Pct. 1 Constable Registers Complaint Against Sheriff

A long standing dispute between Precinct 1 Constable Randy Boren and Lamar County Sheriff Gene Burns has resulted in Boren registering a complaint of official misconduct against Burns with the Lamar County Attorney's office.

The charge stems from an alleged incident on January 3, 1989, and were filed following a radio silence imposed on Boren by Burns beginning Friday, March 3, 1990.

The radio silence was ordered, Sheriff Burns says, in an attempt to get Boren's attention after Boren didn't come in to the courthouse Friday night after Burns asked him to.

Burns said that "we monitored him silently and kept a log on his activities". Beginning between 11:00 p.m.

and 11:30 p.m. the March 3 the Lamar County Sheriff's office did not answer Boren's calls. The silence continued over the weekend but was lifted Monday.

During the radio silence Department of Public Safety Officials, Paris Police Department dispatchers and other constables assisted Boren.

Burns admits that Boren and he have had some differences, and that he wanted to discuss things with him.

He also maintains that Boren and Constable Tiny Hindman had paperwork to complete after an incident Friday night.

Boren, on the other hand, states that "in the first place I don't have to answer to the sheriff, and at the time

he called I was on the east side of Blossom on patrol and couldn't come right in." He also stated that since the

January 3, 1989 incident he has had a problem with the sheriff and didn't want to report for fear of getting in to it with Burns again.

The charges for the January 3rd incident allege that Burns pulled up beside Boren's car while Boren was talking to a Lamar County Deputy. Boren alleges that Burns cursed him and grabbed him by the collar because of a statement that he (Boren) made at the courthouse that Burns would be a one-term sheriff if he wouldn't change some of the things he was doing.

The matter will be submitted to the Grand Jury during the third week of March.

Deport Ball Sign-Up Date Change

The Deport Ball Association will have sign-up on Monday, March 12 at 7 p.m. at the American Legion Hall in Deport. The date for sign-up was previously set as March 8, but has been changed.

There will be a brief business meeting at which time officers will be elected for the new year.

Immediately following will be the sign-up. Notaries will be at the meeting so parents can fill out the neces-

sary forms and turn them in to the coaches. Entry fees will not be collected until the children's first practice. It is not necessary to bring your child to the meeting.

All teams have coaches except one boys Pee-Wee team. A coach will be selected at this meeting.

This year there will be a cut-off date for the sign-up. If your child is going to play, their notarized forms must be turned in by March 31.

Fishing Permit Needed For Jeffus Reservoir

City officials have reminded people that there is to be no fishing at Jeffus Reservoir north of Deport without a fishing permit.

The year-long permits cost \$5 and can be obtained at the Deport City Hall during regular business hours.

Violators can be prosecuted for failing to have a fishing permit for the lake.

Councilman On Agenda At Commissioner's Court

Deport City Councilman Eric Pearson reports that he will be in Commissioner's Court Monday, March 12 to get a ruling on the previously submitted inter-governmental contract which was proposed by him earlier this month.

The proposal would have paved the way for Constable Nancy Boren to be paid as a part time City Marshal for the City of Deport.

Drug Detector Dog Demonstrates Skills During Program

Pat Watson presented a fascinating program on narcotics detector dogs Friday night. The program was sponsored by the Deport Community Service Club and held at the Deport American Legion.

Watson and her yellow labrador retriever "Quinn" demonstrated the dog's ability to locate drugs no matter where hidden.

Watson is a certified dog handler, and the dog is certified. She is a member of the Texas Narcotic Officers Association, a member of the National Narcotics Drug Detector Dog Association, and is very proud, she says, of being associated with SENTRY Place a private security business.

This security firm provides narcotic detector dogs to a number of places, including Glen Rose Nuclear Plant, Mesquite School District, North Lamar School District and many other businesses and schools.

Watson explained to people that the dogs are carefully trained and certified, and that they are considered 99 percent accurate.

Nancy Bidwell and Freddie Bouillion are the owners-trainers of SENTRY Place, and she credits them with turning out some truly fine dogs.

Watson explained that she puts on many programs at schools and for organizations, trying to enlighten the public to the uses of the dogs, especially as a deterrent for school children.

"Having the dogs come on campus helps keep a campus drug-free...and that makes it harder for those who

sell drugs to get younger students on them" she says.

Watson explained how the dogs are trained, stressing that it is all a game for them.

"First we teach them about retrieving a 'tug' (a canvas sack stuffed with a sock). Then we place a small amount of marijuana in a plastic bag inside the sock, inside the tug. From that they learn to associate scent with their game, and will fetch the tug back from weeds, or in the dark".

From there the dogs learn to associate the scents of other drugs, such as methylamphetamine or cocaine by having their tugs scented with them.

"We scent the tugs for cocaine or meth by putting a small amount into This scent the tug, but doesn't contaminate the cloth. Watson says if a dog ever got a mouthful of cocaine or meth it would probably kill it, so they are extremely careful.

Handlers carry a plain tug on their belt when working with the dogs. When the dog alerts on a substance, they are never allowed to get hold of it, but are given the tug instead, while officials handle the suspected substance.

Watson relayed stories about the efficiency of these "drug dogs", including one of a dog that kept alerting on the front bumper of a truck that had been stopped. Nothing immediately showed up, but when the welded pipe bumper was cut open it was found to be packed with cocaine!

The dogs live with their handlers, virtually day and night. Quinn sleeps beside Pat Watson's bed, travels in a kennel with her on the job, and follows her every move with devoted eyes.

The alarms are invaluable as early warning devices to help make people aware if their is a fire in the home or office.

Bethel Baptist Church To Hold Revival March 18-22

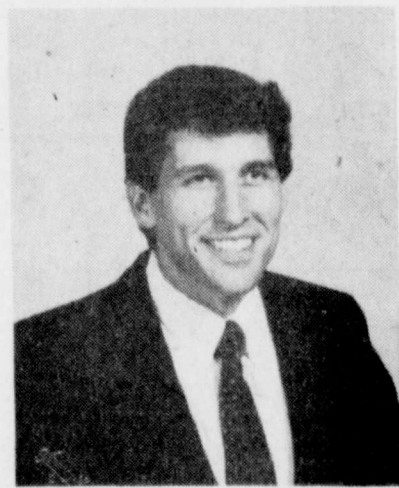
Bethel Baptist Church will have a revival from March 18-22.

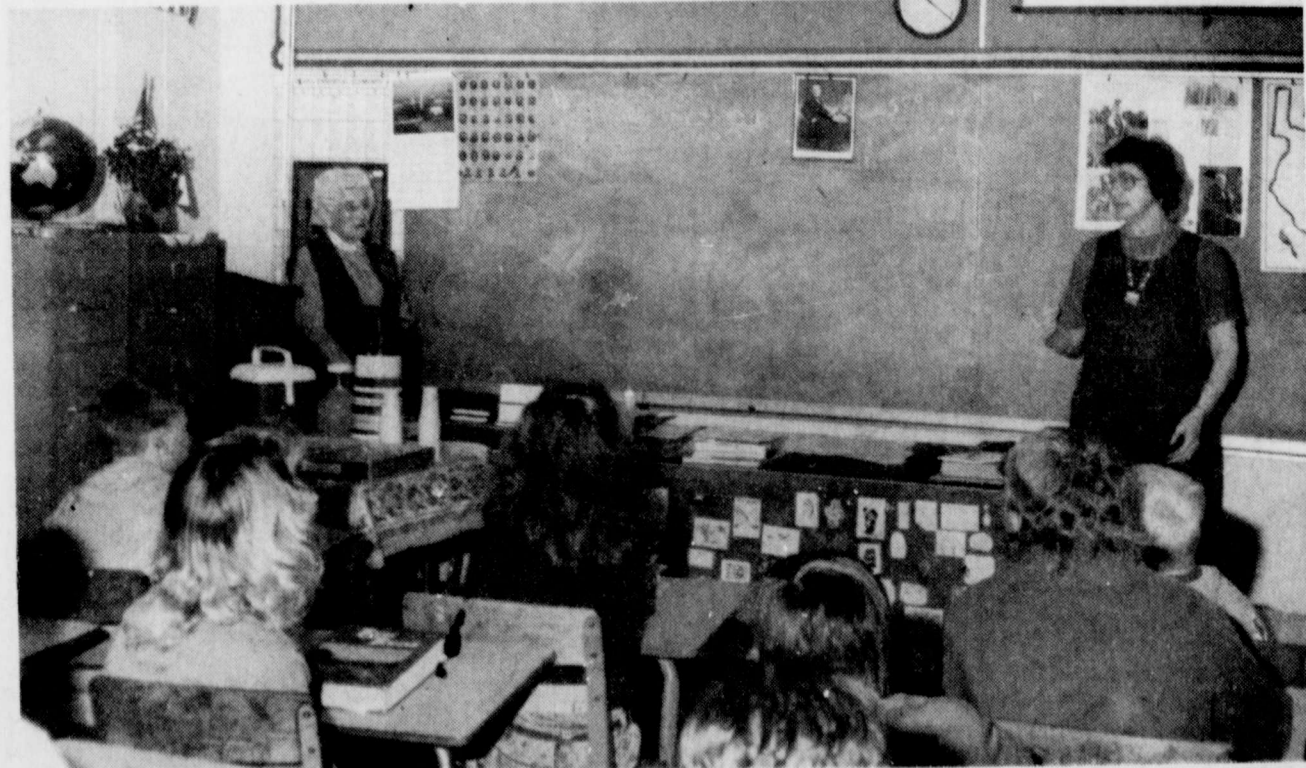

Buell Humphries, 60, of Texas City, died March 1, Thursday, at his residence.

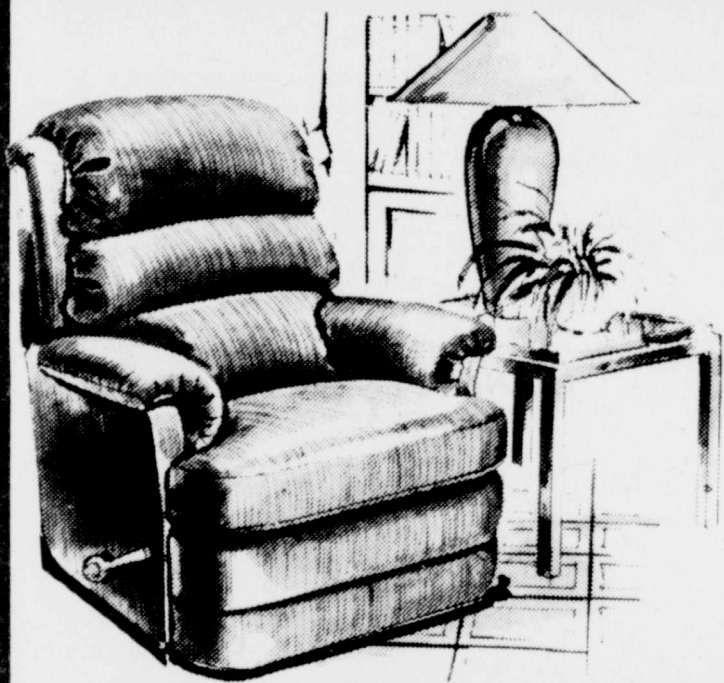

Pallbearers included James Demetrios, Larry Bradford, Don Wiggins, Carl English Sr., Pat Patterson and Gurney Youngblood.

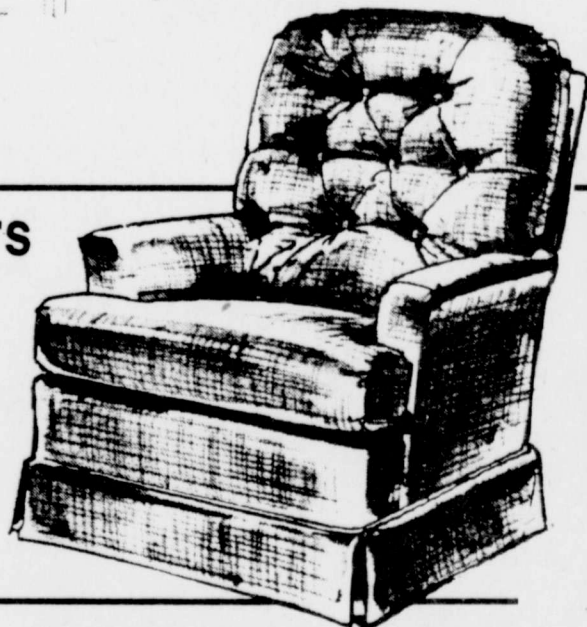

FmHA Monies Targeted To Most Needy Counties

Rural Housing funds are being targeted to 100 counties in 38 states across the nation that need it most, including Colorado, Frio, Maverick, Presidio and Zavala, according to J. Plan Rotation In Garden For Fewer Problems

To help decrease insect and disease problems and make better use of nutrients in the soil, vegetables should be rotated in the garden, says a horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Make a garden plan and write down where each vegetable was planted during the past three years," said Marty Baker, extension horticulturist at Overton. "Initiate a rotation program based on past experiences. The best rotation system is to plant vegetables of different families each year in a particular location in the garden." "Most vegetables within a family are susceptible to the same diseases and insects," Baker said. "Therefore, it is important to have a knowledge of the various families. Most vegetables planted in home gardens belong to 10 distinct families. These families are pea, goosefoot, mustard, parsley, nightshade, gourd, composite, lily, grass and mallow." "Rotations should be planned several years in advance for best results," Baker said. "Gardeners should also be aware of the nutrients required for each vegetable. This allows for better fertility programs and more efficient use of fertilizers." Local county extension agents have additional information on gardening.

Trevor Upchurch scored the only point in the third inning with a homerun and the Panthers picked up two other RBIs. The fourth inning brought no points for either team.

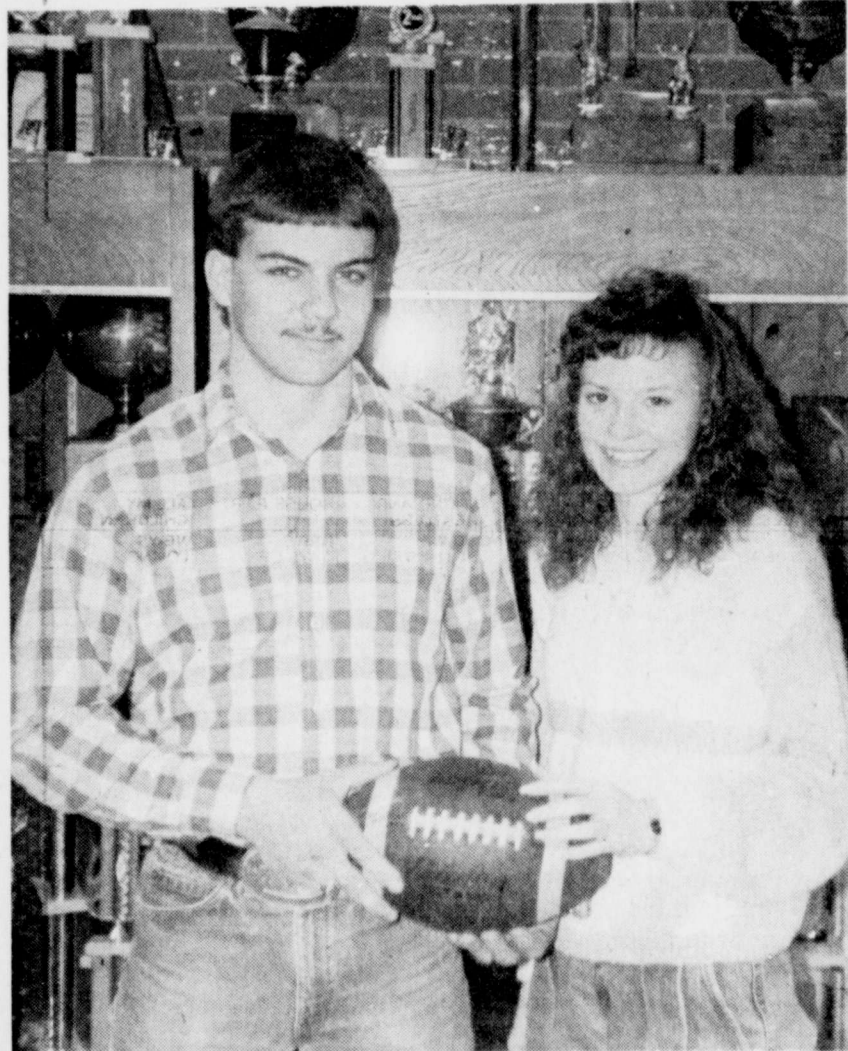
The fifth inning followed the same format with the Patriots ceasing to score and three up---three down on the Panthers.

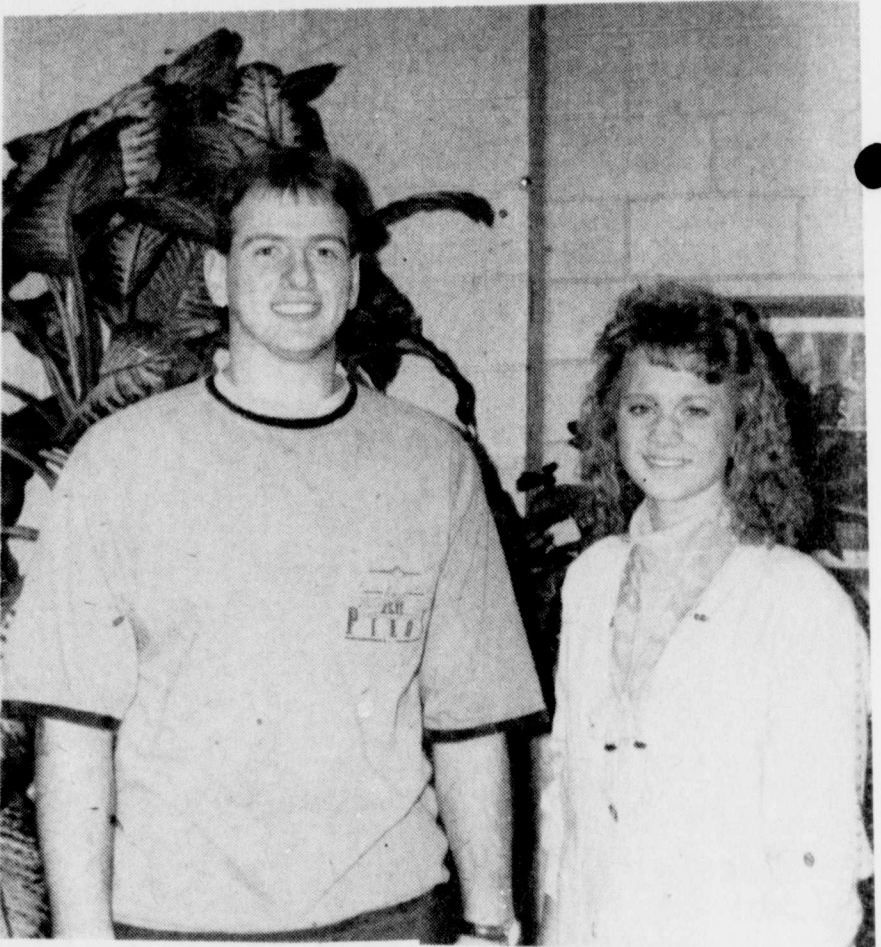

Social Security Notes

Social Security reserves continue to grow...The 1989 Annual Report of the Board of Trustees of the Social Security trust funds showed that the retirement, survivors, and disability insurance trust funds in fiscal year 1988 increased \$38.8 billion. In the same report, the trustees predicted that in 1989 income to the trust funds would increase to \$294 billion with an outgo of approximately \$236 billion.

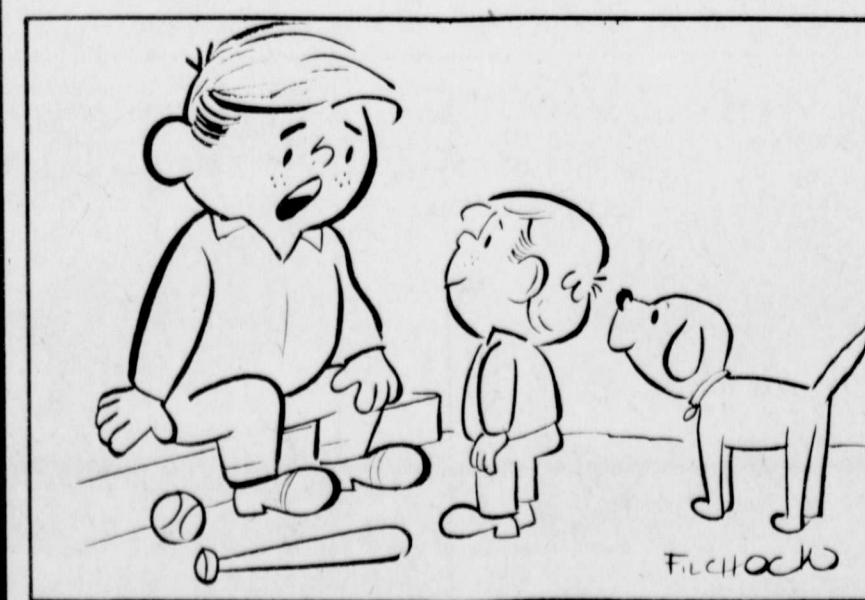
The annual report due in May on the 1989 Social Security finances is expected to show similar results. This helps to assure payments of retirement benefits when "baby boomers" reach retirement age.

With the continued increase in the Social Security trust funds, many people ask why this surplus is not used to raise Social Security benefits.

But, to consider the increase a surplus is a misconception, since the amount in the trust funds is not above what is needed, but merely a reserve to meet the financial commitment to workers in the next century, when today's young workers will become eligible for Social Security benefits.

During 1989, about 130 million workers worked in employment of self-employment covered by Social Security, and 39 million persons received benefit payments each month.

Although the funds are projected to reach \$1 trillion by the turn of the century and peak at about \$2.8 trillion in today's dollars by the year 2020, benefit payments after that will exceed tax income, and Social Security will use the accumulated reserves to meet its obligations.

Although it is impossible to predict exactly when and where severe weather will strike, loss of life and property damage can be reduced if citizens and governments are prepared. Along with the Governor's Division of Emergency Management, the National Weather Service and the Texas Insurance Advisory Association, local governments are encouraged to actively work toward a high level of preparedness by joining with schools, libraries, the media and civic groups to disseminate awareness information and to organize and take part in emergency management planning and exercises.

Therefore, I, William P. Clements, Jr., Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the week of March 11 through 17, 1990 as:

Severe Weather Awareness Week

in Texas and urge the appropriate recognition thereof.

There is a field for critics, no doubt, but we don't remember seeing statues of any of them in the Hall of Fame.

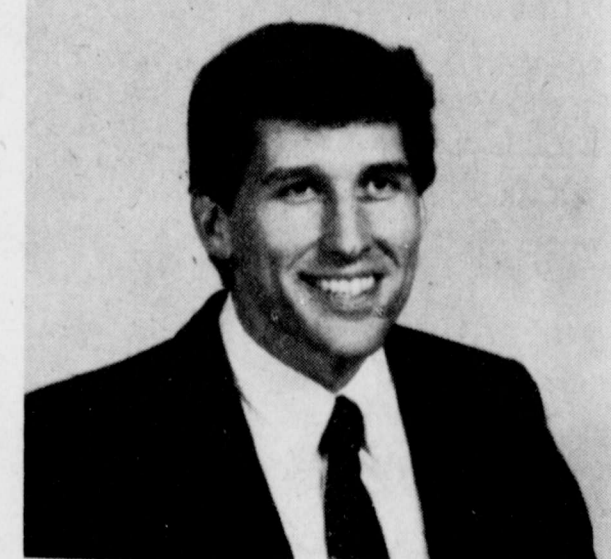
