Census Figures Show 2,087,759 Farms In 1987

The 1987 Census of Agriculture shows that the United States had 2,087,759 farms in 1987, a decline of 7% from 1982. The number with sales of \$10,000 or more totaled 1,059,573 or 51% of the farms. Between the 1982 and 1987 censuses, the number of farms with sales of \$10,000 or more also declined by 7%. The Census Bureau defines a farm as any place which sold or normally would have sold \$1,000 or more of agricultural products during the census year.

The 1987 census shows that the U.S. agricultural sales totaled \$136 billion. Farms with sales of \$10,000 or more accounted for \$132.6 billion of the sales. Livestock, poultry and their products accounted for \$77 billion or 57% of the 1987 sales. Crops, including nursery and greenhouse products, accounted for \$59 billion or 43%.

Some 295,721 farms had sales of \$100,000 or more, accounting for

76% of total agricultural sales. About 10% had sales of \$50,000 to \$99,999 while 11% had sales of \$25,000 to \$49,999, 16% had sales of \$10,000 to \$24,999 and 49% had sales of less than \$10,000.

Production expenditures for the country's agricultural operations came to \$108 billion. Agricultural operators spent 13% less for commercial fertilizers, 10% more for agricultural chemicals and 29% more for hired farm labor than they did in 1982. They spent 3% more for livestock and poultry feed.

Duane is a native of the small community of Cunningham, and has frequently visits the area.

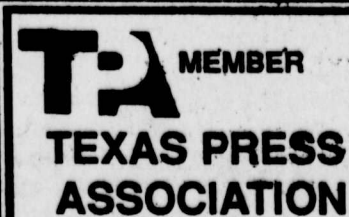
The Oak Ridge Boys latest album is entitled "American Dream" and the new video is being shown on the country music video channel.

Grimes Announces For County Treasurer

Former KBUS-KPRE news director Jeff Grimes has announced his candidacy for Lamar County treasurer. The 26-year old Democrat will be campaigning for the job on the promise of reducing the duties, the salary of the position over the next four years. "The treasurer's position has grown at a rate far greater than government as a whole and has become a bureaucracy itself," Grimes said.

Many counties have done away with the position or are in the process of attempting to do so, but efforts of special interest lobbyists in Austin have made that a difficult task. Grimes says the position in Lamar County could easily be reduced to a part time job. "I hope to reduce the job from a full time to a ten to fifteen hour per week job before the end of my term and reduce the salary for the position accordingly."

The primary argument for a full time treasurer's position is to act as a check on the county auditor. The auditor is a certified public accountant appointed by district judges who oversees all county finances. However, the treasurer's office was unable to catch a 26 thousand dollar error in 1986 resulting in double payment to a company no longer in business. Examples of these same type of double payments (in smaller amounts) are available for the last quarter of 1989. "Lamar County pays an out-

side firm in the neighborhood of 10 thousand dollars annually to check the books. If we have two CPA's looking at finances, an elected layman is not likely to catch their mistakes."

Grimes is a lifelong democrat, having served as a delegate to the democratic state convention from Lamar County in 1988. He is married to the former Debra Hackler of Clarksville and resides at 2710 40th SE in Paris. They have three daughters, Tammie, Tiffany and Valerie. Grimes studied political science at the University of Southwestern Louisiana and East Texas State. He has spent the last 8 years in radio news, receiving numerous awards for broadcast excellence. Prior to that he worked in his family's auditing business for five years. Grimes is a member of the Paris Jaycees having served as vice-president and he attends the Oak Park United Methodist Church.

Jeff resigned his position at the radio station effective December 29, because of federal equal time laws prohibiting him from maintaining an on-air position while campaigning. "I will be self-employed for the next three months, but will devote the majority of my time and energy to getting my message of less government to the good people of Lamar County."

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
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

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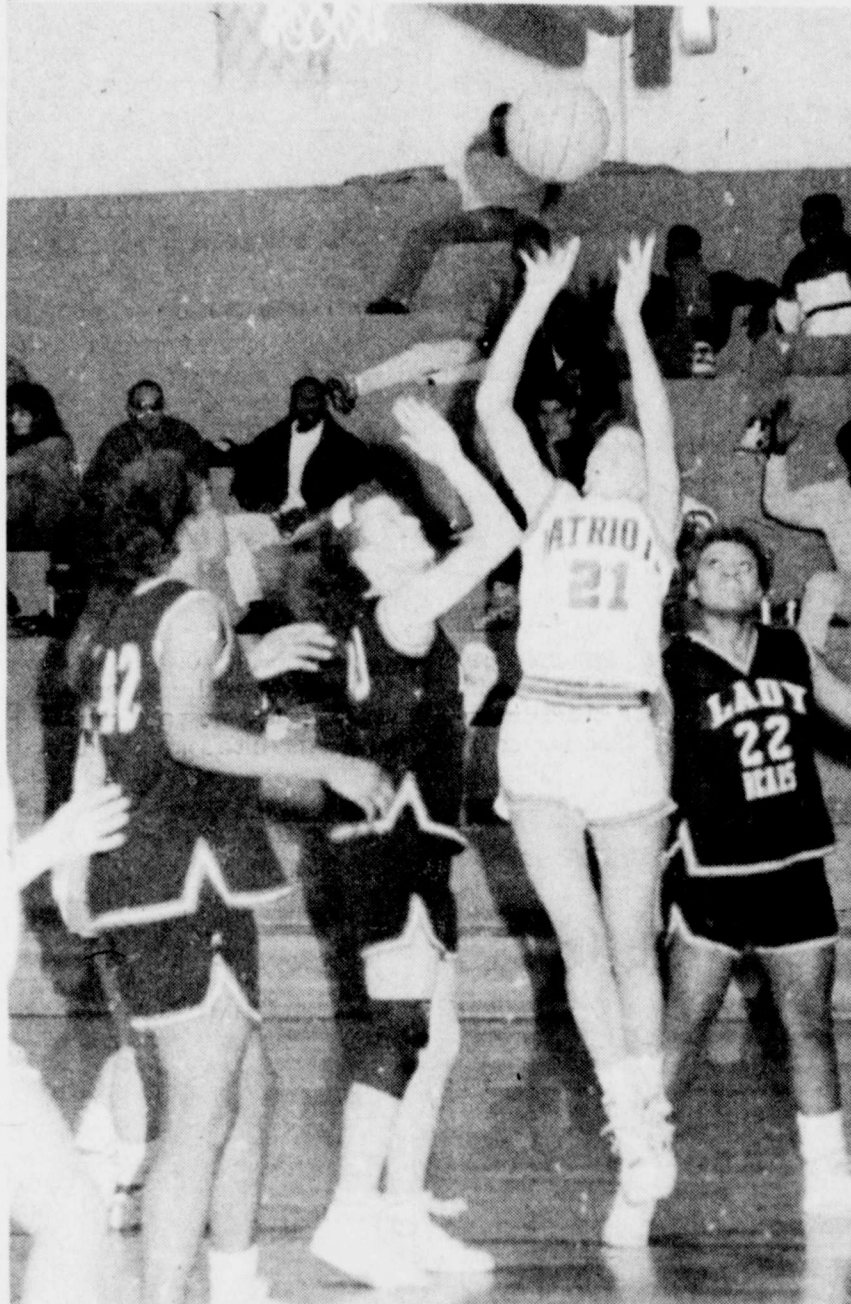

The kids are bored, the grass needs mowing, the barbecue hasn't been cleaned in weeks, and it's 90 degrees in the shade. Brace yourself for warm weather stress.

All year long we look toward warm weather for fun and relaxation, only to find that our jobs and families are just as demanding as during the rest of the year. And more and more, with dual-income families becoming more prevalent, it's difficult for families to arrange the traditional two-week vacation.

So we end up relying on weekends to provide us with what little relaxation we can capture. Like me, though, you've probably found that warm weather provides little relief from chore-filled weekends. In a national survey recently commissioned by Hilton Hotels Corporation, nearly 90 percent of the 1,000 respondents reported returning to work Monday morning feeling just as tired as when they left the previous Friday. • Eat well. If your schedule won't permit much more than fast or frozen foods during the work-week, plan some healthy meals on the weekends.

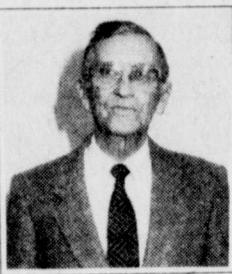
