Last Wednesday, when the presses were broken and our usually hectic schedule had gone beyond retrieval into the ludicrous, we wandered out to an antique store...not to buy anything, just looking while we killed the extra two hours in Paris we were faced with.

And while the rain roared down, I found myself swept back into childhood by the antique pictures that were for sale.

Still in their original frames, these prints, never expensive new, were bringing some pretty fancy prices. But as I looked at each one, it brought back memories of darkened hallways, lace curtains blowing gently at opened windows and elderly ladies exchanging gossip and lengthy tales!

For as a child I was taken with my grandmother to visit her many friends.

Not being interested in the gossip, I turned in boredom to the pictures on the walls, and studied them in every detail.

At least one of these prints could be found in those parlors with their stiff furniture and cold fireplaces. Many homes held the same pictures.

The millions have been made by the theme, for they could be found throughout the nation in "old-fashioned" homes.

Annie G. Anderson had a print of the "End of the Trail", the classic Indian and his dejected horse, crowded out of existence. So did a distant relative at Bogata, whose name I can't recall.

Then there was the collie dog howling over a newborn lamb in a freezing snowstorm. I can't recall which lady had that one, but know it always worried me as a child. Was the lamb dead, and the dog howling in dismay? Or was he trying to get someone to come and help it? At any rate, that cold and snowy scene was melancholy and disturbing to me.

The little girl and boy crossing a bridge, guarded by a watching angel and the small girl listening to a bird singing were two more familiar examples.

The one that was always my favorite was on hand too, the wolf, standing on a hillcrest looking down at the lights of a small town. Was he hungry? Was he lonely? Or was he on the verge of extinction from civilization?

Those pictures were maudlin in the extreme by today's standards...but the sight of them recalled the scent of lemon on iced tea glasses, and the chatter of ladies who are long gone.

It's been a long time since I sat on a stool at my grandmother's feet, looking at those inexpensive, common prints.

But it was a clear as day when those antique-store pictures jogged my memory.

Area Weather Produces Hail, Tornados, Heavy Rains

Rain, high winds, tornados and hail have characterized the past month's weather, leaving behind serious damage. And, according to weather reports, it isn't over yet!

Last Wednesday night high water resulted throughout the area from heavy rains, and a hail storm devastated the crops in the Cunningham, Taylortown area. Large hail there left fields looking like a shredder had run over them. Gardens, roofs and cars also suffered damage. Cotton plants about a foot tall were completely stripped of foliage. From Taylortown to Talco trees were uprooted and metal buildings stripped of sheet metal. Milo crops large enough to be in the boot stage looked as if a giant had twisted and torn the foliage away, leaving them totally destroyed.

Some farmers were in the process of applying fertilizer to the milo, which added to their financial loss. Cotton crops destroyed will have to be replanted in cotton because those in which certain herbicides had been

applied cannot be used for other crops, the chemicals not being compatible with anything but cotton. Generally, most farmers had put their major expenses into the ground, and that is now lost.

In Talco residents could only watch as a small tornado passed over their main street, but, fortunately, never touched down. 3 and 3/4 inches of rain fell in about one half an hour. Mt. Pleasant was not so lucky, suffering severe damage from twisters and high winds.

But the most wide-spread problem has been the rain. Construction workers, farmers and others in weather-affected jobs have been forced to watch as more and more rain fell. Although excellent for pastures, and, basically, crops, damage to roads and bridges have resulted from the unusually heavy downpours. Hay baling has been a "hit or miss" situation, with very little hay being put up that hasn't been rained on. Plow-

ing, gardening and other seasonal chores are behind.

To date there has been nearly as much rain in 1989 as there was throughout 1988.

In January of this year there were only 10 rainy days, with a total of 3.81 inches. February had 13 rainy days with 5.61 inches. March had 12 rainy days for a total of 5.16, and April was dry with 8 rainy days but a total of only 1.22.

Then, in May there were 13 rainy days and a total of 11.66 inches. In June, as of the 12th, there had been 10 rainy days and 7.20 inches of rain, with more still falling.

This adds up to 89 wet days and 34.66 inches of rain for the year! Whether the rains will continue this pattern into the traditionally hot, dry months of July and August remains to be seen.

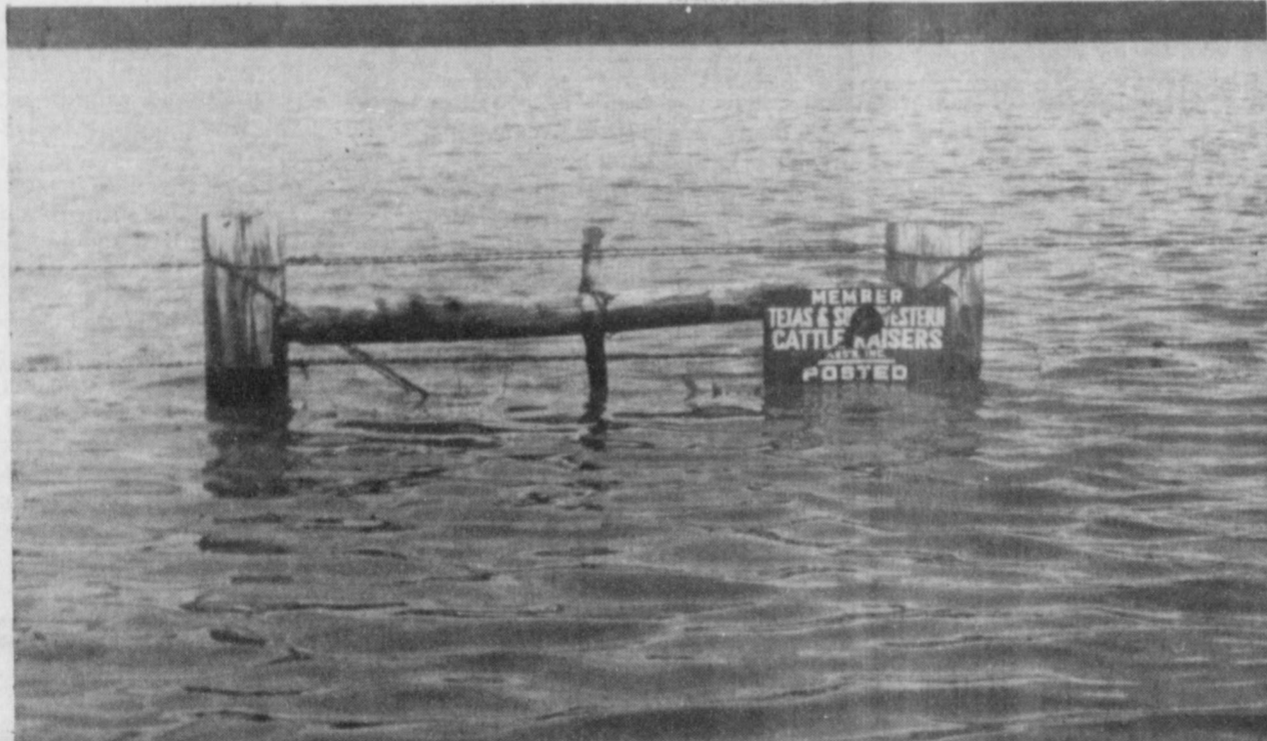
Meanwhile, the weather continues to remain a topic of conversation and a subject of concern.

McClahanan and Holmes was retained as the auditor for the 1988-89 books.

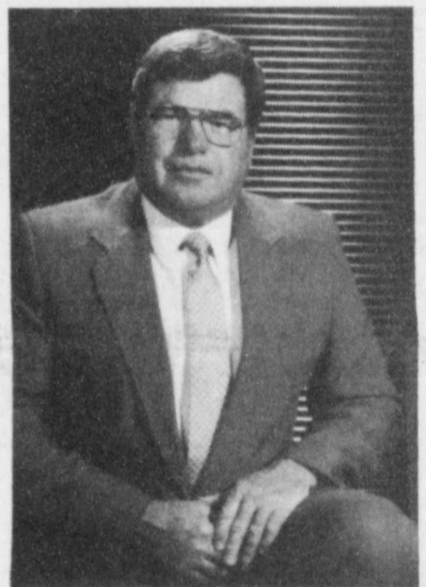
The board will begin a search for a head boy's basketball coach and an assistant girl's coach.

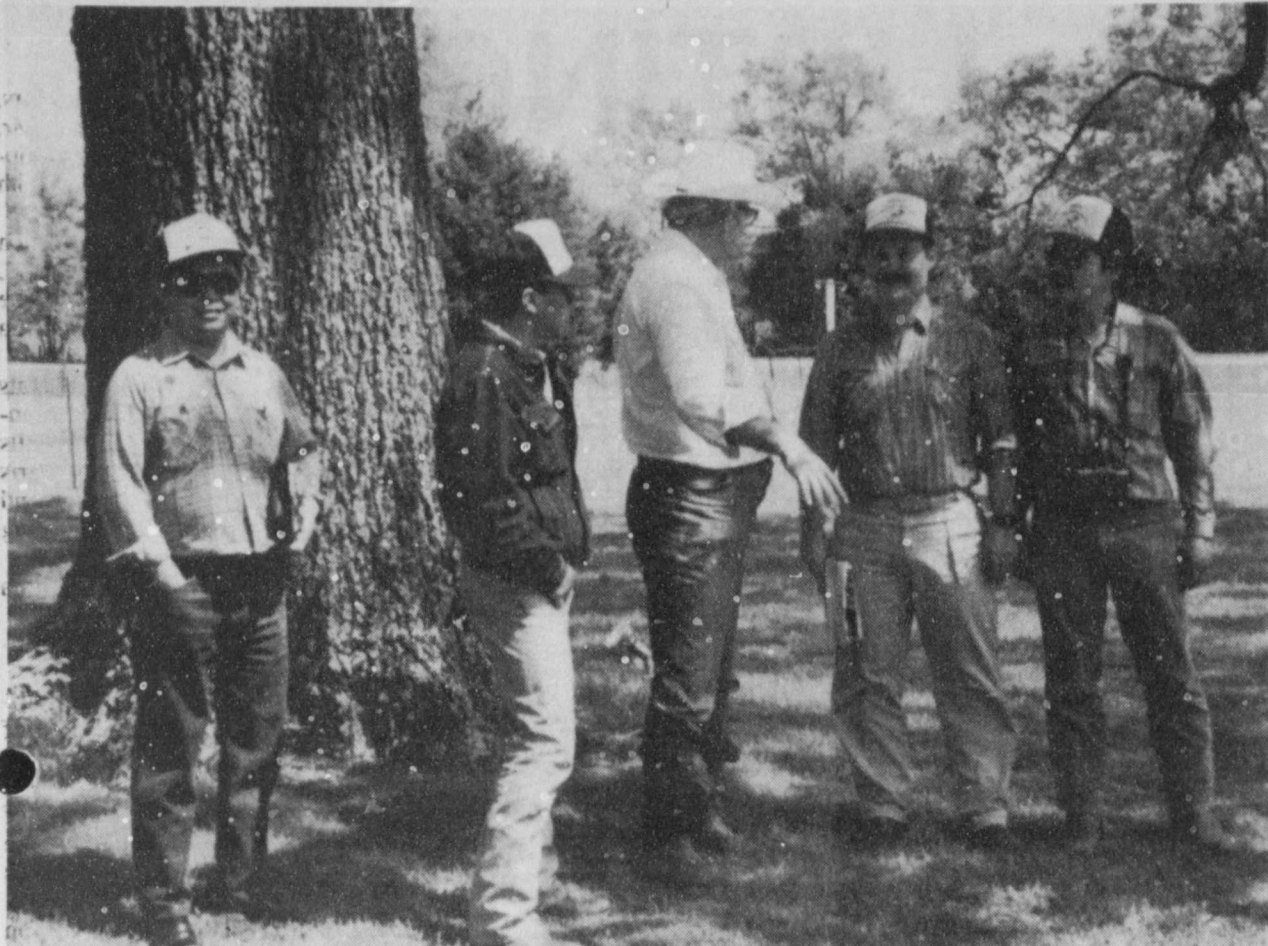

Cattle Going To Thailand

The Thailand Department of Agriculture sent Neni Wong Wan and Auswin Wong Wan to the United States to purchase young beef heifers to be sent to Thailand as base stock for a future red meat market in their country.

Their people are presently using water buffalo as their red meat source. Wullop Sarasup, First Secretary of the Agricultural Council Royal Thai Embassy in Washington, DC helped the Wong Wan brothers locate cattle in Texas and Louisiana.

A total of 520 head of heifers in-

cluding 12 registered Brahman heifers from Henry Burress' Great Oaks Ranch were shipped via Houston International Airport during the first part of June. The cattle were shipped through expert Livestock Specialist Orlando A. Puig, Sr. in Houston.

Before the cattle could be shipped, U.S. veterinarians and Thailand veterinarians visited each ranch and inspected each animal to be shipped.

The heifers will be bred to English-type bulls, and calf crops will be sent to a feed lot before being marketed to the people.

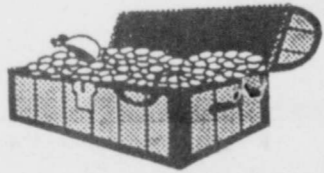
