Fleeing Suspect Crashes Road Blocks, Into Vehicles

Last Wednesday night, January 24, law enforcement officials were faced with a car chase that ultimately proved expensive, dangerous and lengthy.

John Enos Jones, age 42, of Bogata, led lawmen on a chase from near Pattonville to Bogata, down several roads and highways. During that chase Jones ran several road blocks, and, according to reports, allegedly crashed into at least three law enforcement vehicles, and ran dozens of innocent drivers off the road.

The chase began when DPS Trooper John Williams pulled Jones over for an expired inspection sticker. Trooper Williams reports that when he asked Jones for his driver's license and registration papers, Jones offered him a passport. Williams then reported that he smelled alcohol on Jones' breath, and put him through a few field sobriety tests. Computer checks revealed that Jones' driver's license had expired in February 1989, and a Dallas County Warrant called for his arrest.

When informed that he was being placed under arrest Jones allegedly shoved the trooper to the ground, then jumped back into his car and sped away, heading towards Bogata on Hwy. 271 South.

According to reports Jones ran a dozen vehicles off the road, getting up to high speeds of 65 to 70 miles per hour. Williams had radioed for assistance, and Lamar County Sheriff's deputies were soon on the scene. Lamar County Deputy George Dollins attempted to pass Jones during a "rolling roadblock". Dollins alleges that Jones tried to force his car off the road, colliding with him. Damage to that vehicle was estimated at less than \$1,000.

In Bogata a constable and a Franklin County DPS trooper

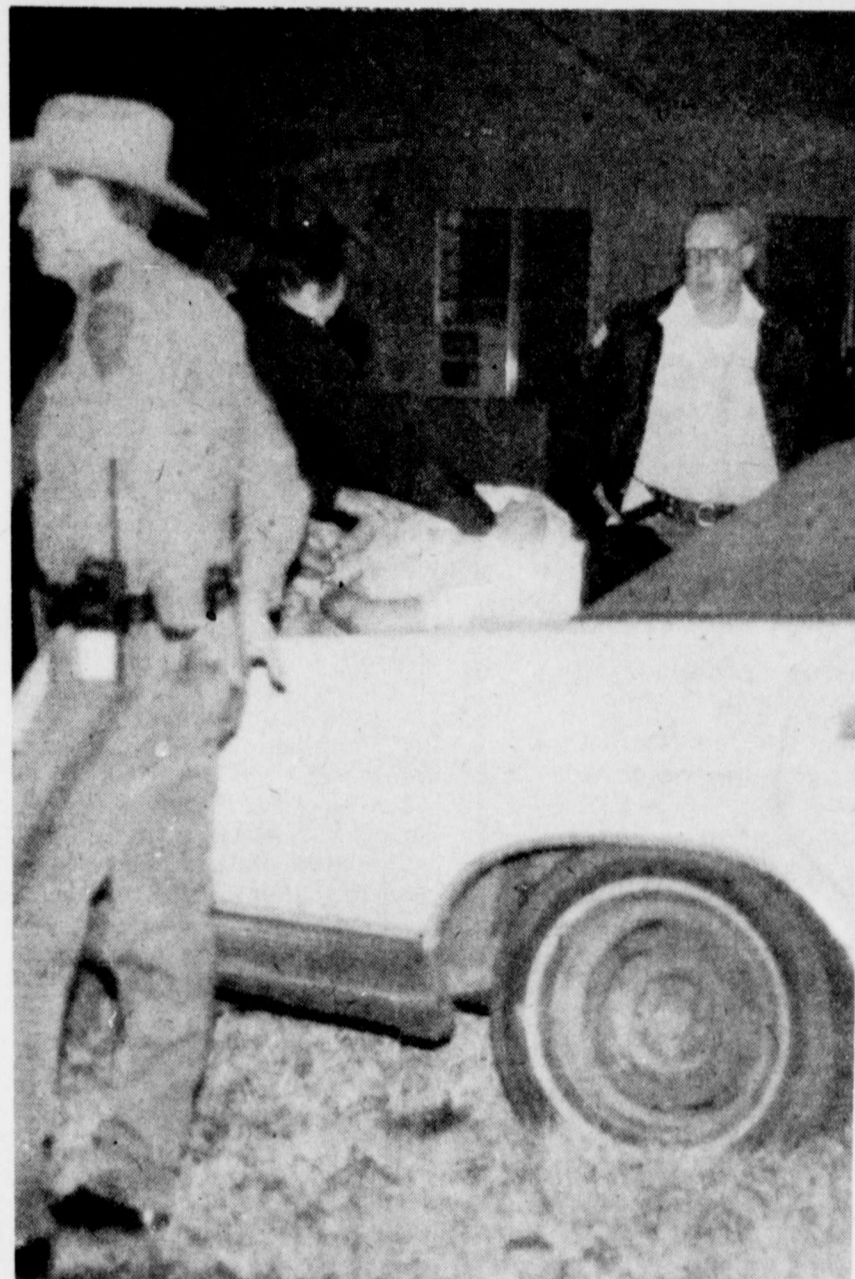
set up a road block with their vehicles, reports indicate. Jones cut through a ditch to avoid this road-block taking what is known in Bogata as "the loop" an old section of Hwy. 271. Two DPS cars and a constable were then in pursuit, and apparently driving on the wrong side of the road Jones' vehicle headed straight for a Mt. Vernon DPS trooper's Mustang. Jones' vehicle smashed into the Mustang, disabling it. Williams reported that Jones then backed up, hitting Constable Ted Byndas' pickup truck, and hit the Mustang again. Trooper Williams stopped to pick up the trooper in the disabled vehicle, and the chase continued.

Jones sped into the driveway of his house located on FM 909 east of Bogata, and, according to Williams and other witnesses, headed directly for Williams. Jones allegedly attacked Williams, and the Mt. Vernon Trooper came across the top of a car, knocking both men to the ground. Jones did sustain some injuries to his head during the struggle. After his arrest he was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital, where he was treated and released.

He was placed in Lamar County jail after being charged with the aggravated assault of a peace officer, resisting arrest, evading arrest, escape, driving while his license was revoked, driving while intoxicated and a motion to revoke his probation for driving while intoxicated.

Bonds totalling \$45,000 were set by Justice of the Peace L.Z. "Pete" Wilkerson, along with a fine of \$117.50. Bond was denied on the Dallas County motion to revoke his probation for driving while intoxicated.

Damage estimates on the two vehicles involved in collision during the road block were unavailable but expected to be heavy.



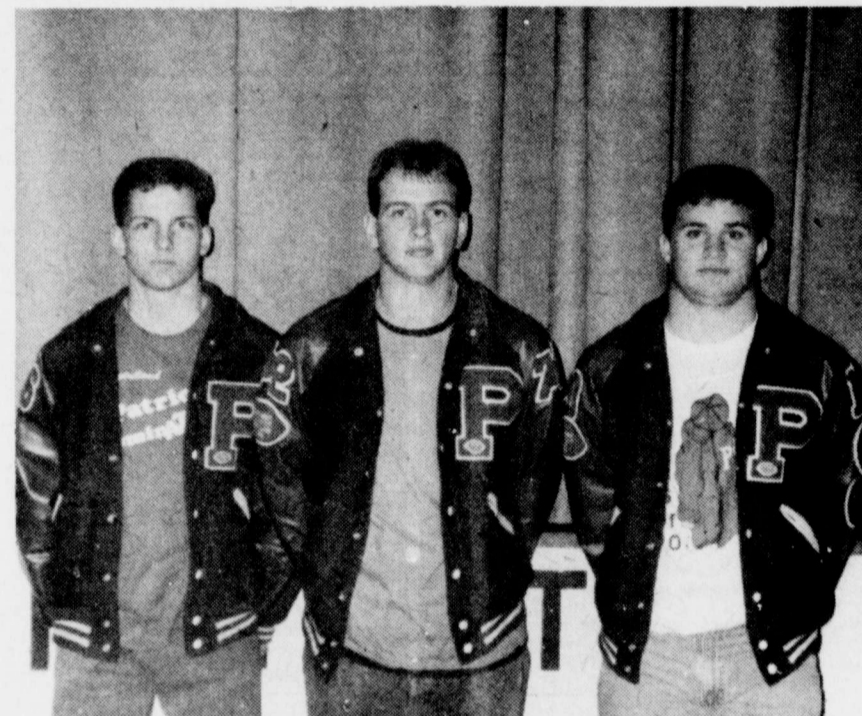
On February 6, students in Prairiland schools, as well as students across the state, will take the writing section, followed by the reading and math on the next two days.

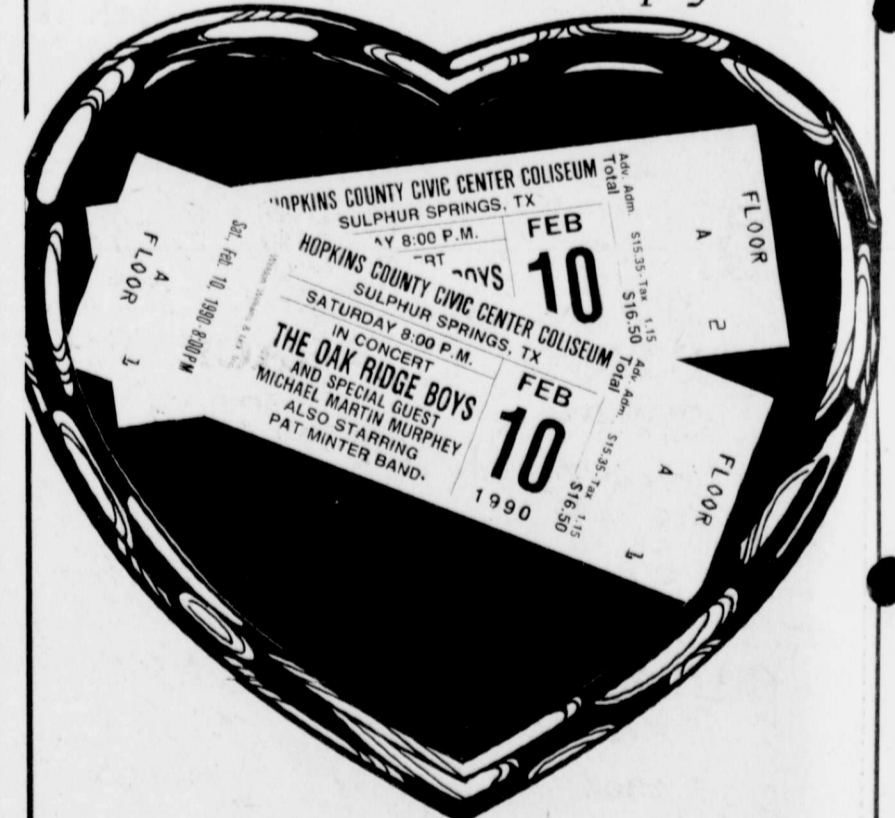

Couch Accepted Into Medical School

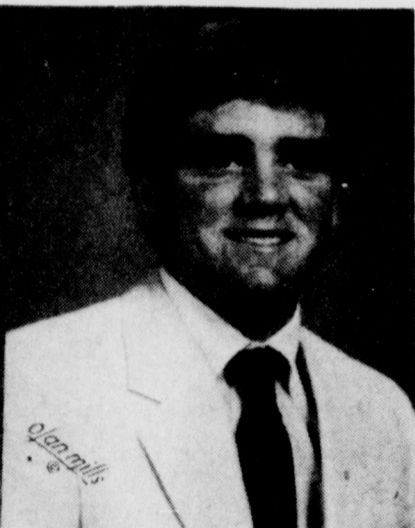

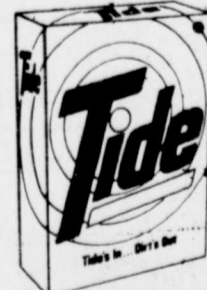

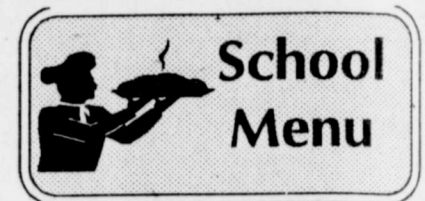
