Chad Figueroa Wins Calf

When the flag dropped at the March 2 performance of the 1990 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, the scramble was on, as 28 FFA students and 14 unruly calves covered the 2.75 acre Astrodome arena with excitement.

Chad Figueroa of Deport won an \$800 calf certificate by catching, haltering and maneuvering one of the elusive calves into the winner's circle. The certificate, sponsored by Lehndorff USA Group, will enable the youngster to purchase a registered beef or dairy heifer.

During the next year, Chad will raise the calf under the supervision of his county extension agent or agriculture science teacher. He will send

monthly progress reports to the calf certificate sponsor and to the Show. Also required are accurate monetary records, a journal including photographs and a 500-word essay covering the year's experiences.

The culmination of the year-long project will be when Chad returns to Houston to show the heifer at a special competition during the 1998 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

Net proceeds from the Show fund scholarships for more than 1,000 students in Texas colleges and universities. Money also is provided for agricultural research projects at the college level.

Donna Rozell Brings High Tech Treatment To The Barn Lot!

She walks into the horse lot lugging a big silver suitcase and a smaller black case. A tall woman, she is surrounded by a variety of dogs, from a tiny Italian greyhound to a huge part St. Bernard.
The horses are lined up with their heads over the stall doors, paying no attention to the dogs, showing only delight in her presence.
Donna Rozell of Bogata is about to give her "patients" their treatments. Donna has an unusual machine tucked away in that big silver case. It's called an Electro-Accuscope, and is used in the treatment of soft tissue damage, cartilage damage, pain relief, muscle spasms, arthritis, neurological injury and emotional trauma in animals.
Actually, the machine was developed and is in wide-spread usage for humans...it's only fairly recently that it's use began to become more widespread for treatment of horses, and even dogs.
Donna stresses that this treatment isn't meant to be a "cure-all" and that she very definitely wants to work under a veterinarian's supervision, as most people do.
"This machine isn't a miracle machine, but it is an excellent form of therapy when combined with good veterinarian care" she states.
The use of the accuscope in pain relief and therapy comes naturally to Donna, who has always been devoted to horses and has a weak spot for any animal in pain.
She has traveled extensively, including to Africa and Bangladesh, and during that time actually brought back a starving cat she found in Mali, Africa.
Her large "herd" of dogs consists almost exclusively of strays or dogs with injuries or problems. Inside along with a variety of exotic items from her travels is a crippled cat and a host of horse-related literature.
Therefore, when she first saw the accuscope used on horses at the race track, she was intrigued.

Soon she had purchased a state-of-the-art machine, and was spending days and weeks learning about it's proper use at Wraparound Farms in Bossier City, Louisiana.
She waxes enthusiastic when she launches into her explanations about the machine.
"It works by duplicating the body's own electrical currents" she says. "Damaged tissue doesn't have good electrical conductivity. This machine returns the tissue to it's normal conductivity by bringing blood and oxygen to the area of trauma". She stresses once again that the ideal situation is to have a veterinarian diagnose the exact problem, and treat it, and her machine works in addition to the other medical treatment.
She admits that she wants to make some money with the accuscope. With treatments ranging from \$10 to \$35, it's a cinch she won't be getting rich! But there's a lot more to it than that.
One of the first uses the machine was put to was to provide pain relief to a big yellow labrador retriever, afflicted with bone cancer. There was never any thought that the machine would cure the dog...only that it might give her pain relief until chemotherapy could have time to work. When, after the second treatment, the dog got up and walked away without limping, then curled up into a peaceful sleep, Donna's eyes filled with tears of joy...as did the dog's owner's.
One of the best things about the machine is that it can't do harm or damage. It doesn't mask pain, as some treatments do, but instead helps bring the body's natural painkillers (endorphins) to an afflicted area. Portable, battery powered, it certainly seems to be a high-tech machine in a prosaic barnyard world!
"That's what I want" she says "I want to establish a practice of treatment available to ALL horsemen, from the casual, backyard horse owner to serious competitors"

Watching her in action, she applies gel to the treatment area, tapes on two brass plates, and adjusts her machine. Treatment lasts from eight to thirty minutes. Her equine patients literally sag with relaxation when the treatments begin.
"A horse can actually be sedated with this machine" she grins. That's fairly obvious, as the animals cock a hip and enjoy the relief!
It may seem like an odd ambition, providing electronic accuscope treatments to horses, but Donna Rozell is serious about it.
"This machine is used in human athletic training rooms, and physical therapy at hospitals. It's even used on Olympic athletes...so why not on some of the best athletes of all, horses?" she queries.

Chinatown Chicken Simmer

2 cans (8 oz. ea.) Dole Pineapple Chunks
2 tbsp. cornstarch
2 whole chicken breasts, split
1 tsp. vegetable oil
Salt to taste
2 lg. cloves garlic, pressed
1 lg. onion, sliced
1 tsp. minced ginger root
1/2 cup chicken broth
1/4 cup soy sauce
2 tsp. honey
1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon

Drain pineapple, reserve 1/2 cup juice. Mix 2 tbsp. juice with cornstarch; set aside. Brown chicken on both sides in oil. Sprinkle with salt. Add garlic, onion and ginger. Mix reserved juice, chicken broth, soy sauce, honey and cinnamon. Pour into chicken mixture. Spoon sauce over chicken. Cover, simmer 25 to 30 minutes. Stir cornstarch mixture; stir into pan juices along with pineapple. Cook until sauce boils and thickens. Makes 4 servings.

Contacting Social Security...Chances are you or a family member will contact Social Security in the near future: A young child needs Social Security card; someone applies for monthly retirement, disability, survivors checks; an older individual wants to discuss the effect of part time work on his or her benefits.

Visiting any government office can be trying. There may be long waits and forms to complete. Then there's the nuisance of finding a parking spot and possibly another visit if you forgot something. Here's how to avoid some of these problems.

Use the phone! Most Social security business can be handled by phone.

Time your contacts! The best and least busy times to contact Social Security are generally early in the morning and later in the afternoon after the first week of the month. There are times, however, when you should get in touch with Social Security as quickly as possible.

Find out what you need! If you decide to visit Social Security, call first to find out what information and proofs you need so you can avoid a second trip. Evidence required for most claims include: Proof of age and Social Security number for each applicant; mos recent W-2 form, tax return; and possibly marriage, divorce, military or other documents.

Three-Bean Casserole

- 1 pkg. (10 oz.) frozen lima beans
- 1 can (21 oz.) baked beans
- 1 can (15½ oz.) kidney beans, drained
- ½ lb. Italian or pork link sausages
- 1 small onion, chopped (about ¼ cup)
- ½ cup catsup
- 1 tbsp. packed brown sugar
- ½ tsp. salt
- ½ tsp. dry mustard
- 1/8 tsp. pepper

Cook lima beans as directed on package; drain. Mix lima beans, baked beans and kidney beans in ungreased 2-quart casserole. Heat sausages and small amount water to boiling; reduce heat. Cover and simmer 5 minutes; drain. Cook sausages until brown on all sides (do not prick sausages). Cut each sausage into 2 or 3 pieces; stir into beans. Drain plums well, reserving juice. Add 2 drops red food coloring. Heat in saucepan until hot. Stir in sugar until dissolved. Whisk in cornstarch until thickened. Let cool.

Pit plums and chop coarsely. Soften gelatin in cold water. Fold chopped plum bits into dairy topping. Fold in gelatin mixture and ¼ cup of plum sauce. Spoon into pie crust. Chill. Use reserved sauce to garnish top.

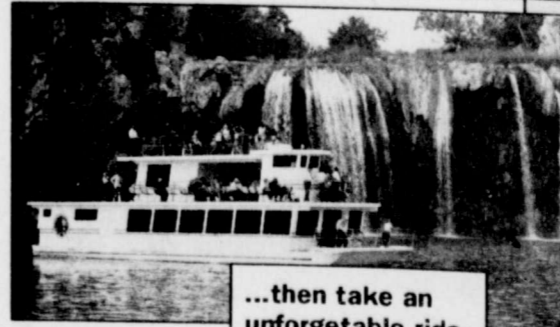
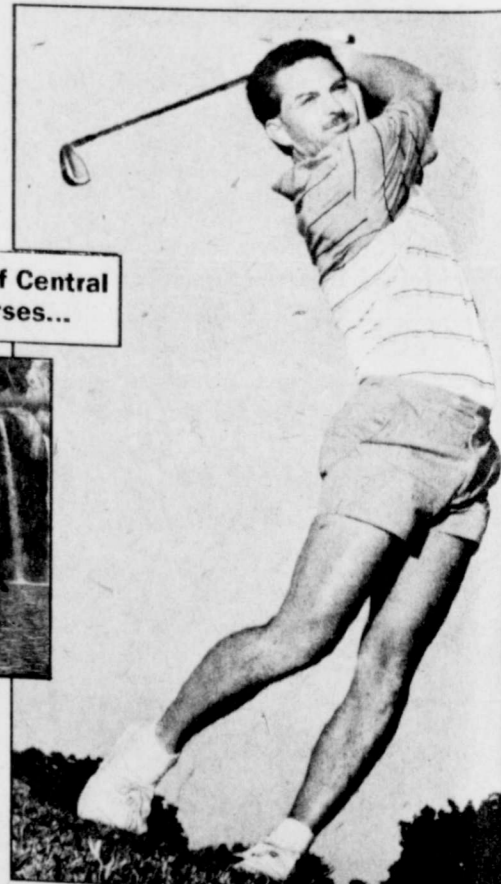

Soil Temperature Is Critical When Planting Garden

The temperature of the soil is critical to the success of newly planted gardens, says a horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Marty Baker.

"Many vegetable transplants and seed will not tolerate cold soil," said Baker. "However, cool season transplants may be planted in soils with 45 degree temperatures. Cool season seed crops need a soil temperature of 50 to 55 degrees."

"Most seeds are stored at a room temperature of approximately 70 degrees," Baker said. "Research has shown that putting the seed in the refrigerator for a couple of days may trigger the seeds to have a better germination percentage."

"Warm season crops, such as tomatoes, can be set out when the soil temperature reaches 60 to 65 degrees," Baker said. "Hold off on certain crops like okra, sweet potatoes and southern peas until the soil temperature is well above 65 degrees."

Soil thermometers are available for a few dollars. If a thermometer is not available, touch the soil with your hand to determine if it is warm.

Baker suggests using two soil thermometers in the garden. Place one at four to five inches deep and the other at one to two inches deep. By using both depths, the gardener should be able to gauge the right temperature for both transplants and seeds.
