How come we don't have hair on our eye lids...but have hair above them and on the very edges of the lids?


On the less biological side, more on the mechanical side.

His collection of memorabilia from World War II includes guns, flags, letters, German and French money, pictures and much, much more. In fact, the collection included enough items to cover a large antique dining

During the war, Mr. Geese was in the United States Army, 4th Platoon, Company A, in the Engineering Regiment.

Although the war is many years past, Mr. Geese describes with extreme clarity each person or event he recalls as he thumbs through his thick picture album.

With the same expertise he most likely initiated in the 40's, Mr. Geese mounted a grenade launcher to the

If anyone would like a glimpse end of his old army rifle, explaining with surity just how it was done, and the uses it had during war time.

Among the most fascinating things

in his collection is a diary, kept from 1941 to 1945, his service years. Scanning the handwritten pages is

an almost magical journey back to those war days. All the anxiety he and others felt as thebombers flew overhead, attacking the camp. The sadness he felt as he wrote

about the many Americans he saw killed, while fighting for freedom, the loss of friends, all are revealed in this day to day account of life during a turbulent, difficult time.

At the end of the diary, the tone changes, and the exuberance and pride Geese felt as he recounted the victories and his final days of wartime becomes stronger and stronger.

Mr. Geese generously explained

about many items of interest, and his pride and his devotion to his nation is strong and inspiring.

After a visit to his home, after talking with someone whose patriotism has been tested in the sternest of tests, it is impossible not to ponder on the men and women who fought so bravely for the liberty that each and every American enjoys.

Mr. Geese was amogn the fortunate ones who lived to come home from that war. Those memories are branded forever in his mind.

Somehow, it is doubtful that he, or other veterans, sees fit to consider burning the flag that they fought for as a "form of free speech". For him, the flag and the collection of war memorabilia, are very real reminders of a desperate time when freedom was at stake. It isn't something they

### Abundant Rain Leads To Abundant Mosquities By Nanalee Nichols

How can anything so very small be such a very big problem? But with tile abnormally wet spring, and the continuing rains of this summer, the mosquito is very definitely a big problem.

The fierce, persistent, armed, as everyone knows, with a blood-sucking "beak" and the desire to feed, is everywhere this summer.

Few things are as frustrating as trying to sleep with the irritating whine of a mosquito fading in and out as it zooms in closer, then backs off. Small enough to evade being spotted, the mosquito nevertheless, leaves behind huge welts that itch fiercely. Fortunately, this part of the world doesn't have to worry about transmission of diseases such as malaria by mosquitoes, so that the welt is about the only

result of a bite. Usual control methods, such as eliminating standing water in outside containers and pots, are nearly useless this year, because of the large amounts of water left standing every-

Old tires, cans, jars or scrap piles make ideal sites for mosquitoes to raise, and usually by July, these sites have gone dry. This year, however, with rain still falling, these places are continuing to provide excellent breeding spots.

can fly up to 10 miles, control efforts

are really difficult. Another by-product of the heavy rains is dense foliage and tall grass, mosquito heaven! Spraying dense shrubbery near or around the home with insecticide such as malathion can help, since that is where the in-

sects concentrate. Screens should be checked for

small holes, and patches applied, in order to help keep them outside.

Garages should be checked, and perhaps sprayed, as the mosquito likes to "lurk" in dark corners, they fly in through opened doors.

In order to go fishing, sit on the porch or have an outdoor patio, some measures must be taken. Insect repellent helps, as do oil of citronella candles or lamps. But remember, it takes a pretty heavy concentration, Since some species of mosquitoes since outdoors the effects of the repellent dissipate quickly. Bird houses for Purple Martins can provide natu-

ral controls, too. All in all, there is little that can be done about the mosquito except to eliminate as many breeding sites as possible, spray if they are really bad, and hope for dryer weather! Oh, and be prepared to use the ever-useful slap and scratch technique!

# Sales Tax Figures Released

Friday that local sales tax allocations to cities, counties and transit authorities across the state increased 14.2% during the first half of 1989, compared to the first half of 1988.

"The Texas economy continues to strengthen and expand, and the local sales tax rebates reflect that growth, ' Bullock said. "Even payments to economic areas that haven't fully recovered, such as Austin and San Antonio, are improving.

In the first six months of 1989, statewide city allocations totaled \$512.5 million, Last year's payments for the first six months were \$465.9

Checks totaling \$66.3 million were sent Friday to 875 cities that impose

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said local sales tax at either one or one and one-half percent, Bullock said.

Bullock added that the June 1988 monthly allocation was unusually large, so this month's payments compared to June 1988 payments may appear to be slightly lower than they actually are.

Bogata received \$1,397.84 for a 6.97% increase over last year's payment of \$1,020.57. Total payments to date are \$13,767.91.

Clarksville received \$12,782.15 for a 5.49% increase while Detroit received no payment for this period.

Mt. Pleasant received \$83,544.78 for a 9.75% increase for this period. Talco received \$1,247.89, show-

ing a 19.51% decrease, as last year's

payment was \$1,331.10. Total pay-

ments to date are \$10,083.44. Blossom received \$790.09 for this period, a 27.55% increase over 1988,

which had no payment for this period. Deport received no payment this period, with no payment for the same period last year. Total payments to date are \$6,904.56.

Paris received \$158,529.23, showing a 6.24% increase over 1988's payment.

'The best indicator of sales tax rebate trends is the year-to-date totals. One payment won't give as accurate a comparison as six payments,"

Bullock said. June's checks represent taxes collected in April by monthly filers and reported to the Comptroller's office by May 22, Bullock said.

Gonzales, settled in 1925 by James Kerr, is the site of the largest number of episodes of the Texas Revolution. The town is home to the cannon that fired the first shot of the Revolution on October 2, 1835. The first battle flag of Texas depicts the cannon and the words, "Come and Take It," in response to Mexico's demands for its possession. Gonzales was the only town to come to the aid of the men of the Alamo. Three Texas armies were formed at this site. Today, Texans can visit a museum in Gonzales commemorating its role in the Texas Revolution.

The state of Texas is the largest "aviary" in the United States recording more than 540 bird species. More than 97 percent of recorded migratory species of birds can be seen in the Surfside Beach area. Two continental flyways come together at this point on the Gulf Coast making Brazosport, Texas the wild bird capital of the United States. California is the second largest "aviary" with approximately 460 species.


