## Manhunt Searches For Burglary Suspect Three Arrested, One Still At Large

Three men are under arrest, while one remained the object of a massive manhunt in Red River County near Bogata Wednesday morning, in what appears to be related incidents that are part of a larger theft ring.

The series of events began in Hopkins county when two Mexican men, Jose Antonio Delgado and Armando Vallejo Canijalez, were spotted burglarizing a house near Winnsboro.

Law enforcement officials chased the van the pair was in into Franklin County, where the vehicle was wrecked and the fugitives fled on foot. A massive manhunt involving between 50 and 75 law enforcement officials began at 10 a.m. that morning and didn't conclude until the TDC dogs were brought in at approximately 8:00 p.m. Within 30 minutes the two suspects were apprehended.

According to reports from Hopkins County, the two suspects told O.C. Rupe, with the Criminal Investigation Division of Hopkins County, that they had been in the country for about three weeks and were recruited by a man in downtown Dallas to commit burglaries in a 100 mile radius of Dallas. The van they were driving was reported stolen in Ft. Worth. The two men were arraigned on Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle and Burglary of a Habitation and returned from Franklin County to Sulphur Springs in Hopkins County.

The second incident began after two more Mexican men burglarized a house belonging to Dale Mills of Sulphur Bluff.

A Dallas County Deputy, B. W. Little, spotted the van the pair was driving as it turned north off of Hwy. 271 in Bogata onto Hwy. 37 N. Little was en route to Red River County Jail to pick up a prisoner there. He began a pursuit of the van, which turned off on a gravel road north of the Fulbright cutoff. The road, which turns east, is just past what was for years Massey's BBQ. The van wrecked on a curve a short distance down the road, and the officer apprehended one suspect then. Rafael Delgado, the suspect in custody, is believed to be a brother to the Delgado arrested the day before in Franklin County. A console Television and a pulsar watch was found in the van.

The other suspect fled into dense brush and woods on foot. At about 9:30 Tuesday morning the call went out and the Red River County search was launched.

Throughout a hot, humid day search teams attempted to seal off a perimeter and searched from Hwy. 37 all the way to FM 909 in the Cuthand Area. Over 100 officers and volunteers have been involved in the search.

Volunteers on horseback, air search and TDC dogs have all been utilized in the chase.

Sometime during the night the suspect apparently stole a truck in the Cuthand area from Alvin Baker. The vehicle was found on FM 909 wrecked Wednesday morning.

At press time, in spite of heavy rains law enforcement and volunteers were still looking for the suspect.

## Commissioners Court Adopts New Septic System Rules, Changes Constable's Mileage

The Lamar County Commissioners Court has voted to adopt the Texas Water Commission's minimum requirements on the installation of septic systems in Lamar County.

Minimum requirements are: if a home is situated in the county, it must be located on at least one-half acre, unless a percolation test requires additional property. To build a new home, property owners must purchase a permit from the county at a cost of \$35.00.

In other business, the commissioners voted to stop paying the County Constables \$.21 per mile and go back

to the old system of paying \$485.00 per month for car expenses instead.

Commissioner for Precinct 1, Troy Owens, stated to the Times that "The reason for the move was to try to keep Constable's car expenses within the limit of their budget."

According to Owens, even though the last Commissioners Court voted to pay the Constables \$.21 per mile, with a total budget of \$5,000.00 per year, the car expenses were still budgeted at \$485.00 per month for the year.

Owens says, "The Constables are doing a good job for the County, and

the move is not intended to hurt any of them. However, the county has a budget and that \$485.00 is all they have for those car expenses. It's just something we have to live with," he continued.

Owens also said that perhaps in the next budget, things can be revamped to help the Constables with their expenses. Without making the decision they did, he said, the Constables

## Early Management Influences Meat Quality

By Herb Brevard

Proper management of slaughter steers early in their lives produces more tender, higher grading carcasses, according to livestock specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Dr. Randall Grooms.

"Good management of this year's calf crop will pay dividends in terms of performance, marketing and efficient use of management," said Dr. Grooms. "Hopefully, producers who have not vaccinated or castrated their calves will do so in the near future."

All calves should be vaccinated

against clostridium diseases by the time they are four months old. Normally, the cows colostrum protects the calf for the four months.

Grooms suggests using a 3 or 4 way blackleg vaccine under typical conditions, or a 7 or 8 way if the calves are to receive a heavy grain ration.

"Male calves should be castrated as early as possible," Grooms said. "Early castrated steers experience less stress, gain faster and produce more tender, higher grading carcasses than those castrated at 500 to 700 pounds. Commercial feedlots, where most of our calves go, normally do not feed

bulls."

"Although steer calves do not normally gain as fast as bulls, implants can boost steer gains by 10 to 15%," he said. "Implants give an excellent return to the producer."

"All heifer calves should be vacci-

nated for brucellosis between four and 12 months of age," Grooms said. "Those heifers being retained for breeding should be vaccinated as close to four months as possible."

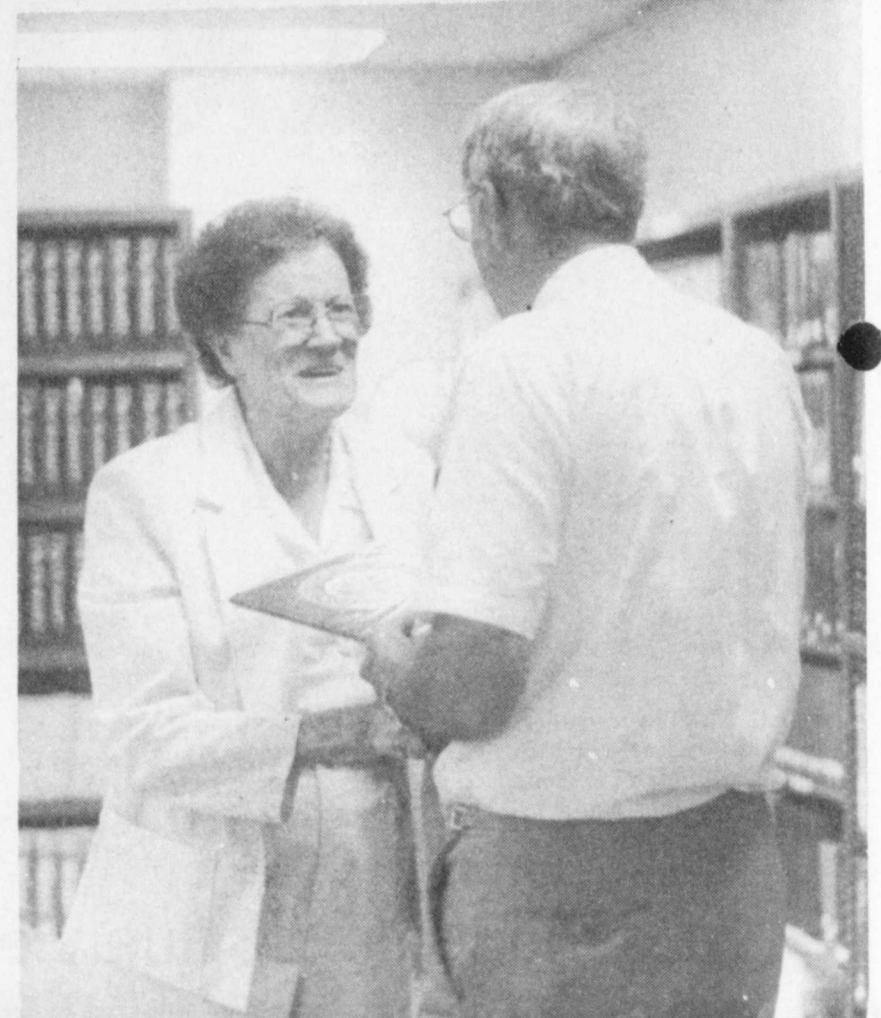

## Crop Demonstration Reported

Each year a number of result demonstrations are established in the county to take a look at a new variety, a new herbicide, economics of controlling a disease or a different management practice. The results of these demonstrations have had an impact on the agriculture industry in the county over the past 75 years, and I am sure there are some of the long time farmers, in the county could relate many more examples than I.

This year we have focused in on wheat and soybeans as well as a new crop possibility for the area. In the wheat variety demonstration which is located on the Slate Shoals Farm in Northeast Lamar County, we are looking at eight varieties this year - McNair 1003, Saluda, Florida 302, Caldwell and Pioneer 2548, 2551, 2180 and 2157. We have already gained a wealth of information on cold susceptibility and have collected data on disease susceptibility.

We, also have a seed treatment demonstration at the same location. Florida 302 wheat that was injected with Head Smut was treated with four different chemicals in stand and cold tolerance as a result of the use of some of the materials.

Another important demonstration that has been established is wheat disease control. We are continuing to study the economics of controlling septoria leaf blotch chemically.

There are fungicides that are available that do a beautiful job of controlling the disease, but can we save enough grain to pay for fungicide and application cost is the question. Hopefully, we will have a good data after this year to guide producers in making this decision.

We applied Tilt at growth stage 6 and also at growth stage 8 to each of the varieties in variety demonstration. This was replicated four times in each variety.

There was heavy septoria in the stand at the time of each application but no rust was present. That which was treated at growth stage 6 remained free of septoria but that treated later appears to have as much infection as that receiving no chemical. One cannot fully know the affects until yield data is obtained. Several fields of wheat have received Tilt, so we should have a much better understanding of economics of wheat disease control as a result.

We continue to do soybean variety demonstration work in this area. Variety work is year is limited to the early maturing varieties. The county variety demonstration is located in the Direct bottom on land farmed by Joe Sanders. It was planted on April 6 and the following varieties are included: Williams 82, Asgrow 3935 and 4393, Pioneer 9391 and 9442, Desota, Prize 822, Crawford, Terra Competitor and Helene Hy-Performer 401. These are all either group III or IV.

At the Paul Bayer farm located at Garrettts Bluff, we are taking a look

at a new crop possibility, Pigeon Pea. We are evaluating this crop for its grain and forage possibilities. It performed well in the Brazos bottom on the Texas A&M University Experiment Station last year. Hopefully, it will perform well in the county. Two varieties were planted last week that will be evaluated for forage produc-

tion and three additional varieties will be planted about the middle of May for grain production.

The farmers who serve as demonstration cooperators are a very important part of the program. To the 1989 cooperators and all previous cooperators a big "thank you" for their contribution to the agricultural industry.

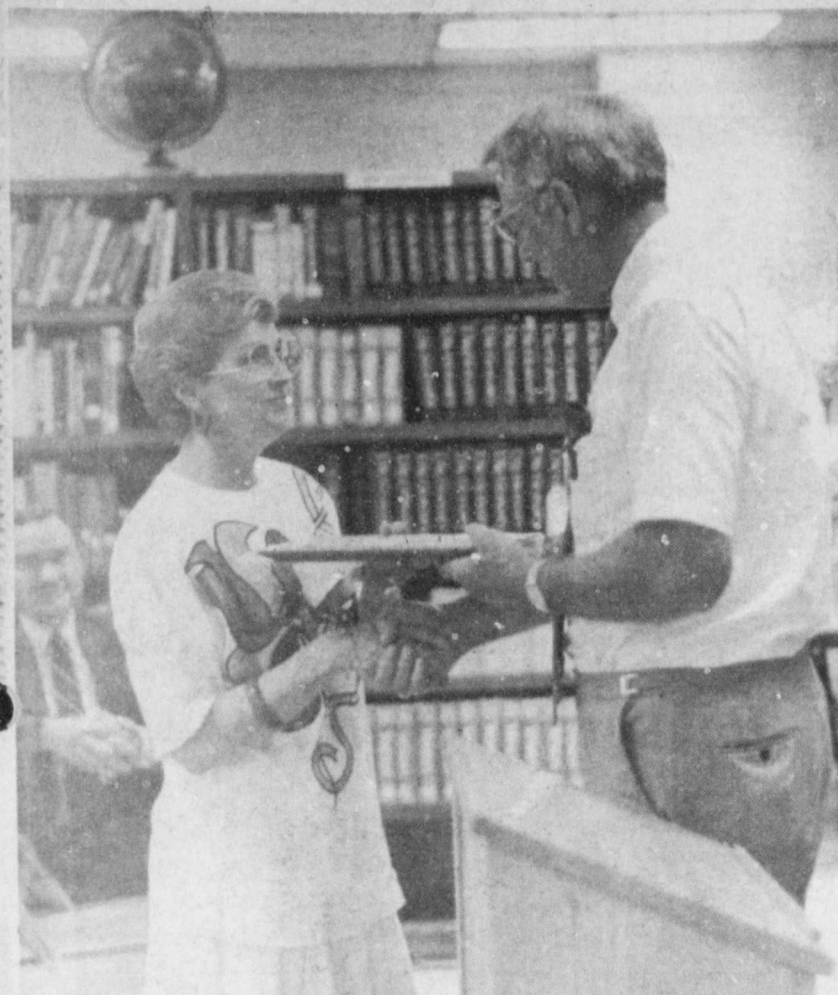

## AG Census Aired

Early data from the 1987 Census of Agriculture show that Texas had 188,788 farms based on \$1,000 or more in sales of agricultural products. Of the total number of farms, 68,792 had annual product sales of \$10,000 or more. Census data also showed that land in farms in Texas totaled 130,502,792 acres. Eighty-five percent of this land was on farms with \$10,000 or more in sales. The 1987 census showed that Texas farmers and ranchers sold \$10.54 billion in agricultural products and that farms with \$10,000 or more in sales averaged \$147,748 per farm. Data also showed that \$2.96 billion or 28% of total agricultural sales were for crops while \$7.58 billion or

72 percent came from the sale of livestock and poultry and their products. Census information comes from all identified farm and ranch operations in the United States. The Census Bureau defines a farm as any place where \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were produced and sold or normally would have been sold during the census year. Sampling is used to collect data for selected items and to account for non-responding farm operations. Reports for individual counties may be obtained by writing the Information Office, Agriculture Division, Bureau of the Census, Washington, DC 20233 or by calling 301/763-1113.
