Our English friends have been here for three weeks now.

During that time they have seen the temperature plummet from 90 to 54 degrees, and have experienced some of the really top class storms Texas is known for, including high winds, hail and deluge.

There are the obvious things, such as rabies. England has no such deadly disease.

They also have only one poisonous snake in the whole of their country, where we have rattlesnakes, copperheads and moccasins. We warned them about sitting on logs, kicking over rocks and logs or reaching in to pick things up in heavy brush without looking first.

The look on their faces when we warned them about chiggers was priceless. Having exposed them to a variety of Texas tales they first thought that we were pulling their leg about chiggers.

Tiny red bugs that bit without you knowing it, left welts and weren't visible sounded to them like another tale. However, numerous people were willing to confirm that chiggers were real, and they ceased sitting on the grass!

Poison ivy was shown to them and its effect was explained. They looked at one another in horror....again, England, peaceful and garden-like, has no such thing.

Coyotes howling at night convinced them that wolves must be waiting to tear the throats from newborn calves, and when we told them about the butcher bird hanging his victims on barbed wire fences they were certain that we were telling lies again.

But a foray into the bird book confirmed that we told the truth.

When word of two people shooting at one another came over the police scanner they were absolutely horrified.

In a country where policemen seldom carry guns, only night sticks, even law enforcement officers made an impression on them.

They met the local constable, game wardens and a Texas Ranger, and they all had on weapons...something these ladies found vaguely disturbing.

Everywhere they heard about hunting and fishing...something that is in short supply in their small, crowded country.

The "blazing heat" nearly melted them, and they can't conceive just how hot it really gets in the summer. Already it is ten degrees warmer than their July and August ever gets!

In short, as Texans, and as Americans, we take for granted the left-over harshness that goes with our vast, sprawling nation.

Over and over they were impressed by what our pioneer ancestors must have had to face...and in commenting on it, brought us to realize that things we take for granted don't always seem normal to the rest of the world...but instead seem harsh and a little frightening.

The front page of the Deport Times carried two large articles in the July 2, 1959 issue. Both were devoted to the formal opening of the Deport Medical Clinic, with Dr. Thomas Hale Glover as the physician, and to the doctor himself. An editorial by Editor, Sam C. Holloway, read, "Welcome back to your home town, Dr. Thomas Hale Glover."

At that time, Dr. Glover had just completed his internship at Parkland Hospital in Dallas.

Born and reared in Deport, the second son of Mr. and Mrs. Curtis B. Glover, he graduated from Deport High School in 1950 with a grade average of 98.45. He was Valedictorian of the senior class and was senior class president, business manager of the annual and sports editor.

He graduated from the University of Texas in 1954, receiving a B.S. in Pharmacy, graduating with highest honors, receiving the Merck Award for attaining the highest scholastic average in pharmacy courses and was elected a member of Rho Chi, National Honorary Pharmacy Society.

He graduated from Southwestern Medical School of the University of Texas in 1958, receiving a Doctor of Medicine degree; he received a Mosby Scholarship Book Award for scholastic excellence in 1958 and ranked #3 in the class of 91 over the four year period in medical school and was elected to Alpha Omega Alpha National Honor Medical Society, and was the chapter's president in 1958.

During his 30 years of practice, he had patients from an enormous area, as well as locally, with people coming from Idabel, OK, Cooper, Mt. Pleasant, Clarksville, and Paris, plus the immediate area.

Dr. T.H. Glover has been a tremendously dedicated person, serving his patients with patience and care. He has also been a tremendous asset to the community, and his welcome 30 years ago concluded with "Welcome Back, Dr. Glover, May God bless you in your efforts to restore health and relieve suffering."

Storms Rip Through Area, Dump Rain

The immediate area was luckier than some places, but still received from three to four inches of rain within a five-hour period during the early morning hours of Tuesday, May 16.

Winds, wall clouds, massive lightning and some hail scoured the area, as an enormous weather system wrecked havoc in north Texas.

In some places, but not locally, hail devastated wheat crops and newly emerging seedlings, broke windows and caused roof damage. Locally, erosion and washing was the major problem. Some fields had low portions completely under water, others suffered from rows being washed away.

Several roads were closed temporarily as the heavy rains kept water at

high levels which created creeks running out of banks and over roads.

School bus routes were delayed, as was delivery of groceries and other items supplied by routes, but no major disruption occurred, unlike nearer to Dallas or Gainesville, which suffered worse flooding.

Several wall clouds formed, and weather-watchers kept a wary eye on them. Some reports of brief tornado funnel clouds were received by local law enforcement officials.

Lightening and wind caused power outages that lasted form a few minutes to several hours.

The storm system was expected to pass through the area by Wednesday night.

Patriot Sports Report

Pats Win District!!!

Prairiland's Patriots exploded for nine first inning runs enroute to a 15-4 win over Quitman here Monday afternoon.

With the win, the Pats sewed up the District 13AAA baseball crown.

Shannon Baker, Wade Sparks and Martin Babb drew first inning walks off Quitman's ace, Carlos Berry, and all three scored when Jack Kindle laced a sharp double to right centerfield.

Kindle scored when Gio Scarano singled left field and Scarano followed Kindle home as Kevin Mowery singled.

Shannon Osborne struck out for the first out of the inning before David Miller sacrificed Mowery to second.

P.G. Morrison and Baker then walked to reload the bases for Sparks, who doubled them home.

Sparks then scored on a single by Babb before Kindle lined out to the second baseman to finally end the inning.

Prairiland scored again in the second inning, when Scarano walked and came around when shortstop Holcomb made a bad throw to first on a ground ball by Miller. Martin Babb picked up the win for the Patriots as he allowed only four hits and struck out 12 batters.

His only trouble came in the bottom of the third when two walks and a long home run by catcher Tucker cut the margin to 10-4.

Prairiland failed to score in the third and fourth innings, but picked up three more in the fifth.

Shannon Baker led off with his second single of the game and was sacrificed to second by Wade Sparks.

Martin Babb singled him to third where he scored on a sac fly by Kindle. Babb moved to second on the throw home and scampered home on a single by Scarano.

Mowery singled Scarano to third where he scored as Mowery got into an intentional rundown between first and second.

The Pats scored twice more in the top half of the sixth as Miller walked and raced to third on a sharp double to left by P.G. Morrison.

Miller scored when Baker lifted a sacrifice fly to left and Morrison breezed home as Sparks lashed another base hit.

Babb then set the Bulldogs down one, two, three in the bottom of the inning and the large gathering of Pat fans began a big celebration.

"We played a real good game except for a small lapse in the third and fourth innings," said Coach Bill Scudder.

The Pats, who finished district play at 13-2 and the regular season at 19-5, will now play DeKalb probably Monday or Tuesday of next week.

On Friday, May 12, Prairiland used five RBIs by hot hitting Kevin Mowery to down Winnsboro's Red Raiders by a score of 9-4 here Friday afternoon.

The game was played in a steady rain for the first three innings as the Pats held a 5-1 lead.

The muddy conditions seemed to put a damper on the players spirits as most fans at the game lined the fences in their cars instead of sitting in the bleachers and cheering.

Three Patriot faithfuls, Tracey Scott, Shelley Ladd and Laurie Malone, did brave the rain to sit in the bleachers and cheer for the boys.

Winnsboro scored a run in the top of the first for a 1-0 lead but Prairiland quickly scored three times in the bottom to put the game over quickly.

Wade Sparks walked with one out and stole second, then moved to third and scored on two successive wild pitches.

Jack Kindle doubled to right center and Gio Scarano walked. Both men scored as Kevin Mowery doubled to deep left centerfield.

Prairiland got the 3-1 lead and basically hum-drummed their way to

the win.

Mowery drove in two more runs in the third as Martin Babb and Scarano both reached on base hits and scored via a Mowery single.

Mowery drove in Kindle in the sixth inning with a bloop single to right field.

Winnsboro did manage to score three times in the top of the sixth, but it was a case of too little too late, as Jack Kindle shut them down in the seventh to secure the win.

Prairiland moved to 12-2 in district and 18-6 on the year as they continue to inch their way to a district championship.

On May 9, P.G. Morrison blasted a line-drive three run home run in the bottom of the fourth inning to break a close game open and send Prairiland on the way to a 10-5 win over Rains.

Jack Kindle also had a good day at the plate as he had two hits, scored two runs and also drove home three runs.

Martin Babb went the distance, giving up four hits and striking out nine for the win.

Rains jumped in front 2-1 before the Patriots scored twice in the bottom of the third to gain a 3-2 lead. Wade Sparks walked and moved to third as Babb singled, Babb moved to second on the throw-in. Both men scored as Kindle grounded a single to right field. Shannon Osborne and David Miller both walked to set the table for Morrison's blast in the bottom of the fourth.

Prairiland scored twice more in the bottom of the fifth as Kindle walked and stole second.

Kevin Mowery continued his hot hitting as he singled to left to score Kindle. He stole second and scored as Miller's ground ball to third was misplayed.

Prairiland moved to 11-2 in district play and 17-6 for the year as they continue on the road to a district 13AAA title.

Approximately 70 parents, adult leaders and area 4-H'ers attended the District 5 4-H Round-up at Kilgore College on May 13.

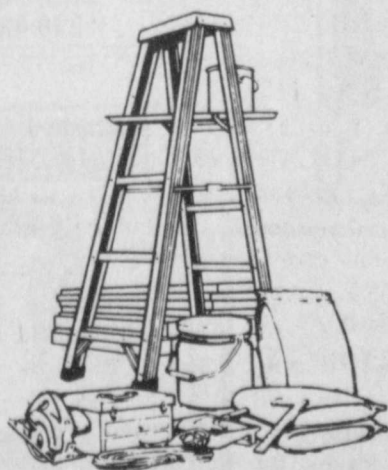
Clubs being represented were Chisum, Red Oak, North Lamar, Blossom, Tigertown and Paris. Lamar County 4-H'ers accumulated the most
