Chili Cookoff Will Benefit Charities

As has been previously stated, CASI, the Chili Appreciation Society International Inc. will be holding a cookoff in Deport on April 14.

Currently, volunteers to provide stew for the Friday night fund raiser, and to assist with a variety of other activities is needed. All funds will benefit local charities.

Currently, there are plans for a Friday night stew supper, which will be for everyone who wants to come out and eat stew, a breakfast for the cooks the next morning, the cookoff for the CASI sanctioned contestants, arts and crafts booths, a local cookoff, food sales at lunch and bake sales.

Currently about 60 teams are expected. Many will be spending the night camping on Blackland Prairie Gin's lot.

The local cookoff will provide fun and competition for anyone wishing to cook up about a gallon of chili. There will also be a bean cookoff.

The CASI cookoff competitors have rules that sanctioned cookoffs must observe. These rules don't affect the local cookoff.

The whole thing got started way back when a challenge was flung down by Wick Fowler to H. Allen Smith.

The Terlingua, Texas World Championship Chili Cookoff is now World famous.

A chili cookoff, CASI states is: A celebration of chili which involves a cooking and showmanship competition. Chili is prepared from scratch at the cookoff site, and judged on a set criteria by a panel of judges in a blind tasting procedure. Chili cooks also

can participate in showmanship which is a form of competitive entertainment that adds a lot of fun to the cookoff. Showmanship will also be judged by a panel of judges based on a set criteria.

It is said that a chili cookoff can be held when two or more people get together to see who can make the best of the fiery "National Dish of Texas".

But the way things stand now, Deport will have a whole lot more than just two competitors.

Anyone who has ever seen the showmanship portion of this event will testify that it makes a major contribution to the cookoff. Imagine...

There are recipes for "Zen Chili", "Jail house Chili", "Oregon Championship Chili", "Nevada Annie's Chili" and a whole host of others.

Recipes are guarded jealously, spices purchased fresh, and chili ranges from blazing, unbelievably hot to mild and pleasant.

Caps commemorating the first annual Prairiland Chili Cookoff will be available.

Sherry and Don Denison have created unusual trophies from plow points. The trophies are hand painted and very attractive. They will be given not only to the CASI cooks, but to the local cooks who win awards such as the popular "People's Choice" award.

There will be trophies for beans, chili and showmanship, along with many other.

Anyone who is interested in helping with the event, setting up a booth, which is available for \$15, cooking in the local chili or bean competition, or donating towards the stew supper or any other aspect of the charity fund raiser is urged to contact a member of the Deport American Legion or the numbers previously listed.

Commissioner's Hear Proposal From City of Deport

The Lamar County Commissioner's Court heard a proposal Monday from City of Deport representatives that would enable the city to hire Constable of Precinct 1 Randy Boren \$300 as a part-time City Marshal in Deport.

The Commissioner's tabled the issue, since there were legal aspects to the matter.

City Councilman Eric Pearson took a letter from the City of Deport, and County Judge Deane Loughmiller read it. Pearson said he believed the agreement would benefit both De-

port and the county, because it would add needed income to the constable's office to offset his operating costs.

It was suggested by Assistant County Attorney Kerye Ashmore indicated that the agreement would probably not be legal, and that Boren could probably not serve as a constable and city marshal at the same time, but that perhaps an inter-governmental agreement could be reached in which the county would handle disbursement of the money Deport would pay Boren.

Smoke Alarm Project Could Provide Safety, Raise Funds

The Deport Volunteer Fire Department is planning a campaign to help safeguard homes from the dangers of fire, and raise funds for the fire department, too.

Willie Joe Fowler of Cunningham died Saturday, February 24 in McCuiston Hospital in Paris.

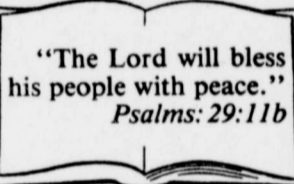
