday, May 1.

The new doctor will be temporary, as within a very few months, they expect to have a Family Practitioner

on a permanent basis. Those who were thinking about picking up their medical records in order to transfer to another doctor do not have to do so.

Officials have stated that the clinic will continue to hold the same office hours it has in the past. Open daily Monday through Friday from 8 until 5, except on Wednesday's, when the office will close at noon, and open until noon on Saturdays.

It is also expected that the cost of a

visit will remain below that of a visit in Paris.

In addition, trauma and suturing work will be done, treatment of minor injuries, etc. This has not been a part of Dr. Glover's practice for some time.

A family practitioner means total family health care, from infants on up, and will indeed be an asset to the community. The staff at the clinic will remain the same.

Meeting To Discuss Unit System

Special Prosecutor Selected, Sparks Case To Go To Trial

After many months it now appears that the case of Jimmie and Yuba Lee Sparks will be brought to trial.

The executive director for the Texas District and County Attorneys Association has agreed to serve as a special prosecutor in the case pending against the two former Lamar County Precinct 1 Commissioners, who are charged with official misconduct.

Tom Krampitz, a prosecutor from Lockhart, has committed to serving in the case, according to County Attorney Tom Wells.

Jimmie and Yuba Lee Sparks have been charged with knowingly and intentionally violating the law concerning the paving of a road leading

to a youth baseball complex. The indictments were handed down last September. Officials claim that the road to Woodall Field, operated by the Breakfast Optimist Club, and located on 271 South just outside of Paris, is not a public road.

No formal requests or motions have been filed in the district clerk's office concerning Krampitz as of yet, but Wells apparently intends to file a formal request within a few days.

Defense attorney Brady Fisher has stated that he expects both of his clients to be acquitted of the charges.

The charges stemmed from a "tip" to a local radio station, and Fisher and the Sparks' have said that they believe the charges were politically motivated.

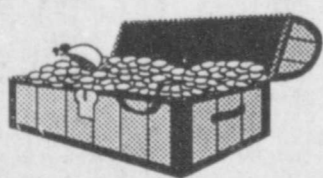

The pizza sales were fun for all as well as profitable, and the group plans to repeat sales next year.

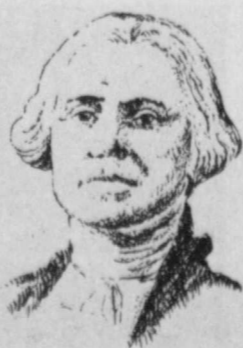

PATS is designed to parallel the district's philosophy of education which states that all students should be provided the opportunity to develop academic potential and with the opportunity to use their acquired skills and knowledge to think logically, critically and creatively.

Gifted and talented students are

those who excel consistently or who show the potential to excel in any one or combination of the following areas: general intellectual ability, specific subject matter aptitude, creative and productive thinking ability, leadership ability, ability in the visual and performing arts and psychomotor ability. These students require educational experiences beyond those normally provided by the regular school program. PATS, according to school officials, addresses the following areas of giftedness: creative/productive thinking ability and general intellectual ability. Students who are selected participate in the program one-half day per week in a resource room located on the high school campus.

Friends Help Keep Veteran Woodard Active, Involved

Tommy Woodard used to spend his time hunting and fishing along the Red River. Now, at age 75, most of his time is spent sitting at the Gulf Station in Blossom.

Occasionally he will join a game of checkers, but most of the time he just sits on the bench behind the counter talking and swapping one-liners with the employees and customers.

Woodard lives at the Blossom Housing Authority, an apartment complex for the senior citizens of Blossom. The complex is about 3/4 of a mile from the station, but Woodard made the walk daily for several years.

However, he suffered a mild heart attack two months ago and is not able to get out and do as much as he had before.

Woodard has no immediate family members nearby who are able to take care of him, and personal pride and a little stubbornness won't let him be placed in a nursing home.

Woodard never married, so he has no children to care for him.

An older sister lives in nearby Reno, but is unable to drive or get out much herself, so Woodard relies on friends to provide him with rides and anything else he needs.

"Shorty" Harrison, a friend and Blossom resident, frequently checks on Woodard to make sure he has been taking his medicine and eating properly.

While Woodard was hospitalized in January at the Sam Rayburn Veterans Memorial Hospital in Bonham, the Rev. Larry Bridges and other members of the Blossom Church of God cleaned Woodard's apartment so he would have a tidy place to come home to.

Station employees Brad and Darrell Sessums, and their older brother, Steve have provided Woodard with transportation to and from Bonham for doctor's appointments.

Long-time friend Herman Glover, takes Woodard to Farmer's Market in Parks where they play dominoes and swap stories with other retired men.

Woodard said he doesn't play dominoes much anymore because his sight has become poor, but he still enjoys the trips to Paris because it allows him to get out of his apartment.

In the living room of his dimly lit apartment, the furniture is sparsely scattered. There are two chairs, one an old table chair, the other an easy chair covered in burnt orange vinyl. Beside the easy chair is a portable

AM radio with which Woodard listens to broadcasts of the Texas Rangers' games during baseball season.

The only other piece of furniture in the room is a wooden dresser with a large mirror attached. Sitting on the dresser are pictures from yesteryear.

There are pictures of Woodard when he served in the Army during World War II, pictures of some of the young men he served with—some returned from the war, others didn't. There is also a picture of his sweetheart from the '40's.

In the top drawer of the dresser is more memorabilia from his youth. Woodard has saved letters from Army buddies and other friends. He keeps the letters in the drawer with other small items and an old cigar box.

Inside the cigar box are medals Woodard received from the Army. He is most proud of the Silver Star and the Combat Infantry Badge. There are various smaller medals in the box, but Woodard's memory sometimes fails and he cannot remember the names of the smaller ones.

As Woodard went through the box, sorting through its contents, he recounted stories from the time he spent in the Armed Forces. As he told the stories, his eyes shifted their focus from the box, and cast a stare against a bare wall, going back in time.

His stories jumped from his days spent in boot camp at Mineral Wells and Camp Roberts, to Camp Pickins, VA where he was stationed before going overseas, to the time he spent overseas.

Woodard explained that he was drafted in 1942, and at age 32, was older than his captain.

He saw his first combat when his division landed at Casablanca in 1942. The infantry division he was in first fought the French and later the Germans, he said.

"We fought the Germans in Casablanca, and then they crossed over into Sicily. We had to make a landing on Sicily and finally we chased them to Austria," he said.

Although most of his experiences overseas were not pleasant, he said one of the most thrilling events in his life happened while the Americans were "mopping up" in Austria.

"Hitler had a house and lived down there in Austria," Woodard said. "I've been through his house. Several of us went down in his cellar and drank his wine."

"Not many people can say that they've drank Hitler's wine...not many Americans, anyway."

The Army remained in Austria until

two months after the United States hit Japan with the atomic bomb. Woodard got out of the Army in 1945 and returned to North Texas where he had grown up.

"I bought me a car and my shirttail didn't hit my back," he laughed!

Although he was out of the Army, he continued to have a part in the advancement of the U.S. Armed Forces. He worked at a construction company in Oklahoma that was the first to build planes that are able to refuel other aircraft while in flight.

Woodard's last job was at the Blossom Truck Stop. The truck stop has since closed down, and the Gulf Station is the only full service station in Blossom, and that could explain the reason he spends most of his time there.

"I enjoyed working at the truck stop," he said. "I ran it by myself—greased cars, waited on the front and swept the drive. That was the hardest part, sweeping the drive."

He still claims that he could handle the duties of running a service station, "Oh, I could outwork any of them boys down at the station. They don't know what work is," he said as a broad grin crossed his face.

He also lets Brad and Darrell Sessums know that he could outwork

them. As they enter and leave the station, Woodard comments that they are slow or that they don't know what they are doing.

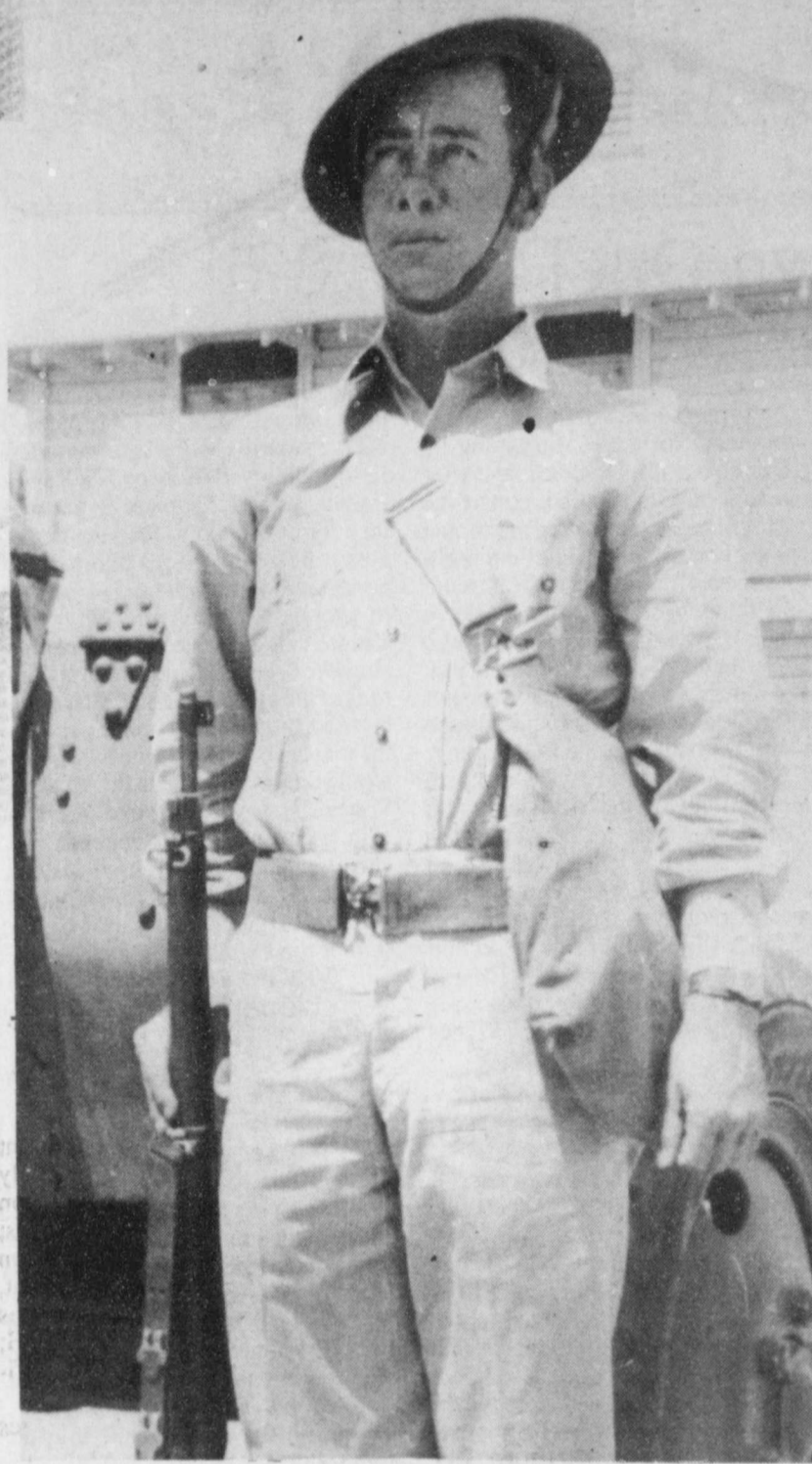
His comments are usually responded with "Get out here if you can do better," or "Go back to sleep on that bench, Woodard," to which he just laughs.

"Yeah, them boys have taken pretty good care of me," he said seriously.

Brad Sessums said, "You've got to have respect for those guys like Woodard. They served in World War II...they made this country what it is today."

Woodard is just one of many senior citizens whose life has become heavily dependent on others. But unlike many of them, Woodard has his friends in Blossom who are helping him get by.

Editor's Note: Mr. Woodard has recently suffered a broken hip and is now home from the hospital. He is slowly improving. His friends, carrying on the tradition of caring and helping, check on him frequently. Brad Sessums goes by daily and others help provide him with the care he needs right now. Soon, they suspect, he will be back at the station, quipping and joking with the rest.
